

New Device.

New York, April 7.—Dr. Lee De Forest, inventor of the audion tube, described recently to the New York Electrical Society the development of a motion picture film that talks and makes music. A demonstration of the apparatus, which is called the "Phonofilm," was given. Dr. De Forest speculated as to the future use in the thefilm," was given. Dr. De Forest speculated as to the future use in the theatre of the phonofilm, which is in all respects like an ordinary motion picture film, except that sound is photographed on the edge, and by an ingenious process is reproduced. The action and sound are photographed simultaneously and reproduced simultaneously, overcoming the weakness of some past attempts at talking drama where the words have not harmonized perfectly with the action.

De Forest admitted that the technique of building a talking drama for motion picture audiences was something which would require a long time to perfect and predicted that the silent drama would never be transformed into a talking machine drama, merely by superimposing dialogue on the present type of photoplay. He emphasized the mistake first made in the use of the meter platters in attempting to the motion pictures in attempting to photograph drama as it appeared on

the legitimate stage.








