

PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

The Forty-seventh annual meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home, was held on Tuesday afternoon, the 7th June, in the Institution, Dovercourt Road. There was a large attendance of those interested in the welfare and management of the Home; among those present being Mayor Shaw, the Rev. Canon Cayley (Chairman), the Rev. Mr. Belt, the Rev. Mr. Davidson, Messrs. Huson W. M. Murray, Beverley Jones, Kelso, Major Leigh, and Mesdames L. E. Cowan, Arthurs, J. Austen, James Lockhart, Edward Leigh, A. Swabey, Andrew McKean, Edmund Phillips, Elmes Henderson, Robert T. Brown, Baker, and Miss Langton.

The children, inmates of the Home, to the number of about two hundred, occupied seats in the meeting room, and attracted the admiration of everybody by their neat, bright, and healthy appearance. The formal proceedings of the meeting were opened with singing by the little ones, in which they acquitted themselves most creditably.

The annual report of the Lady Managers was then presented and read by the Secretary, Mrs. Charlotte E. Leigh. Its tenor was of a most encouraging nature. It stated that 106 children had been admitted into the Home, 59 boys and 47 girls, viz., from the city, 71 children; Montreal, 2; Nashville, 1; Georgetown, 1; Peel, 1; Whitby, 2; Richmond Hill, 2; Amaranth, 2; Port Arthur, 2; Guelph, 1; Markham, 2; Barrie, 1; Lakeport, 1; Hamilton, 3; Burford, 3; Kingston, 1; York County, 2; Ontario, 1; Chicago, 1; Alpena, 2; United States, 1; England 3. By religious denominations—Church of England, 64; Methodist, 17; Presbyterian, 16; Baptists, 8; Disciples, 2. Average number of children, 200; and inmates, 215. Those who left the Home were 90 in number, 80 boys and 10 girls; 59 children had been taken by relatives, 38 boys and 21 girls; 17 had been apprenticed, viz.,

7 boys and 10 girls. One little girl, four years of age, Mabel Geddes, died of convulsions on August 27; two girls were sent to the Shelter, and two boys of defective intellect to the Asylum for the Feeble-Minded at Orillia. Two boys left without any order, and one girl was allowed to go to a situation. The managers acknowledged with gratitude, a legacy of \$100 from Mrs. Baker, formerly on the Board. Thanks were returned to various trades-people for contributions, to the Hospital for Sick Children for kind aid, to Mr Huson Murray for his invaluable services, to Mrs. VanKoughnet, Mr. Christopher Robinson, Mr. Albert Austen, Mr. Windsor for various gifts, to Miss Kate Merritt for admitting, free, 60 boys and girls to her historical drama "When George III was King," to Miss Cary McConnell for teaching drawing to Ida Sutherland, and to Mrs. John Cawthra and Mrs. Arthurs, for entertaining the children at different times. The Board had lost none of its members, but the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Leigh, after ten years spent in the cause of the Home, had decided to retire, and Miss Langton had been induced to take her place.

The statement of the Treasurer, Mrs. L. E. Cowan, for the year ending May 31, stated that the receipts had been \$11,395.89, and the expenditures (ordinary) \$8,400.71, and bequests and repairs, \$2,995.18.

His Worship the Mayor moved the adoption of the report, every line of which, he said, showed the loving interest the Secretary took in the children of the Home; he thought that this most excellently managed institution reflected the greatest credit upon the managers. In soliciting subscriptions the ladies had shown the most delicious tact. If ever an institution deserved an increase in the grant from the city, surely it was this. (Applause.) But fortunately the city had not been asked to make an increase.

The Rev. Mr. Belt seconded the motion, and in so doing referred to the modest early beginning of the Home, and to the proportions the work had now assumed. The promoters of this charity would be followed by the blessings of those they had succored, both in this world and in the next.

The report was adopted.

Dr. Graef, of the medical staff, reported that the health of the inmates had been exceptionally good. At a time when diphtheria was epidemic in the west end, the Home had escaped without a single case, thanks to the vigilance of the matron and officers.

On motion of Mr. Kelso, the following officers and managers were elected for the coming year:—Hon. President, Mrs. Van-Koughnet; First Directress, Mrs. John Cawthra; Second Directress, Mrs. Elmes Henderson; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Langton; Treasurer, Mrs. L. E. Cowan; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Austen; Managers—Mesdames L. E. Cowan, James Lockhart, Edward Leigh, A. R. Creelman, W. J. Douglas, John Cawthra, J. Austen, Robert Darling, John Farley, Arthurs, Gerhard Heintzman, A. Swabey, Andrew McKean, Edmund Phillips, Barker, Elmes Henderson, Stirling, William Revell, Robert T. Brown and Miss Langton; Medical Officers—Consulting Physician, Dr. Macdonald; Staff, Dr. Hunter, Dr. Price Brown, Dr. Graef, G. Stirling Ryerson; Solicitor—Huson W. M. Murray; Committee of Council—The Bishop of Toronto, the Rev. Canon Cayley, Dr. Potts, Mr. Kivas Tully, Mr. S. C. Duncan Clark, Major Bennett, Messrs. W. B. McMurrich, Henry Cawthra, A. R. Creelman, Elmes Henderson; Matron—Miss Deacon.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Medical Staff, to the retiring Corresponding Secretary, and to all friends who had assisted the institution in any way.

The proceedings terminated with singing by the children, and the benediction by the Chairman.

THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

TORONTO, June 7th, 1898.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen :

It is with feelings of devout thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for the great blessing of health and subsistence, that the Lady Managers of this Institution again approach you with their Report for the year.

106 Children have been admitted into the Home, 59 boys and 47 girls.

From the city, 81 children ; other places, 35 ; namely, from Montreal, 2 ; Nashville, 1 ; Georgetown, 1 ; Peel, 1 ; Whitby, 2 ; Richmond Hill, 2 ; Amaranth, 2 ; Port Arthur, 2 ; Guelph, 1 ; Markham, 2 ; Barrie, 1 ; Lakeport, 1 ; Hamilton, 3 ; Burford, 3 ; Kingston, 1 ; County York, 2 ; Ontario, 1 ; Chicago, 1 ; Alpena, N.S., 2 ; U.S.A., 1 ; England, 3.

By religious denomination—Church of England, 63 ; Methodists, 17 ; Presbyterian, 16 ; Baptist, 8 ; and Disciples, 2.

Average number of children, 200 ; and of inmates, 215. Of those who have left the Home, 90 in number, 80 were boys, and 10 girls. Taken by relatives, 59 children, 38 boys and 21 girls ; apprenticed 17, 7 boys and 10 girls ; adopted 6, 1 boy and 5 girls. The Managers regret to say that one little girl of four years, named Mabel Geddes, died of convulsions, on the 27th of August. Two girls were sent to the Shelter ; 2 boys of defective intellect were sent to Orillia ; 2 boys left the Home without an order, and 1 girl was allowed to go to a situation ; making 90 in all.

Perhaps the most satisfactory feeling of all is, that there has been an absence of any event of importance, the daily even round has gone on from hour to hour, without jar or hinderance, like the well kept machinery in some large factory, doing its work with certainty and dispatch.

When the raw material enters here, it is sometimes in a very neglected and unattractive state, but once put through the mill of wholesome restraint, cleanliness and education, it becomes a pleasure to itself and a comfort to the community. But that is only *sometimes*, as a rule, the material is good, coming from stock which is unfortunate, 'tis true, but not vicious.

"I have known all misfortune but disgrace," says Jean Ingelwou in her story of The Two Margarets, and sad indeed it is to follow the course of misfortune in its career. The happy home coming of the bride wife to her humble cottage, in which she gathered, as time went on, with a prudent hand, such little treasures as fell to her lot. The industrious husband returning to his evening meal with light heart and contentment of mind. Children were there, home is not perfect without them, and they generally bless the door-steps of the poor. Do you see a cloud advancing? Possibly an accident, or a day of soaking rain, which penetrates the not too-resisting clothing of the worker; illness follows. It is hard to keep house when the wage earner is laid up. One thing after another, until the last dark curtain is drawn over the sad scene—the mother and her little ones are homeless now.

It may be that it is the wife that is taken; then who will work and mend for the children; who will make ready the necessary food; who will bring them up in the way that they should go, when she who was so loving and so able is no more? Sorrow like this is not easy to fathom; it has to be felt, to be understood.

It is then that the sheltering doors of the Home opens and endeavours to aid, with such help as it is anxious to give, the sorely needed assistance. It can give food and clothing and many things, but what can supply a mother's love or father's earnest care? Love, affectionate interest in it, is what a little child thrives best upon; it is almost as necessary for it as its daily food; without it the body may be strong and healthy, but what about the development of all those qualities which go to make up the mind?

Happily for themselves, the children as long as they are comfortable and healthy, are blessed with the natural exuberance of childish spirits, and seem to love each other without a thought of grief or loneliness. They enjoy their Kindergarten exercises, following on to contest places with one another in the more advanced classes of the school. How keenly critical they are of each other, when called up to take part in the closing exercises. Wise and firm teachers, how much have you not done to mould the character for after life.

The fuel which feeds such a mill as this is, is money. Nothing can be done without money.

The parents who survive, contribute as they are able, with but few exceptions, and visit their children regularly.

The city takes a paternal interest in its youthful citizens, and helps in supporting them. The Provincial Government also makes a per capita grant, yearly.

Those ladies on the Board who are able to do so, go out with book in hand, and sometimes despondency at heart, to ask for contributions; but it does not do to be heavy hearted; the work is a

good and useful one, which commends itself to all thinking minds, and ought to do so, especially, to those who are blessed with happy homes full of boys and girls of their own.

During this year, excepting for measles of a light kind, the health has been excellent, for which all in charge are sincerely thankful. They feel most grateful to those members of the Medical Board, Dr. Graef and others, who have watched with unremitting care over the children.

In thanking Mr. Huson Murray, our invaluable Solicitor, we may say, with so much talk of war abroad, how glad we should be to feel we have had peace at home, not even a law suit, thanks to Providence.

The Matron, Miss Deacon, ably seconded by her Staff, has been most attentive to her duties, as the general state of the Home will prove, and also the bright aspect of the children under her rule. Strangers who have gone through the wards, have not been slow to note this, or to give expression to their favourable impressions.

The strictest economy, consistent with comfort, is observed in all departments, whether cooking, clothing, or sundries.

There is a Fire Insurance for ten thousand dollars on the building, but with the Divine blessing and all watchful care, it is to be hoped it will remain permanently with the Company.

Work has gone on as usual in the sewing rooms (of which a list is given), making or mending the many little garments for the large family, for 227 is a large family under one roof. People who are sitting at home, finding the time long, might well take this into their consideration, and try if their nimble fingers can sew or knit for the orphans. There are plenty of little feet to cover, and bodies to be clothed; and everything will be most acceptable.

There are many who give quite out of proportion to others, and yet have never put their names down in a book; they are the tradespeople, the butchers and bakers, the greengrocers, and many others, from whose door the market wagon never goes empty. Many hearty thanks to them for their continued generosity, and to Mrs. Carlyle.

There is another excellent charity which has been extremely kind to this one, although struggling under a heavy load itself, it is the Hospital for Sick Children, which has always been ready to help any of the little ones needing surgical or other aid. The Managers are very grateful for such help as this is.

One of the greatest pleasures of the year, was the visit paid by her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, who was presented with a basket of flowers, by the youngest child in the Home, and who won all hearts by her sweet gracious manner and kind words.

The Home has affiliated again with the Local Council of Women, and is sending five members to its meetings. It was also represented at the large Conference of Charities and Correction, held in Toronto last summer.

It keeps up a hearty co-operation with the Children's Aid Society.

The Lady Managers wish to express their warmest thanks to Mrs. VanKoughnet, for the handsome marble time-piece, placed by her, in the Board room; to Mrs. Christopher Robinson and Mrs. Albert Austen, for swings for the playgrounds; and to Mr. Windsor for putting them up, free of cost; to Miss Cary McConnell, for instructing Ida Sutherland in drawing; to Miss Kate Merritt, for admitting 60 boys and girls to see her Historical Drama, "When George III was King," with which they were delighted; to many who have given summer outings or treats in the winter evenings, and especially to Mrs. John Cawthra and Mrs. Arthurs for entertaining the children; with the hope that the former may soon return, happily, from Europe, to resume her self-imposed duties as 1st Directress of the Home.

The Board must congratulate itself on not losing any of its members this year; but the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Edward Leigh, feels that she can, although not without regret, gracefully retire from the position, the other Managers and herself, having induced Miss Ellen Langton, who is so capable, in every way, to assume the responsibilities of the work. She is not afraid that any one will attribute it to a changeable disposition, or lack of interest in the children, after more than ten years spent in the good cause; but other reasons prevail, and as she hopes still to remain on the Board, it is only handing over the books and letters to one, for whom she has the very highest regard, and who she will be glad to help in any way in her power, if necessary.

It would be impossible to express the deep sense of gratitude felt, to the Home, for the insight into life, it has given to her; touching the heart many a time, with stories of true sorrow, and cheering it again with the thought of the good done by this really noble charity, which is so worthy of the support of its friends and the public.

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT, 1897-98.

The Medical Staff is pleased to be able to present a gratifying report of the health of the children in this Home, through what has certainly been an unusually trying year among the children in the West end of the city.

When we remember that during this past winter, that dread disease of childhood, diphtheria, was so epidemic and severe, that most of the schools in the West end, and especially those in the immediate neighborhood of the Home, were closed for a longer or shorter period, and recall the fact that this Home escaped without a single case, and afforded the children the advantages of an uninterrupted school term, we feel that we have just reason to congratulate the Management and friends of the Institution on such a satisfactory showing.

A mild outbreak of chicken-pox (Varicella) in December among the nursery children—some twelve cases in all—and in April, some fifteen cases of measles, none of which involved any of the ordinary sequelae, sums up the extent of infectious diseases in the Home during the year.

This record is all the more gratifying in view of the fact, that many of the children in the Home are the orphans of parents who, dying of consumption, cancer, or similar more or less hereditary troubles, have transmitted to their offspring constitutions but ill adapted to resist the onset of disease. It is only just to add that their good record is largely due to the vigilance and energy of the matron, and her help, in the Home. They have learned thoroughly the value of the proverbial "ounce of prevention," and to their intelligent carrying out of the rules of Hygiene, we owe much of the health and comfort enjoyed by the children.

The thanks of the staff are due to the Managers for the pains they have taken to carry out such suggestions as we have found it advisable to make from time to time; their unvarying courtesy to us, and the untiring interest they display in the welfare of their charges, coupled with the generous devotion of their time and energies to the interests of the Home, has rendered the discharge of our duties both easy and pleasant.
