Labrador News

The S. S. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, reached port at 10.30 Monday night from the Labrador mail service, going as far north as Hopedale, where she took on board the crew of a shipwrecked schooner owned by Mr. James, of Exploits. The ill fated ship left her bones on the shore at Rowseville Harbor, North of Labrador. The men who had a narrow escape, were landed at their homes on the return trip.

Capt. Parsons reports the fishery unfavourable, with most of the floaters gone north. The trip was almost a record one, was made under excellent weather conditions until last Sunday when returning home from the north darkness suddenly set in, about five miles outside of Weesleyville, and much difficulty was experienced in making that port.

The Sagona's report of the fishery is:—
Cape Mugford—Seven schooners reported there last week, all doing well.
West Turnavie—Bartlett's crews hail for 50 to 100 quintals, with fish scarce.
East Turnavie—The best fished crews report from 100 to 150 quintals.

Iliaa—A few crews have from 150 to 200 quintals.
Mesovic—Dunn's crews have 400 quintals ashore.
Iron Bound Islands—Hierlihy's crews have about 200 each.
Ragged Islands—A few crews hail for 200 quintals each.
Horse Hr.—Very little doing.
Emily Hr.—Very little doing.
Holton—Poor fishery.

Indian Hr.—Jas. Wade's schooner from Conception Hr. with 600 quintals.
Cutthroat—A few crews with 300 quintals each.
Grady—Very little doing.
Pack's Hr.—Very little doing.
Sandy Island—Some crews have done fairly well.
Webber's Cove—Crews 200 and 300 quintals each.
Bolster's Rock—Shanahan's crews report for 500 quintals.
Other places fishery generally poor.

Death of Mr. Jonathan Snow

Interment took place on Monday, July 31st, at 2.30 p. m. in the Church of England Cemetery, the Rev. D. R. Bailey officiating.





Famous Bridges

The Highest, Largest and Most Ornate Structures of their Kind.

The biggest bridge in the world is the Forth bridge. The British navy can pass under it, and its biggest dreadnaught looks like a pygmy in comparison.

The highest bridge in the world is the wonderful single span which crosses the gorge discovered by Livingston, into which the mighty Zambesi leaps in a fall only matched by Niagara. This light, airy looking structure is 400 feet above the river bed, so that the dome of St. Paul's could comfortably stand beneath it.

The longest single span in the world is the span of Brooklyn bridge. It is a suspension bridge, and its supporting towers are 1,600 feet apart. Imagine the strength of the cables capable of supporting such a terrific dead weight, to which add the surging traffic of two vast cities.

The two longest bridges in the world are the Tay bridge, in Scotland, and the great bridge which carries the railway across the St. Lawrence, at Montreal. The most ornate bridge in the world is the Tower bridge across the Thames. In fact, it is perhaps the most beautiful bridge in existence. It is unique, too, in that it is both a girder bridge and a suspension bridge and is also like the ancient draw-bridges of romance.

Its cost was £1,500,000, which is just about half the amount the Forth bridge cost.

Russian Equipment

New Shell Explains Russian Success on the Eastern Front.

A new kind of shell, said by some correspondents to be a Japanese invention, while others assert it is the product of Russian scientists, is generally given the chief credit for the success of the new Russian offensive, in despatches from Petrograd. Incredible quantities of this new weapon are being used by the General Brusiloff, and its effect is said to surpass everything witnessed in the war thus far.

"Of course, nothing can be said about the nature of this shell," says the Morning Post's correspondent at Petrograd, who asserts it is the product of the co-operative research of the Russian universities.

"In fighting, hitherto, the capture of positions have been gradual processes, but on the present occasion it is rapid beyond belief, the destruction and capture of men coming like a lightning stroke, leaving the staff officers, whose station is from five to fifteen miles behind the firing line, with no hopes of repairing the initial mischief, and they simply fled. The astounding quantity of booty of every kind is likewise evidence of this."

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—85 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

A Forgotten Army

Organization That is Doing a Noble Work at the Front

There is one army actively engaged in the war swept countries of Europe whose achievements have never as yet got into the headlines. It does not figure in the reports of trenches lost or taken in Flanders, or of desperate fighting in mountain passes, or of advance or retreat in Russia or Mesopotamia. It attracts no notice, and the man in the street never hears of it or thinks about it. Yet its activities extend to all the different theatres of war.

It is the Salvation Army—the same army whose soldiers trumpet along our street with their summons to equality striking meetings, and whose leaders hold out entreating cups at the street corners for contributions to Thanksgiving dinners and Christmas gifts. It is not all of its fighting on one side. There are 40,000 or more Salvation Army recruits fighting under the British flag—many of them were wrecks and derelicts until the Salvationists officers picked them up and made them men. But there are also Salvationists also fighting in the German, French and Belgian armies.

British Salvationists have furnished, and manned ambulance units for care of the wounded soldiers from the field hospitals to the base. Canadian Salvationists have sent a unit of five cars to the Russian front, and have received the Czar's personal acknowledgment. The soldier Salvationists sing their familiar hymns in camp and when they get into battle. The women Salvationists are welcomed in the military hospitals in France. They have faced all perils in Rheims and other cities that have been battered by bombardments, and that have been in the possession of the French and the Germans. Here is an incident of the German occupation of Rheims which presents war in a new aspect.

A few grief-stricken neighbors were gathered for prayer in the small quarters. Suddenly some one was heard knocking at the windows; the adjutant opened it and saw a German soldier. At sight of the praying group, the man drew back, uttering excuses. But the adjutant, who did not know a word of German, beckoned him to stay, and then, from his coat pocket, the German drew forth a photograph of his wife and children, and began to sob as he tried to make the officers understand that he, too, was a converted man.

In Holland, the Salvationists have visited internment camps and have sheltered Belgian refugees. They have established a strangers' bureau, by means of which they communicate with prisoners of war and trace those who have been reported missing. What is perhaps most remarkable they finance their different activities through their own "Self-Denial Fund." It seems time to pay a word of tribute to this unique army, whose members seek to be, as they express it, "servants of all."

World Briefs

Three sisters of Lords have become farm laborers in England, including the sisters of Lord Fitzwilliam.

Archduke Frederick (Austria) was taking lunch at Lusk at noon; in the afternoon the Russians took possession.

French army officers have solved the problem of travelling over desert sands with a light sled, driven by an aerial propeller, which makes fair speed and climbs grades easily.

For cleaning the outside of ships an Englishman has invented a huge scrubbing brush, to be driven by an electric motor while a vessel is in port without the necessity for dry-docking.

No paint for lampposts this year of war in some parishes of London. As there are hundreds of thousands of lampposts in the metropolis, and a coat of paint costs 25c each post, this will mean something substantial to put into the credit side of the ledger.

The Russian government has ordered 200,000 tons of barbed wire in the United States. This order will total over twelve million dollars at present prices. Evidently the bear is in the war to stay.

Major Priestly, R. A. M. C., whose report on the horrors of the Wittenburg hospital camp, shocked the world, has received the C. M. C. The King emphasized the value of his service on the whole subject of the treatment of prisoners by Germany.

It is too bad that, just when it is most needed, the winter wheat crop of the United States will show a loss of at least 180,000,000 bushels. On top of that, the exceptionally wet weather in Canada is bound to hurt the crop there. Misfortunes, it would seem, never come singly.

The old naval training ship, Britannia, that has been stationed at the Dart since 1869, and on which King George and the late Duke of Clarence were both cadets, has been sold to a London firm for the sake of the material of which she was constructed. She was in action during the Crimean war.

The Sultan of Darfur, whose troops were so thoroughly beaten in the desert a few weeks ago, was the same gentleman that was liberated from the old Mahdi's prison of Khartoum by Kitchener in 1898. His punishment now is considered by Egyptians to be the finest act that has been performed by the British since the war began.

A tortoise was sent by an English soldier to his wife at Southampton, Eng., from Saloniki. Eighteen days on the journey, it was packed in a wooden box and wrapped in paper. When taken from the box it had eaten a good deal of its packing. At first it refused to come out of its shell, but was eventually coaxed with a spoonful of milk.

The town in question is Altenberg, and the double reason given for the innovation is the absence of men at the front, and the famished condition of the population through a shortage of food which could be dealt with more effectively by women than by men.

Twice Wounded

Writes to His Mother

Dear Mother, - No doubt before this you have heard of the Great Franco-British offensive and the part our Regiment played in it. Well, mother, I must say it was an awful time. Our heavy guns bombarded the German lines for 3 or 4 days before we attacked. We had guns of the greatest calibre, from 15 inches down, and hundreds of them. The ground trembled for miles around. It was enough to shake your nerves.

About an hour before the attack we exploded a mine which we had dug under the German village, and I can tell you it was quite a sight to see houses, wagons, horses, Germans and everything else going up in the air. We stood to all night in the trench, and about 3 in the morning, July 1st, we left the trench and went over to pay Billy German a visit. But he did not seem a bit surprised. He was fully prepared to receive us. Two other Regiments went over before us and got mowed down.

We went and they received us the same. They turned their machine guns on us as soon as we left the trench, and our boys began to fall. There were bulks of dead on the ground. We had to jump over the fallen, and the cries of the wounded were enough to pierce you; but we kept on. Our boys were falling fast and it soon came to my turn, I got hit in the shoulder and fell.

The shells were bursting around there then, and the Germans were sweeping the ground, killing the wounded, with their machine guns, so I thought if I wanted to live that was no place for me. My legs were all right then, so I got up and started for our trench. I just had time to reach the top, when I got a bullet in the leg sending me head over heels to the bottom of the trench on top of five, more that were already there. That's where I stayed.

I thought I was done for. I couldn't bandage my wounds, and I was bleeding fast and getting very weak. One of our boys, who was also wounded, came along shortly after, and he bandaged my leg with my field dressing, but he couldn't bandage my shoulder.

I began to get very weak from loss of blood. I couldn't move hand or foot then, and there was no one to bring you in. One of the five in the trench with me died there, and the other four were, like myself, helpless.

Fishery News

New fish is beginning to find its way into the market in increasing quantities, and, while the first to come in was of a small run, what is now being offered shows a marked improvement, both in size and quality.

The prices given in St. John's are: For No. 1, \$6.50, and for other qualities \$5.50 to \$6.00.

It seems apparent that there will be an early demand for large, well-made new fish for the European market. Our fishermen should, by every means in their power, endeavor to meet this demand.

There is considerable old fish still on hand in St. John's, but most of that will likely be sent to Brazil where, we learn, the market is holding firm.

The shore and bank fisheries report to July 25, as given by the Trade Review, is 259,031 qtls. This year as against 232,793 qtls. for the corresponding period last year.

The total number of vessels cleared for Labrador and the Straits up to July 15, 1916 is 522, with a tonnage of 19,943. The crews aggregating 6,248 persons.

The price of common cod oil is now \$140 per ton, but it has a tendency to drop. As this price is nearly double that offered at the same time last year a reduction would not be so badly felt.

Choice refined medicinal oil is quoted at \$1.25 per gallon, but buying is not very brisk. It is thought that those who can afford to do so would act wisely in holding on to their refined oil.

All over the country the refiners have cut the price of livers to 20 cents per gallon, and some of them have suspended business.

All along this side of Conception Bay there is still some fish to be had. In our immediate vicinity, when weather permits fishermen get 2 or 3 qtls daily, while at Harbor Grace, during the past week, from 5 to 20 qtls. were taken daily.

We learn that there is a good "sign" of squid in this neighbourhood. Hook and line men anticipate good results should squid bait become plentiful.

Interesting Letters

On our third page today will be found a very well written letter from Rowen Parsons, a member of the Newfoundland regiment who was twice wounded during the battle of the 1st of July, to his mother, Mrs. Richard Parsons. It is well worth perusing. We trust his recovery will be speedy and complete. Also a letter from Naval Reservist Ted Russell, to his father Mr. William Russell, Ted has "signed on" for the duration of the war. Do not these letters appeal to you, boys? Eyes, front!

The Cot Fund

Strong Letter From "Protected"

(Editor The Guardian).

Dear Sir,—It seems incredible that an appeal such as that made last week on behalf of the Cot Fund should have met with a comparatively insignificant, wholly inadequate response in some sections of this town.

Men and women may, with some claim to conscientiousness, albeit with a complete absence of logical reasoning, refuse to subscribe to a fund for the help of men while actually fighting; but it is inconceivable that anybody who has anything to offer should refuse to make some sacrifice—I said sacrifice—for the alleviation of the suffering of those who are being mutilated in their sublime efforts to protect our liberties, our (in many cases) worthless lives, and to preserve to future generations nothing less important than Christianity itself!

No one amongst us can plead ignorance of this cause. It has been well advertised, discussed in daily newspapers and from the pulpits of our churches, and has been an absorbing universal topic of conversation.

I am no saint, but even I should fail to recognize the least claim to being called a Christian on the part of a man who shows, by his actions, that he is incapable of appreciating, in some degree, the significance of sacrifice, the present merit of his Faith. The man who refuses to recognize the claims of his human neighbours must naturally be incapable of a Christian's love for the Divine Christ, his oft-repeated professions and loud protestations notwithstanding. I can well imagine such a man, if not actually crying "Crucify Him!", at least shirking his responsibilities and "washing his hands" as Pilate did.

Bay Roberts ought to be ashamed of itself! We have not raised sufficient for two beds, when we should, at least, be providing ten!

In conclusion, I cannot refrain from expressing the thought that, if grief were possible in the Blessed Home of Martyrs, those from amongst us, who have given a million times more than we should if we bestowed everything we possessed, must be even now grieving for us in our infinite selfishness. Then, while the opportunity is still present, let those of us who have not done what we should, at least, have some justification for the name of Christian, and that the sublimest evidences of self-sacrifice since the days of our Saviour Himself have not been manifested in vain.

College Extension Lectures

PRELIMINARY NOTICE. Courses of lectures covering the requirements of the Licentiate in Arts of the Council of Higher Education and of the second, or Sophomore year, in certain Canadian Universities, will be organized for the next Academic year, beginning October 1st, 1916, and ending April 30th, 1917. The following, and possibly other subjects will be included:—English, Mathematics, Latin, French, Physics, Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

Candidates passing successfully through such of those courses of lectures as are required for the Second Year in Arts in the Universities, will be admitted as Third Year students in the Universities, provided they are otherwise qualified. Each of the lecture courses will be open to qualified students whether they have graduation in view or not.

A Let Up

London, Aug. 3. The armies in the three great centres of recent activity, the Somme region in France, Russia and Galicia, evidently have let up considerably in the violent fighting in which they have been engaged in a breathing spell before further attacks and counter attacks.

Mytelsne, Aug. 3. The British fleet bombarded Moulabot on the coast of Asia Minor and landed small detachments.

Gunboat Sunk

Havrre, Aug. 3. The sinking of the German gunboat Graf von Gotsche in a duel with the Belgian gunboat Netta on Lake Tanganyika is announced in an official statement.

All Repulsed

Paris, Aug. 4.—North of the River Somme several German attempts last night against French positions on Moneau Farm, were repulsed. It is official, announced this afternoon that French troops have organized their position between Moneau Farm and Hem Wood.

Nearing Kovel

London, Aug. 4. According to despatches received from Petrograd, the Russian advance against Kovel continues. General Kaledin's troops have pushed forward ten miles since they crossed the bend of the Strophod River, which would place them only ten miles from Kovel.

London, Aug. 3. Roger Casement, the Irish traitor, has paid the extreme penalty for high treason, being hanged this morning in Pentonville jail. He was pronounced dead at nine minutes past nine.

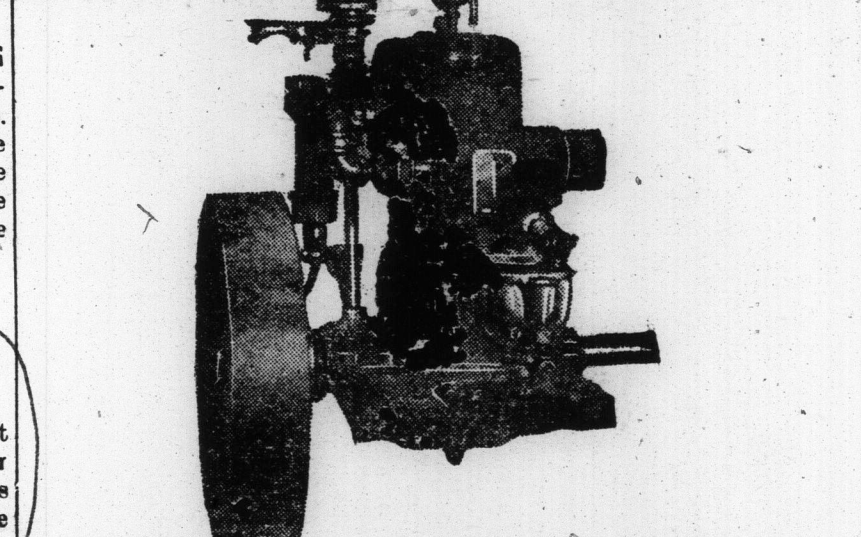
