And about two-thirds of the deaths are among infants under five years of age.

city on several occasions, is now almost unknown here. An efficient quarantine has kept it away so long that there is no longer dread of its approach. Yellow fever does not come so far north, even when it devastates Southern ports. Quarantine and health regulations can save us from that. Small-pox scarcely appeared here for a series of years, and the visitations of it which we have experienced recently were of slight account compared with those of the past. Vacination and re-vacination furnish a sure safeguard against that odious disease. The Health Department can do much to prevent the spread of the other contagious maladies which assail us. For a year they have not been rife to any alarming extent For months the city has been remarkably free from them.

But against the heat we have no proection. No quarantine can keep it out. When the fiercest of tropical weather comes upon New York to stay for even one week, it finds us as much unprepared to meet it as if the visitation was not of requent, almost annual occurrence. No health regulations can save the inhabitants of the crowded tenement houses, 377 St. Paul Street, Montreal lining districts of the city which are more thickly populated than even the most crowded quarters of London. Only the exceptionally strong or exceptionally fortunate of the children there can resist its debilitating effects.
