LITTLE OVER HALF OF THE USUAL CUT

Lumber Operators are Wintering Logs and Piling, and Cut Will be Very Small.

RATE OF WAGES DOWN

Some of the Mills Have Closed for the Season But Others Will Run Late

It is stated on reliable authority that the coming season's cut on the Miramichi will not be much more than half of the average cut. During the past season about 50,000,000 feet came through the South West and about 22,000,000 through the North West. Of this amount at least 15,000,000 will be wintered and the stock is divided as follows:

Snowball & Co. will also winter some but D. & J. Ritchie will not winter any. Besides wintering large quantities of logs the operators have large quantities of deal piled and as the British market is not improving to any extent this winter's cut will be very small. Very little preparation has yet been made for the winter operations.

The best wages during the coming season will be \$22 or \$23. Last season men received \$25 and \$30. A prominent operator, however, told a reporter for the ADVOCATE yesterday that he found it difficult to procure men. He attributed the scarcity, however, to the coming elections. Men were bound to stay out of the woods until after election day. Lynch shut down for the season last week. The Fleet mill is also down and the Ritchie mill closes this week. The Hickson mill will likely run late.

I. C. R. IMPROVING TRAIN SERVICE.

Many Changes Have Been Made Since Canada Eastern Was Taken Over.

Many changes and improvements have been made in the train and traffic arrangements on the Canada Eastern section of the I. C. R. The passenger service has been bettered by more commodious and modern coaches and quicker running of trains. Two regular freight trains are run daily with frequent specials. A construction train with large crew is at work repairing the roadbed and in the near future the running time of all regular trains will be still further cut down. All freight and other cars on the road are to be equipped with the latest air brake. The I. C. R. air brake instruction car has been at Gibson for three days and all conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen are being instructed in the use of the brake. The improved service calls for more men and the staff at the Gibson station has been increased to meet the demands. Assistant Superintendent Hobson has a separate office with a clerk. Station Agent Henry has two train dispatchers, one for day and the other for night, and a telegraph operator.

A LIBERAL SPLIT.

At the liberal convention in Dalhousie yesterday the liberals split. Reid received the nomination but Murray will contest the County as independent liberal. O'Brien and McKeown were the choice of the St. John liberal convention.

This Seems to be the Slogan of Liberal Party in This County.

BREACH NOT HEALED.

Convention on Friday May Choose George Watt as a Compromise Candidate.

TORIES FAVOR ROBINSON.

The political atmosphere in this County which is at present very dense bids fair to be cleared by Friday evening or at all events as clear as it is likely to be until after November 3rd.

At 3 o'clock on Friday the liberals of Northumberland will assemble here in the Temperance Hall for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest this constituency on behalf of the liberal cause. On the same day at 8 p. m. the convention of the conservative party takes place in the Masonic Hall, Chatham, when the candidate of that party will be chosen. The breach in the ranks of the liberal party of this county has seemingly not been entirely healed. There is one faction—and it is a powerful one—which favors the nomination of Mr. John Morrissey, M.P.P., while another faction seems to insist on the nomination of Mr. W. S. Loggie, M.P.P. One or two other names are mentioned as compromise candidates, notably among which is that of Mr. George Watt.

A prominent liberal leader of the County in discussing the situation yesterday with a reporter for the Advocate expressed the opinion that Mr. Watt would be acceptable to both wings of the party.

"I feel confident," he said, "that Mr. Morrissey will accept him and support him loyally and as for Mr. Loggie—well—the same may be said about him. Mr. Watt has stood loyally by the party through thick and thin and I am confident that with a united liberal vote he will have no difficulty in carrying the County." At the last general election, Mr. Morrissey ran with only one half of the liberal party in this county behind him and polled a large vote. His friends think he is now entitled to the nomination of the whole party. On the other hand he is not acceptable to some and consequently Mr. Loggie is being boomed for the nomination. In the face of these conditions there is a strong probability of Mr. Watt being selected as a compromise candidate.

ROBINSON AGAIN.

Among the conservatives the name of Mr. James Robinson, the present member is most prominently mentioned but a prominent Newcastle conservative is also mentioned. Mr. Robinson is still out of town but the Advocate learns on very good authority that he is again ready to contest this seat on behalf of the conservative party. Whether the other gentleman whose name is mentioned would accept the nomination or not the Advocate is not in a position to state.

Both conventions promise to be extremely interesting and it is difficult to forecast the result of either. There is a possibility of a split in the ranks of both parties and if so political matters in this county will have reached a very impressive stage.

GLOUCESTER SITUATION.

The Advocate's Bathurst correspondent writes:— Political matters in Gloucester are very quiet, it being pretty well understood that there will be no serious opposition to Mr. Turgeon's return. In our opinion this is as it should be at the present time, Mr. Turgeon has certainly done excellent work for Gloucester particularly during the past four years. He is a man peculiarly situated, inasmuch as he is able to give his undivided time to the interests of the County, whereas a man actively engaged in some mercantile or other business might not be able to do this. Mr. Turgeon is easy to approach by all classes and appears to take a pride in listening to the claims of his constituents, and endeavoring to right them no matter whether those making the application are former supporters of his or not. Further than this he is well liked and respected by the minority, who appreciate his help in the public affairs of the county, and every one of his colleagues in parliament bears witness to the fact that he is no time server, but a conscientious hard worker in parliament. We therefore think Mr. Turgeon's hands would be able in the future to do even more than in the past for his County should he be returned at this election by acclamation.

HUNTERS CAPTURE SOME FINE HEADS

Big Game Reported Very Pleasantful and Sportsmen Return Successful.

ONE HEAD 62 INCHES.

Season Will Come Up Fully to Expectations of Game Wardens.

The expectations of Chief Game Warden Robinson and others that the present season will be blanner one for big game in this county bids fair to be fulfilled. The woods fairly teem with sportsmen and many have already returned after succeeding in landing their quarry. Several big heads have been secured and the taxidermists will be kept pretty busy for some time to come.

One of the finest heads captured in the Miramichi woods in recent years was that brought out last week by Mr. Horace Kethro. In company with Mr. Wm. Sinclair, Mr. Kethro spent two weeks on Whitney brook. His head has a spread of 62 inches and has twenty points. Mr. Sinclair also landed a moose, his head has a spread of 49 inches and 28 points. Their guides were Peter Prisk and Louis Paul. Their cook was Russell Ward. Mr. Kethro breaks the record for 1904.

Mr. J. T. Stirling of London, England has returned from the Bay du Vin district with one moose. His guide was Donald Fraser.

Messrs. Edwin B. Holmes and S. P. Holmes of Boston with guide Arthur Pringle got a moose each and one caribou in the Big Bald mountain district.

Mr. Arthur Robinson and wife of New York and Miss Bradford of Quebec were very successful up at the head of the Little South West with Henry Braithwaite as guide. They managed to secure a moose and a caribou each and besides a large bear which was shot by one of the ladies.

Mr. W. J. Poindexter and wife of Reading, Pa. got a moose each and a bear on the Dunganon with guide J. Ronald McDougall.

Mr. Carl Fickhardt, New York, and Mr. H. Von Geilgen, Germany, got a moose each on the north branch of the Renous with guides Norris Manderville and Pat. McNeil.

Mr. J. M. Murdoch, Johnston, Pa., and Dr. W. H. Moore, Philadelphia, were up at Morriscan Brook lake, Renous, with Hiram Manderville and Benj. Warren as guides. They got one moose each. Dr. Moore got the best head of the season. It has a spread of 59 inches, 31 points and 15 inch blades.

Mr. Henry R. Diebel of New York brought down a large moose head from the Dunganon. His guide was Howard Manderville.

Mr. Joseph McKnight of Douglastown was at the head of Burnt Church river with guide Michael Fox. The first afternoon he shot a very large moose. It weighed 680 pounds when dressed.

BOARD OF HEALTH NOTICE.

The attention of Physicians, Householders and others is called to the following sections of the Board of Health Act and rules of the Provincial Board of Health of the Province of New Brunswick:—

37. Whenever any house owner shall know that any person within his family has smallpox, or any other disease dangerous to the public health, he shall give notice thereof to the Health Officers of the Local Board of Health for the Municipality, City or Town in which he resides.

38. Whenever any Physician shall know that any person whom he is called upon to visit is infected with smallpox or other disease dangerous to the public health, such Physician shall immediately give notice thereof to the Local Board of Health or the Health Officers of the Municipality in which the diseased person may be.

39. Whenever any Physician shall know any pupil attending any public school is infected with diphtheria or other infectious disease dangerous to the public health, he shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Principal of the school at which the pupil is attending, and also to the Local Board of Health or the Health Officers of the place in which such pupil may be.

40. Any person or persons, Physician or Physicians to whom the three preceding Sections shall apply, who shall refuse or neglect to give the notice by such Sections required to be given by him or them respectively, shall be subject to the penalty provided by the fifty-four Section of this Act, and the said Section and the subsequent Sections thereof shall apply to any prosecution under the three preceding Sections.

41. In case the owner or occupier of any dwelling or premises neglects or refuses to obey the orders given by such Health Officers in pursuance of such regulations, such Health Officers may call to their assistance all constables, peace officers, and such other persons as they think fit, and may enter into such dwelling or premises and execute the same or cause to be executed therein such regulations, and remove therefrom and destroy whatsoever in pursuance of such regulations it is necessary to remove or destroy for the preservation of the public health.

RULE IV.—Any household in whose house there shall occur a case of smallpox, cholera, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever or measles, shall immediately notify the Board of Health of that district of the same.

RULE V.—When a Physician knows or suspects that any person to whom he has been called is sick of, or has died of, any of the diseases named in Rule 4, he shall immediately notify the Local Board of Health of that district.

RULE VI.—Whenever a case of scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus fever or smallpox exists in any house or dwelling, a notice or placard shall be posted on or near the door of such house, stating that such disease exists therein, and no person shall remove such notice or placard without the authority of the Local Board of Health of that district.

RULE VII.—A rigid quarantine shall be put upon any person sick of the diseases named in Rule 4 for a period of at least three weeks or until the Local Board of Health shall permit the quarantine to be removed. During this period all persons not necessarily in attendance there shall be excluded from the patient's room.

RULE VIII.—Whenever the existence of any contagious disease in a house or in any public institution has been ascertained, or if there is reason to believe that one of the inmates is suffering from any contagious disease, no occupant of such house or public institution shall change his residence without the consent of the Local Board of Health of that district.

RULE IX.—In case of removal it shall be the duty of the Local Board of Health to prescribe the precautions to be taken so that the said removal may be effected without danger of spreading the contagion.

RULE X.—Any person affected with a contagious disease shall not be allowed to leave any health district before the Local Board of such health district has notified the Local Board of the district into which such person is to be removed.

RULE XI.—No person suffering from or infected with smallpox or any other infectious disease, or any member or inmate of any household where any contagious disease exists, shall wilfully expose himself without proper precaution against spreading the said disease in any street, public conveyance or in any public place or in any congregation of people.

RULE XII.—Rooms with their furniture in which there has existed a case of either of the diseases named in Rule 4, shall be thoroughly fumigated with sulphur before re-occupation.

RULE XIII.—Hereafter there shall not be a public or church funeral held within any health district of any person who shall have died of smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus fever or cholera. The body shall be interred within twenty-four hours or as soon thereafter as possible. The body shall immediately after death be disinfected and shall be enclosed in a metallic or other tight burial case which shall not thereafter be opened. The funeral of such person shall be strictly private and in no case shall children be allowed to attend thereat. The body shall not be brought into any church but must be conveyed directly from the place of death to the place for burial, and in the removal thereof for burial a hearse or open vehicle only shall be used.

RULE XIV.—Any conveyance that has been used to carry any person suffering from any of the diseases named in Rule 4, shall be immediately disinfected and before further use is made of it, and no conductor, owner or proprietor of any public conveyance shall knowingly carry such person without an order from the Local Board of Health.

RULE XV.—No person shall give or sell any articles, merchandise, products, milk, bread, provisions, etc., if such are coming from a house in which any of the diseases named in Rule 4 exists.

RULE XVI.—Every person shall permit his residence to be disinfected by the Local Board of Health or by any person directed so to do by the Local Board of Health.

RULE XVII.—No person shall oppose any visit made by the Local Board of Health, or any agent of the Local Board of Health, at reasonable times during the day, under the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health.

Any physicians or other persons who do not comply with the above regulations will be prosecuted as the law directs.

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



PRESBYTERIANISM.

Business of the Maritime Synod.

Pictou, N. S., Oct. 6.—At the Maritime Province Synod on Wednesday the resolution submitted by the college board that \$5,000 be appropriated for a tutor in classics and that the nomination to governors of Dalhousie of such tutor be made by the board of the Presbyterian College was unanimously adopted.

An invitation to meet in Sydney next year was accepted.

A delegation from the Methodist church, bringing greetings, was received.

At this morning's session the report of the special committee on the Synod fund was read by Rev. A. McLean Sinclair.

The report of the committee on the tenure of church property was presented by the convener, Judge Forbes, and a resolution was read providing for a bill to the legislature having for its object the preservation of church property, which resolution was agreed to by the Synod.

Dr. McMillan, president of the Nova Scotia auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, read a resolution urging members of the Synod to ask churches which

have not yet contributed to the century fund of this society to do so before next March.

The report of the standing committees for the coming year was read by T. H. Murray, convener.

Dr. Cunningham read the obituary notices. There have been four deaths during the past year—Revs. Alex. Stirling, Kenneth McKenzie, Thomas G. Johnston and Gavin Sinclair, all men who have rendered noble service to the church.

Rev. Mr. Fowler asked leave to move a resolution expressing the sympathy of the Synod with the United Free Church of Scotland in her recent loss of property by the decision of the House of Lords, and commending her to the providence of God. Some discussion followed as to whether it would not better to have the resolution more strongly worded. It was finally agreed upon as at first drafted.



CATCH OF FISH WAS VERY POOR.

Shipments of Fish This Season do Not Compare With Past Seasons

SALMON WERE SCARCE.

Dog Fish When Canned Said to Make Very Good Eating.

The shipment of fish from the country during the past season do not compare with those of other seasons. Such was the statement given to a reporter of the Advocate yesterday by Mr. T. W. Crocker. Mr. Crocker stated that the catch of nearly all kinds of fish had not been up to the average. The catch of cod was the only exception. It was very good and would have been better if it had not been for the dog fish pest. Mr. Crocker stated that the dog fish pest has been the cause of the fish being scarce. He said that there is a possibility of the pest being in the future instead of destroying the salmon. The dog fish was not up to the average. The cod catch did not begin to compare with that of last year. The lobster catch was an average one but not up to that of last year. Young bass are reported very plentiful down river at present and Mr. Crocker states that this gives encouragement of a plentiful supply in future years.

SHE RAN ASHORE IN A DENSE FOG.

Steamer Alexandra Struck Below Doyle's Mill, but Damage Done Was Slight.

PASSENGERS TRANSFERRED.

During a dense fog the Miramichi Steam Navigation Company's steamer Alexandra ran aground Monday morning below Doyle's mill. The steamer left Chatham for New Castle on her early morning trip and proceeded very slowly and cautiously on account of the fog. The Captain was feeling his way along when the steamer struck. An effort was made to get her off but it was not successful. Shortly afterwards the tug St. Nicholas came along and offered assistance but it was not required. About two hours after the Alexandra struck, the steamer Miramichi, also being on her way from Chatham to New Castle, a boat was lowered from the Alexandra and the dozen or more passengers on board were rowed out by the Miramichi and placed on board that steamer. The Alexandra came off early Monday evening at high tide. She was only slightly damaged.


