

The Dominion Government could easily set all discussion at rest by definitely announcing a date for the meeting of Parliament, but it has so far refrained from doing so, though, in the interests of the members and of the public, the House should have been in session before now Not since the days when Sir John Macdon ald was endeavoring to burk the investigation into the Pacific Scandal rascalities has the House been called at so late a date as it will be if the decision of the Cabinet is finally to abandon the immediate dissolution proposition and face their numerous difficulties in Parliament.

We in London know how fearful many of the wire-pullers are that an election now brought on would bring disaster to their cause. It is ominous, too, that suggestions are again made that Mr. Carling, who only secured his election in 1887 by a majority of 38, should be given the Lieutenant-Governorship of Ontario, and thus be enabled to avoid the defeat which it is believed awaits him. The tax qualification, he argues, leads to the debasement of politics and the collection and expenditure of large sums of money at elections, thus tending to make wealth a necessary qualification for candidates, because poverty is a disqualification for voters. "In important and exciting contests," Governor Russell says, "it is of no effect except to degrade the voter, to burden the candidate and to suggest and encourage corruption." The inference is that under the operation of this law in State elections men's taxes are frequently paid for them in order that they may be qualified to vote. 



VOICES OF THE PEOPLE.

Now, the first thing in order to accomplish this is a proper classification. It is a very easy thing to find out the number of pupils attending the schools and the standing of each. Our inspector or teachers can also inform the Board of the number which

pupils attending the schools and the standing of each. Our inspector or teachers can also inform the Board of the number which each room will accommodate, and will also admit that withreasonably full classes better results are obtained than with thin attendance. Now, it seems a simple matter with this data given to satisfy any reasonable mind. With the cranks we have little to do. First, in the junior classes distance must be the first factor. In the senior classes this has little to do with the decision, for all have to go to the common high school. Second, efficiency of work done with full classes and no overcrowding is the next factor. The convenience or ambition of certain teachers ought not and must not be taken into account, for it is the duty of all to obey the mandates of the Board, promotion to be obtained according to their abilities and success, as judged by the inspector's report.

The Board proposes to divide the city into nine high school districts. Heretofore we have had but three; of these two had not full classes, whilst the third was far too crowded. Surely the city has not advanced in population with such rapid strides in the past year or two as to require such an increase. With nine preparing classes we would pass on an average about eight pupils per half year, or sixteen per year, i.e., it would cost more than \$50 per pupil per half year. But there were in the last half of 1890 219 pupils in the preparing classes, i.e., about 24 pupils to the class, a number far too small to engage a first-class teacher. A class of 50 could be as easily managed and give far better results. Now, looking at the convenience of the pupils and the success of the schools, and not forgetting the pockets of the ratepayers, I would say that for the present five preparing classes is sufficient, and better work will be done than if we had more; and besides, \$1,200 per annum would be saved.

The Wharnoliffe Bridge.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

As one who was instrumental in securing the erection of the Oxford street bridge, and who believes in sensible public improvements and conveniences, I would like to suggest that the City Council hold a special meeting at once and deede to erect a bridge on the Wharnoliffe over the Thames between the city and London West, and at once notify and require the County Council now sitting to appoint their committee for its erection, as otherwise no action on behalf of the county could be taken till next June, by which time it would be too late to erect the bridge this year.
