

Von Heinrich, Former Military Governor of Lille, Said To war was over on the assumption that Have Ordered Execution of Frenchmen After Granting Permission To Have Their Cases Appealed to Emperor.

Lille, France, Aug. 19.—Evidence adduced before the French military court inquiring into crimes committed by the Germans during the occupation indicates that a charge of murder may be brought against von Heinrich, a former military governor of Lille.

Testimony against von Heinrich was given today by Madame Jacques and Madame Martens, widows of men shot by the Germans. It was testified that after sentence of death had been passed on Jacques and Martens, von Heinrich authorized the lawyers of the condemned men to appeal to the German emperor. While the appeal was being made von Heinrich, it was declared, ordered that the men be executed, and they were shot 24 hours later.

BURIED ALIVE WHEN CAVE-IN OCCURS

William Barrett Meets Death in Accident Near Quebec.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—William Barrett, single, 21, was buried alive last Thursday near Kennedy Creek, some 28 miles from La Tuque. With other men, he was digging gravel to fill wharves for the protection of floating logs when a cave-in occurred. Sixteen men who were with him dug in to rescue their comrade, but when he was about half unearthed another slide occurred, burying him with two other men, Adjutor Fortin and Jos. Tremblay. Fortin and Tremblay were rescued and taken to the hospital.

The body of Barrett was recovered the next day.

CANADIAN FARMER WILL RECEIVE \$2.15 AND THE ADVANCE

Price Set by Government Is the Initial and Not Fixed Figure.

FIXED PRICE IN U.S.

Growers in Canada To Get the Benefit If Price Goes Up.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.-Telegrams and ommunications received by the Government, as well as comments made by brokers and others interested in the wheat trade, indicate that the Government's action in fixing an initial price for wheat to be paid to the farmers by the wheat control board, is still misunderstood in many quarters. It is assumed by many, apparently

that the initial price of \$2.15, announced on Monday & the Government is a fixed price and that no matter what the price of wheat may be the farmers will not receive more than that figure. On behalf of the Government it was pointed out this morning to a representative of the Canadian Press that, in the case of the Canadian farmer, he gets what the market of the world will give him. If the price of wheat should go to \$2.30, \$2.40 or \$2.50, the farmer will get the bene-

U. S. Farmers Get Fixed Price.

on the other hand, in the United States, where a price has been definitely fixed, the farmer will simply get the fixed price.

The object of the Government, it was further explained, was not to limit to any price or estimate the price that the farmer should obtain but rather to make sure that he should speedily sell his crop and that he should receive the highest possible initial payment upon the crop. The Government through the Canadian what board undertakes to sell the surplus crop, not at a fixed price but at the best world price available, and to turn back to the farmer free from all speculative and profiteering charges the balance of the price received for his grain over and above the initial payment of \$2.15.

SERBIANS AND MONTENEGRINS ENGAGE IN SEVERE FIGHTING

Inhabitants of the Carnizza R egion Are Beported To Have Been Massacred by Serbians. Who Have Burned Homes and Driven Fleeing Inhabi tants Out of the Country.

Rome, Aug. 20.—Severe fighting between Montenegrins and Serbians near Lake Soutari was reported in news agency dispatches received here today. Serbians were said to be evacuating what was formerly Montenegro, and to have massacred inhabitants of the Carnizza region. It was said the Serbians burned houses and drove the fleeing inhabitants toward Beria with the intention of interning them there.

FOOD SUPPLIES HELD BY GERMAN PRINCE GIVEN TO HOSPITALS

Berlin, Aug. 20.—At a meeting of the citizens of Teltow, a suburb of Berlin, there was a discussion of the conduct of Prince Friedrich Leopold, cousin of former Emperor William, who, unlike Count Hohenzollern, remained there instead of leaving the country. It was alleged that he had engaged in illicit trading on a large scale and had hoarded large quantities of food.

Local authorities recently searched his castle, confiscating great supplies of food which were distributed among hospitals, but when they attempted to bring action against the prince, they were told from authoritative quarters that he was immune, being a member of the royal family.

The castle has 140 rooms and 16 bathrooms. No decision as to what will be done with the prince was reached at the meeting.

170,000,000 Marks To Compensate Ex-Kaiser for Loss of Throne

Berlin, Aug. 20.-A bill has been submitted to the Prussian Cabinet which provides that 170,000,000 marks shall be handed over to former Emperor William as total settlement for what he lost "through forced abdication," according to a Weimar dispatch to Die Frieheit. The Cabinet has not yet reached a decision, it is said, because the scheme is opposed by Herr von Braun, the minister of agriculture.

PERSIA TREATY ANNOYS FRENCH

League of Nations Should Have Passed On British Deal, They Assert.

PROTECTION TO EMPIRE

Protectorate Established in Near East Country Sets Up India Blockade.

London, Aug. 19.-Russian boshevism made possible the Anglo-Persian treaty, one of the most important developments in the near east. The fall of the Russian autocracy ended the Anglo-Russian agreement of 1907 which partitioned Persia and turned all the sympathies of the Persians toward Germany at the

outbreak of the war. By this new treaty, which the French declare establishes a protectorate, Great Britain gains an unbroken chain of in-

fluence from Egypt to India, Egypt, Palestine, Mesopotamia and now Persia form a chain to Baluchistan.

Serveral months of quiet work was devoted to the writing of the treaty, which affords the British a feeling of protection they have not enjoyed hitherto. The treaty serves as a blockade for India, barring the way of the Rus-sians and of Germany With their unhappy experience in Egypt still fresh in mind, and strongly f reorganization tremendously

Any improvement is clear gain for the Persians and British. Persians and British.

The French are annoyed that the treaty was not submitted to the League of Nations. They have no real objection to the British extending their influence to Persia, but they feel that if the treaty were before the League of Nations it would be possible to make a bargain with the British regarding French claims in Syria.

GREEKS IN CAUCASUS SEEKING PROTECTION

Peace Conference Asked To Help People Who Are Victims of Bandits.

Saloniki, Aug. 20.—Delegates claiming to represent thirty-five thousand Greeks living in the Ardahan district in the Caucasus, according to the Athens News Agency, have telegraphed the peace conference at Paris an appeal for allied protection against bandits and the Turkish military who, they assert, have piliaged the country and massacred Greek inhabitants. The dispatch was quoted as saying these forces operate from a base at Erzeum. The dispatch directed attention to the fact that the people in the Ardahan district already suffered severely during the war because of the severely during the war because of the Turkish and Russian operations there.



GERMANY DISCONTINUES PURCHASE OF FOOD IN DENMARK AND HOLLAND

Food Controller Issues Order Because

of Depreciation of German Mark. Berlin, Aug. 20 .- As a result of the ontinued downward trend of the Ger man mark, the food controller has ordered the discontinuance of purchases in Holland and Denmark.

FIRE APPARATUS NOT INSURED AGAINST DAMAGE BY FLAMES

Odd Fact Comes To Light As Result of Flusher Afire.

Between \$200 and \$300 damage was done to the city's street flusher last night by a fire which started from a short circuit in the connection of the rear motor, which operates the flushing pump. The machine was halted at York and Ridout street being filled when the blaze broke out. With several hundred gallons of water on one side and a large tank of gasoline on the other, the fire burned merrily away, consuming the cab, until the entire fire-fighting force of the city arrived and extinguished the blaze.

The loss is fully covered by insurance, but it has drawn attention to the fact that the fire-fighting equipment itself is not insured against fire. City Treasurer Bell said today that while all the vehicles of the fire department are insured against accident none of them have insurance to cover a fire which might originate in the same manner as that which damaged the street flusher. Whether such a fire would come under the head of accidents would be a point for insurance courts to decide.

Wake Up, Ontario!

Let the Referendum Battle Cry be "No" - "No" - "No" - "No"!

NCE the announcement in the Legislature last spring that a Referendum on the Ontario Temperance Act would be taken in the fall, the different temperance organizations of the Province of Ontario have formed the Ontario Referendum Committee, which comprises representatives from the organized temperance forces of the Province and the temperance sentiment of the Province outside of these organizations. The new Committee will conduct the Campaign. We are asking the voters of Ontario to decide against the repeal of the Ontario Temperance Act, and, in fact, to vote "No" to all questions submitted on the ballot.

No Repeal-No Surrender

THE Ontario Temperance Act, upon which the approaching Referendum is to be taken, became law on April 27th, 1916, and came into full effect on September 16th. 1916. By the Ontario Temperance Act, sale and distribution of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes within the Province were prohibited. For practically three years the Province has experienced the good effects of this law. The legislation which brought about these good results, however, was enacted as a war measure.

By explicit promise of Premier Hearst on behalf of the Government of Ontario, made at the time it was introduced in the House, the question of repealing the Ontario Temperance Act or maintaining it as the permanent law of the Province, was to be referred directly to a vote of the people in the year 1919, on the first Monday in June. The exact date was subsequently extended and is now set for the fall of this year.

For the Temperance forces to win they must secure four "No" majorities. That is, a majority for "No" on every question. The Temperance forces will be defeated if there is a majority for "Yes" on any one of the questions. You must mark an X after each of the four questions, or your ballot is counted as spoiled.

A century of Temperance progress in this Province is at stake in the coming Referendum. It is, therefore, most important that the Ontario Temperance Act be solidified as permanent legislation.

The Ontario Referendum Committee earnestly and respectfully ask you to mark your ballot with X in the "No" column after each and every question, as indicated in the sample ballot reproduced herewith.

"NO!"-Four Times-"NO!"

Question No. 1

By reference to the sample ballot you will see Question No. I asks if you are in favor of repealing the Ontario Temperance Act. You should understand that if this Act is repealed, the Province will go back to the system in operation before the war under the Ontario License Act. Every temperance vote in the Province must be recorded against this abject surrender. We believe the majority of people of all shades of opinion will vote a solid "No" to this question.

Question No. 2

Ouestion No. 2 relates to the sale of beer by Government vendors. If the Act itself is repealed, of course, there can be no amendment of it, for there would be no Act left to amend. "The Greater (No. 1) includes the less (Nos. 2, 3 and 4)," said Premier Hearst. Temperance people must vote "No" to this question also. Beer of the proposed strength, 2.54 % alcohol by weight, is intoxicating. It is just as much intoxicating when sold in Government shops as when sold in licensed liquor stores or saloons.





The plainest one-egg cake can be made an elaborate company dessert by the addition of some unusual filling. Use either two or more layers, or if some stale sponge cake is on hand try the following:

Scoop out the centre of the cake, leaving a wall about one inch thick, into which the filling may be poured. Then mix the crumbs with the filling and place in the hollowed cake.

1 cup of powdered sugar.

Press the apples through a sleve.

240 deg. F., or until a soft ball can be formed when tested in cold water. Remove from the fire, add the nut meats, and beat until smooth and creamy.

Wash, dry and chop the figs. Wa dry, stone and chop the dates. Mix fruit with the sugar, water and lem juice, and cook over hot water until gets thick enough to spread.

1 cupful of milk.

"We made the plan, set the time and the pace," said Gen. Currie. The secrecy had been perfect and the objective, the old Amiens line, was taken the first night. "That day we penetrated eight miles, the greatest penetration made by any army in the war, and our victory had a wonderful effect. By August 13 we had penetrated 24,000 yards and reached the old Somme battlefield, which the Boche had left in 1916. The wire and machine gun emplacements were still there and the ground was filled with enemy reserves.

Canadians Did It.

Gen. Currie said he had then advised Gen. Currie said he had then advised that the Canadians be moved to assist the third British army driven-from Bapaume, and after that army had later

Bapaume, and after that army had later struck, the Canadians were called upon and were the first to break the Hindenburg line. During the eight days the battle lasted they pierced five systems of German trenches. He then told of Foch's hammer blows, which resulted in the Canadians going in at Canal du Nord, Bourlon wood and Cambrai, and compared the battles there with Vimy. The Canadians in the last one hundred days had faced 47 different Boche divisions, or more than a quarter of the enemy forces on the western front. No force in the world, said Gen. Currie, had played a greater part in finally endhad played a greater part in finally end-ing the struggle and bringing the Boche

ing the struggle and bringing the Boche to his knees.

The spirit of the troops even to the last had been such that the gunners and stretcher-bearers worked through gas attacks without masks in order to give their comrades better support and assistance. Of the 64 Victoria Crosses won by Canadians during the war, 30 had been awarded for the last 100 days.

Of the men who lie buried in Flanders, Canada can best cherish their memory by doing her duty to those who were their dependents, as the men had done neir duty for Canada. No Such Problem.

The returned soldier problem, said Gen. Currie, had been brought to his notice since his return. He thought there was no such problem, and urged the businessmen of Canada to give themen a chance on their return.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF WHEAT PRICE HAS **CAUSED SURPRISE**

But Figure Decided Upon Is Considered Generally a Fair One.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—The announcement made by Sir George Foster yesterday that the initial price of wheat to the farmers of Canada would be \$2.15 per bushei on the basis of No. 1 northern, Fort William, has been received with some surprise at the capital, because of the forecast from the West that the price would be somewhat between \$2.20 and \$2.25. In Government and official circles, as far as can be gathered the price decided upon by the wheat control board and approved by the Government, apparently without hesitation, is considered to be a fair one when all things are considered. In some quarters the opinion is expressed that in fixing the price as high as \$2.15 the Government is taking some chance of experiencin g aloss in connection with the handling of the season's wheat crop. On the other hand, if the average price secured is higher than \$2.15, the farmers under the arrangement will receive the balance of the sum realized at the end of the season. 


