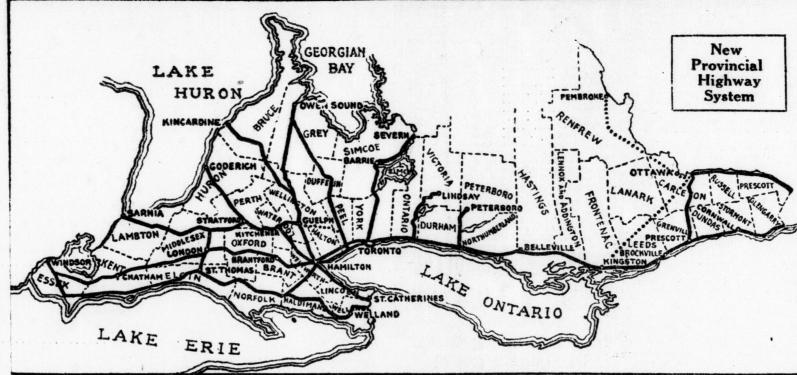

FORMER KAISER IS **GUARDED AS WELL AS** IF IN REAL PRISON

Amerongen, March 18.—By the Associated Press.—Reinforcement of the Dutch guard at you Bentinck Castle, which since the middle ages has been protected by moats and drawbridges, has made the former German em-peror's refuge a veritable prison fortress, capable of defence even in the unexpected event of an attack by raiders desiring to free the exile.

The castle is situated in a big square. The four sides are moated, while two of them have additional walls. Constables and military polled patrol the roads with loaded rifles night and day. The guards are not permitted to put down their rifles for a minute. WAVE OF BOLSHEVISM THREATENS TO ENGULF GERMANY; RADICALS **ASSUME CONTROL IN MANY PLACES**

Gustav Noske, Minister of Defence, Arrives in Berlin and Announces That the Ebert Government Will Again Take Over the Direction of Affairs-Proletarian Dictatorships Have Been Set Up in Larger Cities.

The collapse of the reactionary dictatorship in Berlin has been quickly followed by the resumption of authority on the part of the old government. Its chief task for the moment, it appears, will be to deal with the disordered conditions which the Spartacans are endeavoring to

prolong for their own purposes. Dispatches stating that Minister of Defence Noske was back on the cene in Berlin, have been followed by reports that President Ebert also had returned to the capital from Stuttgart. Pending his return Vice-Premier Schiffer of the Bauer cabinet, took over the direction of affairs relinquished by Dr. Kapp when he gave up his effort to establish

a new government. re are reports current in Berlin that ex-Chancellor Kapp had committed suicide, but these so far lack confirmation. His prosecution. ogether with that of other leaders of the reactionary movement, is said to have been ordered by President Ehert

Germany has cast off the governmental regime suddenly set up by the reactionary elements last Saturday morning, but advices indicate she is now facing another extreme peril in the form of a wave of radicalism. Reports from Berlin say Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, the reactionary chancellor, and his adherents, have either fled from the city or contemplate going at once. Rumors that Kapp had committed suicide were received at Amsterdam by telephone from Berlin this morning. Armed forces of the reactionary element are leaving Berlin today, and the presence of Gustav Noske, minister of defence in the Ebert cabinet, who arrived in Berlin last night by airplane from Stuttgart, would seem to indicate that the constitutional government intends to assume control immediate General von Seecht, President Ebert's chief of staff, has been named commander of government forces in Berlin. Announcements by Dr. Kapp, as well as official statements from the officials of the Ebert Government, reflect the fear of a radical uprising in Germany. In fact Dr. Kapp's announcement stated he had resigned from the direction of affairs so that the country might be enabled to fight Bolshevism. From various cities come reports of uprisings of workers, and advices from Berlin state that red forces, under command of Spartacist leaders, are marching on that city. As the Ebert troops have not as yet resumed full control an attack by the reds is feared

PRELIMINARY WORK ON NEW RESERVOIR COMMENCED TODA IN CITY THIS YEAR

For Butter Made From Pas- Lack of Organization Among Capacity of Storage Will Be Reports Presented At Confer-Increased by 10,000,000 Gallons.

ANOTHER ONE NEXT YEAR

Commissioners Plan To Have Twenty Million Gallons Available.

Preliminary work on the 10,000,000-gallon addition to Springbank reservoir was commenced today. Holes were drilled at the four corners of the pro-posed site and in the centre, to learn

posed site and in the centre, to learn what kind of ground will be encountered when excavating is started.

If conditions are found to be satisfactory a steam shovel will be obtained and the real work will be commenced at once. The project, which will cost \$100,000, promises to be an interesting engineering feat. A temporary incline railway will likely be built up the side of the hill to carry material to the of the hill to carry material to the

This addition represents only half of what is planned. If the work on this section is completed this year the citi-zens will be asked at the next election to approve another addition of the same

Present Capacity. At the present time the total storage capacity is about 6,000,000 gallons, or about one average day's supply. For fire protection alone this is insufficient, and the fire underwriters' in their regulations call for a reservoir of at least 8,500,000 gallons capacity for a city of 60,000 inhabitants, while other authorities state that a city should have a reservoir capacity of from three to ten days' supply

ten days' supply.

The average daily consumption of water in the city is approximately 5,000,000 gallons, while the maximum consumption during any one day has been as high as 6,500,000 gallons. To meet this maximum demand there is available from all three sources of supply Springbank, Horton street and Crysta Springbank, Horton street and Crystal Park, about 6,000,000 gallons. While this is an adequate margin under average conditions, a period of two or three days of heavy drought threatens a

Shortage.

Would Help Materially.

The additional reservoir, containing 20,000,000 gallons of water, will be capable of supplying a deficiency of 500,-000 gallons per day for 40 days, which would be sufficient to carry the city over any prolonged period of hot or cold

It is estimated that the new reser voir adjoining the present one will give a pressure of 75 to 80 pounds in the downtown district without the need of pumps. If another main is laid this will insure ample fire pressure even in the event of a breakdown in the pump ing machinery. It will be possible to do nearly all the pumping during the night when plenty of power is availble at low cost.

It is expected that this work wil nostpone the necessity for addition to he present supply, and that in any event it ill form an integral part of any water supply system which the city may adopt.

Assumption College, Windsor, May Be Moved to London.

URSULINES COMING. TOO

Building of Seminary Will Not Be Commenced This

London will become one of the great est Roman Catholic educational centres in the Dominion of Canada within the next few years, when the plans of Bishop M. F. Fallon are fully realized. His lordship stated to The Advertise-His lordship stated to The Advertiser today that a large seminary for boys would be erected here, that the Ur-suline College for young women now located in Chatham, and possibly the Assumption College for young men, at present in Sandwich, are to be brought to this city.

Although it had been definitely decided to bring the Ursuline College here, and to build the seminary, the building program would not be started this year, he said, ewing to the high cost of building material. Two splendid sites have been chosen, and the work would be started as soon as building material became cheaper. The freshmen class of the Ursuline College would be located in this city in the fall, but a classfoom

had not been chosen yet.

The Ursuline College is the greatest preparatory school for girls under the jurisdiction of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada. At the present time there are nearly two hundred students attending it, and it is expected that the number will be greatly increased when the school is moved to London. The new site will adjoin the grounds of the new Western University on the north branch of the Thames. It is on an elevation that overlooks the whole

Plans for the seminary have been pre pared and the building funds have been raised by special subscriptions raised by the bishop from the members of the diocese. The buildings will be erected on a site known as Sunshine Park, which also is located on the north branch of the river, but in the vicinity of Waterloo or Wellington streets. The bishop said that he hoped to bring the Assumption College here, but nothing definite could be given out



CANADA'S NATIONHOOD.

Hon. W. I. Mackenzie King has taken the opportunity in the House of Commons to discuss the claim so frequently advanced by Hon. N. W. Howell in the last year that Canada's full nationhood has at last been achieved for her by the efforts of Sir Robert Borden. The question of Canada's present status has been brought to the front particularly in connection with the signing of the peace treaty, and on the part of the Unionist ministers the impression has been spread abroad that some entirely new departure has been taken, that by a stroke of the pen, as it were, Canada has gone from the colonial status to a place of independence. Unfortunately for that argument, there remains the fact that the constitution of Canada, the very framework of her body politic, is not today any more in her own control than it was in 1867, and that any amendment to the British North America act must be made, not by the Canadian Parliament, but by the Parliament of moved by a great waterways from the lakes to Great Britain which framed it more than half a century ago.

Aside from that rather disconcerting fact, it is well in a matter of this kind to see if there have been steps in the past leading in the direction of full nationhood. There are authorities in abundance who might be quoted on the question. Let us take one that should carry weight with. the Unicnist ministers, John W. Dafoe, editor of the Manitoba Free Press, who attended the Peace Conference in an official capacity on behalf of the present administration. Here is what

'I do not solely credit one political party in Canada with furthering the policy of National Canadianism. Three of the landmarks along the road were set up by Sir John Macdonald: the declaration of fiscal independence in 1859 when the Canadian Government affirmed 'the right of the Canadian Legislature to adjust the taxation of the people in the way they deemed best, even if it should unfortunately happen to meet with the disapproval of the imperial ministry; the participation by Canada in the negotiations leading up to the treaty of Washington in 1871; and the refusal of the suggestion made in 1885 by the British Government that Canada should send troops to take part in a war which did not affect the

The same authority recalls the fact that when the confederation of the provinces was under consideration, Sir John Macdonald atdom of Canada," knowing that sovereignty was

The work that was begun by Sir John Macdonald was continued in the era dominated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as Mr. King points out. Under both men it was a gradual evolution, step by step, towards the realization of the fullest nationality, to be achieved at some time in the future. In the mind of neither prime minister was there the thought of inde- down. pendence. Both affirmed their belief that Canada must continue to move forward to a status where she would be one of a group of sister nations, while completely in control of her own affairs. Undoubtedly both Macdonald and Laurier would follow the same course were they now alive. The ministry of today has, then, but moved with a currrent that had its origin even before Confederation. They have blazed no new trail, but have only been the means by which a movement quite beyond their control

has proceeded. There are steps yet to be taken to comday have the power to change our own constitution. We should also have no need to go to courts beyond our own Supreme Court, Appeals to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council are not compatible with that full nationhood of which Mr. Rowell speaks. But these changes will come when the convenient time arrives, and they will come without shock or without boasting. The credit will belong to no particular individual, to no particular government, for it will be but further progress of of Canada. But you can never tell about Germany!

THE GREAT WATERWAYS PROJECT. Nothing indicates so clearly the wisdom of unlocking the Great Lakes by a deep waterway to the seaboard, as the growth of the Great Lakes commerce within the last seventy years. At the middle of the last century-in the year 1850-the amount of merchandise carried was 30,000 tons. Contrasted with the figures of four years ago the expansion has been stupendous. In the year 1916 there passed through the Detroit River close to forty thousand vessels, carrying more than a million tons of freight, the value of which was more than \$1,000,000,000. The later war years reduced the tonnage carried to some extent, many vessels used for Great Lakes shipping being commandeered or purchased for war purposes, but the outlook for the coming season holds promise of being a record-breaker, and the prospect for industry and commerce in Canada and the United States for many years to come assures Great Lakes shipping business that would Canada for many years to come will be sending enormous quantities of merchandise and foodstuffs to the old world. THE NEW MONROE DOCTRINE.

[Victoria (B.C.) Times.] Three South American nations-Argentina, Chili and Paraguay-which were neutral in the war have announced their adherence to the League of Nations. Brazil, which was a belligerent on the side of the Allies, is already a member of the league. Hence, the most important of the South American states have adhered to the new organization of nations. Article X of the covenant of the league says: "The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all the members of the league. In case of any such aggress plete the work begun long ago. We must some in the case of any threat or danger of such aggression, the council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled." This would appear to dispose of the Monroe Doctrine as guarantee of the integrity of the South American states against external aggression. Indeed to the nations of the southern continent it must be a much more satisfactory provision, since it is one their formal acceptance of it and the other obligasulted when the Monroe Doctrine was promulgated and the protection it guaranteed was foisted upon them whether they wanted it or not The Monroe Doctrine, which actually originated in London, was not devised out of any particular concern for Central and South America, who were taken under its protection, but was prompted by the special interests of Great Britain and the United States. The national pride of large and importan countries like Brazil, Argentina and Chili, which before long may be in the "great power class," is certain to prefer the safeguards involved in their nembership in the League of Nations, in which they are on terms of equality with other members to being under the special guardianship of the great republic in the north.







Party-Line Consideration

two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user, and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line it is possible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incom-

Therefore there are special considerations which we urge a party-line user to keep in mind:

- 1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber; therefore, party-line talks should be as brief as possible.
- 2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency. courtesy should prompt the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line.
- 3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
- 4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately; otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.



Be sure always to give the operator the letters W or J in calling a party line subscriber,






