

Opening Up a Great Land.

A study of the map of Canada will the Rockies, the C. P. R. runs almost due west, crossing and recrossing the 50th parallel of latitude, and international boundary. The Grand Trunk Pacific will run northwesterly to a point 500 miles north of the boundary before it pierces the Rockies. Leaving Manitoba it will cut across the northeast corner of Assiniboia, the southwest corner of Saskatchewan, the northeast corner of Alberta and the southwest corner of Athabasca, It will be in almost a direct line between Winnipeg and Edmonton, deviating a little to the north to reach Battleford. Between Winnipeg and Edmonton the country is being settled rapidly, and beyond Edmonton the line will open up the great Peace River Valley, which will some day be one of the wheatproducing centers of the world. From the Peace River Pass the Grand Trunk Pacific will run southwesterly to Port Simpson, which owing to the coast formation, is the port nearest to the ports of Asia.

Turning to the east, Winnipeg is connected with Port Arthur and Fort William, the head of lake navigation, by two lines, the C. P. R. and the Canadian Northern. These two railroads are unable to carry the crop to the head of Lake Superior before navigation closes, and the C. P. R. is busy during the winter months, in hauling grain to the east by the all-rail route. The Grand Trunk Pacific at a point about 250 miles east of Winnipeg will send a spur to Port Arthur so as to get its share of the traffic by the land and lake route. During navigation most of the grain which the railways are able to carry from the prairies will go to Lake Superior ports for lake shipment, water transportation being the cheaper. From Port Arthur and Fort or Georgian Bay ports to be conveyed by rail to tide water. It is hoped also that an increasing number of vessels will pass the Welland Canal, so that cargoes may be taken from the head of Lake Superior to Montreal without

breaking bulk. From Winnipeg eastward the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific almost follows the 50th parallel of latitude for 500 miles, passing north of Lake Nepigon; then it dips southeasterly to the city of Quebec, 700 miles. Of these 1,-200 miles, 800 are in the Province of Ontario. This territory was explored in 1900 by parties of surveyors and officials of the crown land department sent out by the Ontario Government. Here is an extract from their report:




