TO MISS A MEAL

Occasionally a Well-known American Physician Considers a Safe Rule for Prolong ing Life

After Middle Age-Some of the Rules That Should be Followed to Produce Longevity.

The causes that prolong life beyond mid-dle age are some of them beyond the con-trol of the individual. The inheritance of

trol of the individual. The inheritance of sound organs from a rugged ancestry is an example of this kind.
Yet it is easy for one of middle age to precipitate prematurely the season of old age, while, on the other hand, a reasonable modification of the habits of life may long extend the period of active usefulness. The man of advancing years should con-tinue to indulge in bodily exercise, but in moderation and not immediately after meals.

moderation and not immediately after meals.

Less food should be caten as the "fires more slowly burn," if one would avoid premature old age. The act of eating should be more slowly performed, and even an occasional indulgence to excess in the bleasures of the table should be avoided.

The sage of Concord, whose phile "by was practical as well as "transcendental," found in late life "little food and often" to be the safe rule. A well known American physician considers it of benefit to miss a meal occasionally. The number of meals should be less rather than greater, he believes, and "red" meat should be eaten in great moderation—not more than once a day. It will be seen that the philosopher and the physician are at one in this—that less food is needed after middle age. At any age intemperate eating rather than intemperate drinking is the common sin against bodily health.





We know that a certain quantity of water in the soil is necessary to render its fertile constituents available, and that a deficiency in this required amount makes a difference-between a good crop and a poor one. A few figures will kelp us to inderstand the importance of this fact: 60 to 98 per cent. of water enters into the composition of plants, and this amount, large as it is, is but a fraction of the total sum required during the growth of the plant. It has been calculated, from reliable experiments, that in raising oats every ton of dry matter represents an expenditure of 522 tons; potatoes use 422 tons for the same amount and corn requires 309 tons.

Great- as these requirements are, the annual fall of water in our country would be quite sufficient to meet them, but owing to its unequal distribution and the irregularity of the rainfall, cur crops are liable to suffer severely from droughts, unless proper methods are employed to retain in the soil, at the disposition of the plant-roots, the water which it has received from previous rains. Too often unnecessary loss of moisture is going on in our cultivated fields during the summer days, till the quantity left is insufficient for the requirements of the plant. Then, no matter how good the soil may be in other respects, the growth of the plant is checked and the crop is reduced in yield.

Average Cost of Eggs.

Experiments in feeding and in computing the value of eggs show that if no estimate is made for labor, one dozen eggs can be produced at a cost of about six cents for food, or about half a cent per egg. If all of the food allowed to hens were converted into eggs the profit of a dozen eggs would be large, even when prices are very lew, but much depends on whether the hens convert the food into eggs, flesh, or support of their bodies. It is a fact demonstrated, however, that when a dozen eggs are marketed they carry from the farm but little of the nutritious elements of the soil in proportion to their value in market, and on that secount they are as produced on the farm.—Poultry Keeper.

How to Fight Early Lice. SOME INNS IN ASIA

Description of Some of the Queer Institutions Found in China.

e Average Tourist Does not in Them—The Travellers Spread Their Bedding on a Dais and Sleep There.

Like inns are the inns of the east—the inns that prevail everywhere in Asia, though the average tourist does not see them. Let me describe one of these Chinese inns. Turning sharp off the main street of the town and passing through a gateway in a mud wall you find yourself in a courtyard. One side is occupied by several rooms for guests. At one end of each room, filling about a third of the space, is a matted dais raised about two feeth high. But under the dais is a fire-place of brick. On the dais is a small table standing about six inches high.

The travelers spread their beddling on the dais and sleep there, or they squat crosslegged on the dais and eat their food from the six inch high table that rests there. The larger portion of the room, the space not occupied by the dais, has a floor-off beaten earth, and it may contain a table or a couple of chairs, or it may contain nothing. Its purpose is to store the gavelers' baggage or six rebandiss. On the other three sides of the contrard are tables for the pack animals and a kitchen used by every piece. the inns are the inns of the east

The traveler must bring, and often does bring, his own food and forage. He ought to draw his own water and himself bod it. But in practice and under pressure of traffic the inns have fallen into the way of keeping for alse anien into the way of keeping for ale a quantity of forage and of food, such a mutton, fowls and eggs, and the care-akers or servants of the inn supply water raws from the well and boiled over the imman fire.

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
