The Committee to whom were referred the several Petitions of William Zwick, and others; Thomas Markland, and others; and John Turnbull, and others; beg leave to Report—

That in the year 1793 an Act was passed, authorising the Quarter Sessions of the Midland District to be holden at Kingston and Adolphustown, alternately.

That at the time of the passing the said Act, the population of the Midland District was principally settled in front, upon the Bay of Quinte.

That from the settlement of the rear Townships, and the great increase of population, in the Western part of the said District—the situation of the District Town, where the Courts of Justice are holden, is now felt to be inconvenient and injurious to those who reside at a distance of from sixty to one hundred miles from Kingston.

That the building used as a Court-House at Adolphustown, is, from its size and state of decay, altogether inadequate for the purposes originally intended.

That since the passage of the Act authorising the setting apart the County of Prince Edward, as a separate District, it appears to your Committee to be inexpedient to continue the holding of the Quarter Sessions at Adolphustown.

That it would greatly benefit the inhabitants of the County of Hastings, if the Quarter Sessions were, in future, holden, alternately, at Kingston and at the Town of Bellville, in the said County of Hastings, instead of at Adolphustown, as heretofore.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend to your Honorable House, to pass a Bill to repeal the second clause of an Act passed in the thirty-third year of the reign of King George the Third, chap. 6, and to enact, that the Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the Midland District be holden at Kingston and Belleville, alternately, so soon as a building shall have been erected, suitable for the holding of the same at Bellville aforesaid.

That the expense of erecting such building, for the service of the District generally, your Committee are of opinion, should be defrayed by the District; but as the present depressed state of the District funds will render it impossible to provide the whole sum required, your Committee would therefore recommend, that the Magistrates in Quarter Sessions be authorised to appropriate, of the District funds, the sum of _____ in aid of such sum as may be raised in the County of Hastings, either by voluntary contribution or by Special Assessment.

Your Committee are assured that a large proportion of the sum required has been already subscribed by the inhabitants of the County of Hastings, and that any deficiency will be readily raised by voluntary contributions: as the petitioners have, however, stated their willingness to submit to an additional assessment for that purpose, your Committee have the greater confidence in recommending the prayer of the petitioner; to the favorable consideration of your Honorable House.

Your Committee beg leave to call the attention of your Honorable House to the fact, that the petition is signed by a number of Magistrates residing in Kingston, as well as other parts of the District—and that the prayer of the petitioners is strongly recommended by the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions and the Judge of the District Court, as appears by their letters on the subject.

Your Committee have therefore introduced a clause in the bill to vest the parcel of land described in the said petition, in His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, in trust, for the purposes and according to the prayer of the petition.

ANNUAL REPORT,

Of the York Hospital and Dispensary.

The number of patients admitted since last report has been 321:—of these, 258 were discharged cured—2 incurable—2 absconded, and 39 have died;—32 remain under treatment—1031 adults and children have been prescribed for at the Dispensary.

The admissions of this year, as compared with the last, are more than double, owing to the great influx of Emigrants. The proportion of deaths will appear great, but many of the cases were admitted in a very advanced stage of illness, and several in an expiring condition.

The prevailing complaints amongst the Emigrants has been Fever of the character denominated Typhus; this disease engendered in poverty and wretchedness, has happily been heretofore almost unknown in the Country. Of a malignant and protracted nature it proved baneful to the Attendants and expensive to the Establishment. The income of the Hospital, indeed, could not have met the urgent demand upon it for providing additional bedding, Nurses and nourishment; but the timely aid of large benevolent contributions, furnished the means of affording relief to every applicant. This judicious appropriation of Charity, thus materially contributed to preserve the Town from the contagion that would otherwise have endangered it.

In last years report, the propriety of building a Lunatic Ward was suggested, this year a case of Fever followed by severe Maniacal symptoms, and an Insane Woman, who had suffered an injury of the Spine from jumping out of a window, were from necessity admitted, to the great disturbance of the sick throughout the Hospital. The District Gaol is still the only refuge of the destitute Maniac—where he becomes a nuisance of the most revolting nature, and where neither medical or moral treatment can be successfully applied for his relief.

To His Excellency SIR JOHN COLBORNE,

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commissioners appointed for the Burlington Bay Canal, beg leave, most respectfully, to report upon the state of the work intrusted to their care.

Report of Commissioners Burlington Bay Canal.

Since the undersigned had the honor of transmitting their last report to Your Excellency, upon the work intrusted to their care, they regret to say that the Contractors have not been as diligent in prosecuting their contract as they might have been, for they have not finished their undertaking, and a part of it they have abandoned altogether: the time for completing their contract was out on the first day of October last.

The Commissioners beg leave to submit, herewith, an estimate of all deficiencies agreeable to their Contract:—The Bridge which was finished last year remains secure and in good order, and has answered an excellent purpose.

The North and South Piers in Lake Ontario have been completed agreeable to contract.—The Piers in Burlington Bay are also completed; the latter, although varying a little from the contract, are, however, equally strong and secure. The difference, or rather the diminution, of the work is included in the estimate of deficiencies.

The South or main Pier in Lake Ontario, as well as the Piers in Burlington Bay, have been finished by Job Loder, Esq. who is the principal security for the fulfilment of Messieurs Mann and Spaun's Contract. And the Commissioners take this opportunity of saying, that Mr. Loder has come forward in a spirited manner and completed the work, as far as was in his power, agreeable to the contract. The work that was intended to cut off the angles in Lake Ontario, between the North and South Piers, has failed entirely, and it is now the opinion of the Commissioners, that nothing short of a good and substantial Pier, secured with piles and well filled with stone, will answer the purpose required. The object is to obviate the necessity of dredging the channel, by confining the water in a narrow compass which will have the effect of keeping the channel clear and of a proper depth.

The South Pier in Lake Ontario has been extended out to the remaining crib of the Break Water, and securely laid down, measuring 1,300 feet from the Shore, and terminating in twenty feet of water. The work, as far as it is finished, is done in a substantial manner.

The Tolls received this Summer, amount to £1,150, and in all probability, before the navigation closes, will net £1,400.

The Commissioners have directed the Superintendent to make out an estimate of the materials and labor necessary for finishing the Burlington Bay Canal in a permanent manner,—with a Light House, &c., which they hope your Excellency will

APPENDIX. favorably recommend to the consideration of the Legislature, in order that so important a public work may be more securely completed.

It will also be necessary to make provision for attending the Swing Bridge across the Canal; and Light House.

Accounts of all monies received and expended upon this work out of the last appropriation of £5,000, accompany this report; which have been audited and found correct.

The Commissioners would further beg leave to mention some claims upon this work for materials furnished and services rendered, which they conceive deserve the attention of the Legislature, and hope your Excellency will be pleased to recommend the same.

In the early part of the Season of 1830, Mr. Kerr, the Superintendent, made application to the Commissioners for a balance due him, in securing the Canal and Machinery during the year 1828 and 1829—amounting to £337 14s. 2d. over and above the funds placed in his hands; which expenditure had been authorised by the late Commissioners. The undersigned, upon careful examination of the Act relative to this work, passed two Sessions ago, found that it did not authorise them to pay for work that had been done to the Canal, but strictly required that the sum granted should be applied only for work to be done in completing the same—being well assured that the greater part of that sum was due to others for labor and materials furnished for securing the Harbor, the Commissioners did grant out of the sum retained by them for contingencies, and upon Mr. Kerr's own responsibility, the sum of £337 14s. 2d.

trusting that the Legislature would make good the same—the Commissioners being well aware, that the Canal had never yielded or paid tolls until the Harbor was secured by Mr. Kerr.

An application from Mr. Barrett, Civil Engineer, has been made to the Commissioners for the sum of £10 for services rendered during the arbitration of Mr. Strobbridge's claim in 1828, which sum was omitted in the arbitrators account of expenses, &c. The Commissioners conceive it their duty to report it. A claim for £35 is made by Mr. Francis Hall, Civil Engineer, who was employed at the commencement of this work by the first Commissioners. That sum, in the first instance, was objected to by the late Commissioners, but afterwards was ordered to be retained for Mr. Hall, (who was at that time in Nova Scotia) and placed in the hands of James Crooks, Esquire, where it remained until the year 1828, when it was withdrawn by order of the Commissioners and applied to the uses of the Canal.

Mr. Hall has, in the course of the last year, made application for that sum through an Agent. The Commissioners beg leave to report the same.

APPENDIX.

To the Commissioners of the Burlington Bay Canal,

GENTLEMEN:

At your present meeting, to make your annual report to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, we would beg leave to suggest, that although the Contract has not been completed according to its letter, we feel confident that we have proceeded with the work with as much economy as could be expected; and that the delays instead of operating to the disadvantage of the Canal, have had a tendency to develop the necessary alterations which are required, and what further requisitions will be necessary to render the Canal permanent and secure the Piers. The Piers in Lake Ontario have cost us, at a moderate calculation, about £250 more than was anticipated, the water being much deeper than when the survey was made, and the washing out of the stone from the Piers sunk on the old work has considerably augmented the loss which we have to sustain; this we wish you to take into consideration. The work in the angles will of course be represented to you by the Superintendent. The work which we have already done last fall and the present season far exceeds our calculations for its completion, as the effect of the current, and the water washing over the Piers at the East end, had the effect to undermine, which we could not expect. The plan proposed by us is, we deem, impracticable, or at least another which will be better can be adopted, as the channel is now reduced to its proper depth by the work already done: the work we have done will stand a comparison with any in America, and so far as permanency and durability were required, we are confident that no pains have been lacking on our part.

Letter from Contractor to Commissioners of Burlington Bay Canal.

It is but justice in us to state, that a good understanding has existed between us and the Superintendent; and considering the long experience he has had in the prosecution of the work, that should any further appropriation be made it should be done under his direction; by taking into consideration the complicated nature of the work, and the difficulty of making calculations by contract. The Bridge we would wish to have disposed of, as we are not desirous of tending it any longer; the expense of tending it while the work has been in progress has been much more than was anticipated, in consequence of the continual passing and re-passing of Boats.

We have not abandoned the work with any desire not to fulfil our Contract, but being deprived of all means by the Surety, into whose hands all the money has been received, to proceed with the undertaking, and being willing to assume the same, which he has done, you will look to him for a final termination of the contract.

The Petition of the undersigned Contractors of the Burlington Bay Canal, humbly sheweth, That your petitioners contracted in good faith to perform certain work on the Burlington Bay Canal, in the month of May 1830—that your petitioners proceeded with the undertaking with as much prudence and economy as was susceptible, but the complicated nature of the work, which has been attendant during the whole of its progress has disabled your petitioners from fulfilling their contract, a part of which experience has proven will not answer the purpose intended, although it has had the desired effect to clear the channel; but it is necessary to make some alteration for its permanency and durability, which, agreeable to the present Act of the Legislature, is not vested in the power of the Commissioners,—your petitioners, therefore pray, that this petition may accompany the report of the Commissioners; that a clause may be inserted, should any farther Act pass the Legislature relative to said work, to enable your petitioners to settle the contract on fair and equitable terms, either by us and the Commissioners, or by the Superintendent, who has charge of the work, as we may mutually agree, and your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

SIR,

I had the honor to receive your letter on the subject of "Writs issued and Suits instituted, &c." in the Courts in which I have the honor to preside; and to enable me to give the statement required with as much accuracy as possible, I wrote to Mr. Askin, the Clerk of the District Court, and to the Attorneys who practice in it.

Mr. Askin having the custody of the Records of the Court, can give a more minute detail of its proceedings than any other Officer connected with it. He stated in answer to my letter, that he has communicated to you all the information on the subjects referred to in the address from the House of Assembly, that his official situation enables him to give. And I regret to say, that the delay necessarily occasioned in corresponding with the Attorneys, &c. who reside in different parts of this extensive District, has not enabled me to add to the information given by Mr. Askin, although I trust it will satisfactorily account for my not having sooner acknowledged the receipt of your letter.

Letter from Judge District Court and Surrogate London District.

With respect to the Surrogate Court, the terms or days whereon the Courts sit for the ordinary dispatch of business, are pointed out by the Act establishing Surrogate Courts in each District; and the only Suit which has been instituted or litigated in the Court since I have presided in it, is a Suit instituted in 1829, against the Widow and Administratrix of John Davis, who died intestate, leaving Goods and Chattels amounting to nearly £2,000; some of the claimants who instituted the suit resided in this Country, and others in the United States;—this suit occupied two terms in 1829, and three terms in 1830, in succession, before it was finally and amicably settled.

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of David Brakenridge and others, upon the subject of the improvement of the Navigation of the River Saint Lawrence, beg leave to report to Your Honorable House—

That having examined the evidence taken by a Committee appointed by Your Honorable House upon the same subject during the last Session, and having obtained some additional testimony, shewing the increased necessity which exists for taking measures towards the accomplishment of this object, they are of opinion, that the improvement of the Navigation of this great and common highway to the ocean is becoming daily more and more an object of the deepest interests, as well to our Agricultural as to our Commercial prosperity; and that the only points regarding which we apprehend there can exist any difference of opinion, are the extent and manner of effecting the end contemplated.

Report of Select Committee upon the subject of the improvement of the Navigation of the River St. Lawrence.

Two plans have at different periods been proposed,—the one for effecting a Ship Navigation for vessels drawing eight or nine feet water,—the other, for boats requiring four feet water.

Two methods have likewise been suggested, for accomplishing whichever plan may be adopted,—the one, to incorporate a Joint Stock Company to undertake the work on their own responsibility, and to be solely composed of private individuals, or of individuals in conjunction with the Provincial Government;—the other, for the Government to undertake the whole expense, on behalf of the public.

The latter of each of these suggestions have appeared to Your Committee to be most in accordance with the interests of the Country.

It is useless, in the opinion of Your Committee, to attempt improvements on that part of the River Saint Lawrence within our territory, which will not meet something similar to correspond therewith in Lower Canada; and as a Boat Canal of the depth of four feet is the largest that has ever been seriously contemplated by the Legislature of our Sister Province, Your Committee conceive that there is little reason to expect that any corresponding work will be undertaken in Lower Canada upon a larger scale than the one recommended by Your Committee; and at the same time, they beg to express their conviction, that a Canal for boats drawing four feet water is as extensive an undertaking as there is any probability of being immediately useful to Commerce, or productive, in its return, for the Capital expended.

The expense of this latter project, Your Committee feel every confidence, need not exceed £50,000, and the immediate return, by way of Tolls, they have little doubt, from the evidence before them, will at no time be so little as £5000 per annum, which, allowing five per centum as the interest upon the sum to be expended, would leave £2,500 as a sinking fund to redeem the Principal, although they are satisfied that the increase of Trade would afford a sufficient guarantee for that object.

Upon the second point, Your Committee are also decided in their opinion, that the whole work should be undertaken at the expense of the Province,—first, because the Saint Lawrence being the grand outlet of the Country, should never be, in the remotest degree, under the controul of a private Company, for reasons too obvious to require recapitulation: and also, because, when the Capital in a few years shall have been realized, the Government will be in a situation to remit the greater part of the tolls, or to derive a considerable revenue from their continuation;—add to which, that should a Canal upon a more extensive scale be thought advantageous at any future period, the undertaking may be entered upon without any sacrifice of private rights, which must always yield to the public interests.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully recommend, that £50,000 be placed at the disposal of Commissioners to construct a Canal four feet in depth, upon such parts of the Saint Lawrence, within our territory, as shall afford a safe and easy Navigation both up and down that great thoroughfare.

All which is humbly submitted.

W. L. WHITING called in and examined.

Question.—Are you aware of any alteration having taken place in the Imports and Exports passing up and down the Saint Lawrence since last year, and if any, to what extent?

Answer.—The quantity sent down in 1830 was equal to 316,025 bbls. as ascertained from the Custom-House Returns at Coteau du Lac. I cannot state the quantity in 1831 with the same exactness, the Returns not having yet been made up; but inasmuch as the excess in quantity of the article of Wheat alone, is equal to 60,000 bbls., I can state with perfect confidence, that the whole Export exceeds 400,000 bbls., estimating 220 lbs. equal to a barrel of flour—of Merchandize upwards the quantity, on the 10th November, was about 10,000 tons, and I think fully 1000 tons have been brought up since that period: this is exclusive of Emigrants, of whom about 25,000 have come up the Saint Lawrence.

Question.—Is it considered the improvement prayed for would facilitate the Exporter in the transport down the River;

and what rate of toll do the Forwarders think the Trade would bear; and what revenue do you think may be reasonably expected from it?

APPENDIX.

Answer.—It would most decidedly; and from my own experience, as well as from information derived from free communication with the Forwarders generally on the subject, I feel assured the same amount of business can be done. on the completion of the work now in progress in Lower Canada, if a corresponding improvement is made in the Upper Province, for one half the sum it now costs, and the Forwarders be enabled to pay a toll of 50s. on Durham-Boats; 25s. on Batteaux; 6d. per cwt. on Merchandize; and for Passengers 1s. each. These rates would yield a revenue, taking the business of 1831 for data, of say—

The usual prices have been 2s. 6d. per bbl. for Flour; 9d. per bushel for Wheat; and other property in the same proportion, down;—the average price of up freight this year has been about 3s. 9d. per cwt.

Question.—Since last year, have you had much conversation with intelligent persons engaged in the Forwarding, respecting the contemplated improvement of the Saint Lawrence; and as from their knowledge of the difficulties which exist, they must be supposed to know the best method of surmounting them—will you state that method?

Answer.—I have had much conversation with them, and there is but one opinion on the subject, viz: that the improvement for large Barges, Durham-boats, &c. requiring four feet depth of water, by means of Towing-paths, &c. is the one best calculated to effect the objects in view, which are *cheapness*, *expedition*, and *safety*; and even if an improvement on a larger scale were perfectly practicable, and within the means of the Province, the scale on which the improvement has been authorised in Lower Canada, and now in progress, will render any large and expensive improvement wholly useless.

The Commissioners for Superintending the erection of the Building designed for the use of the Legislature, have the honor to submit to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the amounts of receipts and expenditures of the monies appropriated by the Provincial Parliament, for that purpose, which are contained in the three accompanying papers, marked 1, 2, and 3.

Commissioners' Report.

They very much regret that difficulties arising from circumstances, wholly unforeseen, should have been the cause of so inconvenient a delay, and of ultimately defeating their well-grounded expectation, that the sum at their disposal would have sufficed for the finishing the Building.

The Correspondence with the Superintendants, which is likewise enclosed, will explain why the Commissioners have not thought it advisable peremptorily to confine the work to the precise amount in their hands, and upon its expenditure to dismiss the workmen; but, satisfied with discharging themselves from all responsibility beyond that sum, have considered it more beneficial to the Public Service to permit the Undertakers to proceed to the completion of their several Contracts.

Communications between the Commissioners for erecting the New Parliament Buildings and Messrs. Ewart & Parke.

York, 2nd August, 1831.

GENTLEMEN,

With reference to the instructions communicated verbally to you, some time since, that the Legislative Walls in the Parliament Building should be finished before the other parts of the edifice; and, at all events, in order that the Legislature may occupy it at the ensuing Session,—(probably in November). The Commissioners wish you, explicitly, to understand, that those instructions were founded on an apprehension, that the sum remaining in their hands, (£————) would be quite insufficient for finishing the whole of the interior, and an opinion that it would be more advisable to leave the other apartments, (though not in an untenable state,) still incomplete, rather than the Great Chambers.

Having learned, however, in an interview with you this morning, in presence of Mr. Crowther and Mr. Turton, the Carpenter and Mason Contractors, that the very great and discouraging slackness in the prosecution of the work, which is now most manifest, may, in a great measure, be ascribed to the interruption to the operation occasioned by such an arrangement. The Commissioners think it due to the public service, as well as to the persons more immediately concerned, to say, that their desire in that respect was to avoid, if possible, incurring any pecuniary responsibility beyond the amount of funds placed by the Parliamentary grant at their disposal, (of which at present £———— is unexpended); nevertheless, if the undertakers of the work are willing to proceed in it with the best economy and despatch to a greater extent on the strength of their just claim for ultimate payment, the Commissioners can see no possible reason to doubt, that in such a case the Legislature will not fail to provide the means for that end at the next meeting.

The Commissioners wish that you would make known their sentiments on this subject to the Undertakers of the work, and, at the same time, favor them with your judgment of the benefit, if any, in the shape of dispatch and saving, likely to flow from adopting their present view of the matter.

York, 5th August, 1831.

GENTLEMEN,

We have made known your sentiments to the Contractors (Mr. Crowther and Mr. Turton), communicated to us on the 2nd instant, and they have expressed their willingness to proceed to a greater extent in the finishing of the interior of the Parliament Buildings than the means remaining in your hands will meet, relying on a provision of the Legislature at its next meeting for the amount of their expenditure beyond said residue.

In our judgments, this arrangement will be attended with many good consequences: ultimately, the Building will cost less by proceeding with the plastering and Joiners' work in regular order, than if the same was now partly done and the remainder left over.

The Contractors' interest will be advanced by proceeding with the work, as some arrangements have been made by them and materials provided for that purpose.

The accommodations for the Legislature, at its next meeting, will be much more ample and comfortable. It will prevent any disrespect that might be the consequence of proceeding in a contracted manner with the work.

School.

The undersigned, a majority of the Board of Trustees
of the District School of the Ottawa District—

HUMBLY REPORT :

That, in fulfilment of the provision to that
effect contained in the Provincial Statute of the 59th George
3rd, Chapter 4, the annual public examination of the said
School, taught by the Reverend John McLaurin, was held at
Longueuil, in the said District, on the 14th day of July instant.

The School List comprises thirty-nine Scholars, of whom
thirty-three were present, and examined.

The Scholars consist of fourteen boys and twenty-five
girls. There are three Latin pupils, and the remainder, ex-
cept three, are reading in the New Testament, English
Reader, &c.

Three are just entering the rudiments of English.

A number of the Scholars are well advanced in Writing
and Arithmetic, and the neatness of their books was very
satisfactory.

Several of them recited select pieces, in a correct manner,
and much attention seems paid to the exercise of their memories.

The books principally used are, in the Latin Class,
Rudiman's Grammar, Mair's Syntax, Selecta Veteus, Salust,
and Virgil.

In the English branches—Mavor's Spelling-Book, Mur-
ray's Grammar, Scott's Lessons, Murray's English Reader ;
in Arithmetic—Walkingham's Elements, and Jacksons, Book-
keeping.

It is to be regretted, that the Trustees of the several
Common Schools have, as yet, omitted to avail themselves of
the privilege of sending ten free Scholars, as authorised by
the sixth clause of the said Statute.

It is proposed to state this omission to the District Board
of Education, at its next public meeting, in order that steps
may be taken to remind the Trustees of the Common Schools
of the power vested in them by the said clause.

The undersigned Trustees of the Public School of the
Midland District—

Beg leave most respectfully to report,

That the examination of the said School was held at the
School House, in Kingston, on the fifth day of August last
past, when the Pupils were heard according to their Classes,
in the various branches of Education, to which their studies
had been directed by Mr. Baxter, the Master, in the course
of the year ; and the Trustees have to express to Your Excel-
lency, their entire satisfaction with the proficiency of the Scho-
lars, as well as the unremitting care and assiduity of the
Master.

The two Schedules herewith submitted marked A and B,
will exhibit to Your Excellency in a clear and compendious
form, the present state of the institution, the number and ages
of the Scholars, the several Classes with which they are divi-
ded, and the subjects of their studies.

It appears that within the year just ended, three boys
have completed their education, and entered into mercantile
business, and that one has been removed to the College at
York, of those now at School, many, it will be seen are of
tender age, three boys have been admitted for gratuitous in-

struction, at the instance of the Trustees, and four others have
been also taught by the Master without fee or compensation.

A French Teacher is at present employed by Mr. Baxter,
but it is uncertain whether there will be sufficient encourage-
ment held out for him to remain.

The Board of Education for the Eastern District,

RESPECTFULLY REPORT :

That during the half year ending on the first December, 1830, there were forty-nine Common Schools, in which one thousand three hundred and eighty-three Pupils were instructed, principally in Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, and in a few instances, some of the more advanced branches of Education. In the subsequent half year ending on the first of June last, the number of Schools increased from forty-nine, to fifty-seven, and the number of Pupils according to the reports of the Trustees, amounted to sixteen hundred and eleven.

The Books received by the Boards for the use of Common Schools, have been all distributed under the directions of the Clerk, and the Board have every confidence, that they will be found of essential use in the remote parts of the District, where books are not easily obtained.

The amount of each Teachers allowance of the Government Monies, does not exceed six pounds per annum, in this District, yet it is found to operate as an inducement in the establishment of Schools, where, in all probability, none would otherwise exist. The Trustees express their satisfaction with the general conduct of the Teachers, and the Board have every reason to believe that much advantage is derived from the Schools now established in the District.

In transmitting the return required by the Honorable the Commons House of Assembly, I am under the necessity of confining myself to such charges as have received the sanction of the Court from time to time, never having kept any account of casual emoluments.

It is not unlikely that I may have received from One hundred and fifty to Two hundred Pounds since I have been in Office, over and above the sum mentioned in the accompanying accounts, and the annual allowance of thirty pounds for making out the Collectors Rolls, and transmitting the aggregate account of Assessment to Your Office, agreeably to the Statute.

With regard to the Table of Fees adopted by the Court of Quarter Sessions in this District, I beg leave to state, that previous to its being reported by the Committee, reference was had to the allowances made to the Clerks of the Peace, in the Home, London, and Gore Districts, and very material alterations made in the items of charges, as will appear by the

In addition to the sums stated to have been received by me out of the District Treasury, I have to observe, that the Court has made an annual allowance of eight pounds and ten shillings to defray the expense of delivering the Rolls to the different Collectors, and although I have not derived the least advantage therefrom, the charge would appear against myself without this explanation.

There is also another sum stated to have been paid me, amounting to twenty-five pounds, and ten shillings, with respect to which I beg to observe, that the money was not paid to me; but to a Carpenter who had made repairs to the Court House under my superintendance.

That your Memorialist, on his first application, did not succeed in the prayer of his petition, and therefore now respectfully submits this Memorial to your Worships, in Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace assembled, with the hope that, on your Worships duly considering the same, you will be pleased to allow him similar Fees for duties so performed. As from the tenor of an Act passed by the Legislature of this Province on the 10th March, 1807, entitled "An Act to establish the Fees of the Clerks of the Peace, and to regulate the Fees in the several Courts of Quarter Sessions throughout this Province." The second clause of which Act gives, in your Memorialist's opinion, full power and authority to your Worships, in Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace assembled, to allow such fees to your Officers, in the following words:—

"And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That when any person or persons shall be convicted before any Court of Quarter Sessions in this Province, of any Assault or Misdemeanor, such person or persons convicted shall pay the costs of such conviction and prosecution that shall be ALLOWED and TAXED by the said Court."

Wherefore, your Memorialists trusts that, on your Worships considering his present application, will perceive its justness, and allow him to charge similar fees on all criminal prosecutions, as appertaining to the emoluments of his office.

REPRESENTATION

Of the Grand Jury of the Home District on the subject of an Asylum.

With reference to the subject of the establishment of a Penitentiary, in which a system of Prison discipline might be introduced, affording a greater degree of certainty in the punishment of offenders against the Laws, and their employment in a manner beneficial both to themselves and to the public, the Grand Jury consider as being most desirable, as that certainty would operate with greater effect in deterring others from the commission of crime, while their being so employed would relieve the district from the inconvenient charge which is now incurred for their maintenance in a state of idleness, during the several periods of imprisonment to which they are sentenced.

Representation of the Grand Jury of the Home District on the subject of an Asylum.

They also take this opportunity of noticing another subject, which the course of their enquiries has brought under their consideration, and which for the sake of humanity towards an unfortunate class of their fellow beings, they confidently hope, needs but to be brought under the notice of the Legislature to receive its decided and immediate support.— They allude to the necessity which exists for the establishment of an Asylum, for the reception of insane persons.

Several cases have occurred in this District within a few years, in which the expenses incurred in taking care of individuals laboring under insanity, have been defrayed in the first instance, by the liberality of a society and of private individuals, and lately from the funds of the District, under an Act of the Legislature, the provisions of which, applying as they do, to this District only, are liable to the objection, that the

APPENDIX. expense, which is already very considerable, may be increased beyond its means, with a due regard to other objects, by the introduction of persons afflicted with this malady from other parts of the Province, in which no such District provision is made. A general Asylum supported from the Provincial Funds, it is thought, would be more beneficial to those afflicted, and would certainly insure for them a greater degree of care and comfort than can be expected while they are kept in the Common Gaol,—an arrangement found to be extremely inconvenient—to a certain extent unsafe—and imposing a responsibility on the Sheriff in no wise connected with the discharge of his duties to the public.

Representation of Grand Jury, Home District, on subject of an Asylum.

The Grand Jury are strongly impressed with a conviction, that the administration of justice would be very materially promoted, and that great advantage might be expected to result to the public, by the appointment of one of the Magistracy, with an adequate remuneration, to attend more exclusively to the duties of Police Magistrate in this Town, and that such an appointment would, at the same time, afford very desirable facilities to individuals having complaints to make, or other business to transact connected with that Office. In the present rapidly increasing state of the Population of the Town and District, and the consequent accumulation of public business in the Police Office, they feel, that the gratuitous discharge of the duties required, is more than ought reasonably to be expected.

In respectfully offering these remarks on the subject of a Penitentiary; of an Asylum for the Insane; and for the appointment of a Police Magistrate, the Grand Jury are induced to do so, in the hope, that the Court will consider them of sufficient importance for reference to the Government, with a view to their being recommended to the earnest attention of the Legislature.

The Grand Jury witness with much satisfaction the increasing prosperity of the Town and District, and of the Province generally. The rapid accession to our population by Emigration from the Mother Country of so many respectable and useful families, they trust will be found equally conducive to the interests of the Province, and of those individuals who have selected it as their future homes. The present occasion, the Grand Jury hope, will not be deemed an improper one of giving them the assurance of welcome among us, and of pointing out to them the path of honest industry, sobriety, and perseverance in their several pursuits, as certain to lead to respectability and comfort for themselves and families, under the protection of a most Gracious Sovereign, and the administration of laws eminently calculated to promote the peace and happiness of a people.

SIR:

With reference to my Despatch of the 23rd May last, No. 26, I have the honor to transmit to you an Act of Parliament, passed in the present Session, to amend the Statute, 14th Geo. 3rd, chap. 88, which places at the disposal of the Legislature of Upper Canada the Revenues of that Province arising from the Statute of Geo. 3rd.

The Act having been passed on the 22nd instant, it has not been practicable since that time to issue the necessary order of His Majesty in Council for confirming the Provincial Statute of the first year of His Majesty's Reign, chap. 14. That order will, however, be issued by the earliest possible opportunity. The Provincial Act will, in the mean, have its operation.

APPENDIX. Copy of an Act of the British Parliament, conferring the disposition of the Duties collected under the Act, 14th Geo. 3rd, cap. 88, to the Legislatures of the Provinces.

ANNO PRIMO & SECUNDO GULIELMI 4th. REGIS. Cap. 23.

An Act to amend an Act of the fourteenth year of His Majesty, King George the 3rd, for establishing a Fund towards defraying the charges of the Administration of Justice and support of the Civil Government within the Province of Quebec in America.

22nd September, 1831.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourteenth year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King George the 3rd, intituled, "An Act to establish a Fund towards further defraying the charges of the Administration of Justice and support of the Civil Government within the Province of Quebec in America," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that from and after the fifth day of April, one thousand, seven hundred and seventy-five, there should be raised, levied, collected, and paid unto His said late Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, for, and upon, the respective Goods thereafter mentioned, which should be imported and brought into any part of the said Province, over and above all other Duties then payable in the said Province by any Act or Acts of Parliament, the several Rates and Duties therein mentioned: that is to say, for every Gallon of Brandy, or other Spirits, of the manufacture of Great Britain, three pence; for every Gallon of Rum, or other Spirits, which should be imported or brought from any of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in the West Indies, six pence; for every Gallon of Rum, or other Spirits, which should be imported or brought from any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Dominions in America, nine pence; for every Gallon of Foreign Brandy, or other Spirits of Foreign manufacture, imported or brought from Great Britain, one shilling; for every Gallon of Rum or Spirits, of the produce or manufacture of any of the Colonies or Plantations in America, not in the possession or under the dominion of His Majesty, imported from any other place except Great Britain, one shilling; for every Gallon of Molasses and Syrups, which should be imported or brought into the said Province in Ships or Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects in Great Britain or Ireland, or to His Majesty's Subjects in the said Province, three pence; for every Gallon of Molasses and Syrups, which should be imported or brought into the said Province in any other Ships or Vessels in which the same might be legally imported, six pence: and after those Rates for any greater or less quantity of such Goods respectively. And it was thereby further enacted, that all the monies that should arise by the said Duties, (except the necessary charges of raising, collecting, levying, recovering, answering, paying, and accounting for the same) should be paid by the Collector of His Majesty's Customs into the hands of His Majesty's Receiver General in the said Province for the time being, and should be applied, in the first place, in making a more certain and adequate provision towards defraying the expenses of the administration of Justice, and of the support of the Civil Government in the said Province; and that the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any three or more of them, for the time being, should be, and they were thereby empowered, from time to time, by any Warrant or Warrants under his or their hand or hands, to cause such money to be applied out of the said produce of the said duties, towards defraying the said expenses. And it was thereby enacted, that the residue of the said duties should remain and be reserved in the hands of the said Receiver General, for the future disposition of Parliament: And whereas the said Province of Quebec hath, since the enactment of the said Act, been divided into the two Provinces of Upper Canada and Lower Canada: And whereas it is expedient to make further provision for the appropriation of the Duties raised, levied and collected, under the said Act:— Be it thereby enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for the Legislative Councils and Assemblies of the said Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada respectively, by any Acts to be by them from time to time passed, and assented to by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, or on His or their behalf, to appropriate, in such and to such purposes, as to them respectively shall seem meet, all the monies that shall hereafter arise by, or be produced from the said Duties, except so much of such monies as shall be necessarily defrayed for the charges of raising, collecting, levying, recovering, answering, paying and accounting for the same.

Report on Petition of Thomas Clark and others.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Thomas Clark and others, on the subject of an Act of Corporation to construct a Rail Road between the Rivers Welland and Niagara, have examined the same, and having availed themselves of information from respectable and intelligent persons, and given their consideration to the subject, beg leave to report :

That a Rail Road as projected would evidently be of much utility, and the ground for it having been by an eminent Civil Engineer, John B. Jarvis, Esq. carefully explored, the practicability of its being carried into effect is fully demonstrated by his plan and report ; and—

That as no public aid is required, your Committee are disposed to recommend that the Petitioners be Incorporated agreeably to the prayer of their petition, and that your Honorable House do pass the bill now before it.

REPORT

Of Select Committee on Petition of J. Muirhead and others, of Niagara.

Report on Petition of J. Muirhead and others, of Niagara.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of certain Inhabitants of the Town of Niagara, praying for an alteration in the Charter of the Niagara Canal Company—beg leave to report to your Honorable House :

That your Committee fully concur in the opinion expressed by the Petitioners, that the Act Incorporating the Niagara Canal Company imposes terms so injurious to the interests of the persons who might take Stock in the said Company, that they feel no surprise at the assurance of the Petitioners, that attempts have been made in vain to induce individuals to invest their Capital in this undertaking, which is so essential to the Commercial prosperity of Niagara.

Your Committee are of opinion, that no Town in Upper Canada has claims so powerful as those which Niagara can urge upon the favorable consideration of the Legislature : which, your Committee feel convinced, will readily be conceded when it is recollected that in the early part of the late war the Town was occupied by the enemy during a whole summer, and upon their being driven out in the autumn they left the whole place in a heap of smoking ruins, and the Inhabitants, in the inclement month of December, without any other covering than the canopy of Heaven.

Notwithstanding all the privations and sufferings Niagara then endured without a murmur, national calamities at that time drowning the voice of individual suffering, the return of peace brought with it evils little expected by her devoted population :—those Troops who during the war had been the object of attack, and had called forth the reckless cruelty of the enemy, were withdrawn from Fort George, and the advantages accruing from Military expenditure were transferred to the Capital of the Province, and the Town of Niagara, which in former times had been the residence of the King's Representative, as well as the Head-Quarters of His Majesty's Troops, was doomed to languish under the weight of its accumulated privations.

In 1824, when the project of the Welland Canal first began to attract public attention, the Town of Niagara thought she had a right to expect that her obviously local superiority over any other point, for the termination of this great work, should have determined the question in her favor, had no former privations raised their voice in favor of this again neglected spot : but what was her disappointment when she found that Military considerations, instead of awakening the most enthusiastic sentiments in her favor, were assigned as the cause of again destroying her brightest hopes, and she was left without one ray to cheer her future prospects.

After all these sufferings—all these disappointments—and all these privations, which in many cases have reduced to indigence, persons who before the war were comparatively affluent, your Committee are constrained to express their earnest recommendation to your Honorable House, to award the Petitioners a boon which the present occasion affords an opportunity of doing without any detriment to the public interests of the Province, or injury to private rights.

The Petitioners feel assured that they can readily provide the funds necessary for constructing the contemplated Junction

Canal, but they are anxious to be relieved, if possible, from the additional expense of providing for the payment of the claim made by the Welland Canal Company for the use of the water, and to be allowed to retain their own work in their own hands, without having their interests merged in, or blended with, those of the Welland Canal Company.

Your Committee are persuaded that the Harbor at Port Dalhousie will be a constant source of expense ; and that even now it is contemplated by the Welland Canal Company to remove the entrance Lock farther back from the Lake, at an expenditure very considerable when compared with the means of the Company or the object to be attained ; and they feel assured that, under any circumstances, it never can be equal to the natural Harbor which the beautiful River Niagara already affords.

Under all these circumstances, and viewing the advantages which will accrue to the Town from the Hydraulic privileges she will derive from the surplus water, your Committee beg leave respectfully to recommend the passing of a bill which they have prepared, and which accompanies this report, rendering the Niagara Canal Company altogether independent of the Welland Canal Company, and authorising them to complete the Lateral Cut contemplated with their own resources, and relieving them from the condition of allowing their Stock to merge in that of the Welland Canal Company, if the latter shall desire it ; and authorising the Receiver General of this Province to compensate the Welland Canal Company for the amount at which the use of the water may be valued, out of the money first loaned to the Welland Canal Company, which sum shall form a part of the Stock of the Niagara Canal Company, and shall be subscribed for, and held, by the Receiver General, on behalf of the Province.

Your Committee recommend this course with the greater confidence of its meeting the approbation of your Honorable House, when they are assured, that the waters of the Eight and Ten Mile Creeks, and the other small streams crossing the contemplated route of the lateral cut, together with the water which is now discharged down the Ten over the Waste Weirs of the Welland Canal, in Thorold, will, for three-fourths of the year, afford a sufficient supply of water without necessarily taking any from the Welland Canal. It must also be recollected, that the waters of the Twelve, and other streams, have been appropriated to the use of the Welland Canal Company without charge, and therefore, it is but reasonable, this important undertaking should not be deprived of a similar advantage.

Your Committee are also further induced to represent to your Honorable House, that it is quite manifest, upon investigating the subject, that the lateral branch, instead of being an injury to the Welland Canal Company, will tend very much to increase the Transport of that Company ; because those commodities which are now unladen at Niagara have no means of arriving at the Welland Canal, except by a long land carriage, which renders it impossible that the owners of such articles will ever be able, unless this Branch Canal be completed, to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Welland Canal of transporting their effects by that mode of conveyance.

All which is humbly submitted for the consideration of your Honorable House.

Independently of the loss which the Public Revenue would sustain by the repeal of the Laws imposing a duty on Stills, your Committee are apprehensive, that an acquiescence in the prayer of the Petition might be productive of demoralizing consequences, by multiplying the number of small Distilleries, and thereby placing a greater quantity of Spirituous Liquor within the immediate reach of the multitude in the remote parts of the Country.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petitions of Hugh C. Thomson and James M. Farlane, Esquires, and of Robert Stanton, Esquire:—

RESPECTFULLY REPORT:

That they are of opinion, that the House of Assembly should take for its use two hundred copies of the Edition of the Provincial Statutes published by the first named Petitioners.

In making this recommendation, the Committee abstain from offering any opinion on the work, further than to observe, with reference to the Printing, Paper, and Binding, that it appears to have been executed in a manner highly creditable to the Publishers.

The price at which it is offered is reasonable; and from the difficulty latterly experienced in obtaining complete sets of the Laws of the Province, the Publication in question must be regarded as affording a very great accommodation to the people of this Province.

The well directed enterprise of individuals in the performance of works of public utility is at all times deserving of patronage from the Legislature: and the Committee are disposed to regard the Publication of the Provincial Statutes by Messrs. Thomson and M. Farlane in this light. In addition to which, there is a necessity for obtaining a number of copies of the Laws of the Province, for the use of the House of Assembly, as every Member must be fully sensible the taking of two hundred copies therefore of the edition referred to, will afford encouragement to the publishers, and at the same time supply the House with a work that is much needed.

The Committee have considered the objections of Mr. Stanton to granting the prayer of the Petition preferred by Messrs. Thomson and Macfarlane, but they do not think that the House of Assembly, in acquiescing in the petition of the latter Gentlemen, in the manner recommended, will infringe Mr. Stanton's rights as King's Printer.—The publication of an edition of the Statutes of the Province, by authority, for gratuitous distribution, has for some time been very generally regarded as necessary;—when this measure shall be decided upon, the just rights of the King's Printer in this Province will of course receive proper consideration.

REPORT

On Petition of John Chisholm.

To the Honorable the Commons House of Assembly.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of John Chisholm, on the subject of remunerating him for the diversion of the water from the natural outlet of Burlington Bay, by the Canal which has been cut through the Beach that separates Lake Ontario from Burlington Bay, agreeably to the Act of the Legislature of this Province—beg leave most respectfully to submit the following report:—

The Petitioner represents that in the year 1816 he purchased Property at said outlet, for the purpose of accommodating the public, by forwarding produce and goods; that he laid out considerable Capital in the erection of buildings, having had reason to suppose that said outlet, from its being the natural channel for the overflow of water from Burlington Bay, would continue to be so, and did not anticipate that any risk would occur to him when providing suitable premises for public accommodation; that he realized considerable profit from the Capital which he necessarily expended, by means of the forwarding business; and since the said Canal has been made, the said natural outlet has entirely disappeared—consequently his premises are rendered useless, with the exception of a trifling rent he obtains for a dwelling-house that is now inconveniently situated for any other useful purpose, in consequence of the diversion, as aforesaid, of the said outlet.

Your Committee have before them undoubted evidence of the great inconvenience to which Petitioner has been exposed, and loss he has sustained, in consequence of the com-

munication between Burlington Bay and Lake Ontario being removed from the old outlet to the said Canal; that in the years 1820, 1821, and 1822, he personally conducted the forwarding business, the proceeds of which netted him from £250 to £300 yearly; and the years 1823, 1824, and 1825, he rented his said premises for £75 yearly; and for the year 1826, he received for rent one hundred pounds, and of course had every reason to expect that an improvement of rent would take place each succeeding year.

APPENDIX.

The Committee perceive that the private right of Petitioner has been very materially interfered with for the benefit of the public, and consider it a subject worthy of Legislative consideration;—should even the lowest sum mentioned as received by him for rent,—say £75 a year—be taken as data for the loss he sustains, at the rate of twenty years purchase, would produce the sum of £1,500, and which would be only a moderate equivalent,—consequently the Committee feel much inclined to recommend to your Honorable House the due consideration of the prayer of his petition.

REPORT

On Petition of Andrew Snider, and others.

To the Honorable the Commons House of Assembly.

The Select Committee to whom was referred the petition of Andrew Snider and others, of Williamsburgh, in the County of Dundas, having taken into their consideration the matters referred to them, have agreed to the following Report.

It will be seen by a reference to the petition, that it is the object of the Petitioners to obtain a law which shall have the effect of altering the Boundary lines of the Lots of Land in the Township of Williamsburgh, such a law would be of course in the strictest sense of the expression, a private Act; its operation would be local and confined to a very limited extent of Territory, and would affect only a small number of its inhabitants; such a Law might prejudice and injure the vested rights of private persons. It appears therefore to the Committee clearly to come within the description of Private Bills mentioned in those rules of the two Houses of the Legislature, which have been established for the security of individuals, and the protection of private rights; one of these rules which has been adopted by the House of Assembly, provides, that no such private bill shall be entertained, unless a notice of the intention of the Petitioners shall have been inserted in the Upper Canada Gazette, for the period of six months previous to the meeting of the Legislature. If such notice had been published in the Upper Canada Gazette, six months previous to the period at which the Legislature has usually met, the Committee would have felt bound to submit to the House of Assembly, whether such a notice would not have been virtually, though certainly not literally in compliance with the rule; but the Committee have ascertained by examination that no notice whatever has been published in the Gazette of the intention of the Petitioners; upon this account the Committee do not feel at liberty to report a bill or recommend that any bill shall be passed during the present Session; for the rule of the House, that has been alluded to, which cannot fail to be exceedingly useful if adhered to, will cease to be a protection of private rights, and in fact will be a mere snare and the very means of betraying them if not universally enforced; inasmuch as persons might depend on the rule and think it unnecessary to incur the trouble and expense of opposing a bill which could not be entertained consistently with such rule.

From the information in the possession of the Committee, however, they think it their duty to add that the measure desired by the Petitioners would be wise and prudent and well calculated to prevent law suits and confusion. They are of opinion therefore, that if due notice should be published in the Upper Canada Gazette, and petitions should be presented to the different branches of the Legislature, at any future Session, such a law as is desired by the Petitioners ought to be passed, unless some reasons can be assigned for rejecting it which have not occurred to the Committee.

Respecting Medals for the Militia of the Province of Upper Canada.

York, 17th December, 1831.

Adjutant General's Office,
York, U. C. 7th December, 1831. }

SIR,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th instant, addressed to me by order of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, inclosing one from Colonel Coffin, Adjutant General of Militia, under date of the 7th instant, which I herewith return.

I cannot take upon me to give you the information His Excellency desires as to the description of Medals lodged in the Bank.—As respects a chest or box, which I find on reference to the Cashier, was sent there by the Honorable Archdeacon Strachan, in the winter of 1823 or 1824, on his departure from hence to England, which I believe he had, some time previous to that, taken the charge of from the late Mr. Chief Justice Scott, who was the President of the loyal and patriotic Society, and who had also in his possession, at the time of his death, in 1824, another small box, said to contain Medals, and addressed to him, as President. This box being found to have been in his possession by me in October 1825, on my return from England I, as one of the Executors to his Estate, took charge of it.

I have no knowledge of its contents, it never having been opened by me: nor do I know any thing of the contents of the box sent by Doctor Strachan.

With respect to the loyal and patriotic Society being still responsible for their distribution, I cannot say.—I perfectly recollect the cause assigned formerly for these Medals not being distributed soon after they came to hand, which must have been in 1818.—I think it was found to be too late, as no previous means had been taken to ascertain who were the persons most entitled to receive them; and the difficulty that appeared to occur in making a distribution at that late period, without causing much jealousy and discontent, were, as far as I know, the reasons it was not done; and I presume, accounts for their being now on hand.

I had the honor of receiving your communication of yesterday's date, covering a copy of an address from the Honorable the House of Assembly, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting information with respect to Medals procured for distribution to the Militia of the Province who had distinguished themselves during the late war with the United States of America; and if any were distributed, how many, and to whom, distinguishing the Gold from the Silver Medals.—In answer to which I beg leave to state, that the Loyal and Patriotic Society of Upper Canada, whose funds were raised by subscriptions within the Province, and mainly supported by subscriptions in London, Jamaica, Lower Canada, and even by Legislative assistance from Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, had declared its intention of not only relieving the distresses of the Militia of the Province, and of their families, who might suffer from the effects of the war, but also of rewarding all such, with the honorary distinction of Medals, as conducted themselves in a conspicuously deserving manner in the defence of their country.

Medals of Gold and of Silver, but to what extent, I am not aware, were procured accordingly, and are now lodged, I am induced to believe, in the Bank of Upper Canada.

Why they were not distributed, I cannot possibly take on myself to say;—but I know that measures were taken at one or more times, for ascertaining the persons to whom it might have been considered desirable to have them presented: and I also know, that great anxiety was evinced by many deserving individuals for the attainment of so honorable a distinction.

Of the Commissioners for Superintending the erection of a Light House on Long Point, in Lake Erie.

To His Excellency, SIR JOHN COLBORNE, Knight, Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, and Major General, Commanding His Majesty's Forces therein, &c. &c. &c.

The Commissioners appointed under authority of the Provincial Statute, 10th Geo. 4th, to provide for the erection of a Light House on Long Point, in Lake Erie—

Most respectfully beg leave to Report :

That as early in the Spring as the weather would permit the Contractors for the Light House and Dwelling House applied themselves to the completion of the work left unperformed last Autumn, and which they finished early last Summer.

The Commissioners personally inspected the Light House and Dwelling House, and found them completed agreeable to the Specification; and they have placed the Light House in charge of Mr. Thomas Price, a competent person.

The Commissioners also beg leave to present Your Excellency with the statements of moneys disbursed by them under two distinct heads, viz :

1. Statement marded A, with Vouchers, shewing the disbursements made under authority of Statute 10th, Geo. 4th, chap. 20.

2. Statement marked B, with Vouchers, shewing the disbursements made under authority of Statute 11th, Geo. 4th, chap. 28.

Of the sum of £1,000 appropriated for building the Light House, a balance of £5 9 4, was wanting to complete it, which is taken into account in Statement B.

Of the sum of £400 appropriated for building a Dwelling House for the Light keeper, and furnishing Oil, Wick, and other materials for the Light House, a balance of £18 12s. 6d. remains unexpended, and which has been returned to His Majesty's Receiver General.

The Commissioners further beg leave to state, that there remains on hand a supply of Oil to last till June next; also, Wick and Tube Glass, sufficient for the next Season; also, 21 panes of Glass, should any be wanting for the Lantern.

From this report, which has been circulated through the
province, it appears that several Districts have been unneces-
sarily deprived of the benefits which they might have reaped
from the Royal Grants made for the purpose of establishing
Grammar Schools, had the lands set apart been properly
managed; and that the leased Crown Reserves ceded in 1826,
for the endowment of a University, were intended for the sup-
port of District Schools.

The Lieutenant Governor is of opinion, that the measures
which have been recommended to be adopted, with a view of
forming a fund for the maintenance of Schools, and for their
endowment, should be fully explained, in order that the erro-
neous impressions which may have taken place on this subject

IN COUNCIL.

We, the Magistrates, Barristers, Grand and Petit Jurors,
and Yeomanry of the District of London, in General Quarter
Sessions of the Peace assembled, beg leave most respectfully
to approach your Excellency with our representations on a
subject in which we are deeply interested, both as parents and
members of society.

We have seen, with much satisfaction, Your Excellency's
great exertions in the cause of Education, and the fostering
care and protection which you have bestowed upon the Minor
College, recently established under your direction at York, (the
seat of Government,) in the hope that the same earnest efforts
will be extended to the other divisions of the Province.

Yet while we wish every success to that institution, we
cannot but feel that the great advantages which it offers can
seldom be enjoyed by any of our children: useful, certainly,
it will be to the Home District and the Town of York, and
perhaps to some youth brought up at other Schools, as a place
to furnish their preparations for a still higher Seminary; but
very few parents are in circumstances in this part of the Province
to benefit by Minor College, and still fewer appear inclined
to send their children some hundred miles from home at so
early an age as boys ought to enter a Classical School.

Our object, therefore, in addressing Your Excellency is,
to request that such an endowment may be granted to the
School of the London District, at London, in the District
Town, as shall render it efficient as a Classical Seminary and a
Nursery, (as such Schools are intended to be) for the University
of King's College, which we hope soon to see in active op-
eration, notwithstanding the impediments that have been thrown
in its way.

We presume not to determine the extent of the endowment,
but perhaps such a one as would furnish a good School House,
a commodious residence for the head Master to enable him to
keep Boarders, and produce an income in a short time of four
or five hundred pounds currency, per annum, would form an
establishment which, under proper management, would answer
every purpose which we can reasonably desire.

Your Memorialists are aware that Education of a superior
kind cannot be brought to every man's door, and that under
any arrangement the inhabitants of the Province generally
must send their children a short distance from home; but such
is the extent of the several Districts, that the School can
seldom be a day's journey from any part of them, and the
scholars can return to their homes without expense during the

APPENDIX. holy days; and if sick, they can be visited by their parents in a few hours, and removed to their habitation without difficulty: add to all this the cheapness at which board can be obtained in country places, and the easiness with which, in most cases, it can be paid for by produce from their farms.

Memorial from Grand Jury, London District.

Should an endowment, such as we have stated, be found greater than the District of London can justly claim without clashing with the rights of other District Schools, with which your Memorialists have no desire in the smallest degree to interfere, it is humbly suggested, that representations from Your Excellency cannot fail to induce His Majesty's paternal Government to place at Your Excellency's disposal ample means for the liberal endowment of all the District Schools.

We most earnestly hope that Your Excellency's exertions will speedily accomplish an object so pregnant with advantage to the rising generation, and to the future prosperity and happiness of the London District, and become thereby entitled to the lasting gratitude of your Memorialists, as well as their latest posterity.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

The attention of the Executive Council having been particularly directed to that part of your Excellency's reference of May 1830, recommending that the District Schools should be endowed with Land, they have the honor to report:

That the original appropriation of Lands, made under the sanction of His Majesty's Government, in 1798, in order to raise a fund for promoting Education, consisted of 549,217 Acres. That subsequently, to facilitate settlements, and for other objects, the Government has, from time to time, granted to individuals, or resumed in order to grant, these various portions of the original reservation, and replaced the same from Lands more recently surveyed.

That of the original reservation there has been transferred to Government, in lieu of the Crown Reserves, with which the University of King's College is endowed, 225,273 Acres; and by a recent order from His Majesty's Government, a Township has been set apart as an endowment for Upper Canada College and Royal Grammar School; and that some portion of the remainder has, from time to time, been sold under the direction of the General Board of Education; so that, the School Lands at the disposal of the Government for increasing the means of Education in the District Schools cannot be safely taken at more than 240,000 Acres; all of which are situated in the Midland, Home, and London Districts.

That the original reservation was an injudicious selection. First, because confined to three Districts—2nd, because made in whole Townships—3rd, because several of these Townships are found to be very indifferent Land, and containing much altogether unfit for cultivation. Notwithstanding the various changes in the original appropriation, and the several deductions made from it, the proportion left is still liable to these three objections: it is therefore recommended, that such Lots as are found bad or indifferent be exchanged for other Crown Lands more available; and that only parts, and not whole Townships, be retained, because it is impossible to dispose of Lands unless surrounded by settlement, and the greater portion of what remains of the School Lands is far removed from the populous parts of the Province.

Report of the Honorable the Executive Council.

In regard to the endowment of the District Schools, the Board appeared inclined to apportion the reservation of School Lands equally among them, under some such conditions as the following:—

That no part of such endowment should be sold under Ten Shillings per Acre.

That only the interest should be expended.

That the principal arising from all sales be remitted to His Majesty's Receiver General, to be invested in public securities, that the income might become regular and certain.

On further examination, however, very serious, and in the opinion of the Board, insurmountable difficulties stand in the way of this arrangement.

First—Only three Grammar Schools can receive their endowment within their respective Districts as the School Lands are at present situated.

Second—That the School Lands in the London District are far more valuable than those in the Home and Midland; and that, in justice, the whole endowment for any one School cannot be taken from the Reserves in the London District without prejudice to all the other Schools.

Third—That in consequence, no District School can, with propriety, have the whole of its endowment in its own District.

Fourth—That the Trustees, not having the endowment in their respective Districts, would find it exceedingly difficult to manage the sales of Lands at a distance.

Fifth—That the expense of management under such an arrangement would be very much increased.

Sixth—That the quality of the Lands is so different, that with every care to make a fair distribution, some endowments would be found more valuable and sooner available, while others might produce no Revenue for many years.

Seventh—That such a result would not only give rise to jealousies, but retard the great object of the appropriation, which is the gradual and uniform improvement of the District Schools throughout the whole Province.

That, after giving this important subject their best consideration, the Council has been forced to the conclusion, that the whole of the remaining School Lands, consisting of about 240,000 Acres, should be placed under the direction of the

APPENDIX. General Board for the superintendance of Education throughout the Province,—an Institution which rests upon authority equal to that of any other Department in the Colony, and which was not established without the full knowledge and approbation of both the Imperial and Provincial Governments.

That each District Board of Trustees for the District Grammar School be incorporated with the General Board, and communicate therewith by its Chairman or Secretary.

That the Treasurer of the General Board be directed to open an account with the several Districts, and to credit them with their proportion of the Interest arising from the Money hitherto received, or hereafter coming into his hands, from the sales of the said Lands.

That the Capital arising from such sales be lodged in the hands of the Receiver General half yearly, to be invested in public securities, under the direction of the Governor in Council; and that the annual income only be expended.

By this arrangement, a District School Fund will be gradually accumulated; and although it may not for some time be considerable, it cannot fail to be ultimately great: and it should be borne in mind, that public institutions of this kind are for the benefit of posterity, as well as the present generation, and can seldom be made extensively available when first established.

There is, however, little doubt, but that from judicious exchanges which may be effected, and the rapid increase of population, the General Board will be enabled to give much assistance to the several District Schools at no distant period.

This plan offers many advantages of great importance.

First—The General Board will virtually possess all the knowledge and experience of the several District Boards, from its communication with their Chairman; and an interest in its proceedings and success will thus be diffused through the whole Province.

Second—The improvement of the District Schools will be equal and uniform,—a benefit of no small moment.

Third—Should other Districts be formed, it will only require opening a new account in the Treasurers' Books, that it may receive its due share of the available Funds.

A general reservation of Lands, producing gradually a School Fund instead of partial endowments, is supported by the example of such of the neighbouring States as have attended to the raising a permanent Fund for the purposes of Education, and doubtless from its superior advantages in simplifying arrangements, and facility and cheapness of management.

Before closing this Report, the Council think it proper to advert to the assertion frequently brought forward, that the School Reservation might have been made long ago far more productive, and yielding by this time a large disposal Fund.

It is on record (in a Report of Council, dated the first December, 1798, soon after the appropriation was first made,) that on examination, such was the cheapness of Land, viz. nine pence per Acre, that the whole, had it been then sold, would not have furnished a sum sufficient for the decent support of two Grammar Schools.

That so long as Millions of Acres were in course of grant (which was the case till 1828,) by the Crown, in fee simple, for almost nothing, and more than half the population were entitled, from various causes, to gratuitous grants, no Lands could be sold for any price near their value; therefore, sales of School Lands were delayed for more propitious times—nor has the conduct of Government differed in this respect from that of individuals, many of whom, who are not wanting in a due regard to their own interest, have, throughout the same period, and from the same temporary causes, derived no benefit whatever from the twenty, forty, fifty, or even one hundred thousand Acres, which some of them have possessed. Any objection, therefore, on this head, is evidently founded in error; and calculations founded upon the receipt of large sums of money derived from sales which could never have been effected, can only be brought forward by those who have not fully understood the subject.

Were the General Board for the superintendance of Education constituted a Corporate Body, to enable it to hold Lands, &c. and the School Appropriation relieved from Assessments till actually sold, its operations might be greatly facilitated.

All which is most respectfully submitted.

The Petition of the undersigned Magistrates, Clergy, Gentry, and others, inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, assembled for the purpose of considering the necessity of affording greater facilities and encouragement for the Education of the youth of Kingston and its vicinity, and of extending the scheme of instruction at the Public School of the Midland District, established at Kingston:

HUMBLY SHEWETH,—

That while they respectfully solicit your Excellency's favorable notice of their statements, your Petitioners are sensible, that they need not offer any arguments to Your Excellency in proof of the benefits which a well digested, liberal, and comprehensive system of Education never fails to diffuse among the people of those Countries in which Institutions for such purposes are founded and endowed by wise and just Governments.

One of the first acts of Your Excellency's Administration was to elevate the Public School of the Home District to the rank of a College; by which Your Excellency has satisfactorily evinced your appreciation of the advantages of Education, and your anxiety, that while the Province advances in wealth and prosperity the intellectual improvement of its people should not be neglected.

Encouraged to confide in Your Excellency's disposition not to limit your views to the Home District only, but to promote the cause of Education generally throughout the Province, Your Petitioners beg leave to submit to Your Excellency the expediency of providing more ample and efficient means of instructing the youth of the Midland District than the Public School at this place can now possibly afford.

For although your petitioners are fully sensible that the Public School of this District is as well conducted under its present Master as any other of similar endowment in the Province, still, from the rapidly improving condition of the country, and the increasing population of Kingston and its vicinity, the inadequacy of the institution to accomplish the purposes for which it was designed, is every day becoming more and more apparent.

The building used as the School House, and erected many years ago, on lots in the Town reserved for the purpose, is at this moment in a very decayed condition, and there are no public funds from which it is known that any allowance can be made to prevent its falling into absolute ruin. The building, moreover, is so small and inconvenient, that although the Master resides in one part of it, he has no accommodation whatever for boarders, a matter of decided importance, not only to the welfare of the School and the emoluments of the Master, but very frequently also to the morals of the pupils.

Besides the usual Provincial allowance of £100 a year, the Master of the Public School at Kingston enjoyed for some years an additional salary of double that amount, as Teacher of a Royal Grammar School, and he was thus enabled to provide competent assistance in the discharge of his duties.— This allowance has been withdrawn and transferred to the Public School at York. Your Petitioners cannot conceal from Your Excellency the dissatisfaction that was created, and is still felt, at this act of partiality, so unfair and injurious to the School of the Midland District. Your Petitioners entertain a humble hope that if no other more extensive measure be adopted for the liberal endowment of the School at this place, Your Excellency will at least be pleased to order that justice be done to it in this particular.

Your Petitioners would respectfully represent, that while they have long hoped to see measures taken by Government for the endowment of the School at Kingston, it was not until they read the Report of a Committee of the House of Assembly, made during the late Session, that they were aware of the precise objects of the provision for Education long ago determined on by the Imperial Government. According to that report, it appears that His Majesty, the late King George the Third, whose memory the natives of this Colony should ever affectionately cherish, declared in the year 1797, his royal intention "to establish free Grammar Schools in those Districts "in which they were then called for, and in due process of time "other Seminaries of a larger and more comprehensive nature, "for the promotion of religious and moral learning, and the "study of the arts and sciences." His Majesty further intended to support these institutions for the advancement of learning by an appropriation of land; and it appears that, for the accomplishment of these truly benevolent and paternal designs, about half a million Acres have been actually held in reserve by the advice, and on the recommendation, of the Colonial Government.

Your petitioners further learn, that the Executive Council of this Province, as early as the year 1798, stated, that they considered four Schools necessary, viz:—one at Cornwall, one at Kingston, one at Niagara, and one at Sandwich; and added, that the circumstances of the times called for the immediate establishment of the Schools at Kingston and Niagara, or Newark, [as the place was then named,] while the two other Schools and the University were to be established at a subsequent period.

The above plan, however, seems not to have been again brought under consideration till the year 1819, when the Provincial Government directed its attention to the establishment of a University at York, according to the Report of the Honorable the Executive Council of that year. Your petitioners find that (contrary to the apparent intention of the Imperial Government in making the munificent reservation of Crown Lands, for the purposes of Education,) the establishment of the University was recommended before any Free Grammar Schools had been endowed. The Honorable and Executive Council in their Report assign as a reason for this recommendation, "that provision for District Schools is not now required out of the funds arising from the School Reserves, being already made by the Legislature." But this Legislative provision your petitioners respectfully contend, is evidently insufficient to effect the object contemplated by His Majesty King George the Third, viz: "The establishment of Free Grammar Schools;" or even the establishment of the District Schools on such a basis as is desirable, in order to insure their complete efficiency. Your petitioners further submit, that even supposing the Legislative provision sufficient to secure competent means of instruction, still it afforded no funds either for the erection of School Houses or for keeping them in repair. While respectfully expressing their dissent from the view taken of this matter by the Honorable the Executive Council, your petitioners are unwilling for a moment to be supposed as disapproving of, or under-valuing the institution of a University for the promotion (according to the Royal Will) of "religious and moral learning, and the study of the arts and sciences;" on the contrary, it is their earnest hope and desire that such a University may soon be in active operation; but without due support be afforded to the Grammar Schools, which are the appropriate and indispensable hand-maids to every University,—they feel that an institution of this nature, cannot be expected to flourish or become extensively useful.

It is with a desire to see the Public School at Kingston become a good Grammar School, and by establishing it on a suitable footing to insure its being not only a most useful auxiliary to the University, but also a most unexceptionable and attractive place of resort for that numerous class of young persons who merely require instruction in the inferior branches of education suitable to their intended trading or mechanical or agricultural callings in after life, that your petitioners now beseech the patronage of Your Excellency for this Seminary.

In order to realize the wishes they indulge on this subject,

your petitioners beg leave to remark, that a new building should be erected without delay on a suitable spot sufficiently large, (independently of the rooms for tuition,) to accommodate the Masters and enable them to take Boarders; and that beside the Head Master, there should be two Assistant Masters, with Salaries of moderate amount: by granting salaries to the Masters, the fees for tuition can be materially reduced; and by enabling them to accommodate Boarders, parents in the neighborhood can send their children at less cost than is possible when they are constrained to send them further from home, two points most desirable and necessary, for few indeed are the parents in this country, having large families, who can afford to keep their sons at a distant institution, where the annual cost for each boy may exceed seventy pounds, to be paid, of necessity, in ready money.

There are many young persons in Kingston, (the most populous Town in this Province,) whose parents cannot bear the expense, by no means light, of sending them to Upper Canada College, and it can hardly be requisite to urge the expediency and necessity of placing within their reach the opportunity of being as well educated as if their parents were in more affluent circumstances. Your petitioners would deferentially inquire whether the reservation of what are called the School Townships, was not made by Government expressly to meet such a case.

Moreover your petitioners have been given to understand that, not only has a part of these lands been already specially appropriated for the support of the University, but that Government intend to devote another considerable portion of them to the support of the Public School at York, now called Upper Canada College; your petitioners therefore trust that the Public School of the Midland District, situated in a populous Town, will be allowed to possess strong claims not only on the benevolence, but on the justice of Your Excellency's Government, for an ample endowment from the same ample source. Without dwelling on the impolicy of devoting the whole of the immense reservation, appropriated by the Royal munificence for the purposes of education, to the support of two literary institutions at the seat of Government, your petitioners are content to assert on the part of the Midland District, an equal claim with the Home District, to a portion of the produce of that reservation; and they forbear to press on Your Excellency's notice, the consideration of the views entertained by the Provincial Government, in the year 1798, in favor of the School at Kingston. They would likewise observe, that by endowing the public School at York, with a large portion of these reserved lands, in addition to the establishment of an University, at the same place there would be an undue concentration of the funds arising from this source, unless other parts of the Province were allowed a reasonable participation; and it might also hold out to those dissatisfied, a temptation to continue a practice equally impolitic and pernicious, that, viz: of sending their children to be educated in a foreign Country; a temptation which ought by every possible means to be speedily removed, and which your petitioners apprehend may effectually be removed by affording the youth of the Country fair opportunities of being liberally and cheaply educated near their own homes.

In thus stating to Your Excellency their sentiments on a matter of paramount importance to the future welfare of the community with zeal and frankness, your petitioners hope that they may not be considered as having manifested any want of that respect which is so justly due to Your Excellency's character and station, as well as your Government.

Your petitioners are earnestly solicitous that the Public School at Kingston, should be speedily placed on a more efficient footing; and are convinced, that to attain this most desirable object, it is only necessary to state the circumstances plainly and fairly to Your Excellency, and gain your attention to the claims of the institution on Your Excellency's support.

Your petitioners therefore relying on a favorable consideration of their representations to Your Excellency, as in duty bound will ever pray.

SIR—

In reply to your communication to the Board of Trustees of the Ottawa District School, dated the 15th of June last, and referring to the report of the Honorable the Executive Council, dated 29th of April last. I am authorised by the Board to report, for the information of His Excellency, that with respect to the propriety of altering the location of the School Reserves, or any part of them, this Board cannot form any opinion, because they have no means of ascertaining where the reserves are situated, nor what the Honorable Executive Council may consider as lands unfit for cultivation.

The fact that the School Reserves are located entirely in three Districts, does not appear, to this Board to present any disadvantage; on the contrary, they are of opinion, that if the reserves have been granted in large blocks, a peculiar system of management might perhaps render them more valuable than if they had been scattered over the Country at large, nevertheless, it is undoubtedly desirable that if the Government are willing to allow the School Reserves to be culled over, and the objectionable lots to be surrendered, and the equivalent in acres located in more advisable quarters, so great a privilege ought certainly to be taken advantage of, but the Board are at a loss to know where any valuable unappropriated lands are yet at the disposal of the Crown in the populous parts of the Province.

The Board are disinclined to recommend the adoption of any minimum sale price of the Reserves, for it cannot be otherwise than that so many thousands of acres must comprise a number of inferior lots, which would not, for a very long period, command the proposed limit of ten shillings per acre, and yet, would be better parted with, at a lower rate to actual settlers, for the purpose of enhancing the value of the adjoining reserves; it would seem perhaps more advisable on that account, to leave the prices discretionary.

With respect to the proposed plan of placing the proceeds of sales in the charge of the Receiver General as Treasurer the investment of such proceeds, in the public securities, under the discretion of the Governor in Council, and the annual and equal distribution of the interest of such investment, to the several District Schools, this board highly approve of such mode of arrangement, as being better than any other that presents itself.

The Board wish to state to His Excellency that Charles Sheriff, Esq. one of its Members, is, and always has been non-resident in the District, and has never attended as a Trustee, it is therefore desirable that this inconvenience should be remedied by the appointment of some person who is resident among us, and who would take a direct interest in the prosperity of the District School. For this purpose the Board beg leave humbly to suggest for His Excellency's consideration, the name of Thomas Mears, Esq. of Hawkesbury.

And in obedience to the desire of His Excellency, as expressed in the Secretary's Letter, the Board respectfully submit their opinion, that great good will result to the cause of education throughout the Province, by the whole of the unappropriated School funds being placed under the superintendance of the General Board of Education, and the Trustees of the several District Schools being appointed members of the general board, and incorporated therewith. The correspondence of the several District Boards cannot but fail to be of service in the general management of the funds to be derived from the sales of the School Lands; but as the School Lands are principally situated in the London District, and subject only to the disposition of the general board, of which the several District Trustees are to be members, this board beg leave humbly to suggest, that no advantage can be derived from the School Lands, being under the management of the several District Boards; for instance, the Trustees of the Eastern or Johnstown District Schools, could not well manage the sales of Lands in the London District.

The arrangement being with a view to raise a general revenue from the School Lands, to be accounted for in the books of the General Board, for the equal benefit of each District, a principal object must be to sell the Lands to the best advantage, to produce such revenue for subdivision. The Trustees of the London District School, having understood that the sales of the School Lands lying in their District, have been placed by the general board under the superintendance of the Honorable Colonel Talbot, this board submits that the fund required will be produced with more facility under the judicious and active management of that gentleman, than by any arrangement in regard to sales in which the several District Trustees shall be concerned.

The system recommended by the Honorable the Executive Council for the Treasurer of the general board to open an account with the several Districts, and to credit them with their proportion of the interest arising from the money hitherto received, or hereafter coming into his hand from the sale of the School Lands, is a measure so just and equitable in itself, that besides producing the most substantial advantages to each District cannot fail to afford general satisfaction in the country.

Report on the subject of the Circular letter from the Government Office, of the 16th June, 1831, with reference to the Lands set apart for the endowment of Schools, &c.

Kingston, 13th August, 1831.

SIR,

In reply to your communication of the 15th of June last, the Trustees of the Midland District School, beg respectfully to submit the following remarks for the consideration of His Excellency.

Report of the Trustees of the Midland District School.

The Trustees of the Midland District School, do not see any material objection to that part of the report of the Honorable the Executive Council, of the 29th April last, which has reference to the formation of a general board to be composed of the present District Boards, should that arrangement be deemed advisable. It nevertheless appears to the Trustees of the Midland District School, that the cause of education, and the interest of each District School would be best secured by assigning to each a particular endowment to be under the control of the respective Boards of Trustees, subject however to some such conditions as the following :

1st. That no portion of the endowment be sold for less than ten shillings per acre.

2nd. That the Trustees be empowered to apply so much of the proceeds of sales towards the building of a suitable School house, as may be required by the state of the district.

3rd. That after the sum necessary to defray the expense of a sufficiently commodious building has been raised, the Trustees be bound to remit the residue every half year to the Receiver General of the Province, to be invested in public securities, for the benefit of the schools respectively.

4th. That the Treasurer of the District Board be required to give good and sufficient security for all sums which may be paid into his hands for lands sold.

The Trustees of the Midland District School, beg respectfully to express their dissent from that part of the arrangement proposed in the report of the Honorable the Executive Council, which relates to the application of the funds expected to accrue from the sale of the School Lands.

1st. Because it places all Districts on the same level, whereas the older and more populous portion of the Province require more immediate and exclusive provision for the purposes of education than others.

2nd. Because it provides no adequate or specific allowance for erecting and keeping in repair the necessary buildings.

3rd. Because the Midland District, comprising the populous Town of Kingston, has peculiar claims.

4th. Because the Public School of the Home District has already been secured out of the original reservation, a large and separate endowment of 125,000 acres, and the Trustees of the Midland District School, beg to assert on behalf of the Midland District, an equal right with the Home District, to a participation in these reserved lands.

The Trustees of the Midland District School, submit that, under all circumstances taken into consideration, the express recommendation made in favor of the School at Kingston, in the report of the Honorable the Executive Council, in the year 1798, the expectation on their part is not unreasonable, that an ample and specific endowment be speedily made and secured to the School of the Midland District; and since it appears, that as far back as the year 1798, the sum of £3000, was not deemed too large for the purpose of building a suitable School House. The Trustees of the Midland District School, conceive that £5,000 would be by no means an extravagant sum to defray the cost of such a School House as the increasing population of Kingston and the District generally requires; and they trust that authority will be given them to raise immediately that sum out of that endowment to which they cannot but think the School of the Midland District justly entitled.

We have had the honor to receive extracts from a report of the Honorable Executive Council, on the subject of the endowment of District Schools, enclosed in a letter from you, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, communicating to us further information on the subject, to which we have given due consideration.

Report of the Trustees of the Niagara District School.

The proposed arrangement for accomplishing this important object appears to us well calculated to promote the end designed; and we have no doubt, that a considerable Revenue may, at no distant period, be raised from the School Lands placed under the active management of the General Board of Education, aided by the knowledge and experience of the District Boards, to be incorporated with them.

In the present rapidly increasing population, judicious exchanges for Crown Lands, surrounded with settlements, promise more immediate and advantageous sales, and the equal distribution of the interest of the General School Fund among the different Districts is, we think, equitable and expedient, as the improvement of the Schools will then be equal and uniform, a benefit of no small moment.

As there are no Crown Lands in this District, besides the Glebe Reservations, known to us at present, we can only express our cordial approbation of the arrangement proposed, and our readiness to co-operate in promoting an object so desirable.

TRUSTEES WESTERN DISTRICT SCHOOL.

Report on the subject of the Circular Letter from the Government Office of the 16th June, with reference to the Lands set apart for the endowment of Schools, &c.

SIR,

Your Letter of the 16th June, relative to School Lands, was duly received; but, owing to the difficulty of getting a meeting of the Trustees, we have not been able to make any answer till now to the communication submitted to our consideration, having had a meeting only the day before yesterday for the first time, and that of the subscribing Trustees only, as one is absent from the District, and the other resides at too great a distance to attend.

Report of the Trustees of the Western District School.

We entirely concur in the opinion of the Executive Council, that the original reservation of the School Lands was not as judiciously selected as it might have been, and we are glad to observe that it is intended to exchange such as are not immediately available, for others more favorably situated. In effecting this desirable object, it appears to us that it would be well to do so, as far as practicable, for lands in every District, in the proportion to which each may be entitled, so as to be more immediately under the supervision of the respective Boards, who could better judge of their value, and would feel a greater interest in disposing of them speedily and advantageously, such an exchange might perhaps be more readily made in this District than in many others, as there are large bodies of valuable lands still ungranted on the River St. Clair, and elsewhere, which might readily be disposed of, provided an Agent, under the superintendence of the local board, were appointed in the District, (and it would be useful that similar Agents were established wherever School Lands are for sale) in order to give every facility to purchasers, by preventing the expense and necessity of their applying exclusively to one Office in the Province, where it is in general inconvenient for them to attend.

Should the project under consideration be put into execution, we can think of no better conditions than those proposed, namely: that no lands should be sold under ten shillings; that the principal arising from their sale should be vested in public securities, and that the interest alone should be expended: it is only in the management of those means, when realized, that difficulties occur to us, for, upon their judicious application wholly depends the advantages to be derived; and in the consideration of this part of the subject, we regret that our opinion should not coincide with that of the Council, who

seem desirous, in the first instance, to increase the endowment of the District Schools, which, judging from our own observations of their general usefulness, are already provided for much beyond any good that has resulted from their establishment;—we would therefore suggest, that the best employment of the means to be obtained from the School Lands, would be, to allow salaries of of £50 to as many Teachers as the funds would permit, who should be located in some central part of as many Townships as could be provided for, until every Township could have a Teacher. For this salary they should be able to teach Greek, Latin, and the Mathematics, and none should be admitted until after proof of their qualifications had been certified by some persons competent, and authorized to examine them. In order the more speedily to facilitate the operation of this plan, the Legislature would perhaps modify the Common School Acts, so as to apply the funds already granted to the purpose just suggested, and thus at once diffuse as general as possible, a better system of Education than can now be expected under the present circumstances, the benefit of which would be immediately felt throughout the Province, and materially encourage persons of respectability to settle in the remoter parts of the Country, when sure of having the means of giving a proper education to their children.

When the means arising from the School Lands are sufficient, and after each Township is provided with a fit Teacher, then a Seminary might be endowed, where a more extended education could be given; but until sufficient Grammar Schools are established in every Township, it is decidedly our opinion that it would be useless, for general purposes, further to endow the District Schools.

REPORT

Of the Select Committee to which was referred the Petition of David Burns, and others, inhabitants of the County of Oxford; and draft of an Address to His Majesty on the subject of Lands for Common Schools, founded on the same.

Report on

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of David Burns, and others, inhabitants of the County of Oxford, upon the subject of Common Schools, respectfully report, that the Common Schools of this Province are generally in so deplorable a state that they scarcely deserve the name of Schools; the amount of public money annually expended, for the support of Common Schools, is quite insufficient to effect the object for which it was originally intended, and, from the smallness of the amount and mode of application, is rendered almost useless.

They would therefore earnestly recommend the revision of the Common School law, so that it shall be at once simple, clear and efficient, dividing the Public School money equally among the children taught in organized Schools by a person who has a certificate from the District Board of Education, or School Inspectors, of his or her ability to teach a Common School, so that the sum received shall be actually applied towards the payment of the Teachers' wages.

The Common School fund should be so large that the interest would be sufficient, added to what the proprietors of Common Schools are able to pay, to support Common School Teachers respectably, and be generally applied throughout the Province, so that Common School teaching, instead of being a mere matter of convenience to transient persons, or common idlers, would become a regular respectable business, in the hands of gentlemanly, well educated persons.

Surely the formation of the minds of our children, on which must depend the happiness or misery we are to enjoy with them, and their own success in life, is a business worthy to be respectable, worthy of the patronage of men in the highest walks of life: and how sacred is the trust committed to the Representatives of the people.

Funds and appropriations for the support of Education should be permanent; they should not depend upon the annual vote of the Legislature, nor any other casualty that might, by possibility fail, and thereby check the regular progress of education.

The inquiry then, is, where is this large fund to be found, and how is it to be obtained? Answer, There is dormant British

Capital in this Province, that might be rendered available and productive, if placed at the disposal of the provincial Legislature, sufficient for this purpose, without taxing the people directly or indirectly, one shilling, or in any way lessening the other resources of the Province.

APPENDIX.

One Million of Acres of the waste Lands of the Crown, placed in the hands of School Fund Loan Commissioners, under an Act of Parliament, authorising the issuing Debentures for £500,000, redeemable in ten, fifteen or twenty years, at 4 per cent per annum, with authority for the Commissioners to lend the money upon good and sufficient landed security, at 6 per cent, with the interest annually, the two per cent, the difference between which the money could be borrowed, and that at which it could be loaned, would produce a profit or gain of £10,000, per annum; which might be appropriated towards the support of Common Schools, before, and until the lands could be made productive; but as the lands were leased or sold, the rents or interest of the amount of sales would annually be added to the £10,000, increasing the annual appropriation until the interest of the whole grant should be annually appropriated to the support of Common Schools.

As lands are annually rising in demand and value, there can be no doubt but what they will redeem the debt, and as landed security should only be taken for the payment of the principal and interest, by the Commissioners, there could be no risk or fear of loss from the failures of those who should borrow money from the Commissioners, as often happens in other money transactions.

But as ten thousand pounds, even with the present Common School funds, would be very far insufficient for the support of Common Schools, would it not be advisable to pledge the revenues of the Province for the payment of the interest, annually, until the lands could be made available; and as they become productive, apply the rents or interest to the payment of the interest and principal of the loan, until the debt should be paid?

Appropriate 5 per cent, £25000 annually, to the support of Common Schools, and one per cent, £5000 per annum, for a sinking fund, to be placed at interest, to increase the School fund as the population of the Province increases.

Your Committee beg leave further to remark, that £25,000 is not one-sixth part of the sum actually required for the support of Common Schools in this Province; there being about 250 settled Townships that require immediate support for Common Schools; this would not be more than one hundred pounds to a Township; but should something be added from the Jesuits' Estates, and from the sale of some part of the Clergy Reserves, or from any other source, with the present Common School grant, these funds united under proper regulations, would enable our Common Schools to prepare our youth for the District Schools, or District Colleges endowed by the School lands already granted, and these Colleges would prepare such of our youth for the University, as shall be desirous of obtaining the highest literary honors.

To what object can the surplus revenues of the Province for a short time be applied, or for what purpose could a small tax be levied, that would more materially benefit the people of this Province, than for the support of Common Schools; the great and invaluable purpose of education.

Where the introduction of capital can be made without embarrassing the existing financial regulations of the Province or interfering with vested rights, that introduction must tend to facilitate the improvement of the Country, so long as it can be introduced at half its intrinsic value.

The rapid growth and prosperity of the United States may be imputed more to their anticipating their resources by means of Banks and loans, whereby those resources were themselves doubled, than to any other cause.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

We His Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Upper Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled, most respectfully beg leave to represent that there is in this Province a very general want of education; that the insufficiency of the Common School fund to support competent, respectable, and well educated teachers, has degraded Common School teaching from a regular business to a mere matter of convenience to

APPENDIX. transient persons or common idlers, who often teach the School one season and leave it vacant until it accommodates some other like person, whereby the minds of our youth are left without cultivation, or what is still worse, frequently with vulgar, low bred, vicious or intemperate examples before them, in the capacity of monitors.

Report on petition of David Burns, and others.

If provision were made for the liberal and punctual payment of Common School teachers under proper regulations, the teaching of Common Schools would soon become a regular and respectable business; Gentlemanly well educated persons would not be ashamed to take charge of our youth, our Schools would be no longer vacant, nor our youth ignorant; Upper Canada would then form a national character, that would command respect abroad, and insure peace, prosperity and happiness at home, perpetuate our attachment to British principles and British institutions, and enable our posterity to value, as they ought, the inestimable blessings of our glorious constitution.

We would therefore respectfully request Your Excellency to cause this Address to be laid before His Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies; representing to His Majesty, that there is dormant British Capital in this Province which might be rendered available and productive, if placed at the disposal of the Provincial Legislature, sufficient to place its Schools in as flourishing a condition as they are in any part of the civilized world; and to entreat that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to place at the disposal, or transfer to the care, of the Provincial Legislature, 1,000,000 of Acres of the waste Lands of the Crown, as a permanent fund for the support of Common Schools within this Province.

Of Committee of Conference on Brockville Police Bill.

Report of Committee of Conference on Brockville Police Bill.

The Legislative Council has requested a Conference with the Assembly upon the bill entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Brockville, and to establish a Police therein," for the purpose of stating that certain alterations in the bill have suggested themselves as desirable, some of which are such as cannot properly originate in the Legislative Council.

In the second clause, the limit between the intended Wards seems to be obscurely expressed, so that it may be doubted whether the whole of the Court House ground is to be included in the West Ward, or only one half of it; and it is difficult to ascertain what is meant by "extending a line from the centre of the Court House ground in rear of the rear limit of the Town, North twenty-four degrees West," as it is apprehended that the rear limit of the Town lies still more to the North than the rear of the Court House ground; and extending a line Northerly from any part of such rear limit, seems, therefore, to be erroneous, as it could not form a division line of the Town.

Clause 3.—The Legislative Council observes, that the persons to be elected Members of the Corporation, with power to impose Assessments, and with other important powers, are not required to be resident in the Town, or to be possessed of any Property therein, or elsewhere. As a qualification is required for the persons electing, the Council are doubtful whether there may not have been an unintentional omission in this respect.

Clause 6.—A clerical error appears to have crept in, and the Legislative Council are in doubt whether it was intended to prescribe an Oath of Office which the Members are to take, or whether (as no Oath is afterwards mentioned,) the penalty was to be imposed for not accepting the office,—in which case, the words "hereinafter contained" are inapplicable.

The Legislative Council further observe, that no direction is given for the mode of recovering the penalty mentioned in this clause: and as the sum is small, it probably was not intended that it should only be recoverable by information in the King's Bench.

Clause 7.—Some words seem to have been accidentally omitted, which are necessary to complete the sense; and the Legislative Council are in doubt what is meant by providing that the Corporation, "or the Members thereof," shall issue their precept for the election, as they conceive that when the Corporation is constituted, it is not intended that any such act shall be done otherwise than by the Corporation, in its corporate capacity.

Clause 10.—It appears to the Legislative Council that some express provision is necessary for authorizing the levying the assessment by distress, (in case of non-payment) either by Warrant under the Seal of the Corporation, or otherwise.—And they observe that, under this bill, persons residing out of the Town, and possessing Rateable Property within it, will not be made to contribute to the charges of the Police.

Clause 12.—The Legislative Council assume, that from
N n

the nature of the provision, and from the words used, it is intended that the Corporation shall have power to pull down houses, or out-houses, without which it will generally be impracticable to widen the Street of a Town, or alter its direction. But as that is a greater power than is given under the general Road Laws of this Province, and as acts of this nature are construed strictly, the Legislative Council apprehend that persons may be disposed to contest the right of the Corporation to carry their powers to that extent, unless it is expressly given by the Act.—In this clause the word "Arbitrators" is, by a clerical error, inserted instead of "Arbitrator."

APPENDIX. Report of Committee of Conference on Brockville Police Bill.

Besides these points, in some of which, it appears to the Legislative Council, the bill requires amendment, in order to make its provisions effectual,—there are some alterations which it appears to them might be beneficially made, in a measure to the general principles of which they are favorable; and these are, with all deference, suggested to the consideration of the House of Assembly, in case their attention should be again given to the subject.

It appears to the Legislative Council that it might be convenient to prevent the necessity of a second election in case of an equality of votes, by giving to some officer or person a casting vote.

That the Sheriff and his Deputy, or other person appointed by him, might, for convenience, be required to hold the first Election, but that it would be more proper and convenient to provide for the holding of future Elections by a Bailiff to be appointed for each Ward, as the Sheriff is a high Public Officer for the District generally, whose duties might occasionally be interfered with by those imposed upon him by the Corporation.

That the method provided in the fourth clause, for choosing a fifth Member, seems open to abuse, as three Members might designedly exclude the fourth from an opportunity of concurring in, or opposing their choice; and that if the presiding Officer at the Election were to appoint at the close a time and place for the first meeting of the four Members, in order to choose a fifth, any such practice would be guarded against.

That the Legislative Council doubts the prudence, either as respects the Corporation or individual inhabitants, of allowing the award of Arbitrators to be final under all possible circumstances of misconception, partiality, imposition, or unfair practice, particularly if the power is to extend to pulling down houses.

A power of going before a Jury, either in the first instance or by way of appeal, or at all events a power of obtaining a revision of the award by some authority, seems necessary to the ends of Justice, where the rights involved may be so important.

And it appears to require consideration whether, on the principle of our general Road Act, a party should not have the means of being heard in opposition to any projected Street leading through his property, before it is determined upon.

Report on Public Accounts.

The Committee to whom were referred the Public Accounts have examined seventeen general Accounts and Estimates, upon which they make this their first Report, intending to remark on the Detailed Accounts, should there be any occasion for so doing, after they have had time to examine them.

No. 1, Is a statement of the monies collected at the Port of Quebec, and paid into the hands of the Receiver General of Lower Canada, between the first January and first July 1831, arising from duties on Importation by sea, by virtue of the Imperial Act of 14th Geo. 3. Chap. 88, and of sundry Provincial Acts; the net amount of which is, Cur'y. £63,622 11 4½ a proportion of ¼ of which belongs to Upper Canada, } 15,905 12 10

Of the total amount collected as above stated, there is levied under 14. Geo. 3. chap. 88, } £ 3,898 15 6
From which deduct ½ for the proportion of expenses of collection, } 23 19 10½

From which it will be observed that on this branch of the Revenue, for the half year ended 5th April, and up to the 1st May, when compared with amounts collected during the corresponding term last year, there is a decrease of £530 14 6—while on the other hand there is an increase on the Revenues arising from Provincial Statutes for the same period of £2,732 12 10½ which leaves a net increase of £2,201 18 4½

As there is no document before the Committee to shew the amount of duties collected from the 1st May up to the 5th October last, it is impossible to say what may be the result, but supposing the increase to be in proportion to that received for the half year ending the 5th April, it would be about £2,500; which added to the £2,201, would make a total of £5,701, or about £400 less than the increase of last year. It is, however, probable, as the half year ending in October is most productive in Revenue, that an increase still greater may be realized than it would be prudent at present to calculate upon.

No. 2, Is an abstract of Warrants issued by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor on the Receiver General, amounting to £42,737 9 4, Currency, which sum is included in the items of disbursements for which he has taken credit in his account.

No. 3. In this abstract is a charge of £196 9 11, paid to John Covert, Esquire, of the unexpended amount of appropriation for purchasing and erecting Machinery for dressing and preparing Hemp, which your Committee wish to submit to the consideration of the House, as no return of the manner in which this money has been expended has been laid before the Legislature.

No. 3, Is a statement of the Receiver General's Receipts and Payments of the Provincial Revenue from the 31st January to 30th June, 1831, in which he has taken credit for the Warrants issued by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, exhibited in account No. 2, and for his Poundage on various sums received by him, amounting to £657 16 0½, Currency; the balance of £7,843 15 8½ is in favor of the Receiver General, and carried to his credit in Account No. 5.

No. 4, Is an Abstract of Warrants on the Receiver General, under the several enactments of the Provincial Legislature, from the 1st July to the 5th October, 1831, inclusive, amounting to £6,778 1 11½, for which the Receiver General has taken credit in his Account Current of Receipts and Payments, No. 5.

No. 5, Is a statement of the Receiver General's Receipts and Payments of the Provincial Revenue, from the 1st July to the 5th October, 1831, inclusive, wherein he has taken credit for Warrants paid, as stated in Account No. 4, and exhibiting a balance on hand of £15,110 10 3½.

No. 6, Is a statement of the Receiver General's Receipts and Payments of the Annual Appropriation of £2,500 by Provincial Statute, 56th Geo. 3rd, chap. 26, from the 1st January to the 5th October, 1831, shewing a balance unexpended of 1,005 11 1½, to which Account is appended an Abstract of the Warrants paid and taken credit for by the Receiver General, amounting to £2,415 3 4, Currency. The Act under which this Appropriation was made having been repealed during the last Session of the present Parliament, the sum thereby applied merges in the general Revenue of the Province at the disposal of the Legislature.

In order that the House may not be led in error in regard to the balances on hand, as stated in the present and preceding Account, amounting together to £16,116 1 5, by supposing them as available Funds, it must be observed, that they are to be applied jointly with Receipts to the 31st December next, to complete the services of the present year, which it is calculated those sums will be sufficient to meet.

No. 7, is an Abstract of Warrants issued by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor on the Receiver General, payable out of the appropriation by Statute 14th Geo. 3rd, cap. 88, for the year 1830, amounting to £6,714 9 11½, Sterling.

No. 8, Is also an Abstract of a similar nature with the foregoing, amounting to £6,665 4 5½, Sterling, for the expenditure of the year 1831.

In these Accounts it will be seen, that notwithstanding the repeated recommendation of several Committees, that the travelling expenses of the Judges and Crown Officers should be discontinued, and that the Deputy Clerks of the Crown in the several Districts should in future perform the duties of the Clerks of Assize; still, these suggestions have not been attended to; but the travelling expenses of the Judges, and the accounts of the Clerks of Assize, have, nevertheless, been allowed as usual—a practice which your Committee recommend should be put a stop to, by withholding any grant for that purpose.

Your Committee would also draw the attention of the House to the charge in No. 8. of a sum of seventy-two pounds sterling, paid to the Cashier of the Bank of Upper Canada, for an allowance for rent of the buildings used for Public Offices, to be paid in discharge of interest upon a loan made for

its erection, and of a Salary to Mrs. Margaret Powell as House keeper, of the said Building. As these are items never before included in the accounts laid before the House, it may perhaps, be proper to inquire under what authority those payments and appointment have been made.

No. 9, is an account of revenue arising from duties on Licenses to Shop-keepers, Inn-keepers and Distillers, from the fifth of January to the fifth October, 1831, shewing a total of £2,781 7 2, being an increase of £522 12 2½ over the income of last year; it must however be observed, that this increase is not owing to a greater number of Inns or Stills having been Licensed, which on the contrary are less than in 1830, but from the circumstances of the additional price on licenses issued to Inn-keepers. It is probable however, that the amount will still be greater at the close of the year, as many Licenses may have issued before its termination. There are eight shops more, seventy-six Inns and 2938½ Gallons of Stills, less, licensed this year than the last, yet the duty on tavern licenses has increased £858 9 3½.

No. 10, is an account of duties collected on Wares and Merchandize imported from the United States, from 1st January to 30th September, 1831, as far as returns have been received, amounting to £5,540 17 6½, which is less by £3720, 4s 2½d. than in 1830; but as the returns are only for nine months, it is possible that a considerable addition will be made to this source of Revenue at the close of the year. It may be well to remark, that no Returns have been received from the Collectors at Cobourg for this year, and none from the Port of Goderich, either for the present or the last year.

No. 11, is an account of duties collected on Salt, from the 1st January to the 30th June 1831, amounting to £1021 10 6½, which is £1,182 15 7½ under the Collections of 1830; but for the same reason mentioned in regard to the preceding account, this branch of revenue may receive considerable accession before the end of the year, the more so, as the largest importations of Salt are generally made in the Autumn, this account forms part of the amount of No. 10.

No. 12, is an account of duties on licenses to Hawkers and Pedlers, from 1st January, to 30th September, 1831, amounting to £494 0 0 Currency, shewing an increase of £57.

No. 13, is an account of Duties on Licences to Auctioneers, and upon Sales at Auction, for the same period as the preceding account, amounting to £289 15 1, being a decrease, compared to last year's receipts, of £239 4 11, which will probably be lessened before the year expires.

No. 14, is an account of Light House Tonnage Duty from 1st January to 30th June, 1831, amounting to £171 2 6, which although £16 17 6 less than was collected during the whole year 1830, will in all probability amount to as much, if not more than the receipts of the previous year.

In examining the last six accounts, it has occurred to your Committee that it would be extremely useful if all accounts of a similar nature were made up quarterly, in order to compare them with the accounts of the corresponding periods of former years, and more particularly when those accounts are submitted to the Legislature at broken periods, as it is then essential to ascertain the actual state of the resources of the country.—As it is probable, unless some sudden emergency shall require a deviation from the practice, that in future the Parliament will meet in the autumn, instead of the winter, as heretofore, your Committee would suggest the propriety of addressing His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in future to fix on the month of October as the term for closing the yearly public accounts.

No. 15, is an estimate of the supply required for the administration of Justice, and the support of the Civil Government, for the year 1832, amounting to £7,766 5 7½ Sterling.

As the House will be called upon to vote on the different items contained in this estimate, your Committee will make such remarks thereon in a second report as may be suggested on a more minute examination of their details, to which they have not as yet been able to give that attention they would have desired, owing to so much of their time having been necessarily taken up in attending the debates of the House.

No. 16, is a general estimate of the resources and expenditure of the Province for the year 1832. The whole resources, including £13,500 calculated to be received under the 14th Geo. 3, chap. 88, it is supposed will amount to £56,500; and the expenditure is estimated at £37,041, leaving a probable balance of £19,459, which it is intended should be applied in extinguishment of the public debt, a purpose from which your Committee would hope it might not be diverted.

No. 17, is a statement of monies outstanding in the hands of Collectors and Inspectors, on account of Provincial Duties, on the 5th October, 1831, amounting to £5,738 4 4.

In examining this account, your Committee were surprised to find that so large a sum was allowed to remain in the hands of those public Officers: they consequently addressed

the Inspector General to make inquiry whether any steps had been taken to recover those debts, and particularly called his attention to the amount due by Mr. Savage, Collector at York. Your Committee are happy to say, from the answer of the Inspector General, hereto appended, that effectual measures have been taken to compel payment from Collectors, &c. and that the effect has been the liquidation of a considerable portion of the amount outstanding as stated in the account transmitted to this House; and that there is every prospect that little or no loss will be sustained.—Your Committee would, notwithstanding, recommend, to prevent Collectors and Inspectors from again falling into arrears, to pass an Act making it imperative on those Officers to render an account quarterly, and to pay up all monies received up to that time, on pain of forfeiting their situation—by which means your Committee think all future defalcations will be prevented.

Your Letter of 24th instant was delivered to me this morning with your note of this day.

In reply to your queries for the information of the Committee, to learn if any steps have been taken to compel the payment of sums outstanding in the hands of Collectors and Inspectors, I have to state that the strong measures which have been pursued to enforce the payment of outstanding dues have proved effectual, legal proceedings have been instituted against several defaulters; but as yet I am without the returns of the sums that may have been recovered in consequence of such proceedings.

Certain Collectors and Inspectors on being warned that they would be removed from Office if they did not pay the ar-

rears due by them, have paid considerable sums for arrears, since the public accounts were prepared, so as to enable them to retain their offices.

APPENDIX.

The reason that Mr. Savage appears, by the public accounts, to owe the large sum of £1,239 17 9½, is that Collectors are allowed forty days after making their returns, to pay the Receiver General. Within the period of making payment allowed by law, Mr. Savage has paid the Receiver General the sum of £1,230, for which I have seen the Receiver General's receipts. This payment being posterior to the period at which the public accounts were prepared, could not appear in the accounts.

Mr. Savage has not been in the habit to allow the entry of goods on Bonds, Collectors have been instructed that they are not authorised to do so.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of J. S. Merwin, Esquire, and others, of the Village of Prescott,

Respectfully beg leave to Report :

That from the Geographical position of this village at the head of the Boat, and foot of the Ship navigation of the Saint Lawrence and the Lakes, it is necessarily the stopping place of a great proportion of the emigrants from the Mother Country to Upper Canada, many of whom on their arrival at this place, in consequence of fatigue incident to a long voyage, and exposures to the inclemencies of the weather and change of climate, are attacked with sickness, and left destitute of money, far from friends, and without any means of obtaining sustenance, but from private charity.

From facts which have come to the knowledge of Your Committee, they are satisfied that numerous instances of the most unparalleled distress and abject suffering, have been alleviated by the liberality and humane attention of the inhabitants of Prescott, without which many must have perished.

Your Committee have much satisfaction in stating, that they have good reason to believe that most perfect willingness exists on the part of the inhabitants of this village, to extend relief to the sick and destitute, the widow and orphan, to the utmost extent of their means; but from the limited number of those who have the ability to contribute to such relief, they do not consider themselves able, nor do they think it their duty to bear the whole burthen which an increased emigration is likely to impose on them the ensuing season.

Your Committee therefore beg leave most strongly to recommend that the sum of three hundred pounds be placed at the disposal of responsible persons, in aid of private contributions for the relief of sick, destitute emigrants, arriving at that place the next season.

Report on Survey Bill.

REPORT

Of the Select Committee to which was referred the detailed accounts of the Welland Canal Company, for 1831.

To the Honorable the Common's House of Assembly.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report on the accounts of the Welland Canal Company, respectfully beg leave to inform the House, that upon a close investigation of the several papers, Your Committee perceive that during the past year the Company have expended the sum of £38,239 1s. 10d. in payment of bills due, contingencies, interest, salaries, engineers, &c. &c. of which sum £18,988 14 7, has been paid to Contractors, and that the receipts for the same period, are £30,000, on account of the grant of last Session of the Legislature, and £8,239 1 10 in-Exchange, Capital Stock, Rent, Toll, &c.—making a total equal to the expenditure. Of the £18,988 14 7, paid to Contractors for labour, it appears that the sum of £3308 17 5 only has been applied in opening the new route from the Welland River to Lake Erie. Mr. Black the Secretary of the Company who was called before the Committee, states in answer to a question put to him, that the sum of £1,268 13 7 was disbursed for the purchase of boats, and the erection of ware houses; the Vice-president, Mr. McDonell, however, explains, that this item was not charged against the loan of last Session, but on account of Capital Stock paid in. How far the spirit of the Act may be found to justify this distinction, your Committee will not attempt to decide.

The total amount of tolls collected on the Canal for the same period is £2136 10 11, and the sum paid for Salaries to Officers and Engineers, together with their contingent account £2136 1 7—the expense of the persons who have had charge of the Locks, Your Committee cannot ascertain, as several charges for that branch of the expenditure are involved in other entries; it appears however, that when this outlay is added to the last item, that the revenue of the Canal for 1831, will be insufficient for the payment for its Superintendence. It appears to Your Committee, that as the public Stock in this Company is much greater than the private stock, it would be just to alter the Law which regulates the direction of the Company. The accompanying bill is for that purpose most respectfully submitted for the consideration of the House.

The Committee appointed to inquire into the petition of Hugh Richardson and others, Ship owners and Master of Vessels navigating Lake Ontario, respectfully report; That it is expedient for the safety of life and property, that an improvement be made in the harbour of York, by erecting a pier in front of the Garrison of about Sixty Feet in length, upon which two harbour lights may be placed for the guidance of Vessels entering the harbour; and that from past experience, it is also necessary that the Light house on Gibraltar Point be raised, at least fifteen feet and the lantern improved, in order that in dull and foggy weather, the light may be seen, and vessels enabled, with safety, to enter the said harbour of York.

Your Committee are of opinion that the sum of Twelve hundred and Fifty Pounds will effect both these objects.

REPORT

Of the Select Committee on the Petition of Captain Whitney and others, on the subject of a Light House on Long Point.

To the Honorable the House of Assembly.

The Select Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Captain Whitney, of the Steam Boat Great Britain, and twelve others, Masters of Vessels on Lake Ontario, on the

subject of the benefit to be derived from a Light House on Long Point, situate sixty miles from Kingston, on the North side of Lake Ontario—

BEG LEAVE TO REPORT AS FOLLOWS :

Your Committee, in order to gain the necessary information respecting the benefit to be derived from a Light House on Long Point, otherwise called Salmon or Wicket Point, have had before them Captains Whitney, Mosier, John McIntosh, Tase, Charles McIntosh, Boyle, Zealand, Kerr, Kendrick, Ross, Smith, and Kent, who all perfectly coincide in opinion that the Navigation of Lake Ontario would derive a very great and important advantage from a Light House on Long Point, as it is the most prominent place on the North side of the Lake, and where Vessels, either in going up or down, make for, in order to shape their course for the head or lower end of the Lake; and for the want of a Light House upon it, lives and property are frequently exposed to risk and danger; and they all particularly recommend a revolving light to be adopted, that it may be distinguished from the one on the False Ducks, as when head winds prevail, should both lights be of the same description, the one, in some instances, (from their contiguity to each other) might be taken for the other.

Your Committee have likewise to remark, that all the Masters of Schooners who have been before them complain of a tax, in the shape of fees for Light Houses, imposed upon their vessels in all Ports upon the south side of Lake Ontario, in consequence of the charge made upon all vessels for the Light House at York Harbour, and that if no such charge was made, their Vessels, and all other Canadian Vessels Navigating Lake Ontario, would have the free benefit of all the Light Houses on the South side, which to them would be very important, as they are at present subject to the payment of 10s. for Vessels under 50 tons, and 15s. for Vessels over 50 tons and under 100 tons, each trip; and they are, consequently, very desirous to be relieved from what may be considered a heavy tax in said shape upon them.

Your Committee have no doubt of the importance and advantage to the Navigation of Lake Ontario to be derived from a Light House on Long Point, otherwise called Salmon

APPENDIX. or Wicket Point, and they think the sum of — pounds would defray the charge of its erection, and the necessary lamps; and they recommend that it be provided for agreeably to the prayer of the petition: that Commissioners be appointed to fix upon the proper site, and to Contract for, and superintend its erection.

Your Committee are also disposed to recommend the support of Light Houses to be defrayed by the Province.

REPORT

Of the Select Committee to which was referred the the Petition of the Honorable John Kirby, and others, of the Town of Kingston.

To the Honorable the Commons' House of Assembly.

The Committee to which was referred the Petition of the Honorable John Kirby and others, of the Town of Kingston, praying for aid to erect an Hospital at that place.

RESPECTFULLY REPORT:

That the necessity for providing a place of refuge for the destitute, sick and infirm, who resort in such numbers to this Province, is a fact too obvious to admit of denial.

Hitherto the private contributions of charitable individuals, have been almost the only means from which the sick and destitute have been relieved, and the claims on these benevolent persons are now encreasing to an extremely inconvenient and burthensome extent. It is therefore the opinion of the Committee that some public institution should be established from the public revenues of the Province, to provide an Asylum for such sick persons as are without the means of self support.

The Petitioners represent the necessity and advantages of erecting an Hospital at Kingston, and the reasons urged by them for the selection of that place, appear satisfactory to the Committee, independent of the very strong inducement to come to that decision, from the fact that the benevolent Inhabitants of that place have offered to contribute from their private resources, a sum amounting to nearly one thousand pounds, provided the Legislature will grant a sum in aid sufficient to defray the charge of erecting a suitable building.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that the sum of £3000 be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, for the erection of an Hospital in or near the Town of Kingston, and in order that this grant may not materially interfere with other appropriations which it may be necessary for the Legislature to make, that the same be advanced by instalments of £1000 on the first day of May, in each year after the passing of this Act.

REPORT

Of Kingston Bank Commissioners, &c.

To His Excellency, SIR JOHN COLBORNE, K. C. B. Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, and Major General, Commanding His Majesty's Forces therein, &c. &c. &c.

The Kingston Bank Commissioners, in presenting their annual report, regret they have not been able to bring the affairs of the institution to a close.

No material alteration has taken place since our last report to Your Excellency.

Such debtors as were disposed to avail themselves of the provisions of the Statute, had submitted their accounts to arbitration within the limits of the Act.

There are many accounts yet unsettled, arising from a variety of causes beyond the control of the Commissioners, among which we enumerate those who have left the Province, as well as such as resided out of the Province at the time they contracted the Bank debt; several debtors have become insolvent, and many are deceased, without leaving any available effects behind them; several persons in the Province have neglected to arrange their accounts; many also dispute the claims of the Bank against them, and others make demands against the Bank, the justice of which we are unable to discover, although much time has been spent in searching the Books and other documents in our possession belonging to the institution. An error of Seventy Pounds was charged against Mr. Miles, he evidently paid.

The late Teller has repeatedly been requested to attend for the purpose of giving the necessary explanations, but he has hitherto neglected to come forward.

The accounts of the two principal debtors to the institution stand as follows:—

In the award with Mr. Bartlett, it was directed that he should pay the sum of £1,750, in quarterly instalments of £125 each, commencing in three month from the date of the award made December 9th 1829, in the paper of the Bank at the full face of the Notes. We have received two instalments, the Commissioners hold a mortgage on his property, which they consider sufficient to satisfy the demand against him.

In the award with Mr. Dalton, it was directed that he should pay the sum of £200, in quarterly instalments of £51 5s. each, commencing in three months from the date of the award made May 9th 1829, in the paper of the late Bank at the full face of the Notes. We have received one instalment on this award.—In both awards no interest was allowed for the extended time of payment.

A clause in the latter award directed that certain property, then under mortgage, to secure the debt due by Mr. Dalton to the institution, should be released, whenever it should be required by Mr. Dalton, which demand has been complied with by the Commissioners (with the exception of some wild land.)

The Commissioners are apprehensive, before they can bring the business of the institution to a close, they will have to institute some suits at Law against negligent debtors. They submit to the Legislature the necessity of providing funds for the discharge of such legal processes as it may be requisite to

Representation from Inspector General to His Excellency relative to Light House expenses.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE
10th January, 1832.

SIR,

Representation respecting Light House expenses.

I take the liberty through you to submit for the consideration of His Excellency, the necessity of calling the attention of the House of Assembly to the want of a provision for the maintaining the Light Houses at Long point, and at the False Ducks Islands.

His Excellency is aware that certain expenses, to the amount of between two and three hundred pounds have been incurred under his sanction for the improvement of the Light House at Gibraltar Point, which it was expected would have been completed before the closing of the navigation, which the early setting in of unfavorable weather prevented, but the work will be resumed at the opening of the spring.

Representations have been made to me at sundry times, of the necessity of having Warehouses erected at the principal Ports of entry in the Province, for the security and to facilitate the collection of the Revenue arising from the duties on Imports; this I conceive, indispensable at some of the most frequented Ports, such as Prescott, Kingston, York, Niagara, Chippewa, Dalhousie and at Burlington Bay, for the security of the Tolls at the Canal.

I have understood that this subject was brought before the House of Assembly last Session, but no provisions has yet been made for those purposes.

The Chief Justice to His Excellency, relative to funds for printing reports of King's Bench, and accommodation for sitting of said Court.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

I have the honor to report to Your Excellency, that in the last term, Mr. Draper the reporter of the Court of King's Bench, appointed under the Act passed in 1823, made the inclosed communication to me, announcing that he cannot, without some public aid, support the expense of printing the reported decisions of the Court, and must therefore discontinue it.

The advantages of having the decisions of the Superior Court generally known, (which they never can be, unless they are in print.) are so great, and at the same time so obvious, that it is to be hoped they will not be lost for the want of that public assistance which the reporter requires.

APPENDIX. I beg also to be permitted to state to Your Excellency, that by the temporary provision which has been made for the accommodation of the Court of King's Bench, in the Court House of the Home District, the convenience of the Court and of the profession is not, and cannot be consulted in such a manner as is consistent with a due regard to the administration of Justice.

Having no apartment which they can exclusively occupy for their Court, the Judges cannot direct such arrangements to be made, as would best accommodate themselves, the Barristers, and Suitors, and tend to the observance of good order.

Until a proper building can be erected for the Court of King's Bench, it is very desirable that the Government should provide means to enable the Judges to procure accommodation for the Court, by renting a building, or part of a building which they can occupy exclusively and in which they can make arrangements suitable for the purpose. The Corporation of the Law Society has lately put up a building, in which the desired accommodation can be obtained with the additional advantage of convenient access to a library belonging to the Society, and I trust the Court may be enabled to avail themselves of the offer which has been made of a part of this building.

I have the honor to inform you that the Surveyor General of this Province, Mr. Thomas Ridout, died on the 8th instant, and that I have appointed Mr. William Chewett, the Senior Surveyor, Draftsman and Chief Clerk, to take charge of the Surveyor General's Department, and to perform the duties of Surveyor General until His Majesty's pleasure is known.

I beg leave to transmit to you the inclosed Memorial, from Mr. Chewett, and to recommend that his appointment as Chief of the Department may be confirmed.—There are several Gentlemen who have applied for this post, but there is no person who is so well qualified for it, or has stronger claims, than Mr. Chewett.

I also beg leave to recommend Mr. James Grant Chewett, Assistant Draftsman, to succeed Mr. William Chewett, as Senior Surveyor, Draftsman and Chief Clerk. He has been long in the Department, and is the compiler of the best Map of this Province.

The Memorial of William Chewett, Senior Surveyor and Draftsman, and Principal Clerk in the Office of the Surveyor General—

MOST HUMBLY SHEWETH:

That Your Memorialist, although he was fully aware that the Honorable Thomas Ridout could not survive his late indisposition many days, was totally prevented by every feeling of delicacy and respect for the character and high station of the Surveyor General, from addressing Your Excellency at an earlier period. But as that worthy Gentleman departed this life yesterday morning, Your Memorialist takes the liberty of submitting to Your Excellency the following statement of his long services to his King and Country, (of 54 years) in the firm hope that it will receive Your Excellency's most favorable consideration, and also from His Majesty's Government, which Your Memorialist most respectfully hopes,

APPENDIX. and indeed trusts, such strong and just claims may be entitled to deserve.

That Your Memorialist has served in the Office of the Surveyor General under the Province of Quebec, and that of Upper Canada, from the 20th of May, 1774.

That Your Memorialist served in the Militia of Quebec during the time it was besieged by the Americans, from the latter end of September, 1775, to the 5th May, 1776, when it was relieved by the arrival of the Flank Companies of the 29th Regiment, commanded by Lord Petersham; and when off duty during the said seige, Your Memorialist was employed, by order of His Excellency Captain General Carlton, Governor of the Province of Quebec, under the direction of the Deputy Surveyor General, the Honorable John Collins, Esquire, (there being no Engineer in the Province) Surveying the Fortifications—the City of Quebec—determining the distances of the rebel Batteries—making plans of the same for His Excellency—and was to have been Draftsman to His Excellency had His Excellency commanded the Army from the Province of Quebec to form a junction with the Army from New-York. Some time after the defeat of the Army under General Burgoyne, Your Memorialist was appointed Acting Pay-Master of Works for the Posts of St. John, Isle aux Noix, and their Dependencies, on Lake Champlain, to the Engineer's, Quarter-Master-General's and Naval Departments, and remained in those appointments until about one year and a half after the peace of 1783, when all supernumeraries were discharged, after settling their accounts with the heads of their respective Departments—and Your Memorialist again joined the Office of the Surveyor General, by order of His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Hamilton.

Correspondence relative to Surveyor General.

In 1788 Your Memorialist was sent by the Surveyor General, Major Holland, to take charge of the Eastern District of Upper Canada, to survey and lay out lands for the disbanded Troops and Loyalists, and to locate the same under the usual authorities.

On the arrival of His Excellency, Lieutenant Governor Simcoe, at Quebec, in the Autumn of 1791, your Memorialist was ordered by the Surveyor General to return to Quebec, and was recommended by him to His Excellency for the situation of Surveyor General to His Government of Upper Canada; upon which His Excellency was pleased to say, that he could not make him Surveyor General, as that appointment had been promised to Lieutenant Colonel Provost, who should not come to this Country, but that your Memorialist should be made Deputy Surveyor General.

In 1792, when His Excellency was sworn into His Government at Kingston, after having assisted His Excellency in reorganizing the Map of this Province, His Excellency directed your Memorialist to return to the Eastern District, deliver over his charge to Mr. Hugh McDonell, and to join His Excellency at Niagara, where your Memorialist unfortunately found His Excellency ill with a dangerous fever, and that the appointment had been given to David William Smith, Esquire, then a Captain in the 50th Regiment in Garrison.

In 1802, upon the expression of the intention of the Surveyor General, Mr. Smith, to go home, and retire upon a pension, if he could obtain it, His Excellency, Lieutenant Governor Hunter, was pleased to promise your Memorialist his recommendation; but, in about nine or ten months after, His Excellency informed your Memorialist that the Surveyor General Smith had resigned, and that Charles B. Wyatt, Esquire, had succeeded to that situation.

On the suspension of the Surveyor General, Mr. Wyatt, by Lieutenant Governor Gore, His Excellency was pleased not to refuse permission to Mr. Ridout, although neither a scientific or practical Surveyor, never having either before or since projected a plan or laid out a piece of Land, to go to England and seek, upon his own interest, the appointment of Surveyor General of the Province; notwithstanding that your Memorialist was the first Officer in that Department, after the suspension of Mr. Wyatt; and when the business of the said Office was conducted by His Excellency's Commission in the name of Chewett and Ridout, until the arrival of Mr. Ridout as Surveyor General, in December, 1810, having been absent about one year and a half, during which time your Memorialist had to do the whole duty, and to take upon himself the whole responsibility.

Upon His Excellency, Lieutenant Governor Gore, having received a Letter from Mr. Ridout while at Sea, before his arrival in the Province, informing His Excellency that he had obtained the appointment, His Excellency sent for Your Memorialist and informed him thereof, and said, that the only service he could now render in return for the loss of that appointment was, to give to your Memorialist the appointment formerly held by Mr. Ridout, as Principal Clerk; and that, should the situation again become vacant, he, your Memorialist, should be appointed Surveyor General,—and now holds

the situation of a Principal Clerk, in addition to that of Senior Surveyor and Draftsman. APPENDIX.

In 1812, on the breaking out of the American War, your Memorialist was then a Lieutenant Colonel of the second Regiment of York Militia, and was constant in attending and assisting the Drill of the Flank Companies until they were organized; so as to be sent into Garrison under Major Allan, and shortly after taken by His Excellency Major General Brock on his expedition against the Americans at Detroit, which resulted in the capture of the whole of its Garrison, Munitions, and Stores; and upon their return were employed on the Niagara Frontier until the end of the said Season.

Your Excellency's Memorialist could have brought forward sufficient testimony of his good conduct on the 27th April, 1813, when the Americans landed at York, on which occasion General Sheafe commanded, and on the year following, when commanded by Colonel Stewart of the Royals, when the American Fleet lay off the Garrison; but as those Gentlemen are now absent, your Memorialist shall only appeal to Colonel Foster, then Adjutant General of Militia; Lieutenant Colonel Coffin, Deputy Adjutant General; and to Edward M'Mahon, Esquire, Acting Secretary to His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Gordon Drummond, commanding the Forces in Upper Canada, as to his conduct during that period.

Correspondence relative to Surveyor General.

On the arrival of His Excellency, Lieutenant Governor Gore, His Excellency was pleased, in consequence of your Memorialist's reported good conduct during the War, to promote your Memorialist to the first Regiment of York Militia, as Colonel; and, being taken ill from the hardships suffered during the said War, your Memorialist was forced to resign in 1818, under the Administration of Mr. President Smith, formerly of the Queen's Rangers.

Your Memorialist, therefore, prays, that your Excellency will be pleased to take under your most favorable consideration the long continued and ever unremittingly faithful services of your Memorialist (being upwards of fifty-four years); and that as the Honorable Thomas Ridout has departed this life on the 8th instant, your Excellency will be pleased to recommend your Memorialist, the Senior Surveyor and Draftsman and Principal Clerk in the Office of the Surveyor General, to succeed him as Surveyor General; and although far advanced in years, yet, nevertheless, your Memorialist is not only able to direct and conduct, but to perform, in every sense of the word, all the duties of the said Office, to the benefit and advantage of His Majesty's Government.

And your Excellency's Memorialist, as in duty bound, shall ever pray.

That since the year 1824 Your Memorialist has been placed in great difficulties and privations in carrying on that undertaking, and the many applications to the Legislature in getting appropriations for carrying on the said work, all of which has been attended with great costs and expenses, and finally there was an act passed in 1828, awarding Your Memorialist £5591 8 5½, and that sum was to have been paid on the 2nd June 1828, although, the work was taken out of Your Memorialist's hands, and not one penny was paid until December 1828, when £1,734 14 8 was paid, and on March 26th 1829 £1,500; and on the 8th March, 1831 £2,356 13 9; making in all £5,591 8 5; the amount of the award.

Your Memorialist now most humbly asks, that Your Excellency will lay the accompanying petition and statements of the interest on the award; and when Your Memorialist shall receive the amount of interest on the award, amounting to £426 13 7½: it shall be final and conclusive for all claims on the Government of this Province, for all work and labour in constructing the Burlington Bay Canal.

And Your Memorialist as in duty bound will ever pray.

OBSERVATIONS

By the Bursar of the University of King's College, in reply to that part of the Despatch which calls for a return of the Rents accruing from the Leased Lands of the University.

Observations by the Bursar in reply to Despatch calling for return of Rents of the Leased Lands.

It is impossible to state with accuracy the actual collectable Rental of the Leased Lots, for these Lands being dispersed throughout the Province, it is rendered impracticable without incurring infinite expense to collect the Rents regularly, it is further to be stated, that in very many cases, it has been discovered that the Lessees have changed their minds after being entered for their Leases, and have never taken possession of their Lots, others again have afterwards abandoned them, (after stripping them of their Timber,) with nominal arrears of Rent due upon them which can never be recovered, so that the nominal entire Rental ever exceeds the actual products. Under these circumstances it would not be prudent to calculate the existing Rental at above twelve hundred pounds Currency per annum. Then again, the continual sales of these Lands produce another constant diminution of the income arising from Rents, and although the interest hereafter to be paid on the several annual instalments of one tenth of the purchase money will eventually exceed the amount of the loss of Rent, yet for awhile, it is otherwise, as for instance, if a lot of two hundred acres, under the progressing Ratio of Rent, has increased to £5 per annum and be sold for

£200, (and which amount it must be remarked is a high estimated average of the value of the whole of the Lands of the University, those already sold being principally the most valuable,) the six per cent Interest upon the £20 instalment (one-tenth) will be but £1 4s for the first year, and consequently a diminution in that year's produce from the Lot of £3 16s. for the College terms of sale do not require the annual payment of interest upon the remaining unpaid part of the Principal, but only upon each annual instalment from the day of purchase, so that it is not until the expiration of nine years therefrom, that the full advantages of the sale are realised, except in cases where the purchasers through choice, (it being optional with them so to do) complete their payments earlier, in order to secure their deeds in fee simple the sooner.

It is respectfully hoped that the above explanations will be satisfactory as to the impossibility of stating the Rental with accuracy, and it may perhaps not be deemed irrelevant to remark that an immediate investment of Capital, so as to produce an accruing interest therefrom, is not at all times to be obtained in this Province, and consequently it would be fallacious to form an estimate of an increase of Revenue precisely from the periods when the payments for the Lands are effected.

REPORT

Of Select Committee on the Petition of C. Hopkins and others, on the subject of finishing the Burlington Bay Canal.

TO THE HONORABLE THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of Caleb Hopkins and others, inhabitants of the District of Gore, on the subject of securing and finishing the Burlington Bay Canal, with a Light House &c. also the petition of Asa Mann and Jacob Spaun, Contractors for the Burlington Bay Canal, and other documents marked A. B. C. D. E. Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, sent down by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Most respectfully beg leave to report :

The Petitioners represent that the said Canal has been in successful operation for four years, and from the commencement of said period has annually paid the interest of the Capital expended in constructing it, and the effect, otherwise anticipated, as an improvement for the facilities of promoting the general business of the Country, has been realised beyond expectation.

Your Committee has also been directed to the consideration of the Petition of Asa Mann and Jacob Spaun, representing their being Contractors for the Burlington Bay Canal, and that in good faith they engaged to perform certain Work in the month of May, 1830, that they proceeded with every precaution which economy and prudence could devise for the successful completion of their undertaking, but from complicated circumstances which attended the whole progress of the work, it became impracticable to complete their contract, and that it also became necessary to make alterations in the construction of some part of the work to secure and make it more durable, to meet the payment of which the Act of the Legislature did not provide, they therefore pray that should a new Act, in behalf of the Burlington Bay Canal, pass the Legislature, it may contain a clause to authorise measures to be taken that will effect the adjustment of matters respecting the nonfulfilment of their Contract, and to satisfy them for extra work done, either by the decision of the Commissioners themselves, or the Superintendent of the work, as may be mutually agreed upon.

The Document marked A. is a report of the Commissioners, stating their regret that the work has not been prosecuted by the Contractors in that diligent manner it might have been, as their contract should have been completed by the 1st day of October last, and instead of which a part of the work has been altogether abandoned. An estimate of the deficiencies in their Contract accompanies said Report marked C. amounting to £707 13 4 but from which a deduction should be made of £279 0 0, for work done that was intended to cut off the angles in Lake Ontario, between the North and South Piers, and which has entirely failed, and the Commissioners are now of opinion, that the work which has failed should not be rebuilt, but in place of which a good and substantial Pier, secured with piles and well filled with stone to be substituted, as the object is to obviate the necessity of drudging the channel, by confining the water in a narrower compass, to have the effect of keeping it clear and of a proper depth.

The South or main Pier in Lake Ontario, as well as the Piers in Burlington Bay, have been finished by Job Loder, Esquire, who is surety for the fulfilment of Messieurs Spaun and Mann's Contract; and the Commissioners avail themselves of the opportunity afforded them in their report to point out Mr. Loder's good conduct in furthering the work, and doing all in his power towards its completion agreeably to Contract.

That the South Pier is securely and substantially made, 1,300 feet from the shore, and terminating in twenty feet of water.

The Commissioners further state, that in the early part of the season of 1830, Mr. Kerr, the Superintendent, made application to them for a balance due him on securing the Canal and Machinery during the years 1828 and 1829, amounting to £337 14 2, over and above the funds placed in his hands; and the Commissioners, although they authorised the said expenditure, found that they were precluded from applying any part of the sum last granted by the Legislature to work that had been done to the Canal, as it was particularly provided in the Act that said grant should be applied only for work to be done in completing the same; and the Commissioners being assured that the greater part of that sum was due for labor and materials furnished for securing the Harbour: also, that the Canal had never yielded or paid tolls until the Harbour was, by Mr. Kerr's exertions, secured—they, out of the sum retained by them for contingencies, paid Mr. Kerr, on his own responsibility, said amount of £337 14 2.

The Commissioners also state that a claim from Mr. Barrett, Civil Engineer, has been made to them for the sum

of £10, due him for services rendered during the arbitration of Mr. Strobbridge's claim, in 1828, which was omitted in the Arbitrators' account of expenses;—also, an application from Mr. Hall, Civil Engineer, who was employed at the commencement of the work by the first Commissioners, for the sum of £55, which has been objected to by the former Commissioners, and afterwards ordered the payment of said sum to be made Mr. Hall, (who was then in Nova Scotia,) and which was placed in the hands of James Crooks, Esq., where it remained until the year 1828, when it was withdrawn by order of the late Commissioners, and applied to the uses of the Canal.

The Document marked E. is a communication from Messrs. Mann and Spaun, Contractors, to the Commissioners, in which they state that although their Contract has not been completed according to its letter, they feel confident that the delay which took place in fulfilling it has operated to the advantage of the Canal, inasmuch as it gave more ample opportunity to discern the alterations necessary to be made for better securing the Piers: they also state, that the Piers in Lake Ontario, at a moderate calculation, cost them £250 more than they could have anticipated, in consequence of the water being much deeper than where the Survey was taken.—Also, the washing out of the stone from Piers sunk on old work, augmented their loss. The Contractors further state that they did not abandon the work with a desire to evade completing their contract, but in consequence of their surety having received all monies for, and having assumed, the Contract, they refer the Commissioners to him for the completion of the work.

The Document marked B. is a general statement of monies received and expended for and on account of the Burlington Bay Canal, from 1st April, 1830, to 14th November last, shewing, at the latter date, a balance applicable to the uses of the Canal of £29 0 10½.

The Document No. 1 is an account of monies paid the Contractors for and on account of the Canal, agreeably to contract, amounting to £3,961 8 0.

The Document No. 2 is an account of extra work done to the bridge, and nine and a half cords stone for the foundation of the North Pier in Lake Ontario, and nineteen mooring piles in the Bay, amounting to £133 15 0.

The Document No. 3 is a statement of the receipts and expenditures by Mr. Kerr, as Secretary and Superintendent, during the year 1831, shewing a balance in his hands of 10s ½d.

The Document No. 4 is an account of monies drawn from the Receiver General for and on account of the Burlington Bay Canal, out of the last appropriation of £5,000, shewing a balance in the Receiver General's hands of £28 10 10.

The Document marked D. is an estimate of materials and labor required to complete the Burlington Bay Canal, amounting to £3,478 4 0.

Your Committee taking into consideration the amounts claimed by Mr. Barrett and Mr. Hall, with the amount required to complete the Canal, find that the sum of £3,543 4s. is the amount prayed for by the Petitioners.—The Committee would here beg leave to remark, that notwithstanding this work has, in its progress, cost a sum greatly exceeding the original estimate, they feel no hesitation in recommending to your Honorable House the granting of this further sum required, as it is evident, from every year's experience, the vast importance of this work, and of its being one of the most safe and commodious Harbours, in all seasons of the year, that is known; and also the great and increasing prosperity of all that part of the Province to which its influence on Commerce and Agriculture extends—likewise the certainty of the tolls to be depended on to meet the re-payment of a much greater expenditure, if required.

Your Committee feel unwilling to overlook the deficiencies which have taken place on the part of the Contractors—amounting to so great a sum as £428 13 4.

Your Committee have also noticed the favorable mention made by the Commissioners in their report, respecting the spirited manner in which Mr. Loder, aided the Contractors in the prosecution of the work; but he being Surety for the fulfilment of Messrs. Mann and Spaun's Contract, the Committee are not aware how the joint interests of Surety and Contractors can be separated.

Your Committee would further beg leave to recommend the charging of the last grant of £5,000 to the account of the Province, thereby to relieve the public creditor from depending on the tolls, as provided by the 4th clause of the Act passed in the 11th year of His late Majesty's Reign, and to allow the Commissioners to alter the tolls so as to meet the exigency of the case, as in some instances it has been made appear to your Committee that produce is carried past the Canal, to evade the payment of tolls.

APPENDIX. The Commissioners, in their report, further observe, that it is necessary to make provision for attending the Swing Bridge across the Canal, and the Light House.

Your Committee would therefore recommend the care of both to the Collector of tolls at the Port of Burlington, and that your Honorable House would authorise that instructions be given him for that purpose.

Your Committee feel disposed further to recommend to your Honorable House, that should further aid be granted for the completion of the Burlington Bay Canal, that the Superintendent of the work be authorised to expend it under the direction of the Commissioners.

All which is most respectfully submitted.

Of Select Committee on Public Accounts.

The Committee on Public Accounts having examined the different Detailed Accounts submitted to them, beg leave to make a second Report, for the purpose of suggesting some reductions of the Estimate for the Administration of Justice, and the support of the Civil Government for the year 1832, transmitted to the House by Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Having carefully examined the different items of that Estimate, your Committee would recommend the following deductions for the reasons hereinafter stated.

In referring to the returns of emoluments laid before the House, during the last Session, it appears that the Provincial Secretary and Register has hitherto been paid out of the Casual and Territorial Revenue, his Salary of £300, and a sum, in commutation of Fees, amounting to £636, forming a total of £936 Sterling, which is thought fully sufficient to remunerate the services of that Officer, and to enable him to pay a Clerk or Deputy.

As the expenditure of the Surveyor General's Department originates in the Surveying and disposing of Land, it appears to your Committee that it should be defrayed from the same source by which it has been created; and that therefore the Territorial Revenue should be chargeable with its payment, and not the monies at the disposal of the Legislature.—If, however, it were thought advisable to grant a supply for this Department, your Committee would then recommend striking off all charges for Surveys, and merely allow the Salaries of the principal Clerks, and the absolute Contingencies of the office.

The situations of Door-keeper and an assistant House-keeper are thought unnecessary, as the duty of the first person could be performed by a Messenger, and the want of the second is rendered useless by the appointment of a Housekeeper to the Buildings where the Public Offices are held. It is also advised to strike off from the Contingent Accounts of the Executive Council and Inspector Generals' Office the charges for Messengers, and to provide by an Act of Parliament, not only for their wages, but for the regulation of their duties, which are at present not properly defined; for which purpose a Bill is herewith reported.

APPENDIX. In the first Report of the Committee it was recommended to withhold any grant for the travelling expenses of the Judges and Crown Officers, as it was thought that the Salaries and fees of those high functionaries were amply sufficient to defray those charges.

A similar advice was given in relation to the allowance to Clerks of Assize, under the conviction that their duty might be done, with more advantage and less expense to the public, by the Deputy Clerks of the Crown in the different Districts.

In looking over the Accounts of the Attorney and Solicitor Generals it has struck your Committee, that the fees charged therein might be reduced without injustice to those Officers, but feeling some difficulty in suggesting what alterations might be proper, your Committee leave it to the consideration of your House to determine what change, if any, should be made. In the mean time, and until more effectual steps can be taken, it is recommended that the allowance for a Clerk, heretofore received by the Attorney General, be discontinued.

Having been led to believe, that the charges for Printing, by the Government Printer, were much greater than ought to be allowed, your Committee have submitted certain written queries to Mr. Stanton, the Printer, to which he has given answers hereto appended. By this statement it will be seen, that his profits, as Printer, do not exceed in the aggregate more than £300 per annum, supposing this to be correct, which there is no reason to doubt, and although it is possible the work might be done for less, still considering the necessity of having an Official Press, your Committee do not think it would be proper to make any reduction on this head, the more as they do not believe the compensation just mentioned, more than a fair remuneration for the labors performed.

The Committee having observed among the papers placed under their revision, an account for Fees upon Seals, amounting to £52 10s. they addressed a letter to the Inspector General, to be informed in what manner this sum was applied, to which they have received for answer, that the account "had been sent through inadvertency, and that nothing was paid or received on this account, which, however, has always been kept;—formerly, it constituted a part of the Lieutenant Governor's fees, which have ceased since 1812, and a commutation made in lieu thereof."—Being also desirous to obtain a more detailed statement of that part of the Estimate for 1832 relating to the administration of Justice, and for the contingent expenses of the Public Offices; the Inspector General was therefore referred to, who has complied with the requisition of the Committee, by sending a document which is hereto appended.

Your Committee, in their former report, have suggested the propriety of passing a law, to oblige Collectors and Inspectors to account for, and pay up all monies received by them, every quarter—the Committee have therefore caused a bill to be draughted, which is herewith reported.

The contingent account of the Clerk of the Crown has been added to the amounts to be deducted, because it appears to the Committee, that the fees of that Officer are already abundant, without allowing the charge the House is called upon to provide for.

Question.

It has been stated to the Committee that the Statutes were printed at prices higher than are generally charged in the Province.—Will you therefore be good enough to explain to the Committee how this has arisen, and whether such is really the case?

ANSWER.

This statement, as I understand, is made by Mr. Thomson, a member of the Committee. What the general charges in the Province are, I am not aware; nor am I aware that there is any general understanding on the subject among Printers in the Province: but, I beg leave to remark, that on comparison with a work, published by Mr. Thomson, aided by another Press in Kingston, under the title of "a Revised Edition of the Statutes," and which has been spoken of as a cheap work, and 200 copies of it ordered for the use of the House, at an expense of £400, as a contingent charge, it will be found, by any competent judge, that the Statutes printed by me, as Government Printer, are fully as reasonable, if not more so, than this work. I am led to this conclusion from the circumstance, that it is now some time since I made a communication on the subject of a revised Edition of the Statutes, so much needed—a copy of which I take the liberty of annexing hereto. The calculations therein, as to price, are materially governed by those usually paid for public work—some allowance being made for difference of arrangement, and the probability of a larger Edition than ordinary; and from this it will be seen, that a considerable difference exists between the price paid for 200 copies of the Laws to Mr. Thomson and what they might be procured for if the work was done by me, as Government Printer, by authority.

With respect to the prices I receive for all public work, they are fixed by the Government, and include all outlays—labor, materials, paper, &c. are all furnished at my own expense. The authorized charge, as it appears in the Accounts,

The prices now fixed are those as allowed to my predecessor, after, as I have reason to believe, having been twice or three times, revised and reduced, (the last time shortly before my coming to the Office), reference being had to New-York prices, as well as to a Schedule from Lower Canada of the lowest scale of trade prices at Quebec. After some experience, I do not consider them as beyond fair remunerating prices.

It does not occur to me, that I can give any further information with respect to the Accounts now before the Committee.

On the subject of the Government Printing generally, I would take the liberty of availing myself of the opportunity which this question affords me of alluding to what I conceive to be very erroneous statements made with regard to my Office, and its emoluments from the public. These have frequently been made the subject of discussion, and I have felt the unpleasantness of repeated personal allusions, prejudicing me in the public eye, the more, that I was unable to reply to them. I feel it, therefore, as an obligation, that the question being now put to me, I have an opportunity of making such statements in reply as will afford the House and the public correct information, drawn from facts and documents as may be accessible to all who desire it.

The Committee is aware that a Bill was introduced, and has passed the Assembly, this Session, to regulate Official Advertising. On that occasion it was stated by an honorable member who may be supposed to have the means of acquiring correct information, and who, therefore, no doubt, produced an influence in favor of the Bill, that "the sum paid annually for advertising in the Official Gazette" is between 2 and £3,000.

On the contrary, I now state, that in *six years*, the period I have held the Office of Government Printer, the Official Advertising from every quarter has not amounted in all to half that sum; or, in other words, that its annual amount has not been the one-tenth part of what was stated, when urging the adoption of this Bill. On this occasion too, a good deal was said about Sheriff's Sales in the Gazette.

I have taken the trouble to ascertain the total number of Sheriff's Sales which have been Gazetted since I held the Office,—six years; they amount to three hundred and sixty-two, being an average of about sixty per annum for the whole Province, or an average of little more than five per annum to each District: the average expense is about 25s. for insertion the time required by Law—making the average to each District about £6 16 4, per annum. The two last years they have decreased.

With respect to the expense of Official advertising generally, it is no secret; it stands recorded, item by item, on the Journals of the House of Assembly, published by order of the House, year after year, and is to be found among the Public Accounts; and from these it will be best seen, that the statements I allude to were erroneously made. With regard to other statements made on the occasion alluded to, as well as on others, I have only to remark, that they must have been made under the same erroneous impression as those I have already mentioned. The income which the Honorable Gentleman was pleased to put me down at, would indeed be a very large one for the comparatively unimportant duties I have to perform for the public; but that they, and all others, may be correctly informed on the subject, I take the opportunity of stating, that the Office I now enjoy, (after eighteen years of public service), I have held for the last six years, and my public income from it, including all and every source, has never yet exceeded £300 a year,—in some years it has fallen short of that sum.—Salary, I have none.—I am paid for what is required, at regulated prices, furnishing labor and materials at my own expense; and though it has been publicly stated to my prejudice, that the Foreman in the Government Printing Office is paid \$10 a week from the public chest, I solemnly declare, that my Foreman, as well as every other workman in my Office, is paid from my own pocket, without any allowance whatever from the Government.

Question.

ANSWER.

If the motion for referring the subject to a Committee, for inquiry, where I would have had an opportunity of being heard, had been agreed to, I should not have had occasion to trouble the Committee with these remarks.—To this the Honorable Gentleman who introduced the bill objected, and under these circumstances, I trust I shall stand excused before the Committee, in thus alluding to the subject.

REPORT

Of Select Committee on the Petition of James Forshee and others; Jonathan C. Jackson and others; and Belyat Outwaters and others, of the Midland District.

TO THE HONORABLE THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The Select Committee to whom were referred the Petition of James Forshee and others; the Petition of Jonathan C. Jackson and others; and the Petition of Belyat Outwaters and others, have agreed upon the following Report:—

Report of Committee on Petition of Jas. Forshee, and others.

The petition of James Forshee and others represents that the course of the boundary lines, which by the present law regulates the Concessions of the Townships of Fredericksburgh original and Adolphustown, North of the Hay Bay, varies from the original grants about twelve degrees; and as that part of the said Townships has been settled, generally, from forty to fifty years, the injury which the inhabitants would sustain by having the lines established according to the existing law on the subject, would be very serious to all, and ruinous to many. The Petitioners, therefore, pray that a law may be passed, authorising the aforesaid parts of Fredericksburgh and Adolphustown to be Surveyed, at thirty-one degrees West of North, according to the original grants.

On the other hand, the persons who have subscribed the petition of Jonathan C. Jackson and others, and the petition of Belyat Outwaters and others, pray your Honorable House that the existing law regulating boundary lines may not be repealed or altered, as it respects those tracts of land; and they declare that the alteration which is desired by the subscribers to the petition of James Forshee and others would interfere with their possessions and vested rights, as well as with the roads in that part of the country, and would produce serious evils to themselves and neighbours.

B 3

Several papers have been laid before the Committee, to shew the necessity and propriety of the alteration which is prayed for. In particular, a report of a survey made by a licensed Deputy Surveyor, has been submitted to the Committee, accompanied with a plan of the tracts of land mentioned in the petition. From these documents it appears that only a part of the tracts mentioned in the petition has been actually surveyed: as far as the survey has extended, it has been ascertained, that if the present law should be altered in the manner desired, it would be accommodated to the actual boundary lines of the lots, and would therefore prevent mischief, injustice and law-suits; but what effect might be produced in the remainder of these tracts of land, by such an enactment, cannot be declared without an actual survey; and as the proposed measure is not unanimously desired, or even assented to, by the inhabitants, but is strongly opposed, the Committee are of opinion that it will not be safe or prudent to pass such a law as is prayed for, until it has been ascertained, by actual survey, how far such a law would be suited to the actual settlement on the lots in the whole of those tracts of land. This course has been suggested by some persons who own land in the tracts mentioned, and to whom the Committee have written on the subject, and appears to be so reasonable and discreet as to admit of no doubt.

Report of Committee on Petition of Jas. Forshee, and others.

The Committee regret that, in consequence of their presence being constantly required in the House of Assembly, they have not had time to examine and consider the subject referred to them so fully and carefully as its importance to the persons interested, and its delicacy, required.—This is an additional reason for delay.

For these reasons, the Committee do not report a bill;—but they are of opinion, that if a survey actually made of all the tracts of land mentioned in the petition, or a sufficient investigation to ascertain the courses of the lots, shall shew that the proposed modification of the existing law will not disturb the inhabitants in their actual settlement, but will be conformed to the divisions which now exist between the different lots, it will then be proper that such an alteration of the law should be made. The subject, however, is obviously full of difficulties, and no enactment should be made without great caution.

Beg leave to make a first report.

“That your Petitioners feel deeply aggrieved by the passing of laws in the United Kingdom Parliament, (where they have no Agent, legally elected by them, of their free choice, to act and advise them for their interest,) effecting sudden changes in their commercial relations with Great Britain, and with foreign countries,—changes by which the capitals of their Merchants & Manufacturers are in danger of being sacrificed, and their Trade, Commerce and Agriculture discouraged; and they especially remonstrate against the passing, by that Parliament, of Acts interfering, or assuming to interfere, with their internal affairs, over which it has constitutionally no Legislative power whatsoever.”

That by the 46th clause of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, 31 Geo. 3, chap. 31, which gave a Legislature to this Province, and to the authority of which Your Honorable House gives a daily assent; it is enacted, that “whereas by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of His present Majesty, entitled “an Act for removing all doubts and apprehensions concerning taxation by the Parliament of Great Britain in any of the Colonies, Provinces, and plantations in North America and the West Indies; and for repealing so much of an Act made in the seventh year of the reign of His present Majesty, as imposes a duty on tea imported from Great Britain into any Colony or Plantation in America, or relates thereto,” it has been declared, that the King and Parliament of Great Britain will not impose any duty, tax or assessment whatever, payable in any of His Majesty's Colonies, Provinces and Plantations in North America or the West Indies, except only such duties as it may be expedient to impose for the regulation of commerce; the nett produce of such duties to be always paid and applied to and for the use of the Colony, Province or Plantation in which the same shall be respectively levied, in such manner as other duties collected by the authority of the respective General Courts or General Assemblies of such Colonies, Provinces or Plantations, are ordinarily paid and applied; and whereas it is necessary for the general benefit of the British Empire, that such power of regulation of commerce should continue to be exercised by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the Parliament of Great Britain, subject nevertheless to the conditions hereinbefore recited, with respect to the ap-

plication of any duties which may be imposed for that purpose. Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that nothing in this Act contained, shall extend to prevent or affect the execution of any law which hath been or shall at any time be made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, and the Parliament of Great Britain, for establishing regulations or prohibitions, or for imposing, levying or collecting duties for the regulation of navigation, or for the regulation of the commerce to be carried on between the said two Provinces, or between either of the said Provinces, and any other part of His Majesty's Dominions or between either of the said Provinces, and any foreign Country or state, or for appointing and directing the payment of draw backs of such duties so imposed, or to give to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, any power and authority, by and with the advice and consent of such Legislative Councils and Assemblies respectively, to vary or repeal any such law or laws, or any part thereof, or in any manner to prevent or obstruct the execution thereof.”

By the clause just quoted, the right of the Mother Country to pass laws affecting our commercial regulations with Great Britain, and foreign Countries, is expressly and clearly reserved, and such power must necessarily exist so long as we retain the character of a Colony, and compose a part of the British Empire.

During the present Session, your Honorable House has expressed an opinion upon the manner in which this right may be exercised with the least injury to the interests of this Province; but your Committee beg leave to call the attention of your Honorable House more particularly to the consideration of a subject of so much consequence. Your Committee feel confident that the power thus reserved and admitted, will never be enforced to the injury of this part of His Majesty's dominions, without His Majesty being fully satisfied that the result will be a preponderating benefit to our fellow Subjects in other portions of the Empire.

Your Committee believe that many Merchants and Capitalists entered into extensive contracts and speculations during the past year, under the conviction that they would have full time to advance or recede previous to any alteration in the then existing law. Most of the persons thus engaged may have sustained material injury in consequence of the sudden and unexpected operation of an Act which your Committee believe was intended to benefit these Provinces as well as the Empire generally.—The past will be considered an example for the future; and we fear may tend to crush that spirit of enterprise so essentially necessary to render available, the resources of this country.—Certainty gives energy and encouragement to Commerce; but our Merchants and Capitalists may be deterred from embarking in any branch of Foreign Trade, if, in addition to the usual chances of failure, they are subject to the immediate operation of Acts of the Imperial Parliament.

Convinced of the earnest desire of His Majesty to advance the prosperity of this portion of His dominions, your Committee are justified in the belief, that an humble address to the throne, setting forth the full recognition of the right of the Imperial Parliament to regulate our Foreign relations, and shewing the extensive injury which his faithful Subjects in this Province must suffer from any injudicious or sudden exercise of such power, will meet with the same favorable attention that His Majesty extends to all the reasonable requests of His Subjects.

Experience gives no reason to place much reliance upon the efficiency of a Provincial Agent, and we feel assured that His Majesty is so well aware of the vast and growing importance of His North American Colonies, that no measure affecting their interest, either singly or collectively, will be adopted without the fullest inquiry and deliberation.

"That your Petitioners are desirous that the East India Company may not obtain the renewal of their Charter in such form as would secure to them a further monopoly of the Tea Trade of this country."

"Your petitioners humbly pray your Honorable House that the qualified Electors of this Colony may henceforward be fairly and equally represented in the House of Assembly."

Your Committee are not aware that the Imperial Parliament has ever assumed the right of interference in our internal affairs; and although some of the clauses of the several Acts regulating our foreign Trade may have the colour of interference, yet your Committee find nothing in those Acts that can fairly be considered as an invasion on the constitution of this Province.

The Committee discover nothing to justify the complaint of the Petitioners, unless it be the fifth clause of an Act passed in the ninth year of His late Majesty's Reign, which was intended to give certain power to the Canada Company over their own servants in this Country, and upon which, the Committee are informed, the Company never have acted.

The principles of free Trade, and the advantages of unrestrained Commerce, are too well understood to suffer the existence of any reasonable apprehension that a British Ministry will renew a monopoly so extensive in its nature as the Charter of the East India Company. From the great difficulty and importance of the question, there may be circumstances with which the Committee are unacquainted, and possibly beyond the control of His Majesty's Ministers, that render it necessary to continue for a limited period, and under further restrictions, the Company's Charter; but His Majesty's Ministers are too well aware of the universal opinion on this subject to grant more than strict justice and imperative necessity demand.

The Committee see no good reason to make any general alteration in the 60th Geo. 3, Chap. 2, which regulates the representation of the people of this Province.

The provisions of the Act referred to were, at the time when it was passed, considered as fair and equal as any mode that could be adopted.

The great and continuing influx of wealth and population, as well as the rapid settlement of the Province, render it impossible to establish any permanent rule to regulate the representation of the people.

There are two cases, however, which call for the attention of your Honorable House; these are, the *manner* of Elections in the County of Lincoln and in the County of York. The former consists of four ridings, each of which is entitled to return one Member. The Elections for this County have on several late occasions been holden in one place for the four different Ridings, which has the effect of producing much inconvenience to the voters, and in this case the intention and spirit of the Act which divided the County into four Ridings is evaded, and therefore your Committee recommend the passage of an Act, declaring that the Elections for the said County be holden in the several Ridings, and that each Riding do return one Member. From the great extent and population of the County of York, it seems reasonable to divide the County of York into three Ridings, the East Riding to be composed of York, Markham, Scarborough, Pickering and Whitby. The North Riding to be composed of Whitchurch, Uxbridge, Reach, Gwillimbury East, Gwillimbury North, Georgina, Scott, and Brock; and the West Riding to be composed of Caledon, Albion, Chinguacousy, Toronto, Toronto Gore, King, Vaughan and Etobicoke, and that each of these Ridings do respectively return one Member.

Your Committee have not sufficient information before them to recommend the passage of a bill during the present Session.

As doubts may arise on the construction of the Act above referred to, your Committee recommend the passing of an Act, declaring that any County or Town which now sends, or which may hereafter return, a Member to the House of Assembly, shall not continue so to return a Member when it shall happen that the population of such County or Town shall decrease below one thousand souls in either respectively.

"That the undue preferences and exclusive privileges and immunities allowed and extended by the Colonial Government to certain religious sects or denominations be abolished."

"That the Crown and Clergy Reserves, and all reservations of land, otherwise than for the purposes of education and roads, be abolished. That the land granting department, and the sale and disposal of all lands, and other public property, be regulated for the future only by law."

"That the public debt of the Province may not be augmented for any purpose whatsoever, unless the project were first submitted to the people for their approbation; and that the practice of economy and retrenchment in every branch of the public expenditure, be carefully enforced, so that the debt already contracted, and the interest annually accumulating thereon, may speedily be liquidated, and the surplus revenues of the Colony prudently applied to purposes of general utility."

The Committee are not aware of any undue preferences, exclusive privileges, and immunities allowed and extended by the Colonial Government to any religious sect or denomination.

The sums paid to the Clergy of the Church of Scotland and of the Church of Rome, are directed and authorised by the Imperial Government, and are defrayed out of a fund arising from the sale of lands belonging to the Crown.

The support of the Clergy of the Church of England has hitherto been from a source entirely beyond the control of the Colonial Government.

Your Committee not being acquainted with any foundation for the complaint contained in this part of the petitions, are unable to offer any further opinion on the subject.

The Crown Reserves, as well as the Waste Lands of the Crown in this Province, cannot be considered as belonging exclusively to Upper Canada, they were acquired by the blood and treasure of the Parent State, and are now vested in His Majesty for the benefit of the British Empire. His Majesty, therefore, has the indubitable right to reserve or dispose of these Lands as he may deem most advantageous to his Subjects generally; but should the manner of reservation or disposal at any time interfere with the settlement or prosperity of the Province, a respectful representation to His Majesty will, your Committee are convinced, procure redress.

The address to His Majesty which your Honourable House has passed during the present Session, relative to the Clergy Reserves, so fully expresses the opinion of your Committee, that they consider it unnecessary to draw the attention of the House any further to the subject. The decision of your honorable House has been already expressed upon this part of the petition, by the passing of the address to His Majesty, requesting an alteration in the land granting department.

It is certainly to be desired that the practice of economy may be strictly enforced in every branch of the public expenditure; but your Committee are not aware of any mode by which the approbation of the people of Upper Canada can be obtained for augmenting or decreasing the debt of the Province, except through their Representatives in Assembly.

No addition can be made to the public debt without the consent of this House, and a discretion in this, as well as in all other respects, must necessarily be reposed by the Constituent in his Representative.

Every encouragement should be given towards the opening and improving our internal communications, and to develop the resources of the Province; we need never fear an accumulation of public debt, if contracted for a productive purpose. The fear that, under rational and provident management, a public debt should become an evil, your Committee consider calculated to repress every spirit of enterprise in a Country where much is required to be done without the possession of adequate capital; a debt contracted without any proportionate benefit to the public is most seriously to be avoided. The public debts of England and other Nations press heavily upon the people, because they have generally been contracted to support expensive wars, and not for the purposes of general improvement; their debts have been contracted for unproductive, not for productive purposes; money borrowed and applied to a rational and successful speculation, will afford more advantage to either an individual or a nation, than if the credit of either had never been used in contracting a debt.

The great object with your Honourable House should be to ascertain, by an inquiry somewhat more strict than has hitherto been pursued, whether proposed improvements throughout the Country, will, with a reasonable probability, afford to the whole, or even to portions of the Province, advantages adequate to the expenditure.

Leaving a balance of interest to be paid less by £775, than would have to be provided for if the profits arising from the capital invested as above had not yielded more than the usual interest; but even this amount might be much reduced, if the whole debt paying six per cent per annum were redeemed, and a new loan effected at five per cent interest, by which means there would be left only £4,098 12 0½ annually to be paid for the sum of £205,972, now forming the gross debt of the Province. In assuming five per cent as the rate at which another loan might be contracted, it must not be considered as advancing an opinion that it could not be obtained for less, but on the contrary, it is not only possible, but very probable, it would be taken at four & a half, or even four per cent, as the security and amount required would make such a loan sought after with avidity, particularly if made payable at a distant period; there is thus good reason to suppose that the great benefits we now derive from the improvements effected by the expenditure of monies borrowed for these purposes, may continue to be enjoyed upon the credit of the Province, by the payment of a very small amount of interest.

Our Revenue must necessarily depend upon our population; the latter has doubled within the last eight years; the former has increased in a much greater proportion.—The growing prosperity of this Country, as well as the overgrown population of the Parent State, render it extremely probable that emigration from Great Britain and Ireland, will, for many years to come, continue in an increased ratio. A careful expenditure of money by which the resources of the Country may be made known; the internal communications of the Province, both by land and by water, extended and improved, must always give an additional encouragement, not only to our present population, but operate as a strong inducement to respectable people to settle in in the Province.

Your committee are therefore of opinion, that the Legislature should not be deterred from attempting any work which has the attainment of these objects in view, merely because the means are not immediately within its reach.

Monopoly of any description is so little suited to the spirit of the times in which we live, that your committee cannot anticipate that any desire to continue the whole banking business of the province, to the stock holders of the bank of U. Canada, will interfere with the establishment of banks in other sections of the country, under judicious regulations. The passing of a bill to incorporate a bank in the town of Kingston during the present session, shows the readiness of the Legislature to establish such institutions in other sections of the country, when it may be done with safety to the public. Your committee however strongly recommend the adoption of some general system of banking; a subject so important and so intricate should receive the fullest deliberation, and no means of information be neglected to enable your honorable House to arrive at a conclusion, which may protect the people of Upper Canada from the evils which have arisen in other countries, from unlimited and uncontrolled banking. For this purpose your committee recommend the appointment of a commission to make inquiry during the recess, to procure such information as may enable your Honorable House, at its next Session, to arrive at a correct decision on a subject which all admit to be of the utmost importance.

This prayer of the Petition contains a request, which your Committee scarcely believe could have been well understood by the great majority of the Petitioners. They request this House to repeal two Acts passed only a few months ago, without setting forth any reasons to authorise so sudden a change of opinion.

The first of these Acts granting to His Majesty a sum of money towards the support of the Civil Government and the Administration of Justice in this Province, was passed in

Majesty a sum of money towards defraying the expenses of the civil administration of the Government of this Province, and for granting to His Majesty a certain sum of money to be applied towards the payment of the expenses of the administration of justice and the support of the civil Government of this Province"; as also another bill passed in the said last Session, entitled "An Act for vesting in Trustees the Market-square in the town of York, for the benefit of the inhabitants of the said Town," be repealed.

"That a less expensive and more prompt and efficient system be established for the free and equal administration of justice, that matters of small amount and difficulty may be disposed of with as much regard to the legal rights of the parties, as matters of greater amount and difficulty, but at less expense; and that no fees be exacted, the Tariff of which is not established by an Act of the Provincial Legislature.

consequence of the proposal of His Majesty to relinquish to the Colonial Legislature the control of all the Revenues levied under the Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of George the Third, and under the full expectation of securing the independence of the Judges. The first of these objects has been obtained, and all that remains to be done to secure to the Province the benefits to be derived from the second, is a compliance by the Legislature in the recommendation of Lord Goderich, to establish and regulate the mode of Impeachment.

The establishment of a Court of so high a nature, requires more deliberation and care than can well be given by your Committee during the present Session, but the Committee earnestly call the attention of your Honorable House, to a subject of so much consequence.

The people of the Township of Vaughan may possibly be aware of the provisions of "An Act vesting in Trustees the Market-Square in the Town of York;" and it is also possible that some of them may have an interest in its operations; but Your Committee cannot discover what cause of complaint is given to the people of Glengarry, or to other distant parts of the Province, by the passage of an Act merely local in its nature, and the effect of which, is only to authorise the Church and Town Wardens of York, to superintend and manage the leasing a certain piece of land belonging to the Town, called the "Market Square."

A cheap, prompt and efficient system of justice is extremely desirable, but the petitioners have pointed out no mode by which these advantages are to be obtained.

There are several bills before your Honorable House, for the regulation of the District Courts and Courts of Requests; but Your Committee are of opinion, that the public will derive more benefit from the adoption of some general measure, under which small causes may receive the same consideration, be decided upon the same principles, and with the same regard to equal justice, as matters of greater amount.

The Administration of Justice is a subject which must at all times deserve the best attention of Your Honorable House: but no bill which may destroy the present system, should be adopted without the fullest investigation, and after the most mature deliberation and discussion, your Committee have not had sufficient time to examine the manner in which this important subject has been treated by the Legislatures of other Countries, and the effects which have been produced by systems differing from our own, and are therefore unable to propose, at the present Session, any Bill which would combine cheapness and celerity, with a due regard to equal justice.

A matter of such vast importance to the prosperity and happiness of the people, will unquestionably receive the serious and continued consideration of your Honorable House, but Your Committee fear that the hasty adoption of an ill-digested scheme, would produce evils far greater than those of which the petitioners complain.

The costs of Law proceedings have at all times afforded an ample theme for discussion and remark; and it is therefore not to be wondered at, that in this Province this fruitful topic has been seized upon as a means of attracting public notice, and gaining public confidence.

Your Committee are fully satisfied that the Legislature of this Province, can have no desire to continue any system attended with extravagant costs, or which, on a fair examination, may be found not to have yielded the advantages which may have been contemplated; but in the present state of this country they apprehend that it is much easier to find fault with an existing system, than to substitute one which shall be unexceptionable.

During the last Session, your Honorable House adopted measures more accurately to

ascertain the costs of Law proceedings in the several Courts, with a view to make such reductions as may on investigation appear necessary: and your Committee have reason to believe that much information has been obtained which may prove advantageous in the future discussion of this subject.

Your Committee recommend to your Honorable House, the consideration of this interesting matter, at an early period of the next Session.

A Bill having passed your Honorable House during this Session, for the more equal distribution of the estates of persons dying intestate, it is unnecessary that your Committee should express any opinion on this part of the petition.

Your Committee fully recognise the principle that persons appointed to administer the Laws of the Province, and to dispense justice should be wholly unconnected with the warfare of politics; and it is very desirable that the Judges should not hold a seat in either the Executive or Legislative Council. The right of His Majesty to call to His Councils whomsoever he may please, is indisputable; that right, however, your Committee feel assured, will be exercised with due deliberation, and with the full view to advance the interests of the people of this Province. This prayer of the petition seems founded on a supposition that all the Judges of the Court of King’s Bench hold seats in the Executive or Legislative Councils.

It is, however, a matter well known to your Honorable House, that none of the Judges, with the exception of the Chief Justice, sit in either of the Councils. In the House of Lords there are many Peers who have received a legal as well as political education; yet the legal acquirements of the Lord Chancellor for the time being has long been considered necessary in the transaction of the business of that House. The principal reasons that the Judges of England who have been appointed to administer the criminal law of the realm, are excluded from the Cabinet, is, that in their capacity of Counsellors they may be called upon to advise prosecutions by the State, upon which they themselves might afterwards be obliged to pronounce judgment. Such a case is very properly considered an infringement of the constitution;—the same case cannot occur here. Mr. Justice Macaulay retired from the Executive Council immediately upon his appointment to the Bench. The Chief Justice is no longer one of the Executive Council; and though your Committee have admitted the principle for which the Petitioners contend, yet they are convinced, that under existing circumstances, a continuance of his seat in the Legislative Council will promote the public business and interests of the Province, without interfering with his usefulness and impartiality as a Judge of the Court of King’s Bench.

That part of the despatch of Lord Goderich which relates to the independence of the Judges, shews that His Majesty’s Ministers are fully alive to this subject.

Your Committee discover no good reason why Clergymen should be eligible to a seat in the Legislative Council, and ineligible to sit in the House of Assembly.—The objection, which in England has been considered a valid one, in the exclusion of Clergymen from the House of Commons, your Committee think has a peculiar and additional force in this Province.

Interwoven as the Church and state of Great Britain and Ireland are, there may be an appearance of reason, that the Church should have some special representation in the passing of laws, which in their operation could scarcely affect either, without affecting both; but in this Province, where no established Church exists, it is extremely to be

wished, as well in a religious as in a political point of view, that Clergymen of all denominations should be ineligible to any office, other than that to which their Great Master has called them. The influence of the Clergy in every country is necessarily great; but that influence should be used strictly in their station, and to no other end than the promotion of religion and morality. No Clergyman can be useful to his people unless he possess their respect and veneration; and these can only be attained by greater sanctity of manners, purity of morals, and by an inoffensive tenor of life; qualities which are incompatible with the collision produced by the conflicting temporal interests of mankind; and much less with an interference in a warfare, where we frequently find that every feeling of hostility may be excited, and where party prejudices must necessarily rouse feelings “little allied to the spirit of devotion.” The holy calling of a Christian Minister should never be diverted from one only object; it was intended to promote the cause of religion and piety—not to be made a foundation for political eminence.—Clergymen of every denomination possess the feelings, passions and prejudices of other men; and if a door is opened for the exercise of such feelings, it is to be feared their flocks may in some instances be left to wander, while the Shepherds follow the doubtful paths of politics.

Your Committee agree with the petitioners, that the present method of selecting jurors is defective; for although there is no proof before the Committee of any actual evil which has resulted in the Province from the practice now pursued, and though none such is suggested by the Petitioners, yet it must be evident that an uncontrolled power of so important a nature as that of summoning jurors, lodged in the hands of officers so entirely dependent as the Sheriffs, is liable to abuse; and from the nature of the duty, such abuse, if it should exist, would not be easily discovered, and would be almost incapable of proof.

It is not probable, that in times of peace and tranquility, there is much danger of the exercise of this power for evil purposes; yet instances are not wanting in history, where the influence of cruel and corrupt men has been exerted in the persecution of the innocent, in the selection of jurors. Your Committee think that if a practicable and prudent plan can be devised to relieve the administration of justice from the possibility of contamination, and the Sheriffs from the necessity of exercising a power which may render them liable to the suspicion of partiality or injustice; the adoption of such a measure would be highly expedient, but no such measure is suggested by the petitioners; and your Committee cannot say that any proposed plan has fallen under their observation, which is not liable to insuperable objections. Little benefit can be derived from the suggestion contained in the petition, “that jurors may be drawn by lot from lists of the best qualified persons in the several towns and townships;” because if the best qualified persons were always known, those persons ought themselves to be the jurors; and all necessity for selection would be obviated.—The power of declaring who those best qualified persons are, must be lodged somewhere; but in what hands it should be placed, and in what manner that power should be restrained and regulated, your Committee cannot at present venture to offer an opinion.

Your Committee fear that our province, in common with many other Countries, has suffered much from hasty and imprudent Legislation.—They would earnestly recommend that in a question of such high consequence as the present, affecting the most important of all our civil rights, no change should be made in the law without the most mature consideration; they therefore suggest to your Honourable House the propriety of appointing Commissioners, who, during the

recess, may collect information on the subject, and at leisure examine the systems pursued in other Countries, and inquire into their advantages and defects. Your Committee are convinced that a report from such Commissioners at the next session, would render the task of improvement in our jury laws comparatively easy, and enable your Honourable House to devise such measures as would render the fountains of justice free from all suspicion of impurity, and the administration of the laws, worthy of the fullest confidence of the people.

All which, together with the accompanying address to His Majesty, is respectfully submitted.

REPORT

Of the Committee to whom were referred the message and documents sent down by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, relating to the Parliament Building.

Your Committee beg leave to report, that by an Act of the Legislature of this Province, passed on the 30th January, 1826, entitled, "An Act to authorise the raising by debenture, a sum of money to be applied in erecting buildings for the use of the Legislature;" the Honorable William Allan, William Thompson, and Grant Powell, Esquires, were appointed Commissioners for the purposes therein mentioned.—That the said Commissioners advertised for plans and estimates, as in the said Act is provided; and procured a plan and estimates from an Architect of the name of Rogers, for the erection of such buildings, for a sum between £6000 and £7000.

That the said Commissioners applied to the said Rogers to reduce the plan and estimate, so that the plan and estimate should not cost more than £4000, and the said Rogers subsequently reduced them to £5,300—that on the 30th July, 1829, a contract was drawn between the said Commissioners and one Matthew Priestman, to erect the said buildings and find all the materials for the sum of £5,400, and to have them so far finished by the 1st January, 1831, as that the Legislature could then sit in them, leaving the remaining work to be done by the 1st August thereafter.—That the said contract appears executed by all the said parties, except the said William Thompson, who seems to have declined any interference in the matter. That the said Matthew Priestman having failed in his contract, and having made sub-contracts with Joseph Turton, as mason, James Crowther, a Carpenter, the said Grant Powell, about the 2nd August, 1830, accepted of such sub-contracts, and allowed the said Joseph Turton and James Crowther, to proceed with the work without any new contract.—That the building has so far been conducted in a way very unsatisfactory to your Committee, and your Committee cannot but remark, that in their opinion great blame is attributable to the Commissioners for curtailing the sum in the contract so much below the sum appropriated by the Legislature, as also after the failure of the original Contractor, for allowing the work to proceed without a new contract.

Your Committee, however, beg to observe, that the Honorable William Allan does not appear to have taken any steps in the business since the failure of the original contract, further than advancing money from time to time to the said Joseph Turton and James Crowther, on the report of Mr. John Ewart, who had been authorised to superintend the work. Your Committee further state, that the said Matthew Priestman received one thousand pounds on the said contract, and six thousand pounds more have been expended on the said Building, the greater part of which has been paid to the said Joseph Turton, who, nevertheless has failed in his sub-contract with Matthew Priestman; and the said Building is not finished; and the said Joseph Turton and Ja's. Crowther demand about £1750 beyond what they have received.

That your Committee have made every inquiry, and have ascertained that about £3,500, will still be required to complete the said Building, and pay the claims thereupon. Your Committee have examined the internal arrangements of the said Building, as also the elevation thereof, and do not consi-

der them so well adapted for the purposes for which they were intended, as they ought to have been, if the sum had not been curtailed in the manner before mentioned.

Your Committee beg to annex a statement made to Your Committee by Mr. Allan, on the subject referred to your Committee.

The Honorable Wm. Allan being called in and examined by the Committee, states, that the reason which induced him to curtail the sum for which the contract was entered into for the Parliament Buildings, was, that the Lieutenant Governor expressed himself averse, to a greater sum than five thousand pounds, being expended in such building. Mr. Allen also states, that he did not consider himself acting under the Act which appointed him and Messrs. Grant Powell and Thompson Commissioners, but under the instructions of the Lieutenant Governor. The two Houses of the Legislature in the third Session of the ninth Parliament, expressed their wish that the Building should not be undertaken with haste, but that the Hospital, in which they held their Session that year, should be taken at an annual rent for their accommodation, if it could be obtained. The Hospital however was not obtained in the manner that was desired.

The Commissioners in the first instance received a plan and estimates from a person of the name of Nixon for erecting Parliament Buildings of Stone or of Brick. The sum for the Stone was £15,000, and for the Brick building was £11,000. The two Houses however approved and adopted the plan and estimate for the larger sum, but recommended delay in commencing the work, as the finances of the Country did not seem to justify so great an expenditure at that time. Mr. Allan states that he had great reluctance in consenting to be a Commissioner about the Parliament Buildings, and although he joined in the contract with Priestman, he did not after the failure of Priestman take any part in the arrangements made by Mr. Powell with Turton and Crowther, further than paying out the money in his hands from time to time, on the certificate of Mr. Ewart, who had been appointed to superintend the Buildings, accompanied by an order from the said Grant Powell, Esq.

The Committee on Printing beg leave to report their proceedings during the present Session.

Immediately after its appointment Your Committee sent proposals to the different Printers in this Town to do the printing for the Session. They received tenders from the Guardian Office, the Gazette Office, and from Mr. Carey, and the last being the lowest was accepted.

The Printing to be done by Mr. Carey during the present Session of the House of Assembly was to be subject to the same rules and regulations, measurement and specification, as contained in his Contract for printing the Journals of last Session.

Your Committee have examined Mr. Carey's Accounts for the printing during this Session, which after deductions and additions made, amounts to £76 1 1, which is recommended to be paid.

In this Account will be found a charge for loss of time, by the delay occasioned in waiting for proofs, &c. Your Committee have made inquiry into the correctness of this charge, and have examined the Clerk, his Deputy, Messrs. Jardine and Cameron, two other Clerks of the House, and also H. C. Thomson and William Buell, Esquires, Members of the House.

Mr. Jardine, in answer to the question put to him, informed the Committee that Mr. Patrick generally examines the proofs, and in his absence the task devolves upon himself.—During this Session, he did not recollect more than one instance when there was any material delay in the comparing the proofs. This happened about ten days ago, when the Printer's messenger brought the proof at about nine o'clock at night, when Mr. Patrick had gone home, and locked up the papers; and as the key could not be found, the messenger said it made no difference, and he would call the next day. On the following morning, at about nine o'clock, the corrected proof was handed to him.—Mr. Jardine further said, that the proofs had always been attended to in preference to all other business.

REPORT

Of the Select Committee to which was referred the Petition of William Bergin and others, of the Town of York, on the subject of the Post Office Department in Upper Canada.

To the Honorable the Commons' House of Assembly.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of William Bergin and others, upon the subject of the Post Office Department of this Province, beg leave respectfully to report to your Honorable House:—

That they find an inquiry was made into the affairs of the Post Office Department in the third Session of the seventh Parliament; and the Report of that Committee not being satisfactory, the House confined itself to the consideration of the Administration of the Post Office Department, declining any inquiry relating to the authority thereof, but Resolved, "that the rates of Postage charged in Upper Canada for several years past for the conveyance of Letters have exceeded the charges authorized by Law;" and therefore an Address was presented to the Lieutenant Governor, "requesting him to represent the same to His Majesty's Ministers, and to pray their interference with the Post Master General in Great Britain to prevent the continuance of so great an evil."

Report of Select Committee on Petition of Wm. Bergin and others.

No information was obtained by that Committee, as appears to your Committee, as to how far the present system is sanctioned by Law, and whether, and in what manner, the same can be beneficially altered.

Again, in the second Session of the eighth Parliament a Committee was appointed "to inquire into the state of the public Posts for the conveyance of Letters throughout this Province, how far the present system was sanctioned by Law, and whether, and in what manner, the same could be beneficially altered;" who, after long and carefully examining Acts of Parliament of Great Britain, relative to the subject of the Post Office Department, and also examining Mr. Allan and others connected with the Post Office Department, to whom they propounded such questions as they thought would lead to a knowledge of the affairs of the Post Office Department, the authority under which the rates on Letters for their conveyance through this Province was charged, the amount of Inland Postage, of Foreign Postage, and of Packet or Ship Postage; as also the expense of transmitting the several Mails through this Province, and the amount of Money transmitted out of this Province by the Post Office Department, and to what purposes applied; and upon that inquiry the said

APPENDIX. Committee were of opinion, that the same was not authorized or sanctioned by Law; wherefore, the Committee submitted the following Resolution for adoption by the House:—

“Resolved, That the present system of public Posts for the conveyance of Letters within this Province has grown into use without the sanction of Law, and it is therefore expedient a Bill be brought in establishing public Posts and fixing rates and postage of Letters and Packets, for the purpose of raising a permanent Revenue, applicable solely to the improvement of the Post Roads throughout the Province, in such manner as may from time to time be directed by an Act or Acts of the Legislature of the Province, hereafter to be passed for this purpose.”

Your Committee also find, that in the first Session of the tenth Parliament a Committee was again appointed to inquire into the state of the Post Office in this Province, who made a voluminous Report of their correspondence and examination of witnesses, among whom was the Deputy Post Master (Mr. Howard, of York,) and notes by Mr. Stayner, the Deputy Post Master General of British North America, upon the questions and answers made by Mr. Howard before the Committee. In one of these notes Mr. Stayner says, that “all printed papers, when mailed, pay a penny a sheet, and printed circular letters pay letter postage,” and when remarking upon *overcharged* letters, he says, “if a letter is received by a Post Master *over rated*, the party to whom it is addressed, upon affording reasonable proof of the fact, to the Post Master, will receive back the amount of the overcharge.” In answer to the question put to Mr. Howard, “what is the Gross amount of Revenue in Upper and Lower Canada respectively?” He gives the following explanation:—

“In noticing this question, I think it right to say, that postage on letters from every part of the British Provinces is unavoidably blended together in my reasons, and that there are no means of analyzing those accounts, and of ascertaining what portion accrues in each individual Province; and the fact that the postage on Letters brought by British Packets forms part of the aggregate Revenue does away the possibility of ascertaining what is the amount of Provincial Revenue collectively. I mention these facts to shew the impracticability of answering this question, if I were at liberty to attempt it; but, at the same time, I beg to say, that I should not feel myself authorized to afford the information required without the sanction of the Post Master General.”

That Committee were decidedly of opinion, that the Provincial Legislature should assume the management of the Post Office Department within Upper Canada; and they recommended the immediate passage of a Law for its regulation. They entertained no doubt whatever, but that His Majesty's Government possess full power and authority to appoint Post Masters and Carriers for the delivery and safe conduct of such correspondence as it may be thought necessary by them to carry on with the constituted authorities of this Colony; but they cannot admit, that any authority, other than the Provincial Legislature, has a power to impose a tax upon the correspondence of the inhabitants, or that any rate of Postage or Post Regulation of the Imperial Parliament, can have the force of Law in Upper Canada: they hold all attempts that may be made by persons deputed by Government to convey Letters and collect Postage, to fine, or otherwise punish the inhabitants of this Province for sending their Letters by Steam Boats, Stages, or Travellers, or such other conveyance as may better suit their convenience, to be unjust and illegal; because the British Parliament has, by a Solemn Act, forever renounced the right of imposing taxes upon the Colonies, or of appropriating their Revenues without the consent of the Provincial Legislatures.

2nd. Your Committee are of opinion that the great and important question for them to consider is, whether the present rates of postage on letters be established by Law, and upon this question they proceed to report, that the Revenue of the Post Office Department from its earliest establishment in England, has been appropriated to the purpose of the general Expenditure of the Revenue of the Kingdom, though subjected to particular annuities at different times. The Statute passed in the ninth year of the Reign of Queen Anne, makes a special appropriation of a portion of this Revenue; and the twelfth clause of the same Act, directs the unappropriated, one-third, to be at the disposal of Parliament; and the Statute passed in the forty-first year of Geo. the 3rd, directs the Revenue to be applied to various purposes, for the service of Great Britain; the rates established by this Act being avowedly levied for raising the necessary supplies to defray His Majesty's necessary expenses of the public service, and for making a permanent addition to the public Revenue.

This uniform appropriation of the Post Office Revenue has been to the service of the Parent State, and in no instance, within the investigation of your Committee, to the use of the Colonies or Plantations. The Act passed in the eighteenth

year of His late Majesty George the 3rd, entitled, “An Act for removing all doubts and apprehensions concerning taxation by the Parliament of Great Britain in any of the Colonies and Plantations in North America and the West Indies, and repealing, &c.” it is declared, that the Parliament of Great Britain will not impose any duty, tax or assessment, whatever, payable in any of His Majesty's Colonies, Provinces and Plantations, in North America or the West Indies, except only such duty as it may be expedient to impose for the regulation of Commerce, the nett produce of such duties to be always paid and applied to and for the use of the Colony, Province or Plantation, in which the same shall be respectively levied, in such manner as other duties collected by the authority of the respective General Courts or General Assemblies of such Colonies, Provinces, or Plantations, are ordinarily paid and applied. Moreover the Act passed in the 31st of His late Majesty, Geo. 3rd, giving to this Province its Constitution, in its forty-sixth clause, recognizing the aforesaid 18th of the King, enacts the reservation of certain powers to the British Parliament, viz.—the power to enact any Law that hath, or shall at any time be made by the British Parliament for establishing regulations or prohibitions, or for imposing, levying, or collecting Duties for the regulation of Navigation, or for the regulation of Commerce, to be carried on between the two Provinces, or between either of the said Provinces and any other part of His Majesty's Dominions, or between either of these Provinces and any Foreign Country or State, or for appointing or directing the payment of drawbacks of such Duties so imposed—withholding from His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, any power or authority, by and with the advice of the Legislative Councils and Assemblies, to vary or repeal any such Law or Laws, or any part thereof, or in any manner to prevent or obstruct the execution thereof;—amongst which powers so reserved, nothing appears to your Committee in the least to imply a reservation of the power of enforcing the collection or the levying of any rate or tax for the post or carriage of Letters through this Province. Your Committee further remark, that this very clause, in the reservation of these powers, has these remarkable words—“subject, nevertheless, to the conditions hereinbefore recited, with respect to the application of any Duties which may be imposed for that purpose;” that is to say,—that if the British Parliament, under these reserved powers, by any Law for the regulation of Commerce, levied any Duty, such Duty must be applied for the use of the Colony, in the same manner as the other Duties collected by the authority of the Provincial Legislatures are ordinarily paid and applied.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully beg leave to Report, that, not considering the Post Office Establishment a Commercial Regulation, or in anywise within the exception of the 46th clause of Geo. 3, chap. 31, and that the proceeds are applicable to purposes of general expenditure of the United Kingdom, and not in any way, to the knowledge of your Committee, to the use of the Province, nor hath this Legislature in anywise authorised the levying, nor applied the proceeds thereof to any use whatsoever—they are of opinion, that the present system of levying Rates on the Post and Carriage of Letters throughout this Province is not sanctioned by Law.

Your Committee closely examined the Statute passed in the ninth year of the Reign of Queen Anne, and the 41st Geo. 3, as the Laws, most probably, thought by the Post Master General as his authority for the practise; and in this part of the subject your Committee, considering the 9th of Anne as not even by its own provisions applying to this Colony, and as repealed by the 18th and 31st Geo. 3, as before mentioned, and that the 41st Geo. 3, chap. 7, directly repeals the rates of Postage under the Statute of Anne, in express words, in the first clause, and re-enacts new rates in the second clause within Great Britain; and in this Act, which professedly repeals the rates for the Colonies in the sixth clause of the Statute of Anne, there is no re-enactment of rates for the Colonies, nor does the 18th Geo. 3, preserve those rates in any words expressive of such intention, the twelfth clause preserving all matters relative to the Post Office not repealed by itself, cannot be construed to preserve the Statute of Anne, relative to these Colonies, or if it does, it can only preserve the seventh clause, or power of fixing Posts without any power to fix rates, which is absurd: wherefore, the Statute 9th of Anne is not in force in this Province—neither is the Statute 41st Geo. 3, in force in this Province,—because the 31st of the same Reign is against it, and the appropriation of the Revenue in the fourteenth clause of this Law, the 41st Geo. 3rd, makes it illegal in the Post Master General to enforce it in this Province.

Your Committee find the Statute passed in the 45th year of Geo. 3rd, imposing additional rates to those of 41st, adds a Packet Postage of one penny on Colonial Letters, and in the next clause, adds a further rate of one penny on Inland Postage: the 41st Geo. 3rd is silent as to Inland Postage on

APPENDIX. Colonial Letters, and as this Act, the 45th Geo. 3rd, gives these as additional rates, it must be the Inland conveyance in England; as, for example, a Letter from Quebec pays a Packet Postage of a penny,—it arrives at Falmouth, and for its conveyance thence to London, another penny, the inland additional rate is added to the usual Postage from Falmouth to London, under the 41st Geo. the 3rd, and even this additional rate is appropriated to the General Revenue of the United Kingdom. The 5th Geo. 3, Chap. 25, enacts rates of Inland Postage in America—but the 37th of the same reign, Chap. 18, repeals the same without reservation, therefore, it cannot, at this time, be in force in Upper Canada. The 52nd Geo. 3rd, Chap. 88, grants additional rates to those of the 41st and 45th Geo. 3rd, and these additional rates are given on Letters within Great Britain, to and from Ireland—to and from His Majesty's Dominions and Plantations in America, but nothing is said of this additional rate within the Colonies or Plantations in America—and to and from parts beyond seas, whether within His Majesty's Dominions or not within His Majesty's Dominions.

This last additional rule cannot be strained to Inland Postage in the American Colonies, because the previous clause prescribes the rate as "to and from," and because whatever may be said as to the power of the Post Master General to impose Postage within His Majesty's Dominions, he cannot charge Inland Postage out of His Majesty's Dominions, on Letters,—so that this rate, as well as that prescribed for the Colonies, can only apply to the Packet postage, or transport by sea; and the second clause, which excepts Guernsey, Jersey, and the Isle of Man from this additional rate, saves, from this exception, the Inland Postage in Great Britain, and this rate is applied for the Revenue for defraying charges of the loan.

In further proof of the correctness of the above conclusion, your Committee remark, that the 4th Geo. 3rd, making perpetual 6th Geo. 2nd, which imposes duties for the encouragement of the Trade of the Sugar Plantations, professes to raise a Revenue for defraying the expenses of defending, protecting, and securing the same; that the 14th Geo. 3rd Chap. 88, in like manner professes to levy the Duties in it imposed, to establish a fund towards further defraying the charges of the administration of Justice, and support of the Civil Government of the Province of Quebec in North America; thus the Duties raised by British Statutes for the regulation of Commerce are brought to account for the use of such Province for which such Duties are levied, under the provisions of the 13th and 31st Statutes of Geo. 3rd, while the Post Office Revenue, by the Statutes imposing and raising it, is applied in aid of the general Revenue of the United Kingdom; which indisputably satisfies the mind of your Committee that, the Legislature of the Mother Country never contemplated the raising a tax by inland Postage, in the Province of Upper Canada.

Your Committee are of opinion, from the facts before stated, that the Legislature of this Province have full power and authority to legislate upon the subject of the Post Office Department, and to make such regulations respecting the same as they may deem expedient or necessary, for the better regulation of the Department in this Province; and they have, therefore, proposed a Bill, which they herewith submit for the consideration of your honorable House.

Your Committee would further beg leave to suggest the propriety of your honorable House addressing His Majesty on the subject of the Post Office Establishment in this Province, setting forth to His Majesty the great inconvenience of having a department, in which every individual in the Province is more or less concerned, placed under the control of any person residing without the same, and in no way subject to the control of its Legislature; whose very extensive patronage and interest render him liable to misinformation, to the exercise of the power vested in him in a manner foreign to the wishes of the Inhabitants of the Province, as is at this moment felt in the high rates of inland Postage for Letters, and in the regulations of the Department relative to Printed Circulars, and in regard to the payment for Newspapers at the Office where they are mailed, or subjecting them to the charge of Letter Postage;—a circumstance which has repeatedly occurred during the present Session of the Legislature; and the inconvenience attending the present arrangements as to the time of closing the mails in certain places; and assuring His Majesty, that should the monies accruing to the Department within the Province be found insufficient to cover the expenses necessarily incurred in the establishment and support of the same, the deficiency will be provided from the General Revenues of the Province, and humbly representing, that if the Revenue arising from the Department is more than adequate for its support, an impropriety exists in collecting the same without the consent of the Legislature of the Province, and of applying it to other purposes than those for the immediate benefit of the Country, in which it is raised.

APPENDIX. Your Committee find, that in the Report of the Committee of the House of Commons in Lower Canada, upon the subject of the Post Office Department, on the examination of John Neilson, Esq. a Member of the Committee, he delivered in a return printed by order of the House of Commons, 21st February 1828, in which Sir Francis Freeling, Secretary to the Post Office Department, gives as authority for the establishment of the various Post Offices in America, the 37th George 3rd. Chap. 18, 45th George 3rd Chap. 11, and 52nd George 3rd. Chap. 88, but as none of these Acts authorises the raising a Revenue upon the Post Office Department, they cannot be construed to authorise the Collection of Postage in this Province.

SECOND REPORT

Of the Select Committee to whom were referred the Petitions on Grievances.

TO THE HONORABLE THE COMMONS' HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The Committee to whom were referred the Petition of the people of Vaughan, and other Petitions on the same subject—

BEG LEAVE TO MAKE A SECOND REPORT :

The gracious relinquishment by His Majesty of the control of the revenues arising under the Act 14 Geo. 3rd, places all the duties and taxes levied on the people of this Province at the control of their Representatives in Parliament, with the exception of the monies received and expended by the Post Office Department.

Your Committee have no positive information whether the revenue arising from this source is considerable, or otherwise, nor whether the receipts exceed the necessary expenditure; yet they conceive that the principle which has been recognised by His Majesty is applicable to this branch of revenue as well as to those arising under the 14th Geo. 3rd.

As a Committee has been, during the present Session, appointed to inquire in the state of the Department, your Committee consider it unnecessary to do more than to recommend to your Honorable House to address His Majesty, setting forth the view taken by your Honorable House, previous to the passing any bill upon this subject.

The Crown Lands are, as your Committee have already stated, in their first report, vested in His Majesty, for the use of His Subjects generally, and not for any particular portion of them exclusively:—consequently, the control of the fund arising from this source cannot, so long as Upper Canada retains the great advantage of being a Colony of Great Britain, be transferred to the Provincial Parliament, without the voluntary consent of our Gracious Sovereign.

Your Committee have not attempted to ascertain how these petitions originated, or by what means or influence the several Petitioners were induced to lay their complaints before this House. The petitions were presented in a constitutional and Parliamentary form, and whenever any portion of the people of Upper Canada address their Representatives in a respectful and proper manner, it is the opinion of your Committee that it is the duty of your Honorable House not to inquire the means by which such complaints are made known, but to examine whether any real ground of complaint exists. From the importance of many of the subjects contained in the petitions, your Committee regret that they have not had sufficient time during the sitting of the Legislature, to give them so much investigation and consideration as they deserve.

Your Committee believe that petitions to His Majesty, embracing the same subjects as those before your Committee, were signed at the same time, and generally by the same Petitioners, and such petitions were, your Committee are informed, transmitted to His Majesty before this House had an opportunity of hearing, much less of redressing, their complaints.

There are two points of the petitions, respecting statute labor, local assessments, taxes, rates and imposts levied for District purposes to be placed in qualified Electors at town meetings,

That the people may, by their Representatives, have the control of all monies whatsoever coming into the hands of the Government, whether arising from taxes, duties, or Crown Lands.

and that the Executive Council of this Colony may be composed of persons possessing the confidence of the people, which your Committee have not had time to consider; but the Committee feel convinced that your Honorable House will give attention to the several complaints of the Petitioners, at an early period of next Session.

REPORT

Of the Committee on the Petition of John Carey.

The Committee on the Petition of John Carey, to whom the said petition has been referred, have procured an account of the Petitioner of the losses said to have been sustained by him in Printing the Journals of last Session, in consequence of the alleged violation of the Contract entered into between the Printing Committee and the Petitioner, by the Petitioner having been compelled by the Clerk of the House to execute the work in a different manner, and at an earlier period, than was required by the said Committee.

RESPECTFULLY REPORT:—

That having inquired into the different items, cannot recommend that any of them should be entertained, with the exception of that in which a charge is made for compressing matter, and making alterations after the proof sheet had been struck off; and as it is impossible for your Committee to ascertain the exact amount of such extra labor, have agreed, (after examining certain practical Printers) to recommend that the Petitioner be allowed the sum of twenty-five pounds, over and above what has already been paid him, as a remuneration for all extra labor in consequence of the alterations, &c. which might not have been foreseen by the Petitioner, and which might have caused him to tender for a less price than he would have proposed, had such alterations been anticipated.

Your Committee append a Memorandum of what took place between the Clerk of the Assembly and Mr. Carey, subsequent to the Close of the Session, by which it appears the petitioner acceded to the proposition of the Clerk, to vary the period of completing certain portions of the work at earlier periods than was expressed in the specification, and do not impute any blame to the Clerk for the course pursued, as under the impression, that the report of the Printing Committee had not been adopted by the House, he was justified in not acting upon it. The Committee make the suggestion to the House of granting the said sum of £25 to the petitioner to be added to the Contingent account of the House.

The Items for loss sustained as charged in Nos. 1, 2 and 4, are, in the opinion of your Committee not to be entertained as every facility was given in examining the proofs during Office hours, and the Petitioner, it is proven, intended to discontinue his journal "The Observer" for a time, in the event of his obtaining the printing for which he made the Tender.

Copy of a Journal kept by the Clerk during the recess, and submitted by him to the Select Committee to whom was referred the Petition of John Carey.

On Monday the 25th March, the Clerk addressed a note to Mr. Carey as follows:—

"The Clerk of Assembly is desirous of seeing Mr. Carey, on the subject of his proposal for printing the Journal of the

Assembly of last Session, and requests of Mr. Carey to call on him at his Office in the course of the morning.

Monday, 21st March, 1831.

Mr. Carey attended the office in a few minutes, when the Clerk acquainted him that the proceedings of the Select Committee under which Mr. Carey's proposal was given and accepted, afforded no sanction for him, the Clerk, to act upon, as their reports were not presented to the House.

Nevertheless, he would act upon Mr. Carey's proposal, provided he, Mr. Carey, would agree to have the following conditions inserted in the Bond, in addition to those stated in the proposals of the Committee, viz:—"That one estimated half of the said work to be completed and delivered at the office of the Clerk of Assembly on or before first day of July now next ensuing, and the residue thereof to be delivered in equal proportions, as nearly as may be, on the first day of the months of August, September and October, next following, respectively."—Also, to that part of the Committee's proposal which stated that no extra charge would be allowed for printing from manuscript copy, the Clerk proposed to add the following, viz:—"nor for any other description of work whatever, not mentioned in the proposals;—and it is clearly understood, before the execution of the within written Bond, that the Contractor, nor any Agent in his behalf, or in behalf of any other person or persons, is never, in any shape or manner whatever, to make application to the House of Assembly for a greater remuneration for the labor and materials purchased and used in printing the said Journals than is specified in the Contract for printing the same."

To these conditions Mr. Carey agreed, and then retired.

The same day the papers were placed by the Clerk in the hands of the Attorney General, with instructions to draw the Bond, which was promised to be ready on Wednesday morning.

On Wednesday Morning the Clerk called and took up the Bond, and immediately after addressed the following note to Mr. Carey.

"The Clerk of Assembly acquaints Mr. Carey that the Bond is drawn up, and will be ready for execution in the Clerk's Office from two till four this afternoon."

Wednesday, 23rd March, 1831.

The Messenger took this note and returned in a few Minutes and said that he had delivered it to Mr. Carey, who told him that he feared he could not bring his Sureties together to the Office during the day, but that he would bring them as soon as he could meet with them. The Clerk sent the Messenger back to Mr. Carey to acquaint him that he desired to see the parties all present together to execute the Bond, and that he would be satisfied if they presented themselves for that purpose on to-morrow.

On Thursday at noon the Clerk addressed the following note to Mr. Carey:

"The Clerk of Assembly acquaints Mr. Carey that the Bond shall be kept ready for execution until twelve o'clock to-morrow.

"Should Mr. Carey not present himself with his Sureties and execute the Bond before that hour the Clerk will act on the proposal of some other Bidder.

"Clerk of Assembly's Office,
Thursday, 24th March, 1831, noon."

In a few minutes after Mr. Carey received this note he came to the Clerk's Office and said he yesterday understood from the Messenger that he might come to execute the Bond when convenient to him.

The Clerk observed, that this arose from Mr. Carey's having returned a verbal answer to his note—and he then requested of Mr. Carey to communicate in future in writing.

Mr. Carey stated that he was not then well, and the day being wet he was afraid to go into Town this afternoon for his Sureties. The Clerk said he did not desire to press Mr. Carey through any difficulty: he was only anxious to have the business proceeded in without unnecessary loss of time; that if to-morrow morning should prove wet also, and Mr. Carey would communicate with him at 12 to-morrow, the Clerk would, if necessary, wait till 12 next day.

On Friday, 25th March, the Clerk was confined at home by illness, and Mr. Carey, with his Sureties, attended in the Clerk's Office, and in presence of Mr. Patrick executed the Bond.

On the 14th April the first sheet was delivered in the Office.

On the first week of October the last sheet was delivered.

SECOND REPORT

That they have carefully examined the Accounts sent down by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and find, that of the sum of £20,000 granted by this House at the last Session of the Legislature, there has been expended the sum of about £11,000, and that there still remains a sum of about £9,000 to be expended and accounted for.

From the Documents already received, it appears that the high state of the waters in some Districts, particularly the Western, during the Summer, and the severity of the weather in the Fall, put a stop to Road work generally, throughout the Province, at an earlier period than usual; and to these causes, in the opinion of your Committee, it may be fairly attributed, that the remaining accounts have not yet been sent in. Your Committee are therefore not without hope, that by the ensuing Session of the Legislature, the application of the balance at present outstanding in the hands of Commissioners, will be faithfully accounted for to this House.

Your Committee have also prepared an abstract statement of the monies expended, unexpended, and unaccounted for, which is herewith submitted to the consideration of your Honorable House.
