Prior to the commencement of the

Seal fishery in any year, the owners of sealing steamers engaging therein shall, if possible, cause the estimated amount of crews' shares based upon the average share earned by the crews of sealing steamers sailing from the Colony to the Seal fishery in the previous five years, to be insured, and if no such insurance be procurable such insurance as may be etfected, and the premiums for the insurance shall be a charge against the whole produce of the voyage of such steamers. Anv insurance money received, in respect of the vovage of any particular steamer shall be equally divided amongst the crew in the same manner as shares in the voyage. Owners failing to procure

such insurance shall themselves

be liable for the amount.

(7) The right of property in seal pelts arising from the killing of seals and taking the pelts thereof into possession shall cease if the pelts be not taken on board the steamer by whose crew the seals were killed on the day of such killing. Thereafter the pelts shall belong to the owners of the sealing steamer on which the said pelts are put or whose crew or some member thereof have actual physical possession of the pelts.

(8) The Workmen's Compensation Act 8 Ed. VII., Cap. 5, shall apply to employment on board a sealing steamer. Injury by or from unusually severe exposure while on the ice shall be held to be injury by accident within the meaning of

The Governor-in-Council may appoint a Board of Inspectors composed of three ship-builders, and make regulations for the performance of their duties, which shall have the force and effect of law

(10) No Sealing steamer shall be clear ed outwards for the sealfishery in any year without a certificate from the Board of Inspectors that she has within one month of the date of the clearance been inspected and found seaworthy and well fitted for the sealfishery.

(11) The Governor-in-Council may appoint a Board of Examiners consisting of three persons having not less than ten years' experience as masters of sealing steamers, and make-rules and regulations providing for examinations which shall have the force and effect of law after publication in the Royal

12) No person shall be employed in any sealing steamer as second hand, or master watch, or Master without a certificate of competency from the Board of Examiners, under a penalty of five thousand dollars for each unqualified person, payable by the owner of the steamer.

13) If two or more members of any crew of a sealing steamer shall die from exposure due to negligence on the part of the captain, while on a sealing voyage, the master shall not afterwards be em ployed as such in any sealing owners of any steamer so employing such masters.

(14) Any penalty provided by this Act may be sued for by any member of any steamer's crew in connection with which any offence hereunder has been committed, or hy any other person in his own name who has been authorised so to do by any member of a crew.

OUR POINT OF VIEW

"Current Price"

RESIDENT COAKER has sent the following circular letter to the F.P.U. Councils in Conception Bay re Current price Labrador

Dear Friends,-At the Convention Conception Bay delegates brought up the matter of the current price for Labrador fish shipped off the coast this season and asked to have the matter tested before the Courts. I have consulted Mr. Morine and he advises submitting a test case before the Court here, and I ask all the Councils which can produce receipts, as names of witnesses ready to give evidence should such be necessary.

If original receipts cannot be sent correct certified copies may be forwarded but persons concerned will have to swear to them if needed.

The Councils will please note that they will be expected to pay the expenses of any witness that may be selected from a particular Council. This means that if Carbonear sends two witnesses, the Carbonear Council will be expected to pay the expenses of such witnesses called upon to do so.

The sooner the matter stall have been decided the better. Apparently the judical meaning of the current price of Labrador fish has never been decided. The existing conditions respecting the shipping of fish off the coast are anything but satisfactory. I would add that Councils can send receipts of non-union men as well as Union and can arrange to place the evidence of any shipper whether Union or non-union. Kindly let me have the information as speedily as possible.

Mr. Morine's letter inreference to this matter reads as follows:

W. F. Coaker, Esq.

Dear Sir,-As you are aware, in very many cases fish was bought and sold on the Labrador for the "current price," and disputes have arisen as to the legal meaning of these words, and as to the prices which have, in fact, been paid.

As to the legal meaning of the words, I do not think that any satisfaction can be given without a decision of the Supreme Court being obtained. As to the prices which have, the Empire. in fact, been paid, a decision by a magistrate might probably be obtained with less cost than by proceedings in the Supreme Court. I am, therefore, of opinion that an action should be brought before the Stipendiary Magistrate in this city, and that all the evidence obtainable as to the

prices should be given. I shall, therefore, be obliged to you if you will take steps to find out, as fully as possible, what prices have been paid, by whom, and to what persons, and in each case whether the receipt for the fish was expressed to be for "current price," or "as much as is paid on the cosat," or "at whatever price is paid on the coast," or "at the current price paid on the coast," or what form of expression was used on the receipt. Will you kindly ask your Councils to obtain this information for you and send it forward as

quickly as possible. I need not point out to you how very important it is to have this question of "current price" settled once and for all, if possible. The buyers on the Labrador, sometimes principals, sometimes agents, are hot certain what price to offer. The fisherman has to put off his fish because he wants supplies, or because he cannot afford to hold the fish. The custom has been for the exporting merchants in St. John's to decide at the end of the season what price they would give, and the only surprising thing is that more difficulty has not arisen. they have done and doing for our Some means of settling this matter should be devised at once. Asked for Leave. On Thursday morning I called on board said ship and asked for leave for my son to return home. I found the doctor in sympathy with my request, telling me to return to the ship again. At 12 o'clock noon he said he would see the Captain and give he a

reply on my return. At noon I returned to the ship and orders were given for leave of absence for my son until his hand was better, when he was to report himself on board the ship.

Was Arrested. My son and I arrived at home Friday, 6th inst. On the following Friday, 13th, Will Gardner was leaving for Trinity to get his hand dressed by Dr. Johnson. He was telegraphed by Sergt. 

> Munich, Nov. 19-(By messenger to London)—Austria has its sunken road like Waterloo. The Honved Cavalry, Vienna's bluest blood organization, butchered itself in a hollow in Galicia, on October 4.

> In charging over unknown ground, they piled into a deep ditch. The bodies of the 900 men were transformed into a bloody mass with the bodies of their horses. All the horrors o the charge at Waterloo were repeated. Under the hoofs of the oncoming hor ses, the dying men writhed and trie in vain to escape being crushed into

Within ten minutes, what had been Vienna's proudest cavalry regiment was only a gigantic mass of mixed men and horse flesh.

The officer who ordered the charge killed himself.
