

Huns Still Have Do Huns Meditate a Fresh Drive Upon Calais? Deliberate Camtruction Carried Out by Germans in Retreat

British Headquarters in France, March 19-via London, March 20-(From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press)—The deliberate character of the destruction wrought by the Germans before their withdrawal from Peronne is painfully evident in the once beautiful avenue of trees leading to the railway station. These trees were untouched by shell fire, but each one was hack-ed in two with axes and the gashes and chips show that the work was done within the last few days. The eautiful gardens of the outlying ouses were also wrecked and every fruit tree within several miles of the town was sawed two thirds of the way through and then broken down.

Pedigree of the Horse

His Ancestry Dates Back Over Three Million Years

No king of the realm, no matter how purple be his raiment, can trace his ancestry as far back as the horse. This animal has the longest pedigree on record; one probably over three million years old, dating back to what is known as the Eocene age, thousands of years before the coming of man. His genealogical tree is shown in the National Museum at Washington, where a series of feet and skulls depict some of his more

important ancestors.

The horse of the Eocene or his for bear rather, was known as Eohippus, or dawn horse. He was about the size of a fox, standing a little more than one foot high. Echippus lived in North America, where he ran light footedly over the Tertiary rocks on his well developed four-toed front feet and his three-toed hind feet. His teeth were not like those of a modern horse either, but were short-crowned. While scientists are unable to tell us just how long the mane was, if he had any, or the color of his hide they do know the facts mentioned above, for his fossil remains have been found in the rock strata known as the lower Eocene, which is supposed to date back about three milin North America, where he ran light


