Visit to Masonic Grand Lodge.

Report of J. B. Davison, Esq., P. M., delegate from St George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., to the Worshipful Master, Officers and Brethren of St George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Having received my proxy papers I boarded the evening train on the 10th of June for Halifax en route for Pictou to attend the then coming session of G. L., and in order to be present at the laying of the corner stone of a new church about being erected at Westville (to which Grand Lodge had been invited.)

I boarded the evening train, as before stated, and left Halifax next morning by the C. P. R. at 7 o'clock and arrived at Truro at 8:40, remained there until nine o'clock, then left for Westville at which place we arrived at about 11 o'clock, and as the trains were then running for the first few days on the new time table everything in connection with the laying of the corner stone seemed to be disarranged in consequence and no one seemed to know at what time the ceremony would commence.

We soon found out that a festival of some kind was to be held, the proceeds of which was to be devoted to the finishing of the church, and the Masonic body, it appeared, had been invited for the double purpose of laying a corner stone and to be an attraction to draw patronage to the festival.

Your proxy, with a number of others, took dinner at the Dufferin House and afterward repaired to the Masonic Hall, where a procession was formed and marched through the principal streets of the town, to the music of the cornet and drum, to the grounds of what was to be St Bee's church.

The laying of the corner stone being completed, the Masonic body was marched back, through the same gateway they had entered at, to the hall and dispersed. After waiting an hour or two the train came thundering along and we all embarked for Pictou town, where we arrived in due time.

The ride from Westville to Pictou town is a very pleasing one. Pictou harbor, a magnificent sheet of water, gushes into full view, and the pretty town of Pictou is seen in the distance. Away to the west are seen the green mountains; and to the east beautiful fields and rich vegetation.

Arriving at the depot we speedily made for a hotel, and as your proxy was a stranger in the town he followed the crowd with the hope of finding suitable accommodation and in a few moments arrived at the Revere House; but a sufficient number had arrived there before as to fill the house to overflowing, consequently your proxy, with seven others, started out into the town, not knowing whether to go in search of lodgings. After making several unsuccessful attempts to get accommodation we reached the "Weldens House," kept by Bro. Geo. T. Geldert, and on making application there, were received and accommodated. We found this house to be all that we could desire, with attentive waiters, hospitable nests, good tables, clean beds, and nothing stronger to drink than "Adam's Ale," and near to the railway station, steamboat landing and the Masonic Hall.

After refreshing the inner man with a substantial meal we sauntered forth into the town and were joined by a resident who seemed to take great pleasure in showing us around. After visiting some of the more important private buildings and grounds we found ourselves in front of the celebrated Pictou Academy and on some of us remarking that we should like to see the interior as well as the exterior our guide kindly offered to gain admittance for us, which he had no difficulty in doing.

It being near night and having a strong desire to reach the top of the building we did not remain below to visit the various apartments. The museum however attracted our attention and we spent some time in examining natural history specimens, of which there were some very fine ones.


