A FATAL ACCIDENT.

David Wilson Killed by Falling from the Roof of T. G. Loggie's House.

A very sad and fatal accident occurred at T. G. Loggie's residence, corner church and evidently struck on his head and shoulder. He was on the ground probably five minutes before he was discovered unconscious, with blood 'oozing out of his ears and nose. He was at once carried into W. T. Whitehead's residence, doctors were promptly on the spot, and he lay there nearly an hour when it was thought advisable to remove him to Victoria hospital. A stretcher was prepared, tender hands arranged the poor fellow's temporary bed, and strong

arms carried him to the hospital His wife had arrived before this and was almost distracted with grief. From the first, Wilson's injuries appeared likely to prove fatal. His collar bone was broken and it was believed that the base of the skull was fractured. He never recovered complete consciousness. He was able to recognize his wife for a moment and his pastor, Rev. F. C. Hartley, but that was all. He was kept constantly under morphine and whenever its effects commenced to wear off he would struggle as if in intense pain. Dr. McLearn, the attending physician had some hope of his patient's life Wednesday morning, but it was very faint. The deceased was a popular young man and his death is a great shock to his family and friends. He was a good living, religious fellow, a prominent worker in the Free Baptist church, and a very near friend to Rev. Mr. Hartley. ITALY'S BIG EARTHQUAKE.

Reports of disasters caused by the earthquakes in southern Italy, show that there has been great loss of life. Procopio, a village of 1,200 inhabitants, has been obliterated. Virtually all the buildings were thown into ruins. The number of deaths is not known, but in one church fortyseven persons were buried alive under fallen walls. 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
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
