The Premier's Political Campaign.

We wonder whether the speech of the Premier at the opening of the Agricultural Exhibition at St. George's will be published in verbatim form and afterwards circulated in pamphlet form as a campaign document, as was done with the speech delivered at the Burtin Exhibition. We should have taken no exception to the Premier's speech at that exhibition had it been confined to the matter of Agriculture, treated from an administrative standpoint, but when it ranged over the whole field of partisan politics and treated of Agriculture from a partisan standpoint, and embodied a financial dope on the branch railway policy, on which we have commented in our last two issues, we protested. Nay more, we objected to Agricultural Exhibitions being used for party purposes, and especially objected to the circulation in such a speech of that issue of false suggestion and flat misrepresentation, which we quote again to expose the astounding dishonesty of it:

"By a successful loan of four million dollars at three and a half per cent, which I raised last year in London, at ninety-seven and a half, the highest rate ever obtained by the Colony before, we have been able to build all these railway branches, and pay the interest on them out of our regular revenue, and after all this we still have a surplus left, which we have given back to the people in the shape of all the public utilities which I have named."

We have already pointed out that the Premier made no mention of the branch from Stephenville Crossing to Port au Port at Burtin, but that Sir Edward is pledged to it is evidenced by an article which appeared in the Western Star last year. In reference to the Branch Railway policy, the Western Star said:

"This step in the fulfilment of a wise and progressive policy will be hailed with pleasure by the people on the north side of Bay St. George, who have been promised a branch line from Stephenville Crossing to Port au Port, (a distance of about twenty miles) which will open up for settlement and cultivation a large belt of excellent agricultural land. At the same time it will place within easy reach of the settlers on the most distant parts of the peninsula of Port au Port a direct and rapid means of transportation for their products whether of the sea or of the land, and thus develop the resources of the long neglected section of the West Coast. When Sir Edward Morris was in this district in September last, a Star representative had the pleasure of an interview with him, and in speaking of Bay St. George generally he said: "What would be the making of this country (north side of Bay St. George) would be a small branch railway from Stephenville Crossing to Port au Port. It would be fed by all the settlements between Cape St. George and Stephenville Crossing and ter-

minus Port au Port and the immense quantities of produce which would be raised here would be a great feeder to the railway." That this enlightened view of the best, surest and if it might be said the only possible agency in the development of all the natural capabilities of this large portion of the district is also held by our esteemed representative, Mr. Downey, may be best proven by his 1908 manifesto to his electorate.

A branch line of railway to Port au Port was a strong plank in his political platform, and coupled with the promise of a bonus for land clearing was a potent factor in his election at Bay St. George.

Although a verbatim report of the Premier's speech has not yet been published, sufficient has been published to show that the Premier made a public speech there, and there is nothing left for us to do but to consider it as part of the political campaign which Sir Edward has been carrying on for some time.

As for Mr. Downey, the financial statements already tabled in the House of Assembly show that he is making a big bonanza out of his connection with the Agricultural and other policies of the Government. But a period will be put to the bonanza he and other Plenickers are getting out of the Plenic Party when the electors get a chance of saying the word.

"Citizen" is Called an Assassin.

Some months ago an application was made by a Solicitor on behalf of the owner for permission to repair one of the houses on Casey Street. It appears that the street is narrow at this point, and that some houses stand out from the others. Permission to repair was not granted, but the Secretary was directed to visit the place and report. At the meeting which took place on Friday, the 13th inst., a plan drawn up in the City Engineer's Office was tabled. The plan sets forth a scheme of street widening, to effect which certain purchases would have to be made at a cost of \$1,380 and certain lands exchanged. Councillor Ryan proposed and Councillor Channing seconded a motion to give the Secretary authority to carry out the scheme.

Councillor Mullaly said that the Secretary had been authorized to inquire but not to fix a price on the land; and now that he had found out from the plan one of the Councillors was interested in the property he considered it highly desirable that a disinterested party should be appointed. Further, the Mayor had not seen the plan and the matter should not be proceeded with in his absence. Yesterday the letter signed "Citizen" appeared in the Evening Telegram, pointing out that Councillor Martin was interested in the property.

At the Council meeting last night Councillor Ryan denounced the writer of the letter as an assassin, and charged Councillor Mullaly with being the writer of it. Councillor Mullaly repudiated the charge and declared that he had not seen it, and knew nothing of it. In another part of this issue will be found a letter from Councillor Mullaly denying any connection with the writing of the letter, which we corroborate. Turning again to the meeting, we find that Councillor Martin expressed the opinion that the writing of the letter was the work of an assassin and said he had been threatened with "hounding one" by such a person as the writer was. Councillor Mullaly reiterated that he was a party to appointing the Secretary to enquire, but not to put a value on the property. The Mayor had not seen the plan and still a proposition was made at the previous meeting to finalize it in his absence. It seemed as though the deal had been pre-arranged from the fact that neither the mover nor seconder had moved from their seats to examine the plans before making their motion. Councillor Ryan said this was not true. Councillor Channing was not here to speak for himself as he had left the meeting before the discussion was introduced. Councillor Mullaly repeated the statement that they had not moved from their places to examine the plans when it was tabled. Councillor Coaker confirmed this. Councillor Martin denied that the deal had been pre-arranged and said the affair had been deferred because of the absence of the Mayor. He had been refused permission to make repairs to his property. After a suggestion that the matter be deferred. It was apparently dropped for the present and permission granted to make repairs.

We fail to see the justice of characterizing "Citizen" as an "assassin." Councillor Martin himself had not given publicity to the electors of the city to the fact that he was interested in the property, but "Citizen" did.

We are glad, however, to learn from Councillor Martin that he was not present at the discussion of this proposition, except at one time when he took the chair and asked that the matter be deferred. He tells us he does not want to sell the property. He prefers that it be left as it is. We find that the plan shows that 209 square feet was to be taken from him; 284 square feet taken from Score and given to him, and 40 square feet taken from Cooney and given to him. He was also to receive a monetary compensation. On the other hand his house property would of course be lost. So far as the valuation and the exchange of land, everything may be perfectly just. Our criticism is directed to one point, viz., that it was the duty of Councillor Martin to tell the public that the property was his, and he failed to do so.

Boat Got Leaky.
The Healey's were coming in from Blackhead a few days ago with a boat load of fish, 14 quintals dry; when the punt sprang a leak and commenced to sink. They bailed the water as fast as they could but could not keep against it. They then signalled a tug that was out that way and she went to their assistance and towed the boat to safety., to Bennett's wharf where the fish was taken out, spread and dried.

Japs Getting Active.
Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, To-Day.
A despatch from Shanghai reports fighting going on at Hankow, Hangyang and Touchang. Martial law prevails in all three cities, but the rebels are only able to maintain partial order. A number of looters have been shot. The majority of natives sympathize with the rebels. The messages received from Tokio speak of the feverish military and naval anxiety. This causes great anxiety to the Pekin Government.

Bulgarians Fight Turks
Special to Evening Telegram, LONDON, To-Day.
A despatch from Salonika says that serious fighting is taking place between Turkish and Bulgarian troops on the frontier. Both sides lost heavily.



The Hygienic Aspects of Gas Lighting and Cooking.

Experiments were made at the Lewisham Infirmary during the month of November 1910, with the following in view:—

(1) To compare hygienically the relative values of the open fire and the Gas Radiator as warming agents.

(2) To ascertain if, and to what extent, the quality of the atmosphere of a room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps.

(3) To ascertain the hygienic value of the gas fire.

The experiments were carried out by Dr. F. S. Toogood, M.D. London, D.P.H., the Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary, and the full report of the experiments appeared in the London Medical Magazine, February 1911.

The general conclusions arrived were as follows:—

(1) That both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation gas consumed in modern incandescent burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.

(2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sickroom in respect of its reliability, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust producing properties, and saving of both work and anxiety, are obvious to every professional man or woman.

(3) That in large rooms, adequately ventilated, flueless gas stoves can be used for heating without any hygienic disadvantages. The heated products of combustion (mainly CO₂ and water vapour) ascending quickly above breathing level. This method of heating by radiation and convection from flueless gas stoves, is economical, but proper ventilation of the buildings in which it is adopted is essential, which, of course, is also the case whatever means of heating is adopted. A ward or other public building in which gas radiators cannot be used with advantage is improperly ventilated.

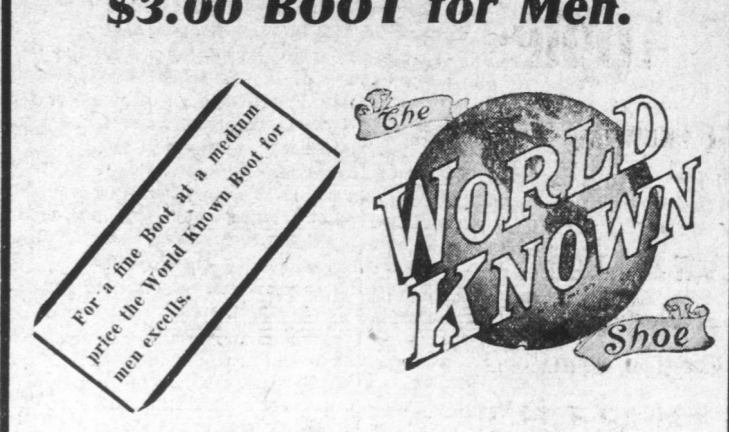

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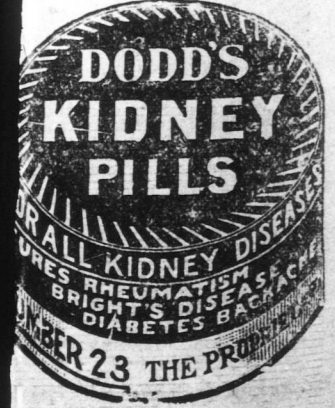

Sir Thomas Crosby's Health Maxims.—A Long Night's Sleep. With pride and wonder members of the City Corporation and of the City Livery Companies are following the public career of Alderman Sir Thomas Crosby, the octogenarian medical man who has been chosen to succeed Sir Vevey Strong as Lord Mayor of London during the coming year. So many demands are made upon the time and energies of a Lord Mayor-Elect that the five weeks intervening between the dates of his election and his succession to the civic chair on November 9 are looked upon as a period of probation and severe training for the onerous responsibilities of the twelve months of office. Every day has its engagements to be kept, meetings to be attended, speeches to be delivered, preparations and arrangements to be made, congratulations to be received and acknowledged. At eighty-one years of age Sir Thomas is discharging all these multifarious obligations with a youthful vigour that suggests admiring Livermen to look forward to the Lord Mayor's Show and the Guildhall Banquet, following it as the inauguration of a mayoral reign at the Mansion House that will stimulate energy and activity in every department of the City's life. "How does he do it? What is his prescription?" ask amazed aldermen as they watch the nimble octogenarian and listen to his clear and vibrant voice. A representative of the Daily Mail recently invited Sir Thomas to disclose his secret. "Take care of your arteries!" That is Sir Thomas's prescription for the preservation of youth. "In the City of London or anywhere else, take care of your arteries. If they degenerate you get an effusion of blood upon the brain or elsewhere and crack!—you are old at five-and-twenty." "But what do you do to your arteries to keep them from degenerating?" he was asked. "Early to bed," he replied, "smoke little and drink less, but first of all early to bed. You know the saying, 'Six hours' sleep for a man, seven hours for a woman, and eight for a fool.' Well, the man who said that was a fool himself, and all the fools who have believed him have found out their folly. A long night's sleep, that is the great rule." "Quarter of a Glass." "But then if little tobacco and less drink is a good rule, why is not total abstinence from both a better one?" "Well," Sir Thomas explained, "I have been a teetotaler myself for a time, and as far as I could judge teetotalism did me no harm. I was as well without anything as with it. But if you want to know why, after all my experience, I take a glass of wine I will tell you. It is because I like it," and the Lord Mayor-elect, laughed a great big, hearty, euphonic laugh. "And there's this about it, my glass of wine is half a glass, and after November 9 it is going to be only a quarter of a glass. When it is every day you have to make a difference. For frequent doses a smaller quantity, you see. But the long night's sleep, you need never vary that!"—Daily Mail.

Household Notes.

To keep vegetables fresh through the winter pack them in sand or dirt when putting them into the cellar. Old pieces of flannel or soft cloth make useful mops. Cut the cloth into even strips and tie in bunches; then nail the bunches to an old broom handle. If the juice of a lemon is added to a pan of cold water, and the wilted vegetables allowed to stand in the water for half an hour they will be as fresh as when gathered. If your roses are still in bloom, save the petals; dry slightly, and drop a few in the tea caddy with the tea. They add not only to its flavor, but to its perfume on the table. When making pies, if you tuck the upper crust under the lower and press down with a fork, you will never have any trouble with your pie sticking to the plate or the juice running out. When a colored dimity or lawn dress becomes faded it can be made pure white by boiling in water enough to cover, to which two tablespoonsful of cream of tartar have been added. Ivory handles that have become blackened may be cleaned by rubbing them with lemon dipped in salt. Stained enameled pans can also be cleaned by rubbing them with coarse sand and lemon pulp. Tan-colored linens are used as such as white for the table these days. Such a statement may cause conventional housekeepers somewhat of a shock, but one can easily see what a saving it would be in laundry bills. Enamel oilcloth on the kitchen table will wear twice as long if several thicknesses of smooth newspaper are kept beneath it. An old magazine on the table will save the oilcloth from losing its enamel by contact with hot dishes. It frequently happens that painters splash the glass windows when they are painting the sills. When this is the case melt some soda in very hot water and wash the glass with it, using a soft flannel. It will entirely remove the paint. Coffee stains on colored goods can be removed if at once sopped with a clean sponge wet with cold water. Place the damaged spot over a thickly-folded cloth or basin and keep changing the water in the sponge until the coffee disappears. How many housekeepers know that jelly is much clearer if strained when done through a fine wire sieve or
