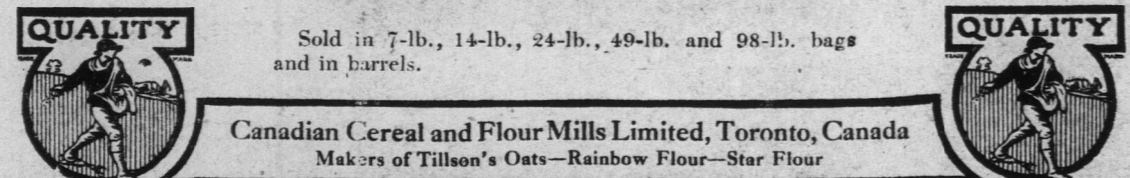

With the question working in his acute brain, he reached Mount Street, and ascended to his studio.

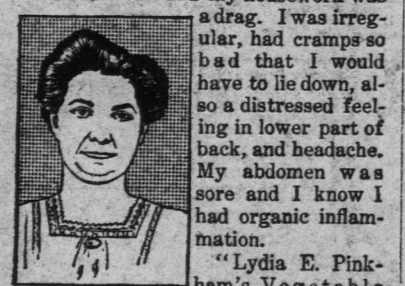

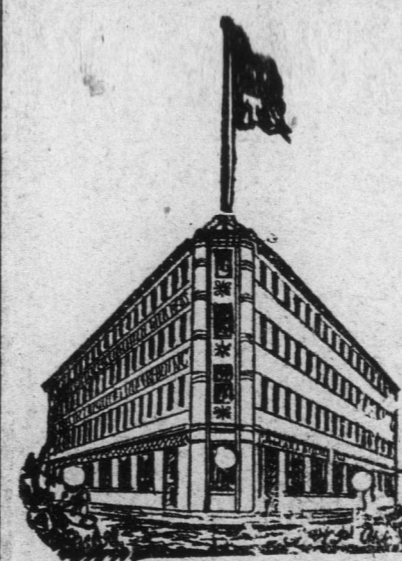

THE LIBERAL MANIFESTO.

The Manifesto of Sir Robert Bond, as accepted as a Statesmanlike statement of a programme which will have considerable influence on the future prosperity of the country. Sir Robert Bond announces his intention of placing the finances of the country on a sound and economic basis. The extravagant expenditure of the Morris administration has alarmed the country. Eighteen months ago thousands of fishermen throughout the North gave expression to their feeling of alarm at the mad panic of expenditure that was going on and did their best to put an end to it by petitioning the Legislature to place their prayer for a General Election twelve months ago before the proper authorities. Their prayers met with insult and contumely, and although backed by that powerful organization of the fishermen, the F. P. U., the request was turned down, and wanton waste and wild extravagance was continued on a greater scale than ever in order forsooth to gain over the electorate by gigantic giveaways. No wonder was it that the F. P. U. turned their attention to the Liberal Party and did their best to induce a Statesman whose great reputation is based on economical management of public affairs to lead a united Opposition against the party led by Sir Edward Morris, pledged themselves to give a loyal support to the Government which Sir Robert Bond expects to form next month, and to do their best

Price Of Fish Going Up Provisions Going Down.

This to a very large extent is the direct result of the Coaker agitation. Note on the side of the Fishermen's Union and you vote for a steady upward tendency for fish prices. SOUTHSIDE ACCLAIMS THE LIBERAL CANDIDATES

The chairman then called upon Mr. Scott, who amidst great applause and continued cheering came forward to address them. For eight years he had and he hoped faithfully represented the district of St. John's West. 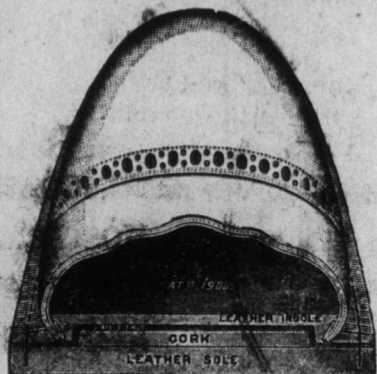

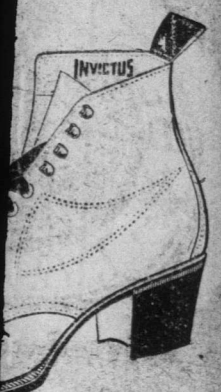

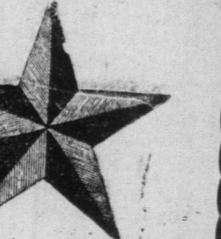

Cable News.

LONDON, Oct. 6. Premier Asquith goes to Balmoral to-day, as Minister in attendance. The usual Home Rule rumors prevail.

LONDON, Oct. 6. Divorce papers have been served by E. A. C. Lowe who cites Horatio Bottomley of "John Bull" notoriety as correspondent Bottomley posed as Lowe's friend.

OTTAWA, Oct. 6. A London cable says that the British Government has abandoned the proposed Imperial Naval Conference. No such proposal had been heard of here officially.

HALIFAX, Oct. 6. The Norwegian steamer Bjergoin is ashore inside Indian Rocks, Northumberland Straits, and likely to be a total loss. She was bound from Pugwash to Shirtsnes with 1,100 standard deal. The schr. Jennie F. is ashore near the entrance of Pictou harbor, a total loss. She was coal laden and owned by J. F. Proctor, of P.E.I.

LONDON, Oct. 6. The Graco-Turkish situation is becoming more acute. Turkey seems determined to tear up the Treaty of London, and the Powers appear indifferent. King Constantine reached Athens on Sunday and will shortly join the Greek army in Macedonia. Truce applied, Serbia yesterday to be ready for any emergency. Serbia has sent her troops to the Bulgarian frontier. The Albanian frontier is quiet.

DUBLIN, Oct. 6. There is no immediate prospect of settlement of the Transport Workers' strike. Sir George Asquith submitted proposals to both sides this morning. They were accepted by the men, but refused by the employers. The commissioners condemn the employers' demand that the men shall undertake not to join the Transport Workers' Union, but also condemn sympathetic strikes by other workmen. Many striking farm laborers have returned to work.

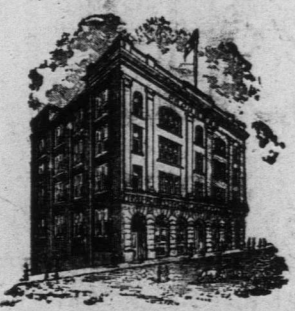

Formation of the Grenfell Association of Newfoundland.

Representative Meeting at Government House.

By kind permission of His Excellency the Governor (Walter E. Davidson, C.M.G.) a meeting was held in the ballroom at Government House yesterday afternoon at 3.30. His Excellency the Governor presided.

The following gentlemen were present:—

Captain H. Atlay, H.M.S. Calypso; Charles P. Ayre, F. C. Bretteau (Auditor General), W. W. Blackall, B. A. (Superintendent of Schools), H. R. Brooks, John Browning, S. E. Garland, Hon. A. F. Goodridge, W. G. Gosling, Walter Bahe Griewe, A. J. Harvey, R. P. Holloway, Hon. W. C. Job, Capt. Abraham Keen (S. S. Prospero), Hon. George Knowling, Dr. Cluny Macpherson, H. W. LeMessurier (H.M.S. Customs), John Mauder, L. C. Morris, John S. Munn, Sir Joseph Outbridge, Hon. Robert Watson, Hon. Marmaduke Winter.

Messages of regret were received from Sir Edward Morris, P.C., Premier of Newfoundland, Hon. Edgar Bowring, Hon. John Harvey.

His Excellency the Governor in opening the meeting said:—

"I am sure it is a great compliment to Dr. Grenfell to have so large a representative meeting, it is a busy time and a busy day. This meeting, so numerous and representative, are here as business men to associate in a sensible way with Dr. Grenfell's philanthropic work. There are two sets of men, those who originate and those who systematize. The most of use belong to the systematizing class, but we do pay the tribute of our sincerest admiration to those who can invent and carry out plans. We have in our midst an almost ideal philanthropic work, carried out by the universal assistance of the English speaking races. Dr. Grenfell has established a philanthropic enterprise which combined not only the people of Newfoundland, but the Canadians and Americans. The funds necessary for such enterprise have been widely subscribed abroad so that there is no need of a central Council which will control, systematize and make the best use of resources. The proposal is the various Associations in Great Britain, Canada, Newfoundland and United States of America shall be bound together under a common deed incorporated so that there can be a Council of direction representing all.

The proposal has been that Central Control shall bear the name of the International Labrador Medical Mission, but I maintain that it is very much better for an Association of this kind to maintain the name of the founder. I am attracted by the International Grenfell Association, and I do hope for my own part, that it may be decided that such central Association be so known. Dr. Grenfell's name is associated with many philanthropic ideas. It would be a pity if the name were lost in a longer and more difficult name which would not convey to us the work that he really represents in Newfoundland and the Labrador, as well as the model Fishermen's and Seaman's Institute in our midst, which I believe will be copied in many parts of the world. But we are here to hear Dr. Grenfell."

Dr. Grenfell then addressed the meeting. He said, Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, had written him to say that the short notice did not enable him to attend the meeting. The Hon. John Harvey had arranged to go out of town, for which he was very sorry as he had always attended the meetings. The Hon. Edgar Bowring expressed his sympathy and regretted he was unable to be present. Other friends also wrote messages of regret. With regard to His Excellency's remarks respecting the name of the International Grenfell Association, it was the fact of introducing his own name that he suggested not having it. He would waive that if it was desired. There is objection to the word "Mission" on account of denominational lines. The work which I get the credit for beginning in such a small way is becoming large, it became too large for the English Associations and

both Americans and Canadians want to come in and join an International Association. There have been many difficulties in arranging for an International Board, but such have now been overcome. We have not had an International meeting yet pending its incorporation. We have had a conference when Mr. H. B. Ames, M. P., Montreal, and Mr. W. R. Stirling were here, and also when Mr. W. F. A. Archibald and Dr. Henry V. Bibe were here. We can arrange meetings all right, but we cannot have a thoroughly complete International Council unless Newfoundland is represented in it. The work must go on now. We have begun, and we want to have the local advice and help of Newfoundland on the Council which will consist of two representatives from London, two from Grenfell Association of America, New York, two from New England Grenfell Association, Boston, two from Grenfell Association of Can-

ada, and two we hope Grenfell Association of Newfoundland, who will meet in St. John's, Newfoundland annually during the month of July, and be responsible for the administration and finances of the whole mission, and Dr. Grenfell said it was essential for the meeting to resolve and incorporate a Grenfell Association of Newfoundland for the purpose of electing two representatives to become members of the International Board of Executive, as well as take such steps as it may decide to secure some financial support of grants in the Colony to assist in meeting the expenditure which will be authorized under a budget to be passed at an annual meeting of the International Corporation to be held in the month of July each year, in St. John's, Newfoundland. No other responsibilities in the work will devolve upon the Grenfell Association of Newfoundland.

For the information of the meeting and the people of Newfoundland generally, he said the St. Anthony Hospital costs about \$25,000 a year, and the Government grant is \$1,500, saying he thought the grant would be increased if properly put to the Executive. The figures show that from the 1st of January to the end of September there have been at St. Anthony about 3,100 "out patients" and 352 "in patients," one surgeon and generally two nurses with some assistants, and of late years one eye and ear specialist and a dentist.

St. Anthony has its Orphanage. The children left by men and women, who die, of course, have to be looked after; this began when a man and woman buried by me, and left five children, had to be cared for. Last year I visited one of the children who grew up in the Orphanage who was comfortably married to a lawyer in Buffalo. Gradually these children began to accumulate. The Orphanage, in a way, has been specially provided for. The two ladies in charge are volunteers. The trouble is that a great many of the children have a parent alive and we do not get a government grant for them. Among the forty children quite a number are not provided for by Government aid. We educate them and they go out as servants, or marry, or we take them into our employ. We are able to get grants for the technical education for some of the children. With regard to the St. Anthony School, in the summer we get a kindergarten by the ladies who come down. This winter we have a school with two teachers. At

ter this I have one permanent scholarship for technical training of the young men. Now that motor boats are coming there is a great need of practical work, and a certain amount of experience is needed. Last winter I was in residence at St. Anthony and had one doctor with myself, Dr. Seymour Armstrong, a volunteer, and we feel that it is more and more necessary that it should be well looked after. Mr. Sheard is to be Secretary of the International Board; he has taken a real part in the work and has made the success more than possible by his experience and diligence. Everything is systematized and you will subsequently be able to find out from the Secretary what any branch is costing. Every department is working and a patient can get every treatment there that is essential for him.

Battle Harbor is costing about \$6,000. It has four nurses and two doctors and two assistants. Indian Harbor costs about \$4,000, has a doctor, two nurses and an assistant. The doctors at these two hospitals are volunteers. Each hospital has a motor boat and a good one at that. The "Yale" assists her coast by carrying the mail. Last winter we transferred the Indian Harbor staff to Mudiak. (To be continued.)

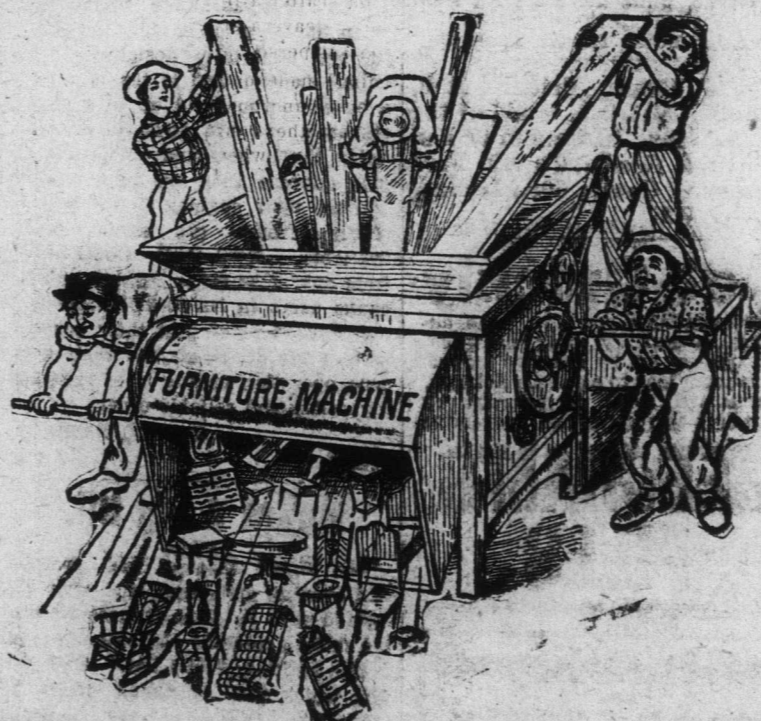

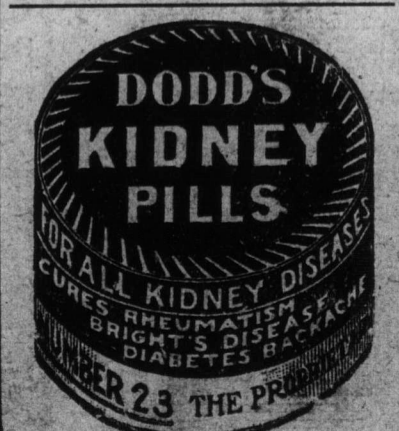

Cataline.



Cataline was a Roman demagogue whose chief occupation was a starting festering sores on the body politic. His system was to run for office on the reform ticket, get defeated, and then assassinate the successful candidate when he was wholly unprepared for anything of the kind. Cataline's first name was Lucius Sergius, but people called him "Luce" behind his back. He was one of the most explosive demagogues Rome ever had, as he was continually inducing some prominent citizen to act as the deceased at a public funeral. It was a dull day for Cataline when he didn't scatter a little poisoned soup around or leave a stiletto adhering to somebody's person.

Cataline made quite a hit as a political boss, and packed all the caucuses from the Pantheon to the Appian Way, but whenever he ran for anything himself the populace would rise up and step on him with so much enthusiasm that he never had to ask for the official count. He ran against Cicero for the consulship at one time, but Cicero had packed the election board with his wife's relatives and buried Cataline under one of the most voluptuous majorities ever recorded.

The senate then had several of Cataline's friends cremated in public, and sent an army in search of Cataline.

The army and Cataline found each other about the same time, and Cataline did not give up until he had become too porous to hit back. His death was greeted with sustained applause and numerous demands for an encore.
