

388th Day of the War

From the Front.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Aug. 26. The Governor, Newfoundland: Squadron - Commander Biggworth to-day destroyed a German submar ine single handed, by bombs dropped from an aeroplane. The submarine sank off Ostend.

The following is the official state ment respecting the Dardanelles: Operations since August 6th comprised two lines of attack, the first from the old Anzac position, and the second from the new landing at Suvla Bay. Severe fighting and heavy lasses on both sides resulted. Our objectives are not yet gained, though the area held by us has greatly increased. The Anzac attack reached the summit of Saribair and Chanak bair ridge but as the Suvla attack did not make the expected progress, the actual crest is not held. Positions below the crest are effectively consolidated. The ground gained enabled the Suvla-Anzac line to be connected upon a front of over twelve miles. Henewed attack on the 21st advanced the Anzac front. Elsewhere, being unable to occupy the summits, we withdrew to the origin-

BONAR LAW.

EARL SELBORNE FORESHADOWS CONSCRIPTION.

LONDON, Aug. 26. Something in the nature of conscription, though the term was not employed, was foreshadowed by Earl London. "Many more men have got o join the army, whether voluntary or compulsory, said the Earl. "Agri-cultural laborers have done their part nobly in this war, but responses have been very unequal over the country. I forecast that during next year, men will be taken from districts and from farms, whence hitherto they have not gone. What I shall aim at, and to which Lord Kitchener has been very sympathetic, is to leave to farmers his foreman, stock-man and carters, but the rest of the work will have to be done by women men not hitherto engaged in agri-lture." Earl Selborne emphasized e fact that Russia's reverses im-sed a great strain on the Allies. creat, and the situation is going to demand from every class greater and greater sacrifices. The speaker stated that the navy had the submarine menace well in hand. This statenent lends color to recent unofficia reports to the effect that the British have of late months captured a very large number of these submarines and that many others have been sunk since the beginning of the war. Brit-ish official reports, however, have ac-counted for but one German submar-ine besides the one, the destruction of which is announced to-day. There is no virtue in further forbearance. Whatever its results, the quarrel is of Germany's seeking. The President and his advisers must now determine ipon a course of action, for act they nust, and American people are more early prepared for a severance of iplomatic and commercial relations ith Germany than they are for the bandonment of what we have been ontending for in the name of humanty, civilization and justice."

> The Philadelphia Inquirer says: "It has been a long time since the Lusitania was torpedoed. Many days have gone by since the United States sent an ultimatum to Germany on this subject of murder. Surely every submarine commander has had his orders since then. Are we to assume from this Arabic accident that there is no intention on the part of Germany to respect the ultimatum? If so then the days of friendly relations between the United States and Germany are limited. To Arrange for British Credit.

Deputation of Financiers to be Sent From London to New York.

New York, August 20.-Misgivings as to developments in this country's relations with Germany as the result of the destruction of the Arabic featured the serious foreign exchange situation to-day.

A report that negotiations for the flotation of a British credit loan of from \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 to pay for American supplies purchased by foreign buyers, had been virtually uspended was denied.

Financial representatives here of the Allied Powers, while asserting that the situation had become complicated by reason of the Arabic incident, likewise refrained from discussion of the prospect for placing the contemplated foreign loan.

Aside from the 'Arabic, the feature gaged in the production of this drama. of the day in foreign exchange markets was the reported decision of Brit-"Fanny's Melodrama" is a fine Vita-graph production featuring Lillian ties to send a deputation of three men from London to New York to arrange the details of the projected loan. Sir Edward Holden and Sir Felix Schuster, it was reported, probably

vould be two of the three men. Sir Felix Schuster is known to local inanciers as a leading authority on banking and international finance whose public utterances abroad have received widespread attention. He is the head of the Union of London and Smiths Bank.

It seemed definitely settled to-night that negotiations would remain in abeyance until the arrival of the deputation.

Business in foreign markets was virtually suspended.


