



The officer, Mr. Tennant said, was at a great height when he switched down his engine, and he used that height to lengthen his descent. Eight miles is a pretty good distance for a heavier-than-air machine to cover in such circumstances, especially when loaded with bombs, but nowadays this distance is frequently exceeded, and it is a not uncommon occurrence for squadrons of British aeroplanes crossing to France to plane nearly the whole distance across the Channel. They make a point of reaching such an altitude before they leave the English coast that they may be sure of gaining a French landing, in the event of their engines failing, by planning alone.—Manchester Guardian.

What Will Wilson Do?

Yesterday we directed attention to a press despatch from Berlin which stated that the formal breaking of diplomatic relations would depend on President Wilson's rejoinder to the German Reply. We pointed out that this in itself implied that the German reply would not be satisfactory to the United States. This forecast is confirmed in the comment of Washington officials, who state that President Wilson's Note was designed to avoid any prolongation of the correspondence, but demanded clearly and categorically an immediate change in Germany's submarine policy. The German reply was given to the German press last night, practically twenty-four hours before the official reply could reach Washington from Mr. Gerard, the American Ambassador in Berlin. The publication of the Reply in the Berlin press before the reply could go through the usual official channels is in itself ominous, and points to an effort to obtain the backing of public opinion in Germany rather than to the satisfying of the American demand. If Germany had complied with the American request, the publication would not have been hurried in Berlin. There would have been either a simultaneous publication at Washington and Berlin, or a publication at Washington and a suppression in Berlin. It would appear that Ambassador Gerard, before he had thoroughly grasped the tenor of the reply, gathered sufficient of it to send a brief intimation of its unsatisfactory character. Last evening the impression in the United States was that the reply was not satisfactory, and this impression had its effect on the Stock market, which showed itself in falling prices. It may be before we go to press there will be further information gathered from the reply as published in Berlin, although the official reply is not expected at Washington until to-night. This delay is probably due to time for putting in code the text and the Ambassador's comments. Should President Wilson determine to break off diplomatic relations, there can be little doubt that he would receive the support of a number of neutral nations, whose ships are being sunk indiscriminately by the Germans and who are too weak to do much of themselves. The attitude of Brazil is a case in point.

Return of Mild Heroes To-Day.

By the express train which reached the city at noon to-day there arrived the following members of the Newfoundland Regiment, including five officers, two non-commissioned officers and one private, some of whom will assist in the training of recruits and others are invalided home, either suffering through illnesses or from wounds received in action. The party consisted of Captain Charles A. W. of the firm of Ayre & Sons, who left here with the First Contingent of Volunteers in October, 1914. He came in charge of the Rifle band. Lieut. Gerald Harvey, of the firm of A. J. Harvey & Co. of St. John's, who enlisted as a private and subsequently secured his commission; he was badly wounded in the shoulder at Suva Bay, Gallipoli; Lieut. Leo Murphy, formerly a well known newspaper man of this city, who worked himself up in the ranks; Lieut. S. K. Lounsbury, who was wounded with the Princess Pats during the big fight at Ypres and was twice wounded and later was transferred to the 2nd Battalion, and received a commission; Dr. Burden, who went over in charge of the last contingent; Sergt. Major Chas. Watson, who belonged to C. Company which won fame for Newfoundland generally and the Newfoundland Regiment in particular on Gallipoli, especially during the historic battle of "Caribou Hill" and Private Gordon Green, who suffered from enteric fever and frost-bites. From the latter ailment he is still suffering and cannot walk unaided. Private Green is a brother of Mr. Randolph Green of the Evening Telegram staff. The party crossed from England to Halifax on the Cunard Liner Pannonia and then came via rail. They did not enjoy the trip across country and were glad to get off the train on arrival. When the train pulled into the station the returned heroes were cheered enthusiastically by the large concourse of people assembled on the station platform. Every member of the party was received when asked for a story of his experiences. The Telegram joins in extending a hearty welcome to our returned heroes.

Bon's Crew Return.

Were Told Thrilling Story by Survivors of British Ship Suffolk.

Captain J. Randall and twenty-four of a crew who took over to the Russian Government the S.S. Bonaventure, returned home by the express train at noon to-day. The Bonaventure left St. John's on November 17th last for Naples with a cargo of cod-fish. She and gone a couple of hundred miles when as a result of boisterous weather she met with mishap, the cargo broke loose and she put back to port. She sailed again on Nov. 26th and after an uneventful voyage arrived at Naples. After discharging there she went to Gibraltar and then proceeded to Glasgow. She left there on January 26th last for Alexandrosk and was forced to remain there two months. After leaving there she found the British auxiliary cruiser Arlanza in the ice with her bows stove in. There were about 90 of the crew on board, the rest having been removed and taken to England. On board the Arlanza also were three members of the crew of the British steamer Suffolk who had a terrible story to tell. The Suffolk got jammed in the ice in the White Sea, provisions ran short and eventually the crew decided to try and make the land by walking across the ice. They lost their way in a snow storm and walked for days. All food gave out. Some went mad, others committed suicide and all perished but three who providentially reached the cruiser Arlanza. Two of the three had their feet amputated and the only one to escape uninjured was a Russian Finlander. After delivering the Bonaventure to the Russians at Archangel, Capt. Randall and crew took the train for Petrograd thence to Norway, Newcastle and Liverpool. At the latter port they took passage on the Liner Pannonia for Halifax, thence coming via rail.

The Speed of Dogs. Few people realize of what remarkable speed dogs are capable. Some statistics in regard to this have been gathered by M. Dusolier, a French scientist. After pointing out the marvellous endurance shown by little fox terriers, who follow their masters patiently for hours, while the latter are riding on bicycles or in carriages he says that even greater endurance is shown by certain wild animals that are akin to dogs. Thus, the wolf can run between fifty and sixty miles in one night; and an arctic fox can do as well, if not better. Eskimo and Siberian dogs can travel forty-five miles on the ice in five hours, and there is a case on record in which a team of Eskimo dogs travelled six and a half miles in twenty-eight minutes. According to M. Dusolier, the speed of the shepherd dog, and those used on hunting ranges, is from ten to fifteen yards a second. English setters and pointers hunt at the rate of eighteen to nineteen miles an hour, and they can maintain this speed for at least two hours. Foxhounds are extraordinarily swift, as it is proved by the fact that a dog of this breed once beat a thoroughbred horse, covering four miles in six and a half minutes, which was at the rate of nearly eighteen yards a second. Greyhounds are the swiftest of all four-footed creatures, and their speed may be regarded as equal to that of carrier pigeons. English greyhounds which are used for coursing, are able to cover at full gallop, a space between eighteen and twenty-three yards every second.—Our Dumb Animals.

### Legislature Closed.

Review of Volunteers and Naval Reservists — Parade Through the City.

The prorogation of the Legislature took place yesterday afternoon, under favourable circumstances. Precisely at three o'clock His Excellency the Governor, Sir Walter Davidson, K. C. M. G., attended by Capt. Abraham, A.D.C., entered the grounds, where lined up were squads from the Royal Naval Reserve, Newfoundland Volunteers, Church Lads Brigade, C. C. C. Highlanders, Frontiersmen and Nfld. Constabulary and City Band. Immediately the general salute was given the National Anthem was rendered by the band. Then His Excellency inspected the various squads, after which he entered the Legislative Council and took his seat on the Throne, attended by Capt. Abraham, Commander MacDermott, Capt. Paterson, Lieut.-Col. Rendell, Lieut.-Col. Conroy and Sheriff Carter. In the Chamber also were Rev. Canon Smith, representing the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland; Rev. Mr. Hewitt, Petty Harbour; Rev. Dr. Curtis, Rev. Dr. Fenwick, other clerical representatives, Consuls of the Allied Nations, Sir Wm. H. Horwood, Chief Justice, Hon. Mr. Justice Kent and a large concourse of ladies.

The members of the Legislature having been summoned to the Bar of the House by the Usher of the Black Rod, the Bills passed during the session were read by Clerk Carter and assented to by His Excellency. During the ceremony within the Legislature the Volunteers were strengthened by their squads which made up the entire battalion of Volunteers, who along with a squad of Naval Reservists were inspected at Government House grounds by His Excellency the Governor, who was accompanied by Capt. Abraham, Commander MacDermott, and members of both branches of the Legislature. The scene was striking and touching to the thousands of men, women and children who assembled in sea-circle fashion in the fields to witness those who have offered to fight for their King and Country. His Excellency the Governor and party on arrival at the saluting base in the centre of the field, the squads presented arms in such uniform style as has seldom before been witnessed in our city and won for the men the admiration of the immense concourse of onlookers. First of all the Volunteers and Naval Reservists as a battalion in line, then in column of mass, column of company and close formation of platoons. Men and instructors alike were complimented on the splendid manner in which the different exercises and manoeuvres were carried out. Addresses complimentary and encouraging, stirring and patriotic were then given by His Excellency, the Premier, Sir E. P. Morris and Mr. Lloyd, Leader of the Opposition and Secretary of the Recruiting Committee. The C. C. C. Band was present and discoursed several patriotic airs. After the speeches the battalion in four deep and headed by the C. C. C. Band paraded through the city via Cochrane, Water, Job's and New Cover Streets, Theatre Hill and Harvey Road followed by a large gathering of people. At the Long Bridge the Naval squad left the parade and returned on board H. M. S. Briton.

On returning to their Armoury Capt. Montgomerie addressed the Volunteers and complimented them on the splendid showing they had made. The parade of yesterday was unusually large, 536 men turning out. The volunteers looked neat and trim in their uniforms, the product of the Newfoundland Clothing Co. Ltd.

Two women were pushing their baby carriages abreast along the sidewalk the other day. A third woman, who was approaching in the opposite direction, was forced off the curbing. As she passed she gave the two women and their carriages a baleful glance.

"Did you see that woman?" said one of the mothers to the other. "The look she gave me! You'd think it was a sin for us to be wheeling babies. I'll bet she's the kind that carries a little dog around."

"Yes," said the other. "Stuck-up thing! I'd like to know if a mother hasn't a right to wheel her baby on the public sidewalk. Think of being mean enough to look like that at a dear little baby!"

She Felt She Had a Grievance.

And she gave her own particular darling a glance in which motherly admiration and indignation at the lady of the baleful look were strangely mingled.

Now the babies were both darling children. There was no doubt of that. But that was no reason that they should be made nuisances of. And that was just what their mothers were doing in taking up the whole sidewalk with their perambulators.

They had a perfect right to "wheel the babies on the public sidewalk," but not to usurp that sidewalk. They were presuming on their motherhood in doing it. It wouldn't have been tolerated in anyone but a mother.

A Thing Unworthy of Motherhood.

To presume on the almost univer-

sal deference and consideration shown to mothers and small children is a very mean and unworthy thing to do. Yet those women were doing it, and I have seen many others.

For instance, the mother who, while people are standing, takes up the whole of the double seat in the trolley by having a small baby sit beside her instead of holding it in her lap. I have seen women do this with little babies a year or two old, while elderly women stood.

Mothers who allow children to rub their muddy feet all over the trolley seat and thus make it unfit for the next person to sit on also belong in the unfair class.

No One Should Travel At Rush Hours Unless It Is Necessary.

Again, I think it is unfair for women with babies to travel in the trolley at rush hour unless it is really necessary. They dare to do it because they are practically sure of a seat, but they dishonor themselves by trading on that security. The working men and women have to be on the car at that hour and the car should be left to them by those who are not forced to travel then.

The very sacredness of motherhood makes it worse for those who belong to the illustrious order of mothers to trade upon its privileges and not to honourably repay the chivalrous consideration they receive with gratitude and consideration for the rights and privileges of others.

### Another Reform.

Lord Hardinge closed his Viceroyalty of India with an act of unusual importance. On behalf of the Government, he accepted in Council a measure calling for the abolition of indentured labour—a form of labor which, while technically free, often actually comes nearer being involuntary servitude, and always carries social evils in its train. Coolies were for a long period indentured to work not only in India, but in the West Indies, Trinidad, Guiana, and South Africa. The conditions under which they lived often meant abject misery. For over a quarter of a century the system has been regulated by the Indian Government, which came to refuse to permit the transportation of natives to some regions of bad reputation. Natal and the French colonies had thus been barred. But there was still an emigration of 10,000 laborers yearly under the system, and this will now, after a period of adjustment, be cut off. The whole is in line with efforts made by Englishmen to end the same system in all European colonies in Africa.

### German Raid on Canada Coming.

New York, April 28.—A German raid on Canada, with the raiders disguised as German picnickers and carrying lunch baskets and beer kegs, is in prospect, according to Max Lynar, who to-day started serving a term on Blakwell's Island for bigamy.

In the lunch-baskets will be sawed-off shot guns, dismantled machine guns, hand grenades and other deadly missiles. As soon as the disguised raiders get across the line they will assemble in military units. No less than 150,000 are to take part and will act concertedly all the way from Milwaukee to Maine.

### Our New Line in Artois.

How the British Helped Their Allies in the Battle of Verdun—A French Tribute to the Brotherhood of Arms. (By H. Warner Allen, British Press Representative.)

France, both the France in the trenches and the France behind the lines, fully appreciates the assistance given by the British Army during the battle of Verdun.

This aid was none the less valuable for being indirect, and it is desirable, in the interests of historical truth, that certain unfounded reports should be contradicted. I am authorized to state that rumors suggesting that British guns and British troops were actually taking part in the battle are without foundation.

The British army has given far more assistance than could possibly have been afforded by such piecemeal aid, and the French force which has barred the way to the Germans has remained entirely homogeneous. This fact is fully appreciated in France, and an eloquent testimony to the achievement of the British army is given by the following document which will be published in the next number of the "Bulletin des Armes," which may be regarded as the official organ of the French soldiers in the trenches.

#### The Victory of Loos.

On Sept. 25, 1915, when the whole French Army was waiting impatiently for details of the first French successes in Champagne and Artois, news arrived that the British army, at the side of its French Allies, had gained a brilliant victory. In a few brief words it was announced to the troops: "The English have taken Loos. They have made their way into Hulluch. On a front of five miles, with a depth in places of two and a half miles, they have carried the German trenches by storm. They have taken prisoners and guns."

In the French army there was a general outbreak of enthusiasm. Their victory was a symbol and a promise.

Weeks have passed since then, and the British army has never ceased making itself more and more feared by the Germans. The day has gone by when the enemy could pretend to mock at the contemptible little army of Marshal French. Already in the Cambresis General French's soldiers had given the first proof of their valor. From Crecy-en-Brie to Coulommiers they had taken their share in the victory of the Marne, and since those glorious marches what a long

way they have gone and what progress they have made!

The 60,000 men of August, 1914, are to-day 2,500,000. The Expeditionary Force has become a formidable army. It has often been said that time is fighting for the Allies, but none of them has he favored so greatly as the English.

It has become a commonplace to praise the organization, the equipment and auxiliary services of the British army. The striking figure of Tommy Atkins and his smart bearing have been lauded to the skies. With him the French have sung the chorus of "Tipperary," and perhaps in France too much emphasis has been laid on his picturesque side. There is, perhaps, a danger of it being forgotten that Tommy is a soldier in the most trying of wars, and that he fights as a soldier should.

In face of the enemy the Frenchman jokes and jests, as he is always accustomed to. The Englishman plays football between the lines. This is a matter of temperament, and both have given their proofs on the field of battle. Ask the German infantry what they think of the warriors of Neuve Chapelle, Loos, or St. Eloi.

#### The Brotherhood of Arms.

Only a fortnight ago the Commander-in-Chief of the French armies, replying to a letter from Sir Douglas Haig, used the following words: "The French army is well aware that, when recently an appeal was made to the camaraderies of the British army, it replied by offering unreservedly its immediate support."

At the very beginning of the battle of Verdun, when Germany was collecting her best forces, to hurl them once again against her principal adversary, France, the British High Command relieved by fresh troops one of the most difficult sectors of the front in Artois. In a few days, from Loos to the Somme the Germans had the surprise of having fresh opponents to fight.

To-day in the trenches of Ablain, Saint Nazaire and Carency, at Souchez and Neuville Saint Vaast, in all the villages of Artois, wrested by the French courage from the invaders, Highlanders, Australians, Canadians, and the men of England, Wales and Ireland are on guard, preparing themselves for battles yet to come. Previously the British had undertaken the difficult task of defending Vermeles, carried last year by the French. To-day they hold the Ouvrages Blancs, the Labyrinth, Notre Dame de Lorette, and the slopes of the heights of Thelus and Vimy, where so much French blood was heroically shed. Would it be possible to find a more eloquent proof of our union and friendship, which the Germans would give their souls to break?"
