



We have less than eight million people in Canada o-day. How are we going to provide employment for the millions of new-comers we confidently hope for in the next decade or two if we drive our surplus capital and European and American capital to other fields of investment?

Capital is cosmopolitan, English especially so, and the peoples of Russia, Japan, India, Egypt, Persia and the Balkans will realize their opportunities after the war, and will know how to treat British and American capitalists who seek to develop the untold resources of their countries. Our present disposition towards capital and industry bids fair to put lanada in the last place in the race of nations for trade supremacy. There will be keen competition for the world's capital when war is ended, and the people who respect capital. and appreciate the risks involved, will get the money. Canada does not respect capital. Canada reviles it.
