An old trunk, decayed and crumbling to pieces, discovered by workmen, in an attic in Philadelphia, containing nothing but bundles of letters, has been found to be worth a fortune in old stamps. "The man in the Street," would never recognize the worth of such a mass of apparent trash, but philatelists say the stamps on each old letter, crude, inartistic little stickers though they are, now are worth a king's ransom. Examination of a few of the letters reveals the fact that the entire collection of correspondence once occupied the files in the law office of one William Morris Meredith, a man of large acquaintance, who received letters from persons in all parts of the country and abroad.

### **Evolution of the** Love Apple.

The tomate of the present day is the descendant of the love apple which at one time was grown only for decorative purposes. The present prize-winning form is due to Mr. Adam Duncan, who died recently. He first knew the tomato, it was a crinkled thing. By careful hybridization, however, he succeeded in producing' the smooth-skinned almost seedless fruit of to-day. Mr. Duncan was the son of a Banffshire crofter, his only schooling being two periods of three months during winters too severe for him to herd cattle. The school was the village cobbler's shop. His first success as an horticulturist was in the early 'eighties, when he took up the chrysanthemum and be-came prominent among those pi-oneers whose patience and skill evolved from the comparatively little flower of that time the large and feathery bloom of to-day.




