



To Make Night Flying Safe.

A series of new and ingenious illuminated ground signals, which will make night flying as safe as it is during the day, are to be installed along

The provision of these facilities is the outcome of many years of experimental work in aerial illumination. The new apparatus, the first one of

which is to be installed midway be tween the Croydon Air Sation and Lympne, where the air expresses se out over the English Channel, has been designed to indicate to pilots on night services the strength of the ground wind. A chief is an open book, a common symbol for a university, and two crowns, representing the name Montreal, Mount Royal and also the crown of achievement. On the book is the text: "In Domino Confido." Any herald can indentify this coat-of-arms at a glance as belonging to a university, and at the same time it is sufficiently indentified with the founder.






