



M.O's Opinion on Conditions at Hampden

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir,-In view of the fact that so many exaggerated rumours regarding the health situation at Hampden have obtained wide circulation, I desire to make a statement as to what I consider to be the true facts of the case. As I have been in medical charge of the place for three weeks I feel justified in doing this. Also as I have had considerable experience with mining and lumbering camps, I feel that I am in a position to give a fairly accurate opinion.

In view of the large number of men, women and children who flocked to this place last fall, many coming from almost destitute homes in a low state of vitality from sickness and lack of nourishment, and considerable sickness in this place was to be expected but it was by no means all due to Typhoid of which I am aware there have been a number of cases. Typhoid, except in rare cases is not considered to be catching through the air in the sense that Scarlet Fever and Smallpox for example are. As one man put it, "You've got to eat it or drink it." Flies have been pretty prevalent this year and are pretty hard to get

There is in my opinion another potent cause of the sickness. As I have already intimated, many of the employees came from districts which were severely affected by the great business depression of the past few years. This resulted in a lowered vitality and a lessening of the powers of resistance to disease. This is personal knowledge as during the Jast few years I have had considerthle connection with some of these







T. B. Diminishing in England

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 30. (Canadian Press)-Thanks in large measure to the gradual enlightenment of the public about the disease and to the modern measures taken to control and treat it, tuberculosis in all its forms is rapidly diminishing in this country and America, says the medical correspondent of The Times. How exceedingly rapid this declension is becoming is not, however, generally

During the first 20 years of the period under review, 1871-91, the percentage drop in mortality was 35; during the last 20 years the percentage drop was 45. Taking consumption alone the drop was 32 for the first 20 years and 46 for the last 20 years.

There has thus been an "accelerated drop" in the mortality figures. This possesses immense significance, because it has occurred during a period when improved methods of diag-nosis have without question revealed many fresh cases and disclosed un-suspected areas of infection. Further, the drop exceeds that of the general mortality from all diseases which has occurred during the last few decades. It is of a special character, and cannot be accounted for merely by say-ing that sanitation has improved, or "people are becoming immune." There is reason to believe that it has not occurred in those countries in which anti-tuberculosis campaigns have been
