PROPOSED RUSSIAN LOAN. London, Dec. 19.—The Rothschlids have heard nothing of any suggestion that Russia will attempt to raise a loau of \$125,000,000, or any other amount, in Great Britain, and they de-clare that the report is palpably un-founded. Russia, they say, could not raise a loan here, and, judging from their latest advices from Paris, it would probably be equally difficult for Russia to raise money in France. The Asso-ciated Press is informed from others that even ware a Bussian loan issued elsewhere, there is little likelihood of any nortion of it being underwritten in London.

Time to Be Taken to Consider leasure in All Its Bearings.

(FROM SATURDAY'S DAILY.)

(FROM SALCHWING the regular monthly fr meeting of the Board of Trade was held, the president in the chair. There was rather a slim attendance of the members. After the transaction of the usual routine business, Mr. S. J. Pitts spoke at some length on the new As-sessment Act, and explained the details details with many illustrations.

spoke at some length on the new Assessment Act, and explained the details of its workings, with many illustrations showing how the tax would bear upon the merchant and manufacturer. Should the merchant meet with poor, or perhaps, no success in his business, he would have to pay just the same on his stock, yet he would have to expend the same amounts as usual for salaries and other running expenses. It was really worse than dual taxation. He believed this act would work harm to the trade and commerce of the province, and it would go far to spoil British Columbia's prospects in the Orient trade, toward which all were now looking hoperully. Merchants trading to the Orient would have to carry heavily on them-if they kept any stock here at all. No man could carry a large stock here and afford to contribute 20 per cent to the government. He hoped that if the government had the case muse in for the act, they would probably see their way to make certain changes. He congnized the fact that the taxes muse in increased, and it was a difficil matter to adjust them to suit all classes and distribute the burden evenly and emitably. 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
