APPEALS TO THE POWERS.

BOTH BULGARIA AND TURKEY ASK FOR INTERVENTION.
LONDON, Sept. 24.—Count Nuloff, the Russian minister, has assured the emperor that Russia is innocent of any participation in the Roumelian outbreak. The Turks, however, are convinced that this is an answer to Sir Henry Drummond Wolff's mission. Sir Henry interprets as the forerunner of an Anglo-Turkish alliance.

THE ROMELIANS ARE TEARING UP THE RAILWAYS ON THE FRONTIER AND FORTIFYING THE MOUNTAINS.
LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Austrian minister attended yesterday's cabinet meeting. At a meeting of the cabinet all parties it was agreed to defend, for as long as necessary, Serbia's claims to the Roumelian provinces. Troops, as rapidly mobilized, start on the march to the frontier.

THE POWERS APPROVE THE PLAN.
LONDON, Sept. 24.—A despatch from Philippopolis to the Standard says the correspondent of that paper had an interview with Mr. Fawcett, British ambassador general, and Major Trotter, military attaché of the British legation, at which the latter stated that Europe cannot disapprove of the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia. They will inform the emperor and Turkey of a definite necessity exists that the union should be completed.

THE PRINCE ON PARADE.
PHILIPPOPOLIS, Sept. 24.—Prince Alexander, accompanied by his staff, met the Bulgarian cavalry on the outskirts of the city, and placing himself at the head of the column, entered the town in the midst of a cheering throng. The prince immediately afterwards started for the frontier to inspect the troops.

THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY APPROVES.
SOFIA, Sept. 24.—The national assembly of Bulgaria has unanimously approved of Prince Alexander's action, and proclaimed a union of the Bulgarian and Roumelian parliaments. The five million pounds to be given to the emperor in return for the Roumelian provinces is to be raised by a loan of 100,000,000 francs.

THE PORT IS SAVING.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 24.—The port is saving an answer from the sultan to the treaty recognizing the independence of Roumelia. The sultan is waiting for the treaty to be signed by the emperor.
