ougford's M.P. Delivers an Address in Ottawa-Gladstone's Fill Not All That Rulers and Liberals Necessary-Otta

wa Puts Up \$1525 for the Cause. OTTAWA, Jan. 25. - The Opera House was fairly well filled to night to hear the address of Hon. Edward Blake, M.P. for Longford, on Home Rule in Ireland. Hon. John Costigan, Secretary of State, presided and Archbishop Duhamel, Father Whelan, Canon McCarthy, Hon. J. J. Curran and a number of other prominent friends of Home Rule were on the stage, which was tastefully decorated with flags

and flowers.

Hon. John Costigan read an address of welcome to Mr. Blake, in which warm sympathy with the cause and with him in his onnection with it were expressed. Mr. Blake spoke for about an hour, de-

livering an earnest and eloquene address, which was frequently interrupted by applause.

He briefly outlined the rise of the Home He briefly outlined the rise of the Home Rule movement, paying a graceful tribute to the memory of Parnell, and then proceeded to analyze the Home-Rule bill passed by Mr. Gladstone, which, while not all that could be wished, was still a good measure, in favor of which much more could be said than could be urged against it.

He spoke of the struggles of the Home Rule party and their need of means to carry on the parliamentary fight, and said that far from considering it a diagrace he regarded it as an honor to be the means of urging Irishmen on this side of the water to aid by material contribution their brethren on the other side of the Atlantic.

He touched on the alliance between the Liberal and Home Rule parties which he held was necessary, and advocated an adherence to the Newcastle program as the best means of furthering the cause of Home Rule.

At the conclusion of the address a vote of thanks to Mr. Blake was moved by Hon. R. W. Scott, seconded by Mr. J. L. Mc-Dougall and carried amid great applause. 




