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

In the Hub district of Toronto, Wednesday of each week is known as "Hub bargain day," and upon this day every member of the organization known as the Hub must give some bargain. Let the merchants of some small town unite in naming one day each week, or, if this is too often, a certain day in each month, when each one agrees to give some certain bargain. Suppose the merchants of a certain town agree that on Friday of every week in the year every merchant in this town will give at least one bargain which shall be special for that day. A shoe dealer may make a special price on a certain shoe for that day only; a clothing merchant may make a special price on chants of some small town unite merchant may make a special price of caps; a grocer may give special groceries for a dollar; a dry goods merchant a bargain on some line of dress goods. The local paper will be glad to co-operate and give this business feature a good write-up free.
