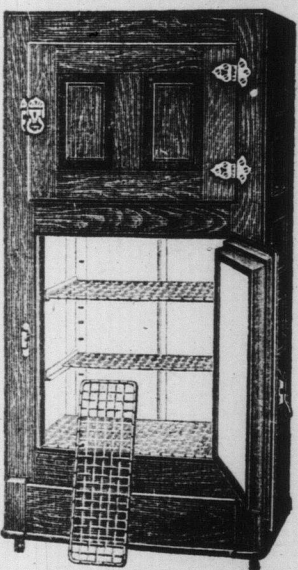

BIG RECEPTION AT KARSDALE

Miss Genie Bogart, a Red Cross Nurse, Returns From Overseas

A company completely filling the house assembled in the Bogart home on Thursday evening, the object being a welcome home to Genie Bogart, daughter of Mrs. Elizabeth Bogart and niece of Mrs. Arthur and J. B. Bogart, the noted Brooklyn surgeons. Miss Bogart who belonged to the American Red Cross nurses went overseas about two years ago and in the most efficient manner discharged the duties of her profession in France during the most reticent period of the war, gaining many encomiums for the splendid work she done. E. H. Porter, as chairman, after O Canada had been rendered with Miss Mildred McNeil at the piano, accompanied by a number of vocalists, referred to the similar occasions which frequently took place in the winter of 1919 and the pleasant recollections of the same. He alluded to the fact that Miss Bogart, yielding to a sense of duty offered her services as an overseas nurse and accepted and went across. Expressed regret that her uncles were not able to be present to witness this grand demonstration in honor of Karsdale's young heroine which her courage and faithful services fully entitled her to. He then extended a hearty welcome home again and hoped that a grand future was before her.
Miss Bogart, after thanking the people for their grand reception, gave a very interesting account of her travels and experiences in Europe. Regarded the Servians as a very interesting people and their Country as a beautiful one. Montenegro was not so attractive. She had visited the larger cities of Italy, also visited Greece. Her story was a most interesting one. She exhibited different articles of wearing apparel in use in Serbia, also many photos.
Mrs. Shaffner then presided at the piano and, with the aid of singers, rendered "Soldiers of the King".
The chairman introduced Rev. Mr. Penny who gave a very forceful address. "The Rose of No Man's Land" followed and then the chairman introduced Rev. Mr. McWilliams, who had spent three years overseas. Mr. McWilliams gave a very interesting address. Mrs. Read in reference to the chairman's urgent request, gave a splendid recitation. The chairman then introduced the officials of the Karsdale Red Cross Society and Mrs. Silas gave a splendid address which was cheered to the end. Then followed "The Star Spangled Banner" after which the ladies served a splendid collation and at midnight the happy company dispersed. Miss Bogart has two medals for meritorious services, one from the King of Serbia and one from the American Red Cross Society.

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FRUIT COMPANY HAD BIG YEAR

Hereafter Nova Scotia Apples Will Be Packed in Boxes Instead Of Barrels.

The annual meeting of the United Fruit Company Ltd., was held in Kentville, Tuesday, June 29th, and it was largely attended. The reports of the president as well as the Board of Management indicated that the past year of the company was the most successful they had ever had, the turnover being around three million dollars for the year. The company elected all of its old officers as follows:—President, F. K. Bishop; Vice President, F. H. Johnson, Secretary, K. L. Pinos, The Board of Management is as follows:—President Bishop, Vice President Johnson, V. D. Leonard, and Dr. P. M. Balcom.
The matter of the erection of canneries and vinegar plants as recently ordered by the Board was endorsed, and the first start will be at Aylesford, where a cannery, as well as a vinegar factory will be erected and ready for business this season.
Another important matter decided was that here after Nova Scotia apples will be packed in boxes instead of barrels. This will place them as far as packing is concerned on a par with western apples.

NEW PROGRAM N. S. RED CROSS

Health Caravan Will Be At Hampton Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday

The Nova Scotia Red Cross Society embarked on a new programme for peace times which bids fair to be as beneficial and humane to the nation as their great war and calamity programmes.
The latest movement is to send through the Province a Caravan of Motor Trucks and Ambulances with equipment for a 10 to 12 bed field hospital. With this are medical specialists in lung diseases in eye, ear, nose and throat diseases, etc.
These Health Caravans, there are two of them, are to cover the entire province during the months of July, August, stopping at only one place in each County in their pioneer voyages.
Their Mission is to bring free medical skill and treatment to children and others suffering from the above line of diseases in out lying sections of the province.
It is hoped in this way that many cases of partial blindness, partial deafness, throat diseases, adenoids and tonsillar troubles so serious to development of normal childhood may be corrected. The Caravan working in the Valley and Western Nova Scotia is to leave Halifax on July 14th and is to be at Hampton on July 19th and remain until the 21st. Churches, School trustees, Sunday School officers, Women's Institutes, and all other community organizations are asked to assist in any way to find out cases of children that could be benefited by the visitation of specialists and make arrangements to have those, unable to go to Hampton, sent there on the 20th for treatment.
In connection with the Health Clinic the Caravan also carries first class Moving picture equipment and such evening moving pictures and health talks will be given free by the specialists travelling therewith.
Any additional information desired regarding the clinic at Hampton may be obtained from the County Medical Health Officer, Dr. Armstrong or from the local Red Cross Society at Hampton, of which Mrs. L. D. Brooks is president.

WHO IS GROWING CLOVER SEED?

The Huller May Be Engaged and Placed Where It Will Benefit All

Mr. L. W. Elliott, secy of the Annapolis County Farmers' Association, writes the MONITOR that he desires to be advised of those who are making an effort to raise clover seed as he may engage the huller and place it where it will be the most benefit to all. Mr. Elliott has also received the following letter from the Department of Agriculture, Truro:

DEAR MR. ELLIOTT-From reports I have received from our District Officer in Western Ontario I am led to believe that there will be very little red clover seed produced in Ontario this season; and while we will probably have plenty of red clover seed on the market at perhaps a slightly lower price than last season it will be chiefly imported seed which as you probably know from experience is not of much value to the Nova Scotia farmer. Therefore I would ask you to encourage in every way you can the farmers in your district to save as much as possible this year.

From samples I received last spring from growers in your district I infer that the principal fault with them is the habit of cutting the seed before it is properly ripened. In your district if the first crop is harvested in the next ten days, there should be no trouble in having success with the second crop.

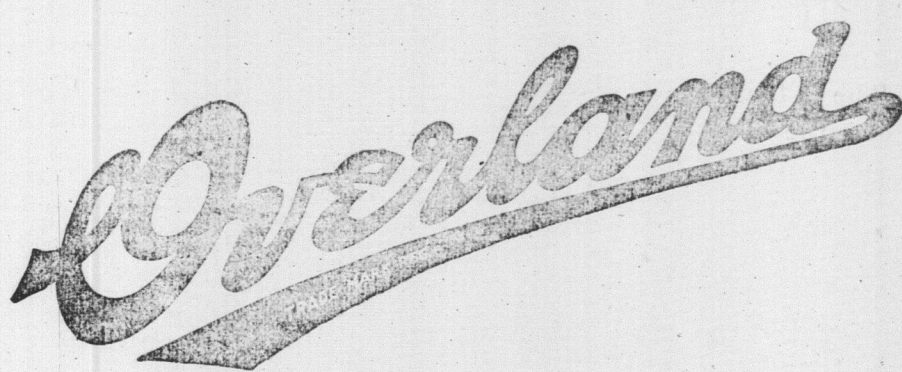

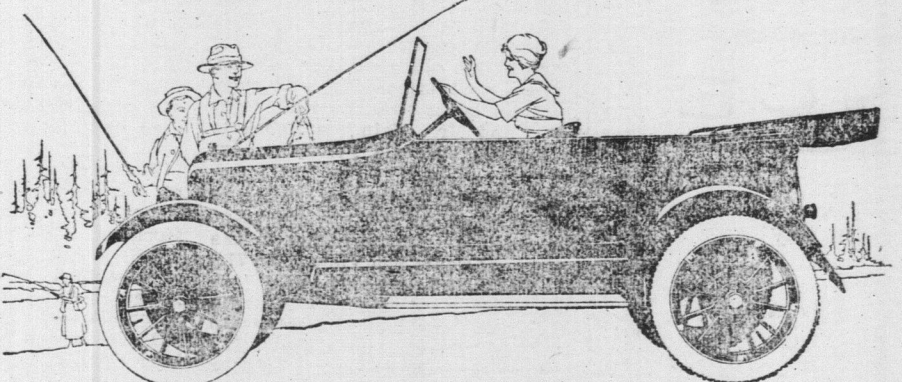

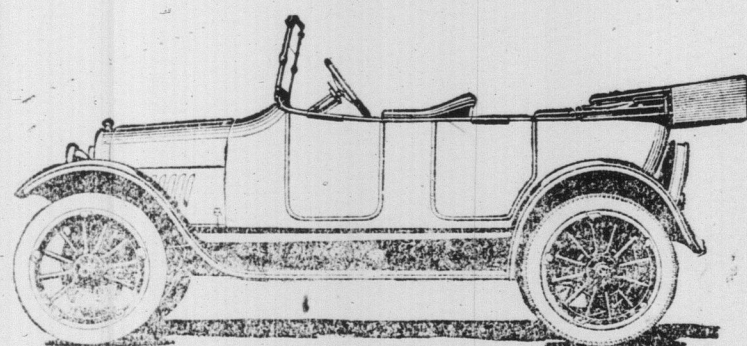

Fredericton, N. B.—An

demand has been made that a
thorough investigation of the pos-
sibilities of harnessing the tides at
the head of the Bay of Fundy, as a
power development proposition, be
made. It is believed that with the
help of the railways the project
could be carried out successfully,
and some investigation work has
been undertaken.

Fredericton, N. B.—The transfer

of the crown lands held by the
estate of the late Sir William Van
Horne a former president of the
C.P.R. to the Dalhousie Lumber Co.,
a subsidiary of the International
Paper Co. of New York, has been
accomplished. The lands consist of
122 1/2 square miles in Northumber-
land County, on the Serpentine.

Calgary, Alta.—Arrangements have

been made by the Belgian govern-
ment for credits amounting to ten
million dollars for the purchase of
western Canadian cattle. Since the
signing of the armistice, a large
trade in livestock has been main-
tained with Belgium and France.

THE HISTORY OF BATTLEFORD

It is only of recent years, since the
opening of the country by the rail-
roads and the discovery of its won-
derful possibilities, that Western
Canada has found its way into the
histories of the world. The stories
of the early settlers who penetrated
an almost unknown land full of hope
but of uncertainty of the future, the
Indian troubles, the proving of the
fertility and productivity of Western
soil, the transition of the prairie
from its primitive wildness to the
huge productive grain areas supply-
ing the granaries of the world—all
these are almost too near our own
epoch to yet be history. Yet there
are certain localities which consti-
tute landmarks in the glowing story
of Western progress, names already
fragrant with historical aroma,
blending the romance of early settle-
ment with the bustle of modern in-
dustry and agricultural progress.
The Battleford district is one of
these.

The city of Battleford, beautifully
situated where the Battle river and
mighty Saskatchewan converge, was
one of the earliest of Western set-
tlements—a thriving little commu-
nity in the era before the railroads. It
linked up Winnipeg with Calgary
and MacLeod on the main trail which
led through what are now the prairie
provinces. In 1878 it was made the
seat of the North West Territories
Government and Parliament con-
tinued to meet there until the pen-
etration of the Canadian Pacific Rail-
way further south and the conse-
quent attraction of settlers along its
tracks caused it to relinquish this
honor in favor of the more conven-
iently situated town of Regina. Its
name occurs frequently in the tales
of early western settlement and the
Battleford district was the scene of
many bloody encounters between
pioneers and Indians. At the barri-
cades of the town the Indian Chief
Fountainhead surrendered to General
Middleton on May 25th, 1886, virtu-
ally closing the chapter of Canada's
Indian wars.

It is in this historic district, that
one of the last blocks of land owned
by the C.P.R. is just becoming avail-
able for settlement. It is a beauti-
ful park area of picturesque shad-
groves, rolling upland and luxuriant
meadows. The country is admirably
suited to mixed farming and the live-
stock industry, for its rolling slopes
produce fine hay, and its clumps of
trees, whilst offering no serious ob-
stacles to grain growing, afford shade,
in the summer and shelter in the
winter. The soil is a rich chocolate
loam with a clay subsoil ensuring a
conservation of these ingredients
which make for rapid and hardy
growth. Wheat is grown extensively
and successfully as well as other
cereal crops. Every phase of agri-
culture in fact, has been success-
fully carried on. Poultry raising,
market gardening, and vegetable
growing flourish, whilst there is no
better dairying locality in the West-
ern provinces.
