Though why they should have accident tickets while sitting in the High Court any more than while sitting in their parlors at home, is one of those things that no "fellah" can make out. The design of the law is to protect the Order against railroad accidents during the journey to or from the sessions; hence, as a rule, members should get only in the stub first. one day tickets for the journey to and another for the journey home from the sessions. the future these will be all that the Supreme Court will refund.

2. Never take any money from any member without giving to the brother the official receipt. In writing such receipt always ill

3. If there are any of the members of your Court who have not paid their dues and assessments by the last meeting in the month, notify them by letter or personal y, that they must pay you before the end of the then current month, otherwise they will stand suspended.

4. 8. In making out monthly reports, commence with the first month after your institution. This means if your Court is instituted on the 1st or 31st July the first Report should be sent, together with the Assessment for August, on the 1st day of August.

To Recording Secretaries.

1. In each and every letter give name and number of your Court and its location.

2. No policy can be issued until a brother has been initiated, which means that he must have previously passed the Medical Board, and the application for membership Form No i has been duly signed and fully withstanding the provisions thereto, even in and poperly filled up. diction of such High Court, no matter by Public Installation of the officers of whom your Court was organized. In that case you must send all your orders for supplies to your own High Secretary, and not to the Supreme Secretary.

4. All the supplies included in the list published in THE FORESTER must be procured of High Courts, except "pins and charms," which may be procured of the Supreme Court or of any jeweler most convenient to the purchaser. Ballot boxes and ballots and gavels may also be procured where most convenient to the Court. Uniforms for Royal Foresters must be procured only from the Supreme Court. Courts located where there is no High Court, are under the immediate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, and must procure their supplies from the Supreme Court.

5. When any of your members are permanently suspended, and you have the right to assume this if they fail to reinstate themselves within two months, advise Brother Atwell Fleming thereof, giving name and P. O. address of the parties So, also, whenever you get new members write to Brother Fleming, giving name in full and their P. O. address. If in large cities give street and number, so that THE FORESTER may be duly sent to them.

6. All answers to letters sent to the Supreme Officers or to the Officers of a High Court will come back addressed to the Court Deputy. He therefore should be at the meetings of the Court regularly. Or if prevented by unforeseen and unavoidable circumstances from attending a Court meeting, he should send all official communications to the Recording Secretary in order that they may be presented to the Court at the earliest date possible. If he cannot or will not do this elect another and send his name to your High Chief Ranger, who will commission him at once. By-laws High Court State New York.

ARTICLE I .- SESSIONS.

Sec. 1. The regular sessions of this High Court shall be held annually. Special sessions shall be held as provided for in Article 62 of the Constituton.

ARTICLE II. - CONFERRING THE HIGH COURT

Sec. 1. In addition to the representatives, the High Court Degree may be conferred upon all the members of the Order in good standing who attend the sessions of the High Court.

ARTICLE III. - REPRESENTATION.

Sec. 1. The basis of representation from Subcrdinate Courts shall be: - for a Subordinate Court with fifty members or less, two representatives, and one additional representative for each additional twentyfive members, or a fraction thereof.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be elected as provided

in Section 588.

Sec. 3. The travelling expense of representatives in attendance at the High Court sessions shall be paid by their respective subordinate courts.

ARTICLE IV .- HIGH COURT DUES.

Sec. 1. The High Court dues payable by each Subordinate Court shall be at the rate of fifty cents per year for each beneficiary member in good standing upon its roll, which shall be payable in advance;

To the High Court of New York:

BRETHREN,—As this is the first annual session of your body, and as the High Court was organized only last February, at which time but eleven cour's existed within our jurisdiction, we would quite naturally presume that very little could have been accomplished in the past and yet notwithstanding the brevity of our existence, we can review our work with pride and look forward to the future with a well grounded hope. The first Court organized in New York was Court Richmond, Mariner's Harbor, Staten Island, and it was instituted by Dr. Oconhyatekha, the present Supreme Chief Ranger, in 1884. Little or no effort was made to extend the Order in this State until May, 1888, when Court Flower City, of Rochester, was instituted by Dr. Kennedy, of London: Canada. In the meantime the Order was having a steady, healthy growth among our Canadian neighbors, with whom the Independent Order of Foresters originated. It soon became evident that the Order was wisely framed and was meeting a long felt want. It is not only a fraternal organization, with very beautiful moral lessons and an impressive ritual, but one half on the first day of January, and one half on it is an Order which carries the principle of mutual help into all the relations of life, follows and protects the Forester in his old age in a most substantial manner, and when he is gone the mantle of its protecting love falls upon those nearest and dearest to the brother. The organization was thoroughly sound in principle, in practice it was proving itself grandly useful, and its machinery and methods of business challenge the admiration of the man of sense and forethought. While not an insurance organization, it puts life insurance upon a scientific and Christian basis, and it is destined in this direction alone to work a great revolution and be the means of saving millions to the people. It takes the English and American life tables, establishes reasonable rates of insurance, exacts the most rigid medical examination and then extends its noble work beyond the grave itself to the widows and organis of the deceased. Men saw that it was not a more assessment association, like so many that have arisen and fallen in a day, but that it was the very embodiment of sound business principles and the most noble benevolence. So soon, therefore, as a little attention could be given to the work in New York, the Order grew at a most encouraging rate, and now we have a membership of nearly one thousand. The following Courts have already been established:

Surely, we may say that this is an excellent record, when we remember that nearly all of these Courts

have been organized within a few months, and the good already accomplished is very great.

Looking over the Order at large, our eyes behold a spectacle inspiring to all our hearts. We see over 600 Courts, with 20,459 members (June 1st) and a Reserve Fund of \$204,814.86, July 1st, which has been increased since by between \$2,000 and \$3 000. Nearly half a million dollars in benefits have been

paid by the Order since its institution.

When we shall close this, our first annual session, we believe we shall be in a position to prosecute the work with due earnestness and wisdom. Up to the present time we have been obliged to rely largely upon the Supreme Court to do the missionary work in our State, and it was fortunate for us that we had in the chair of the Supreme Chief Ranger, a gentlema. whose interests in and sympathies with our American people were of the most kindly character. A graduate of Oxford University, England, a graduate of one of the best English schools of medicine and surgery, and a gentleman known in many countries and many languages, through his personal worth and benevolent feelings, he has brought to the discharge of his duties rare executive aboutes and untiring zeal. So that to day we find the Order as firmly rooted in Canadian and American soil as the oaks and the pines that are native to our lands. To Dr.

Oronhyatekha, our Supreme Chief Ranger, we owe a debt of gratitude we can never pay, but thousands of widows and orphans will yet bless his name and God

himself will give a crown of many jewels.

While we shall no doubt continue to enjoy the co-operation of our Supreme Chief, if we by our acts, legislation and official personnels, show ourselves worthy of it, we must depend somewhat upon ourselves, and every Forester in New York should make himself a missionary for the purpose of making known the blessings of the Order, and bringing worthy men within the circle of its moral influence and protecting

Within our High Court jurisdiction a good feeling prevails, order and earnestness are manifest, and we believe we are at the dawn of a happy and prosperous day. Surely our principles are sublime, being nothing less than the teachings of the wisest philosophers and the out-breathings of the Infinite Spirit. Our methods and machinery are quite as perfect as anything human can be. And now, dear brethren, it is God himself who in the love of our hearts calls us to take our noble institution and go for h into the world to bless mankind and ourselves.

But while we would congratulate you upon the state of the Order, and would with you join in thanksgiving to God for His guiding influence, we must not forget our responsibilities and dangers. The Order will be what we ourselves make it, and however good its principles, and however christian in aim aind spirit the world will judge Forestry by Foresters. While we should set up no s andard impossible of attainment, and while we should not encourage among ou selves or others any spirit of phariseeism, we should, nevertheless, seek good material with which to build up the Order, and we should insist that every member should seek to become what our principles demand. Let us go from this High Court with a re-olve that we will do all we can to increase the interest of Subordinate Courts, and extend the influence of the benign principles of our Order. certainly believe we have the best fraternal o ganization of its kind in the world, and we trust that when we shall assemble next year we shall find we have a hundred courts and a membership more than doubled. Thus shall we carry blessings to thousands, and make our Order an instrument of good in the hands of the Infinite Father of Souls.

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
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
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
