THE GENERAL REFORM ASSOCIATION FOR ONTARIO.

TORONTO, October 31st, 1911.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of The General Reform Association for Ontario was held this day in the Temple Building, corner Bay and Richmond Streets, Toronto. The meeting was called to order at 10 a.m., by the President, H. M. Mowat, K.C. Among those present were :

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

1911

The annual meeting was not called at the usual time in September because of the General Election for the Dominion being then proceeding.

The election was a reverse for our party; and the result was as unexpected by our opponents as ourselves. It is the general opinion that in no previous election did our friends work with more spirit and confidence, and we were encouraged by the assistance volunteered by many Conservatives who believed in Reciprocity. Our public meetings were thronged, and we felt that we had quite the best of the argument. But there was an uncalculated silent opposition among our friends which lost us many seats. The Liberal party has received another intimation that having logic or reason is not sufficient to win an election, and those who think it important or advantageous to succeed will want to avoid any policy which can be misconstrued as entailing an alliance with another nation. We have too many timid people yet for such a course.

If it is desirable to analyse the result from a political standpoint the chief cause for loss of support will be found in the want of appreciation of the class whose interests are injured by existing conditions, and to whom we especially appealed. The smaller farmers had, under Liberal government, been given good prices, considerable prosperity and great contentment. The people were benefitting by the British Preference, and by increased railway accommodation and expenditure. They were somewhat bewildered by the suddenness with which the great issue came before them. They heard arguments and figures showing larger markets and better prices, but they also had, on the other hand, set before them by our opponents definite figures showing losses on the products they had to sell. The Conservative figures were romantic, but they were cleverly published and widely and fluently uttered. The uninstructed man was befooled by them, and many, before the campaign closed, took just enough alarm to resolve to vote against any change of international commercial policy.

Now, and after the event, it is easy to see that instead of supposing that our advantageous proposition had only to be offered to be readily accepted, we might better have waited until

a convinced farming community had asked for it. The Farmers' Deputation had asked for it, but we found that innumerable farmers of Ontario had either never heard of that Deputation until this campaign was commenced, or had thought its efforts were in the interest of Western farmers only.

We were defeated, therefore, mainly by two classes of electors: first, those who were afraid Reciprocity might make them poorer; and secondly, those who would rather remain poorer than make any bargain of any kind with the other country. We have plenty of argument to show that there is error in these ideas. Yet we staked and lost, and we must respect the verdict. Free traders can now urge for reduction of tariffs by independent action by the Government of each country.

A movement to further increase the British Preference by reduction of duties on goods manufactured from imported material would make a fine fight. It would be better from an economic standpoint to buy out or compensate certain industries not using native grown material rather than tax the people generally to keep them going. The best way to make British subjects realize the importance of the British Empire and the advantage of living in it, is to allow unrestricted trade between the Mother Country and the Dominion.

The manufacturers of Ontario, with few exceptions, opposed us, and unduly influenced their men. Their employees forgot that the ballot is secret, and will have to continue to suffer the evils of combines in household supplies. They are now perplexed and vexed by the triumph of those from whom they need expect little assistance or support in their endeavours for betterment.

But a gratifying result of the election is the buoyant and confident attitude of our active workers. They have taken defeat with undaunted spirit. The personnel of the new Ministry does not dismay, and the shilly-shallying on important matters which has been a feature of our opponents' conduct will bring inevitable mortification. We will soon lead again.

Our Government made a sturdy effort to relieve and, therefore, to help the Mother Country in the matter of naval defence and protection of trade routes. There is evidence that this work will be postponed by the Conservative and "Nationalist" Government, and frittered away on one pretext or another. It will be our duty to try to keep public opinion sound on this question, and struggle to maintain the principle inaugurated by our party.

A feeling of profound admiration and fealty goes out to our leader, "The Chief," who for 40 years has given his best to the party and the country, and we rejoice that he is to remain chief of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition.

There has been a Liberal prime minister, either at Ottawa or Toronto, ever since Confederation in 1867, and the Liberal party is

not going to pine if for a few years they may serve the country wholly in opposition.

We are now in another struggle in the Provincial arena. Our candidates and supporters are relying upon local enthusiasm and effort rather than placing too much dependence on central organization, and in the end nothing but good must ensue from such a policy. Our leading men who can afford, it have often contributed generously towards printing, literature and salaries of organizers. But independent local effort is the ideal method, and it is hoped that the temptation to look outside the riding for assistance will lessen and give way.

In the opinion of many, the time has come when attention must be given to the views of those Liberals who believe that the distinct pledges of party leaders made in 1894 and 1897, regarding the limitation of liquor selling, should no longer be ignored. The party has got no credit for failure to keep these pledges. The support of a sincere class of men was either sought or held because of these pledges; and so long as we who are the successors of the Liberal party of those days decline to carry out its will and testament, our executorship will be called to account. The pledges were not lettered by detail, and a just manner of carrying out their spirit would be to amend the Liquor License Act by enacting that after 1913 no license be issued to sell intoxicating liquor in bar-rooms in Ontario. In cities and those municipalities which cherish the right to regulate their own life and conduct let shops and dispensaries remain, unless abolished by Local Option vote. As a majority of voters has more than once voted for abolition in the Province there would be no injustice by reason of want of warning or notice.

If this is the right thing to do, then it follows that it must be politically expedient.

DOMINION GENERAL ELECTION

The results of the General Election of September 21st, 1911, are shown in the returns at the end of this report. Of the 86 seats in Ontario, the Liberals secured 13 and the Conservatives 73, a majority of 60 for the Conservative party in this Province.

The requests submitted to the General Office for forms of constitution and information have been promptly supplied and it is encouraging to note the signs of a new and stirring interest which bids fair to become extensive.

THE GENERAL ASSOCIATION

Before the year ends the General Association will have completed seven years of work on its present lines. It has met the ordinary requirements of the Liberal party in its relations with the Federal and Provincial Riding Associations. Other Provinces feel the need of a General Association on similar lines, and this General Office has responded to inquiries for full information concerning its workings.

MINUTES



CONSTITUTION
OF
THE GENERAL REFORM ASSOCIATION
FOR ONTARIO

NAME

1. This Association shall be known as : The General Reform Association for Ontario.

OBJECTS

2. The objects of the Association shall be :—
 - 1st. To secure good government, by advocating and supporting Reform political principles, in connection with the Liberal party.
 - 2nd. To hold meetings to confer on political affairs.
 - 3rd. To promote, by all legitimate means, the election of Liberal candidates, for the House of Commons and Legislative Assembly.
 - 4th. To effect thorough organization in every Electoral District throughout Ontario, in the interest of the Liberal Party, for Parliament and Legislature.
 - 5th. To exercise general oversight of the interests of the Liberal Party, in the Electoral Districts within the limits of the Province of Ontario.
 - 6th. To advance Registration of Manhood Suffrage Voters.
 - 7th. To maintain correspondence and co-operate with the various Riding Associations in the Province.
 - 8th. To prepare and disseminate political literature from time to time, as circumstances may demand.

MEMBERSHIP

3. This Association shall be composed as follows :
 - 1st. Two representatives named by each Riding Association, for either Dominion or Provincial purposes ; and when not so named the President and Secretary shall be recognized as the accredited representatives.
 - 2nd. Liberal Senators representing Ontario.
 - 3rd. Liberal Members of the House of Commons.
 - 4th. Liberal Members of the Ontario Legislature.
 - 5th. Such representative Liberals to the number of fifty, in the Province, as may be selected annually by the Association.
 - 6th. Honorary Members—latest non-elected Liberal candidates in Dominion and Provincial elections in Ontario.

OFFICERS

4. The officers of the Association shall consist of a President ; Three Vice-Presidents (representing Western, Eastern and Northern Ontario) ; Treasurer, and General Secretary.

- 1st. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be elected at a general meeting of the Association.
- 2nd. All elections shall be by open vote, unless at least ten members present demand a vote by ballot, in which case a ballot shall be taken.
- 3rd. The General Secretary shall be appointed by the Executive Committee.
- 4th. In case of a vacancy occurring in any of these offices, such vacancies shall be filled by the Executive Committee, for the unexpired term.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

5. The Executive Committee, to whom is committed the general management of the Association and who are empowered to do what they deem necessary to forward the aims of the organization, shall consist of the officers of this Association, and five other members, who shall be elected at a general meeting of this Association.

DUTY OF OFFICERS

6. The President, and in his absence a Vice-President, shall preside over all meetings of the Association, and of the Executive Committee. In event of their absence, the Meeting may elect its presiding officer. He shall be entitled to vote, and in case of a tie, shall have an additional casting vote.

2nd. The Treasurer shall receive and account for all moneys belonging to the Association, and under the direction of the President and General Secretary, the Executive Committee or the Association, pay all debts incurred by the Association or its officers on behalf of the Association.

3rd. The General Secretary shall keep the records of the Meetings of the Association, and of the Executive Committee ; keep a correct roll of the members of the Association, and their addresses ; shall conduct the correspondence of the Association, and of the Executive Committee. He shall perform such other duties as the Executive Committee of the Association may, from time to time, prescribe. He shall give his whole time to said duties, except in so far as he may be otherwise permitted by the said Executive Committee. Subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, he may employ such assistants as may be required, who shall be under his control, and their remuneration shall be determined by the Executive.

MEETINGS

7. The annual meeting of the Association shall be held in September, on such date and at such place as may be determined by the Executive Committee; and for the submission of reports, financial statements, and election of officers. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee at any time or place it may determine; or may be called at any time or place decided upon by it on the requisition (in writing) of any twenty-five members of the Association. Twenty members shall form a quorum at all meetings of the Association. Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the President and General Secretary at any time or place they may appoint, and three members shall form a quorum.

FINANCE

8. The Association shall be supported as follows:—

- 1st. Annual assessment on each Riding, \$20.00, to cover both Dominion and Provincial Associations.
- 2nd. Annual membership fee of \$25.00 for Senators; Members of House of Commons; Members of Ontario Legislature, and for each selected or appointed Member of the Association.
- 3rd. Voluntary contributions.

DISCIPLINE

9. The Executive Committee may, after notice to the person affected, by a two-thirds vote, suspend any officer or expel any member; subject in each case to an appeal to the Association, from such decision.

AMENDMENTS

10. The Constitution may be amended, by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Association present, at any general meeting of the Association, or may be amended by the Executive Committee; but such amendments shall remain in force and effect only until the next following general meeting of the Association, and if not then ratified shall become annulled and of no effect. Notice of proposed Amendments to the Constitution shall be furnished to the General Secretary at least fifteen days before the meeting at which it is proposed to consider them.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

11. The order of proceedings at any meeting of the Association shall be as prescribed by the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Association when assembled.

RULES OF ORDER

12. The rules of order shall be in accordance with the practice of the Dominion Parliament, subject to such exceptions, as may be specially provided by the Association.

SUGGESTED FORM OF CONSTITUTION FOR RIDING ASSOCIATIONS

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

RIDING REFORM ASSOCIATION

ADOPTED

191

NAME, OBJECTS, ETC.

1. This Association shall be known as the Reform Association.

The objects of the Association shall be :

- (a) To secure thorough organization in every Polling Subdivision.
- (b) To supervise the Revision of the Voters' Lists and to see that the Party is represented at all Courts of Revision.
- (c) To call conventions for the nomination of Candidates for the House of Commons and for the Legislative Assembly.
- (d) To Advocate and disseminate Liberal political principles, and distribute political literature.
- (e) To make returns and maintain correspondence with the General Reform Association for Ontario.
- (f) To exercise a general oversight of the interests of the Liberal Party within the Electoral District.

MEMBERSHIP

2. This Association shall consist of the Liberal Members for the Riding in the House of Commons and the Legislative Assembly (or the last defeated Candidates, as the case may be); and all such Liberals residing in the Electoral district as shall contribute annually a fee of

OFFICERS AND DUTIES

3. The Officers of this Association shall be a President, a Vice-President for each of the Municipalities in the Electoral District, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

The officers shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and they shall also act as the Executive Committee.

The President shall preside over all meetings of the Association and of the Executive, and in his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, to be chosen by the meeting, shall act.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a proper record of all meetings of the Association and of the Executive, and shall perform such other duties as the Association, or the Executive, may prescribe from time to time.

He shall also distribute the necessary forms in connection with the revision of the Voters' Lists. He shall account for all moneys entrusted to him, in his capacity as Treasurer, and pay bills as may be directed by the Executive.

MEETINGS

4. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held in the month of on a date and at a place to be settled by the President, unless the Association has by resolution fixed a time and place.

The order of business shall be :

- (a) Reading of Minutes.
- (b) Communications.
- (c) Reports of Officers and Committees.
- (d) Election of Officers.
- (e) General business.
- (f) Addresses by members and visitors.
- (g) Adjournment.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.

5. Special meetings of the Association, or of the Executive, may be called by the President when necessary, and the notices for such special meetings shall specify the business to be considered. On a requisition in writing, which shall also set forth the object of the meeting, signed by a majority of the members of the Executive, a meeting of the Executive, or of the Association, as the case may be, shall be called by the President and held within ten days of the receipt by the President of the requisition. The Secretary shall give at least four days notice of the intended meeting to every member of the Executive.

CONVENTIONS FOR THE SELECTION OF CANDIDATES

6. All Conventions for the selection of Liberal Candidates for the House of Commons or the Legislative Assembly shall be held under the auspices of this Association pursuant to resolution of the Association, adopted at a regular or special meeting, or shall be called by the Executive Committee. The delegates at the Convention shall consist of the Officers of the Association and of five electors from each of the Polling Subdivisions in the Electoral District. The Convention shall be governed by the following rules:

- (1) The President of the Association shall preside. If he is absent the Convention shall elect a Chairman.
- (2) Delegates from each Subdivision and Municipality shall, as far as practicable, be grouped and sit together.
- (3) The Secretary shall read the resolution or other authority by virtue of which the Convention has been called.
- (4) The Chairman shall call the roll of delegates. As each Municipality and Subdivision is called the delegates therefrom shall rise and give their names and the same shall be recorded by the Secretary.
- (5) If any others are present who are not delegates they shall sit separate from the delegates.
- (6) The Chairman shall call for nominations of Candidates. Nominations shall be open for fifteen minutes unless the meeting shall unanimously declare the nominations closed sooner.
- (7) Nominators who wish to speak on behalf of their Candidates shall be allowed five minutes for the purpose. Candidates shall be allowed ten minutes in which to address the Convention, but no Candidate shall be allowed to speak twice without permission of the Convention.
- (8) Before a ballot is taken the delegates and the Candidates shall by standing vote pledge themselves to support the nominee of the Convention. In the absence of a Candidate, the pledge shall be given on his behalf by his proposer.
- (9) A ballot shall then be taken for the selection of a Candidate. The Chairman shall name Scrutineers to distribute and collect and count the ballots.

- (10) No Candidate shall be declared to be the choice of the Convention unless he receives a majority of the votes cast.
- (11) After each ballot, should there be no choice, the Candidate having the smallest vote shall retire and so on until a Candidate shall receive a majority of the votes cast.

RULES OF ORDER

7. The rules of order shall be in accordance with the practice of the Dominion Parliament, subject to such exceptions as may be specially provided by this Association or by this Constitution.

SUGGESTED FORM OF CONSTITUTION FOR TOWNSHIP OR LOCAL ASSOCIATIONS

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

.....TOWNSHIP REFORM ASSOCIATION

1. This Association shall be known as theTownship Reform Association.
2. The Association shall consist of all Liberals residing, or carrying on business, or owning property, in the Township as shall pay annually to the funds of the Association a fee of,cents.
3. The Officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary-Treasurer, to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting.
4. At the Annual Meeting a Chairman and a Committee of four other members shall also be elected for each Polling Subdivision in the Township.
5. The Annual Meeting shall be held in, on the day, in the month of,
6. The Secretary shall, under the direction of the President, distribute annually to the Subdivision Chairmen the forms necessary for the Revision of the Voters' List. He shall also, when a Convention is called for the selection of a Liberal Candidate for the House of Commons or Legislative Assembly notify the Subdivision Chairmen to have five delegates selected, and on receipt of the names the Township Secretary shall at once forward the same to the Riding Secretary.
7. It shall be the duty of Subdivision Chairmen to see that the Voters' Lists are revised annually and for that purpose to hold meetings, to send in the necessary appeals and to attend the Court of Revision. The Subdivision Chairmen shall also, when a Convention is called, summon a Subdivision meeting to choose the delegates, and shall at once send the names to the Township Secretary.

SUGGESTED FORM OF CONSTITUTION FOR LIBERAL CLUBS

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

..... LIBERAL CLUB

NAME

1. This Club shall be called the..... Liberal Club.

OBJECTS

2. The objects of the Club shall be to discuss public questions, to aid in securing and maintaining good government and to encourage the spirit of Canadian Nationality.

OFFICERS

3. The officers shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Librarian and (Six) other Members, and they shall form an Executive.

MEETINGS

4. The Annual meeting of the Club shall be held on the First..... day in the month of October, and the officers shall then be elected. Nominations shall be made verbally and election by ballot. In the case of casual vacancies in any of the offices a special meeting shall be called by the President to fill the vacancy.

Regular meetings of the club shall be held on the First..... day in the months of October to April, both inclusive.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

5. The order of business at all meetings of the Club except the Annual Meeting shall be as follows:

- (1) Reading and adoption of minutes.
- (2) Communications.
- (3) Nomination and election of members and payment of fees.
- (4) Reports of Committees, if any.
- (5) Notices of Motion.
- (6) General business.
- (7) Debate or programme.
- (8) Adjournment.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

6. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club and shall perform all the usual duties of a President. In his absence one of the Vice-presidents shall preside, and if both are absent the members present shall elect a Chairman. The President or Chairman shall not vote except in the case of a tie.

The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the club, and shall conduct the correspondence and report thereon.

The Treasurer shall receive all fees and pay accounts when passed by the meeting or certified by the President.

The Librarian shall take charge of books, reports and literature and keep a catalogue thereof.

Two Auditors shall be appointed at the first regular meeting in every year to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and they shall report at the following meeting.

The Executive shall meet between the regular meetings of the Club, and it shall be their duty to arrange subjects for discussion and to settle the order of business for the meetings.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS

7. Candidates for membership may be proposed without notice at any regular meeting and election shall be by ballot by a majority of those present. The annual membership fee shall be cents, and shall be payable at the First Regular Annual Meeting or upon election. No member shall vote unless he is in good standing.

SUSPENSION OR EXPULSION OF MEMBERS

8. The Club may at any regular meeting suspend from the privileges of the Club or expel any member by a two-thirds vote of those present provided that notice has been given at the previous regular meeting, and that at least a week's notice has been given to the member concerned.

AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION

9. The Constitution and By-laws may be amended at any regular or special meeting, provided that at least one week's notice of the proposed amendments has been given to every member.

RULES OF ORDER

10. (1) Notices of motion shall be given at a regular meeting for the next regular meeting unless those present, by a two-thirds vote, dispense with notice.

(2) Motions shall be proposed and seconded before being submitted to a vote.

(3) Members desiring to speak must arise and address the chair.

(4) A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time and shall be voted upon without debate.

(5) The time allowed to speakers shall be settled by those present at a meeting.

(6) All questions debated shall be decided by a show of hands, but on request the yeas and nays, shall be recorded.

(7) The decision of the Chairman shall be final, subject to an appeal to the meeting.

(8) In any case not provided for, the practice of Parliament shall prevail.
