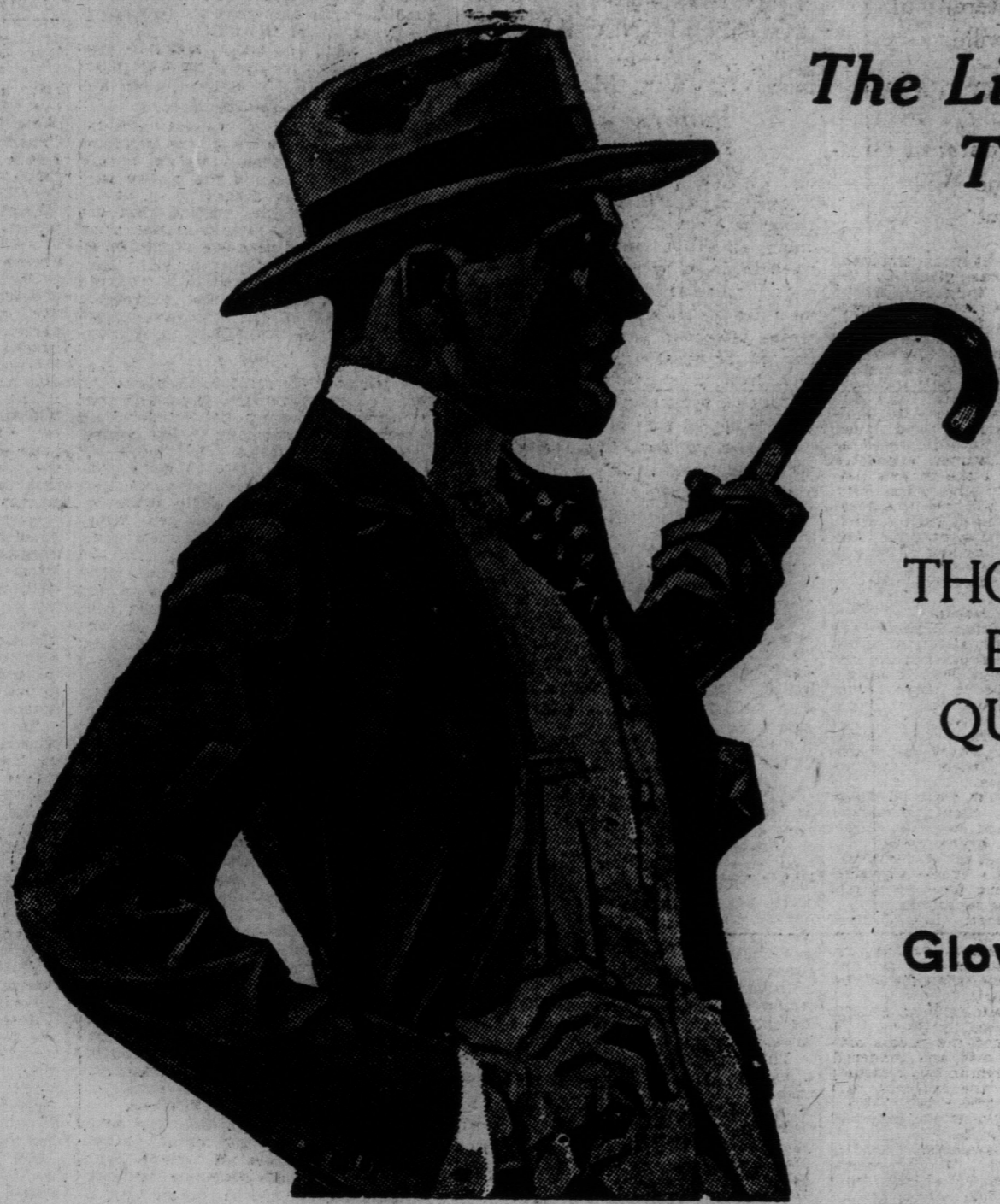

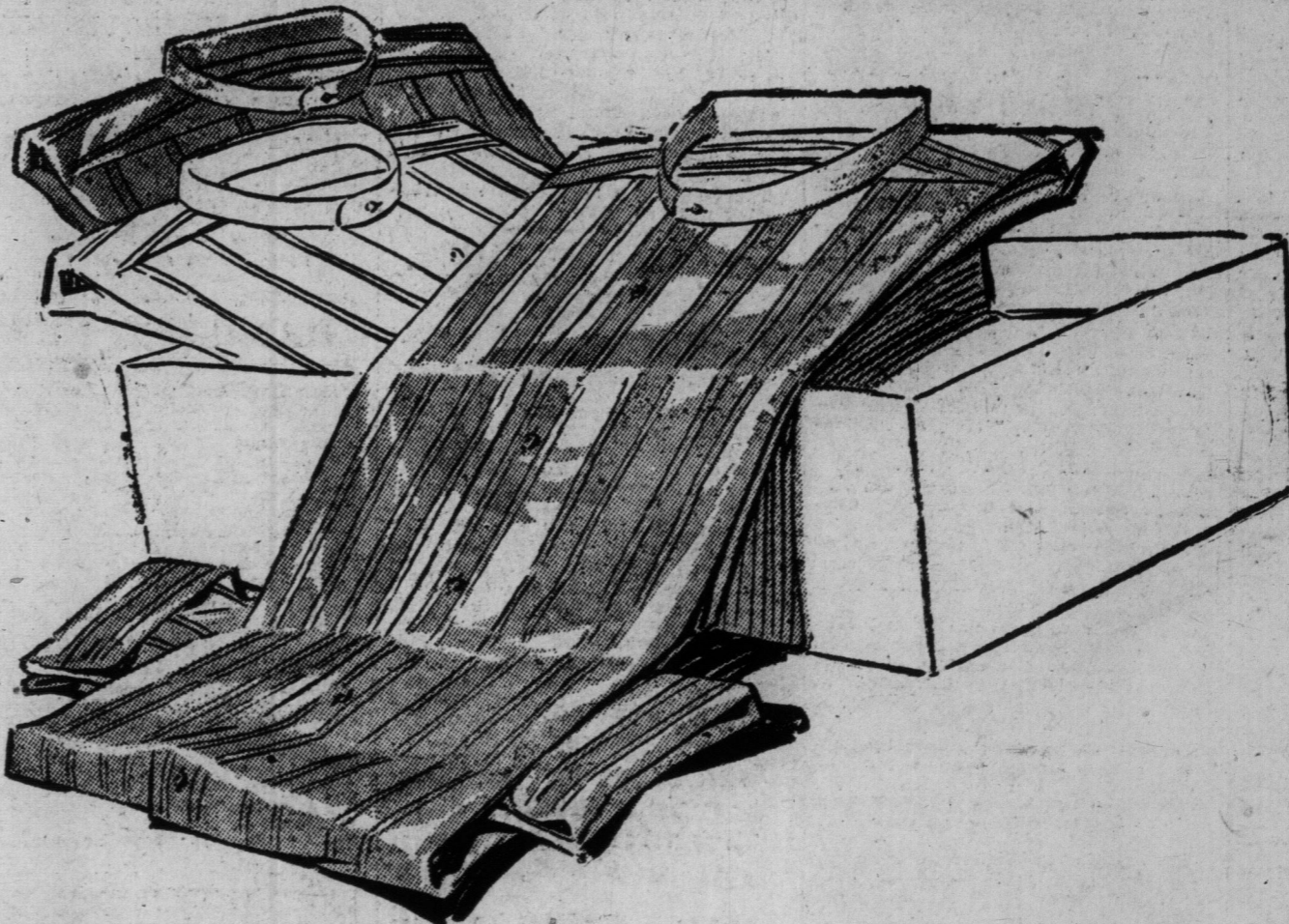

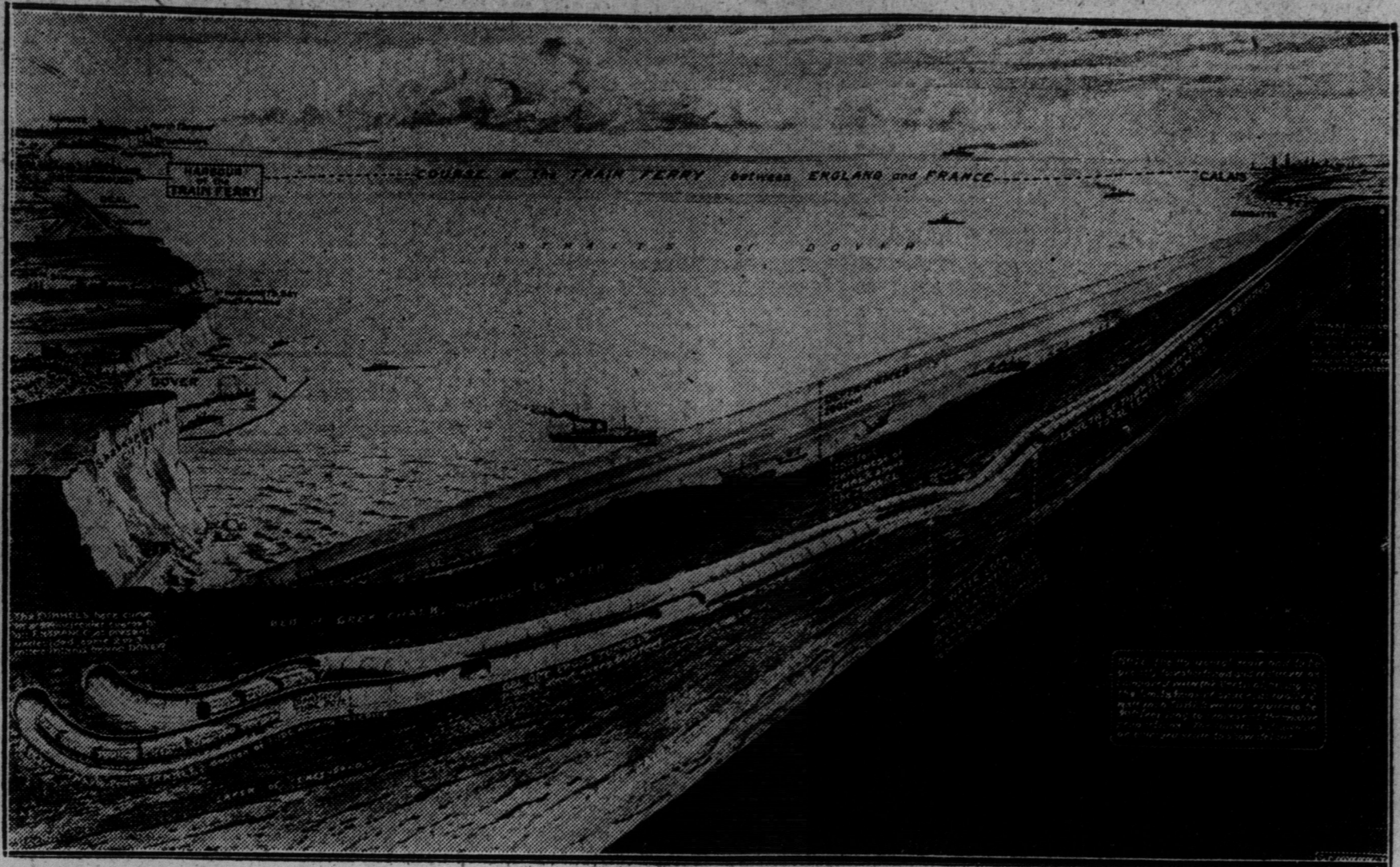

MAY EXPECT ATTACKS WHILE SNOW LASTS

The losses of the enemy were considerable, while the allied casualties were slight, the statement adds.

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THE DAY AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, April 4.—The house of commons showed itself quite willing today to establish a department of public health, but some of the members shied at the clause in the government's bill which provided that the minister of public health should have jurisdiction over all matters and questions relating to "the social welfare of the people of Canada."

Dr. Sheard of South Toronto, made measure of Mr. Rowell himself. He met at the threshold of his speech the objection that public health was purely a provincial affair.

Dr. Peter McEldon of Muskoka, thought there was a great opening for the new department in research work. To investigations of this kind there could be no objection, and the federal government was in every way better fitted to carry them out than the provincial governments.

An amusing feature was the disposition of the members to regard Mr. Rowell as a medical man as soon as they became aware of the fact that he had been in training for minister of public health.

Mr. Steele of South Perth, who, for years has advocated a federal department of health, such as the one being created today, sought to pour oil on the waters by suggesting that public health and social welfare were inseparably connected.
