Low Prevalence of Fever Good Index to Waterworks and Sewerage System Development.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES STATISTICS

Report of Provincial Board of Health Presents Interesting Figures and Comment.

The twenty-first annual report of the Provincial Board of Health, just issued, notes a particularly high state of the general health of the province in the matter of contagious diseases.

In this connection Dr. Vaux, in his preface to the report, further says: "The rapid growth of the urban population of the province, thru the development of manufacturing industries in the several cities and towns, is forcing the question, not only of waterworks but of sewage disposal, into great prominence."

Smallpox Death Rate Low. Among contagious diseases, in the case of smallpox, the rate of mortality is remarkably low, being 0.44 per cent.

Of scarlet fever, smallpox and diphtheria and typhoid, 10,490 cases came under the supervision of the Board of Health, with a mortality of 952, or 9.3 per cent.
