Washington, June 15.—Washington has been selected as the seat of negotiations between the plenipotentiaries of Russia and Japan for a treaty of peace. Official announcement was made by Secretary Lusk at the White House at 1:25 p.m. today. It was in typewritten form and read as follows: "When the two governments were unable to agree upon either Chfoo or Paris, the plenipotentiaries suggested the Hague, but both governments have now requested that Washington be chosen as the place of meeting and the president has accordingly formally notified both governments that Washington will be selected as the place of meeting. After the acceptance by Russia and Japan of President Roosevelt's proposition that they consider the question of peace, Russia indicated Paris as the most desirable place for the meeting to negotiate a treaty, and Japan indicated Chfoo. POISONED, BUT NOT HAD CORONER'S JURY INTIMATE

Mrs. Hamel of Waterloo May Have Met Foul Play, But Crown Attorney Says He Will Not Make Any Inquiry.

Waterloo, June 15.—(Special)—Was Henrietta Hamel, wife of Henry K. Hamel of this town, poisoned by her own hand, or was it the work of her second husband? This is the question that is agitating the minds of people throughout Waterloo and the vicinity, and which the jury this afternoon refused to answer. Poisoned she was, so much has been proven, and the jury in fact has answered so strong is the suspicion against her miser husband, Henry Hamel, that a movement is on foot to force the crown to take criminal proceedings. It was six weeks ago when Mrs. Hamel, then the widow Likens, married Henry Hamel, a widower of 66, and the terror of all the boys of the neighborhood, who had a little land in the town, and by working a little truck and fruit plot in one way and another, eked out a living and even saved money. His second matrimonial venture was not a success from Mrs. Hamel's point of view. Time and again she complained to the neighbors that she was being treated badly by her husband, and of his ugly behavior to her. Flesh and blood could not stand it for many years, and in a few months ago the old lady, played out, was taken ill. She kept at work all the time, but the husband was a miser, and she would relieve her of some of the household tasks, and a doctor to attend her. She refused to accept of a refusal, in desperation she called Rev. Mr. Schultz, the Lutheran pastor, to her assistance, and asked him to plead with her husband. He too, failed; she got neither help nor sympathy. Her husband was dead. This is the only scrap of evidence in the case of the suicide theory. But she did not die for some weeks.

CENTIPEDES BAYAGE ASPARAGUS. New Species of Centipede Found in California, Which Bites the Scientists.

A discovery which is expected to startle the scientific world was announced by Prof. Woodruff, who is in charge of the entomological work of the College of Agriculture, in a Berkeley dispatch to the San Francisco Call.

It has not been known hitherto that centipedes preyed upon vegetable life in all the literature, dating with the subject.

The circumstances relating to the discovery of the centipede's work, the remains of the pest and the changes that must now be made in the data relating to centipedes, will all be treated in an article which Professor Woodruff is preparing to be issued soon.

The asparagus-growers in the Sacramento valley were puzzled, said Professor Woodruff, "when they discovered recently that their young plants were being cut out by a peculiar-looking insect, differing in form from any of the pests and making no familiar with. One man there knew the peculiarities of centipedes, decided that the pest was a centipede, and he was in the right."

"Now centipedes bite people and they bite animals, or they bite insects," he said, "and they bite man and life, so far as science is concerned, and in all the literature on the subject they are classified as carnivorous insects."

"When the asparagus-growers wrote to me that they believed centipedes were attacking their young plants, I replied that such could hardly be a case, as centipedes are carnivorous," he said.

First Mason Third, a Length Behind - Delhi Tirad and Beladme's Stamina Told.

New York, June 15.-Beladme was crowned queen of the American turf when she won the twenty-second Suburban Handicap this afternoon at Sheepshead Bay. She was the second mare to capture the classic. The grand two-year-old daughter of Octagon and Bella Donna, wearing the scarlet jacket of August Belmont, chairman of the Jockey Club, showed the color of James R. Keene's Delia almost without being asked until near the end of the race, slipped into second place, but was again overtaken by the champion when she won by a length and a half. Her time was 1:22.2.
