DUBLIN CENTRE OF GAYETY UNDER ABERDEEN'S RULING

Ex-Governor of Canada Ushers era of Good Feeling to Emerald Isle—Viceregal Gayeties are Now More Brilliant Than Ever.

DUBLIN, March 28.—Viceregal gayeties in the Irish capital are of a brilliancy which has no parallel in the history of the Dublin Court. The two contributing reasons are, of course, Lord Aberdeen's popularity on the one hand, and on the other, the very general appreciation of England's more liberal attitude toward Ireland and anticipation of the results of the new policy approved by the King.

Court morning was omitted for the occasion, and Her Excellency wore a marvel of a gown of gray satin ornamented with Irish embroidery worked in silver and pearls in its design, with gray velvet and draped with Limerick lace. Her tiara was of diamonds, with a riviere of the same jewels.

Viscountess Hawkesbury, whose husband is state steward and chamberlain, made the introductions. She was in ivory satin, with a train of mauve satin.

A Marie Stuart cap of diamonds was the headpiece of Lady Clementine Vicieregal, which she wore with a very particular effect.

Lady Widon and Lady Macdonell, Lady Westcott, Lady Cloness and Viscountess Powerscourt were all in the viceregal circle.

The two little pages were Lord Killen, son of the Earl of Londonderry, and Lord Master Annot, son of Sir John and Lady Annot. They wore St. Patrick's blue costumes and made a charming bit of color.

Of the men Viscount Hawkesbury, Sir Anthony Weld, Viscountess de Grey, Mr. Featherstonhaugh (deputy chamberlain), the Right Hon. Anthony Patrick McDonnell, who bore the sword of state; Sir Arthur Vigne (Ulster King of Arms), Viscount Powerscourt (comptroller), Lord Herchless (private secretary), the very Rev. R. Godfrey Webster (Dean of the Chapel Royal), Capt. Walter Waring (Honorary Secretary of the Viceroy), and Capt. Page (Eleventh Hussars) and a long list of aides-de-camp added to the distinction of the group about Lord Aberdeen.

Countess Annesley, Marchioness Conyngham, the Countess of Mayo, the Countess of Westmorland, the Countess of Granard, Viscountess Leinster, Viscountess Monck, Lady Edith King-Tenison, Lady Margaret Forbes, the Countess of Kingston, Lady Gwendoline Guinness, Lady Ferny, Lady de Freyne, the Hon. Miss Lily French, Miss Emma Colles and many others, whose Irish lineage is their dearest pride, have given the throne room at the castle the veritable color of hospitality, under the gracious auspices of the Viceroy and Vicereine.

St. Patrick's Hall has figured as the scene of many gayeties, and the band of the Cameron Highlanders has on frequent occasions contributed the music.

On the night of the levee following the drawing-room Lord and Lady Aberdeen took a large party to the Mouth Box Hotel, one of the most successful public houses ever organized in Dublin, in the Royal Dublin Society's new Art Industrial Hall, which was beautifully decorated. The Viceroy opened the ball with Lady Macdonnell, Lady Aberdeen dancing with the senior captain of the Meath Hospital, W. Taylor. Among those present were Lord and Lady Powerscourt, Lord and Lady Herchless, Lady Annesley, Lady Milbank, Lady Granard and Lady Margaret Forbes, Sir Allan Mackenzie, Sir Reginald Hill, the Hon. Justice Pollock, and Count and Countess Markievicz.

On Thursday the Viceroy and Vicereine gave a dinner and dance in the Castle, on Friday a state ball, and on Saturday evening an afternoon reception.

Then came the second drawing-room on the 10th, Thursday and St. Patrick's ball Friday.

The week's festivities included a ball given by Lord and Lady Aberdeen on Saturday, and another given at the Royal Hospital by Lord and Lady Grenfell.

MANCHESTER'S COTTON INDUSTRY

An English Spinner's View of the World's Trade, Present and Prospective.

(Special Cor. N. Y. Evening Post.)

Last year was a period of unexampled activity in the Lancashire cotton trade. The profits declared were larger than ever known in the industry. Shipments of piece goods were very heavy, and the weight of yarn exported was about twenty-five per cent more than in the previous twelve months. It is noteworthy that almost all foreign outlets took more of Lancashire cotton and yarn. China increased her taking of Lancashire goods, and there was a considerable improvement in the shipments to Japan. All the world seemed to be buying Lancashire goods, and taking in deliveries on a free scale. The result of this brisk trade was the extension of the weaving sheds in all parts of the county. New looms were put down in almost every village.

It is estimated that at the end of June this year, nearly 60,000 new looms will be working, as compared with eighteen months ago. This new machinery will be worth, nearly \$10,000,000. New spinning factories have been, and are being, erected on a rather reckless scale. Last year quite a number started work, but there are at the present moment in course of erection about fifty others, with five millions of spindles. These to fully equipped will cost \$28,000,000, and will find employment for not far from 14,000 hands.

This year has opened with a continued active demand from abroad for piece goods and bundle yarn. India shippers have given out extensive contracts for delivery during the latter months of the year. China merchants have bought specialties in the textile outside of the Continent have placed contracts for several months ahead. The demand is heavy, and the profit per piece is large. It is estimated that the profit per loom at the present time is not far from four shillings per week, so that in a weaving shed with 1,000 looms the profit is about \$200 per week. This is considered an understatement. Speaking broadly, manufacturers are giving out the end of June, many producers having engagements beyond that time.

A feature of interest in the improvement in the off-take of home trade cotton goods. The distribution houses in London, Manchester and Glasgow are better than for a long time back. Large purchases were made last week end, in preparation for the spring demand. The prospects are good, and more money is being made by the wholesale houses than for a long time past. The spinning department of the trade is better at the end of February than at the close of last year. This refers more to American yarns than to Egyptian spinning. American counts have improved so by close upon 1.2 d. per pound, owing to the drop in cotton. Egyptian spinning have been strong for several months back, but their position today is one of greater strength than for some years to come. There has been just lately a very brisk demand for such descriptions. Shipping yarns have also been active. Indeed, all round a most encouraging state of affairs can be reported.

Raw cotton has fallen in price during the year so far, but the price has nevertheless for some time been looked upon as still rather high. Though the American crop will be only about eleven million bales in the previous season, it is expected there will be a large surplus this year. The Egyptian cotton supply does not look very well. The growth this season it is feared will be small. In long staple descriptions are considered abnormally high and are advancing. East Indian cotton is not now used in Lancashire, but the matter of supply creates some interest, as it affects the consumption of American grades on the Continent and in the Far East.

HO! FOR THE WEST LAND

Three Hundred English Immigrants Passed Through From Halifax This Morning.

Three hundred English immigrants arrived in the city on a special train early this morning from Halifax where they landed from the steamer Corsea yesterday afternoon. They were a fine looking lot, not one poorly dressed man or woman being in the party. Officer Collins has never had a more brightly lot of immigrants in the station. A Times reporter interviewed one of the Englishmen. He was six feet tall and weighed in the vicinity of 200 pounds. He said that most of the party were from Glasgow and Liverpool. "The passage out on the Corsea was a good one, very little rough weather being met with. We are mostly all young men, very few of us being over 40 years of age. I am not going to settle in Winnipeg, no matter how good a city it is, I want to strike work in a country place with a few thousand inhabitants. I have farmed all my life and would not be successful at any other work. There are about seventy-five women amongst us and about that number of children. The Englishmen were not aware this morning that they were in the winter port of Canada until shortly before the train left and a number of them were disappointed when told that they would not have time to go to Sand Point and see the steamer. "On the voyage out one young Englishman took seriously ill and it was thought that he would have to be left at Halifax. He was put aboard the train, however, and this morning was somewhat better. None of the immigrants were ill at Halifax as there were none suffering from infectious diseases. The special of eleven cars carrying the immigrants left for the west at 9.30.

TWO STEAMERS CAME IN TODAY

The Kastalia From Glasgow and the Oriana From South Africa Arrived This Morning

The Donaldson line steamer Kastalia, Capt. Webb, arrived at port this morning direct from Glasgow with 14 cabin passengers for the west and about 100 returned emigrants. Captain Webb reports a good passage. The steamer has on board 20 pedigree horses for the province of Ontario which were landed at the new city wharf at one o'clock today. The steamer also brought a large general cargo for this port, including 327 bags soft coal and 3105 bags hard coal. The South African steamer, Oriana, Capt. Sullivan, arrived this morning from New York by ballast and berthed at the I. C. B. wharf at 12.30 o'clock where a large cargo awaits her for Cape Town, Port Elizabeth and Durban. The steamer left Halifax February 19th and put into Bermuda for coal on her way here.
