British Drive Ahead On The Tigris Front

London, Feb. 28.—The British are continuing to advance rapidly on the Tigris front. Official announcement was made here today that on Sunday, Feb. 26, the British were engaged on the left bank of the river more than thirty miles west and northwest of Kut-el-Amara.

The paper problem, he said, primarily is a forest problem and can be solved by reforestation and scientific forestry to keep up a continuous production of pulpwoods.

Boston, Feb. 28.—Federal state and city forces were put into action here yesterday in an attempt to obtain relief from the present high price of food and other necessities. The federal grand jury heard the testimony of merchants, shipper, warehouse and cold storage men, who were called by District Attorney George W. Anderson to testify in an attempt to determine whether the high prices were due to illegal combinations or other violations of interstate laws.

BRITISH ARMY SCALE OF PENSIONS INCREASED

London, Feb. 28.—An order-in-council establishing a new pension plan for the British Army was issued today. Under it privates totally disabled will receive a minimum of 27 shillings 6 pence weekly. If this sum is insufficient to enable the soldier to live approximately to his before-war standard, he will be given an alternative pension based on his earnings previous to the war.

Calls On Wilson To Make It War

Time For Declaration, Says New York Tribune—Occasion Compels Him to Make Word Good—President Still Awaits Action of Congress

New York, Feb. 28.—Under the caption "Time to Declare War," the Tribune in its leading editorial this morning says: "At last the administration faces an 'either-or' on Germany's part which it can hardly explain away. American citizens traveling on the Laconia have been murdered under exactly the same conditions as those under which American citizens were murdered nearly two years ago on the Lusitania and the Arabic. Mr. Wilson has said many times that he would not tolerate any more such murders. He has pledged himself again and again to 'protect our people in their legitimate and peaceful pursuits on the sea.'"

GERARD SAILS

Corona, Spain, Feb. 27.—James W. Gerard, former American ambassador at Berlin, sailed today on the steamer Infanta Isabel for Havana. The steamer is expected to reach port on March 8 or 9.

HIGH HONORS FOR DR. G. F. MATTHEW

Montreal, Feb. 28.—A London cable says Dr. G. F. Matthew, of St. John, N. B., has been awarded the Marsden Medal and a check by the Royal Geological Society, for valuable services in connection with geological research in New Brunswick.

WRECK ON I. C. R.

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 28.—The Maritime Express, which left Moncton on Monday evening, northbound, was wrecked at St. Pascal, about twenty-five miles north of Riviere du Loup yesterday afternoon. The locomotive and all the cars were derailed. The airbrakes brought to a stand still cars as remained upright, within a few yards, but two or three day coaches toppled into a ditch. The heavy steel cars with which all C. G. R. first class trains are equipped, saved the lives of the passengers.

MEMBERS OF BEATEN GOVERNMENT HOLDING MEETING IN CAPITAL

Fredrickton, N. B., Feb. 28.—Members of the provincial government with the exception of Messrs. Landry and Taylor, are today holding a meeting here. Hon. Arthur Culligan, former member, who was defeated before he was sworn in, arrived today accompanied by J. B. Hickey, of Gloucester, and D. A. Stewart, of Restigouche. Lieut-Governor Wood is also here conferring with his advisers. It is regarded as scarcely likely that the government will attempt to put through any business of an important nature. It is not known just when the resignations will be in order.

**IMPORTANCE OF SHIPBUILDING**

Los. M. Tobin Presents Facts Regarding Race for Supremacy in Shipping

To the Editor of The Halifax Herald: Sir—As the subject of shipbuilding is of world wide interest at the present time perhaps you will find it interesting to know that the future of the empire and particularly the future of Nova Scotia and the city of Halifax.

I propose to deal with the subject under three main heads: 1. Shipbuilding—A world-wide necessity. 2. Shipbuilding—A patriotic duty. 3. Shipbuilding—A provincial opportunity.

The great need which has wrought such destruction of property and wealth that it may seem an exaggeration to say that the loss of tonnage stands out as the greatest and most serious material loss of all. But I believe that statement is true.

In August, 1914, the world's shipping tonnage was numbered at 50,000,000 tons, of which the British holdings were nearly one-half or to be exact 21,045,000 tons. Next to Great Britain came Germany with a mercantile marine of 14,947,720 tons.

By the first of February, 1917, about 2,300 ships aggregating 4,200,000 tons had been destroyed by war agencies. This is irrespective of the loss through non-war or natural agencies which must bring the total reduction in tonnage to a much higher figure. Of these 4% more has been destroyed by the total war loss of tonnage to date amounting to 2,734,000 tons.

Assuming that the present rate of destruction is maintained by the first of July the loss of tonnage will reach the stupendous figure of nearly 7 million tons.

But in considering the effect of the war on the shipbuilding industry and its prospects one must bring into the calculation against the loss of tonnage, the new construction during the period under review.

In the year before the war the United Kingdom turned out 14 million tons of mercantile shipping, about an average yearly output. In 1916 the output of the United Kingdom was 19,000 tons. Germany's average before the war was about 700,000 tons. Her output during the war is unknown, but it is known that she has been making a supreme effort to repair her naval losses and to construct new war vessels, including an immense flotilla, and it is fair to assume that the cessation of her naval programme has left little room for mercantile shipbuilding during the period of the war.

But the war has seen the rise of the United States and Japan in the shipbuilding world. In the year before the war the United States built less than 250,000 tons. In 1916 her output was over a million tons. Japan's output rose from 80,000 tons in the year before the war to 246,000 tons in 1916.

The output of France on the other hand has fallen off from less than 200,000 tons to 39,000 tons in 1916. These figures show a net loss of tonnage of the most serious proportions. They also show that the wide-awake Americans and Japs have seen and seized the opportunity of expanding their shipbuilding industries.

### THE DANGER ZONE

The new provincial government must look to itself. There will be an effort on the part of the men of the Fleming-Murray regime to induce the new administration to let bygones be bygones, let down the lid and forget the very political crimes which roused the people and caused the revolution. Even among the members of the victorious party there may be a disposition toward undue lenience.

To say that stern measures are still necessary is not to betray a vindictive spirit, but to point out a duty. All the things that were said about graft and corruption are as true today as they were before polling day. There are men in public life today who ought not to be in public life. There are manipulators who ought to be exposed. There are gross partisans in office who ought to be dismissed. The new government cannot make no more fatal mistake than to listen to the smooth words of men who have an object in talking smoothly and averting enquiry into their own activities.

There must be another royal commission, with ample powers to go after all the evidence. And in this connection it may be observed that the destruction of public documents is a criminal offence, and any attempt on the part of any individual to conceal the facts concerning any transaction by that method would bring its own punishment.

Not in any vindictive spirit should the new government proceed to uncover the misdeeds of the past half dozen years, but as a guarantee of good faith and as a warning to future administrations. Every effort will be made to prevent enquiry, and an easy-going acquiescence in sordid proposals which may be made would be the first step in a downward path. The new government is in power today because the people want an end of graft and corruption, and its members should not for one moment lose sight of that fact. If honor is to be restored to public life there are still some whose activities should be exposed and labelled.

### LEADERSHIP NEEDED

The decision arrived at in Toronto yesterday by prominent Canadians to hold at some central point in Canada a great wide-war convention is in accordance with the plan outlined in St. John recently by Mr. J. S. Dennis, and heartily approved by the Citizens' Committee. It is a result of the failure of Sir Robert Borden to abolish the patronage committee, call strong men to his councils, and give the country a truly national government.

The Financial Post of Canada in its last issue discusses the situation with great frankness. Like Canadian Financial Times and other financial journals, it calls for a radical change, and that call is emphasized by such organizations as the Winnipeg Canadian Club and Board of Trade. Only yesterday the patronage committee, call strong men to his councils, and give the country a truly national government.

The Financial Post says further: "The necessity that practical business executives handle the country's national affairs is being more and more generally recognized. The need of the hour is such that the public is beginning to demand that steps be taken to secure the efficient management of the government departments at Ottawa. What is wanted is that the present system be smashed and that captains of industry and finance, who have proven themselves equal to their tasks, be called upon to conduct the nation's business. Men without the ability to conduct a village candy store are a menace to the country's best interests when placed in charge of important departments."

And here is another significant paragraph: "The war has forced other countries to recognize the need for efficient administration. Canada is beginning to see the light. The Post understands from a Conservative member of the Commons, a man with large business interests, that Sir Robert Borden realizes the necessity for a change; that he would like to have the resignations of several of his ministers if men prominent in the country's business circles could be called in to replace them. We have reason to believe that he would gladly accept the resignations of the ministers of trade and commerce, immigration, agriculture and labor—these departments have never had weaker heads—and would be prepared to immediately place the portfolios in the hands of capable, business administrators of proven

practical capacity rather than political astuteness."

And while Sir Robert Borden, his eyes opened by his visit to England, is calling for more vigor in recruiting Sir George Foster is telling a Hamilton audience that the people are not yet ready to have the militia act put in force, and Sir Sam Hughes is out gunning on his own account.

Canada needs—not a Sir Robert Borden or a Sir George Foster—but a national leader. And the sooner the better.

MR. E. S. CARTER.  
Mr. E. S. Carter, more than any other individual, has brought about the change that promises this province good government. Everybody professes more or less surprise, and some are even amazed, that a government which swept the province in 1912 should be utterly defeated in 1917. Mr. E. S. Carter is the man who exposed that government, remained on its trail and brought out the facts, and aroused the public sentiment which swept it from power. He held to his task, though assailed as no other man in public life in New Brunswick has ever been assailed with abuse and vituperation and slander. When he sought the remedy the courts provide, he was presented with a jury list which contained the names of tory ward chairmen and others from whom he could never expect a verdict based on the merits of the case. He was refused royal commissions when he sought to disclose more of the iniquity of the government, and even some in his own party did not give him the whole-hearted support he deserved. But he did not falter or turn aside, and today his party is in power. He himself was defeated by the lavish use of every influence known to corrupt politicians, but the cause he advocated when nobody else seemed to care very much has triumphed.

Mr. Carter ought to be in the new cabinet. There is no man in the ranks as capable of getting at the facts as to the conditions in the various departments; nor any man more sincere in his determination to stand for honest government. Mr. Carter's work speaks for him. He should be rewarded by the opportunity to go on giving honorable and effective service in the public life of New Brunswick.

Referring to the result of the elections the Maritime Baptist says: "The provincial election resulted in the defeat of the government, the opposition securing twenty-seven seats out of forty-eight. It is impossible to say what effect, if any, the temperance situation had upon the result. We have no reason to doubt that the new government will accept and enforce the prohibition measure already passed. But the fact that every licensed district except the city of St. John returned the liquor interests will make every effort to secure control, and every friend of temperance should be on guard to defeat their ends." Not a word here about the greater issue in the campaign, which was the question of honor in public life.

The British agent on the western front continues. The German retirement along a portion of that front is a confession of weakness, but they have still immense armies in the field. We are approaching the crisis of the great war. With better weather the great British armies will strike harder than ever before, and they will need all the reinforcements Canada and other parts of the Empire can supply.

The overt act has been committed. The young American who calls upon President Wilson to avenge the murder of his mother and his sister by the Hun will have millions of sympathizers in the United States. Congress may be expected to vindicate the honor of the nation when the issue is so squarely presented by Germany.

### British Take Three Villages

Additional progress has been made by the British forces north and south of the Ancre region, in France, and also to the south of Lens. In the Ancre district the village of Ligny, southwest of Bapaume, has been occupied and north of the stream and western and northern defenses of Palsieux have been taken from the Germans, according to the British official communication, issued last night.

The present objective of the British is a crest which overlooks the high ground running between Achiet-les-Bains to Bapaume, where the Germans may attempt to hold for a time.

Turkish troops taken prisoner by the British at Kut-el-Amara, now number several thousands. The retreating Turks were being pursued and an artillery and infantry section was taking place fifteen miles northwest of Kut at last reports.

WHAT PROVINCE NEEDS TO ATTRACT TOURISTS

That good roads, good hotels and an improved river service are absolutely necessary to the successful carrying on of the tourist trade of the province of New Brunswick, is one of the statements of interest set forth in a summary of the annual report of the New Brunswick Tourist Association just issued.

The report indicates that the association, in spite of the depressing effect of the European war, has "carried on" with splendid zeal and earnest determination during the year 1916 and hopes for a bumper season this year. Several improvements were made in the service of the association to the travelling public last season which brought about good results. The annual report speaks with deep regret of the very great loss suffered through the death of Frank C. Smith, the second vice-president. "His zeal and energy contributed very largely to the success attending the association's efforts in past years," adds the report. "The year opened up with a balance on hand of \$848.70, the total receipts for the year were \$2,708.84, the expenditures were \$2,571.47, leaving a balance of \$981.07 on hand."

Their Work For Women and Girls

Report Tells of Activities of Home of the Good Shepherd in Caring for Little Ones and Wayward Women

Answering the question raised as to the right of the Home of the Good Shepherd to a civic grant, those in charge yesterday gave the following information: Since its organization in 1899, the Home of the Good Shepherd, which Monday received a grant of \$500 from the city, has cared for more than 300 orphans, besides 810 wayward girls, and 287 women prisoners, sent there to serve out their jail sentences by the local police court. Today there are 148 inmates of the Home. Although the greater part of the charges sent to the Sisters of the Good Shepherd are Catholics, yet not a few are of other creeds, and they are compelled in no way to assist in the Catholic services. Orphans and girls who have at other times belonged to parents of other faiths have by preference of those in charge or directing them been sent to institutions organized by their denominations, but the Home of the Good Shepherd draws no line of color or creed. At present two colored women and two Indian girls are included among those being educated to usefulness and thrift. In addition to providing for the large number sent them, the sisters have paid the funeral expenses of thirty-five who have died at the home. St. Michael's laundry, run in conjunction with the home, and supplied with labor largely by prisoners and those who are able to work, is a source of income for the home, but it does not, as some merchants state, undercut laundries employing paid help. List prices for all types of washing show that its charges are even in excess of the average laundry. In addition to being taught the essential knowledge of successful laundry work, a part of the day is devoted to study, another to sewing and household duties, and a time is set aside for recreation and religious instruction. Domestic training, physical drill, confection and mending of stockings, are all carried on under the direction of the mother superior and thirty-five sisters who now compose the personnel of the teaching and supervising staff.

Tom Daly Was Offered in The Trade for Wood. Former St. John Boy Mentioned in the Deal Which Gave Indians "Smoky" Joe Wood, but Frazer Held Out for Cash.

Boston, Feb. 26.—Joe Wood, one-time king of pitchers and idol of local fans, has been sold by Pres. Frazer of the Red Sox to the Cleveland team for \$15,000.

The sale was put through at the Waldorf Hotel in New York city, following a five hours' conference between President Frazer of the Red Sox and Vice-President McRoy of the Cleveland club. Mr. McRoy tried hard to convince the Red Sox president that Catcher Daly of the Cleveland club and a cash sum considerably less than that demanded by Frazer would be about right, but President Frazer could not be budged.

President Dunn was finally located in Pittsburg, and, being apprised of the situation, authorized McRoy to put the deal through at \$15,000. During the conference Wood was in touch with Frazer and McRoy. So far as the Boston club is concerned, Wood will not receive any of the purchase money. It is understood, however, that Wood and McRoy came to terms prior to the closing of the deal.

In these days of the high cost of baseball, the sale of Wood for \$15,000 is a record-breaker. This deal differs from any other ever made, in as much as the purchasing club is taking a big gamble on a player whom many experts declare "will fail."

Wood came to Boston from the Kansas City club of the American Association in 1907, being discovered by Fred Progers and the McNamara brothers. He got away to a bad start, but in 1909 had a good year and did good work up to 1913, his big year being 1915, when he topped all the hurlers and won 16 straight games.

**The Man In The Street**

We will refrain from saying "We told you so."

Editors of government papers are earning their salaries these days by their frantic efforts to discover other than the obvious reasons for the defeat at the polls.

It is noticeable enough when they contradict each other—but more so when they contradict themselves in the same article.

Refusing to accept the responsibility themselves, some of the government spokesmen are blaming it all on federal issues. Seems a mean advantage to take of Hon. Mr. Hays in his absence.

The new government will be able to save the province one heavy item of expense; they won't require any expensive royal commissions to investigate their doings.

Mr. Tilley's debut as a prophet, when he said that the lowest man on the government city ticket would be 500 votes ahead of the highest opposition candidate, did not demonstrate his right to the mantle.

The government intimation that the English speaking counties are more tolerant of graft than the Acadians is too weak to stand; the biggest turnover in the province was the disappearance of the 8,000 majority which the government had in St. John city in 1912.

**He Did Not Vote**

All the attempts at impersonations on Saturday did not succeed. One willing worker entered a booth to vote. The returning officer asked him his name. "Excuse me," he said, and he stepped outside.

"What was that name I was to vote under?" he asked the government man at the door in a hoarse whisper.

The information was given and the would-be voter stepped inside the booth again. "Sorry to keep you waiting," he said. "I just wanted to speak to a man outside. My name is John Smith."

"Get out of this" was the returning officer's courteous reply—and he got.

**Where They Scored**

The government forces had reason to fear the soldier vote, when the soldiers were left to themselves, and efforts were made to persuade in the afternoon so they all could vote at the same time.

They lined up at 8:30 and marched to the polls. When they got there they found a crowd of other voters at the door and they had to wait their turn.

Four o'clock arrived with the booths still crowded with civilians, and the polls closed. The government workers were angry; they were satisfied that they presented a large number of votes from being lost for the opposition.
