London, Nov. 10-The British made an attack this morning on the Flanders front near Passchendaele. The war office announces that early reports indicate good progress. The announcement follows:

"At sunrise this morning our troops attacked German positions northwest and north of Passchendaele. The first reports indicate that good progress was made. The weather is stormy, with heavy rain and high winds." Today's operations were carried out on a 2,500 yard front for limited ob-

jectives, which had been virtually all gained by ten o'clock. British Front in Belgium, Nov. 10-(By the Associated Press)-The British troops which attacked this morning in the Passchendaele area were reported at an early hour to have battled their way forward as much as 800 yards at some points. The British passed many strongly fortified farms north and north vest of Goeberg. At this point they were fighting nearly half a mile from their jumping off place. The line was pushed northward along the Passchendaele

Ridge almost to the point at which the highest crest starts sloping downward. President Tory Tells of Plan To Use in Demobilization Period

Do Teaching in England — Agricultural College for 40,000 Canadian Farmer Soldiers—Business and Other Educational Training Proposed

How the demobilization period may be used for giving to Canadian soldiers an intensive education which will make them an asset of inestimable value to Canada after the war, was outlined to the Montreal Canadian Club at a lun-cheon in the Windsor Hotel by President cheon in the Windsor Hotel by President H. M. Tory, of Alberta University, who has lately returned after visiting the Canadian camps in England and France. President Tory related stories which showed the almost pathetic desire of many of the soldiers to remedy defects of early education or to prevent themselves losing the value of the education they had already had, and he told as well of the large and valuable mine of teaching ability already in the army and which could be utilized for agricultural colleges, business colleges and every colleges, business colleges and every other kind of college which would help the men to prepare themselves again for civil life along lines which would suit their natural aptitudes and ambisuit their natural aptitudes and ambitions. Presidents and principals, as well as the governing bodies, of Canadian universities have assured President Tory of their hearty co-operation in the idea, and Sir Robert Borden told a deputation that every effort would be made to help them, subject always to the proviso that military necessity must be considered first.


Day's Cost of War Enough

Dr. Tory told also of the way in which the Y. M. C. A., aided by the chaplains and many officers, kept a great library circulating for the benefit of the soldiers. Any man asking for any book could get it if it was to be had or purchasable in England. He told of how soldiers had organized themselves to get lessons from comrades who selves to get lessons from comrades who could teach them things they wanted to know, such as shorthand and type-writing. His first idea was that an ag-ricultural college should be established for the 40,000 farmers in the Canadian army. If only ten per cent. of them took advantage of it during the demobilization period, the results would be of tremendous benefit to the men and to Canada. Intensive instruction just as in the case of the army would teach them in a year what it would take five years in Canada. There were men who had been heads of commercial colleges in the army, and they were willing to help, and every university principal and member of a board of governors had expressed the utmost enthusiasm.

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
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QUEBEC CITY ENTHUSIASTIC OVER SIR WILFRID LAURIER

Large Gathering Warmly Applauds Protest Against Conscription; Criticism of Government War Policy

Quebec, Nov. 9-Acclaimed by a great gathering of men, women and children outside and inside the Martineau rink, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, opposition leader, tonight opened his election campaign with a speech that carefully analyzed the policy of the government on conscription food control and manufacture of war

Sir Wilfrid received such a welcome in Quebec east as could probably not be duplicated in any other city of the dominion. Forty years ago tomorrow, Sir Wilfrid received his first nomination in the division and a petition to run in Quebec North presented to him tonight bears one signature that appeared on his nomination papers nearly half a century ago—the name of J. Gauthier.

"Laurier is with us; the people are with Laurier," ran a device in huge letters over the platform. The crowd began to gather outside the hall a couple of hours before the meeting. An hour later traffic was stopped. The hall was jammed from wall to wall with a mass that alternately shouted "down with conscription" and demanded that the correspondent of a government paper in Quebec should be thrown into the street. An appeal not to smoke "for Laurier's sake," met with an instant response. A blind man, still bearing his plea for charity, was allowed to work his way to the front of the crowd. With the rest, he shouted his assent to every word.

As Sir Wilfrid appeared on the platform the crowd broke into O! Canada, and roars of cheering.

CONSCRIPTION "BRUTALLY FORCED."

In the main the opposition leader followed the lines of the manifesto he is sued in Ottawa on Nov. 5. He reiterated that it was the first duty of Canada to give assistance to the men at the front. He added that it was "our duty to continue as we had begun—with the voluntary system." The crowd greeted this declaration with an ovation.

Sir Wilfrid declared that "conscription has been brutally" forced on the people, and repeated his plea for a referendum. On the question of the cost of living, he urged the appointment of a "real controller" instead of a man "who only gave advice." He thought that Liberals who joined the union government had made a great mistake and had no doubt that Mr. Carvell "rendered his country greater service in attacking the profiteers who were sapping the blood of the people than he did in joining this government."

Sir Wilfrid, in opening his speech, referred to the changes which had taken place in Quebec East since he first acpeared in Quebec East since he first acpeared without a referdum. Sir Wilfrid then sketched the stand that he had taken at the outbreak of war and declared that he held the same views still. Canada could not remain aloof at such a time.

"I took that stand," Sir Wilfrid went on, "not because I feared invasion of Canada as some people seemed to fear it, but what I feared was hegemony, domination by a people who violated every human and divine law.

"It is our duty," Sir Wilfrid proceeded, "to continue as we began. It is our duty to give assistance to our armies with the voluntary system. We began in 1914 by sending troops on the voluntary system. Everybody said there would be no conscription. (Cheers.) The prime minister declared on many occasions that there would be no conscription. Then suddenly at the end of June he introduced the conscription bill."

"Shame, shame," shouted members of the crowd and the hall was in an uproar for a time.

What Ministers Said.

"In regard to economic questions Sir Wilfrid pleaded a reduction of the tariff along the lines of his manifesto and declared again that action was needed against profiteers. There were men, he said, speculating in the blood of the people.

The audience burst out with loud cries of "shame."

"It is indeed a great shame," said Sir Wilfrid. "These men have been denounced to the government. And what the government appointed a commission. That commission made its report and the government appointed another commission and then nothing but to appoint Mr. Hanna."

There more interruptions took place and for several minutes the crowd jeered the name of Mr. Hanna and broke out into laughter.

"Mr. Hanna says: 'Eat less,'" said Sir Wilfrid.

Again three was a roar of laughter.

"That," Sir Wilfrid declared, "is all that Mr. Hanna has done."



Turning now to some of the problems which have come up in the course of my work, I would place first as perhaps the most insistent, non-support of families. This may arise from a variety of real or imaginary causes, but the result is always the same, suffering more or less acute. Mixed marriages are a fruitful cause of non-support. Again experience seems to prove that a large percentage of marriages contracted too early in life are unhappy. An extreme case, perhaps, was unhappy. An extreme case, perhaps, was investigated by me a couple of weeks ago, where the wife was twenty-four years old and had a daughter eleven ago, where the wife was twenty-four years old and had a daughter eleven years old. I have been consulted in six non-support cases this summer. One of these reached the police court, where the husband promised to do better for his wife and children. Another was somewhat complicated by the misbehavior of the wife and mother, and a satisfactory adjustment appears impossible. In a third the husband left the city to avoid court proceedings and was followed by his wife and family. In the fourth a mixed marriage, the problem was solved for the time by the husband enlisting in the forestry battalion. In the fifth case the wife went home to her mother, taking her baby with her after an appearance in the police court. The sixth was also a mixed marriage. There were two children and matters do not seem very much improved in the family, although the husband is providing a little better for them. In three of these marriages, the girl was under sixteen, while the man was only a year or two older. In one case she was nineteen and in the remaining two the brides were twenty or over. It would seem to me that something ought to be done to impress such over. It would seem to me that something ought to be done to impress such people with the idea that the marriage tie cannot be set aside lightly and that

The first of these was a married woman with two children, who had been deserted by her husband. She gave birth to a third child about a month ago under the most distressing circumstances. paper Le Devoir. He says: "We ask nothing better than to assist Laurier in upsetting the government of national treasons. We wish, however, that he should surround himself, as well as his party, with barriers solid and high enough to prevent brigands of the Northcliffe and Sifton brand from creating alarm in the sheepfold by corrupting the shepherds and in muzzling the watch dogs."

Mr. Bourassa claims that Le Devoir is the interpreter and directing spirit of the Nationalists. Then he says: "The unionist programme is the antipodes of all we admire, of all we believe and all we desire; while it is the essence of all we detest, of all we despise, both in men, ideas and tendencies of both parties. We are, in fact, at our ease in combatting this detestable coalition. We are at one with Laurier in contesting the right of the Tories to seek pardon for their crimes and acts of the past six years."

Mr. Bourassa takes a whack at the Liberal members of the government. He "We in no way share the opinion of the opposition leader as to the respect-

ability of the renegade Liberals who have rallied to the Borden ministry. We see nothing of respectability in the monstrous cupidity of a Sifton, in the hypocrisy of a Fielding or a Rowell, or in the cynicism of a Ballantyne, a Guthrie or a Pugsley. We see in this ministry but the coalition of the most sordid appetites and the most contemptible tendencies."






