Paris, Nov. 10.—More than 50,000 buildings had been demolished in France and more than 100,000 more or less damaged by bombardments and incendiary fires during the war, according to statistics completed up to the end of May.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF SCARLET FEVER SERUM

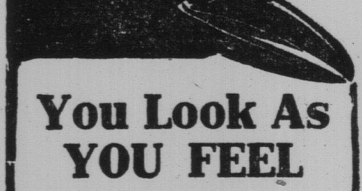
Stockholm, Nov. 10.—Announcement was made at a meeting of the Swedish Medical Society by Dr. Carl Kling, bacteriologist at the Carolinian Institute of the discovery of a serum for the treatment of scarlet fever.

LOSS OF LIFE BY FIRE

In the four years, 1912-15, seven hundred and eighty-nine people were burned to death in Canada, and 78 per cent of those were women and children. More than 300 lives were lost in burning buildings, and it is significant that most of these deaths occurred in dwellings. As might be expected, the majority of the fires was caused by criminal carelessness. This is especially true in regard to the kindling of fires with kerosene and gasolene, and permitting children to play with matches. Such disregard of the safety of human life constitutes a forcible indictment of the entire Canadian attitude towards the danger of fire.

War Menus

How to Save Wheat, Beef and Bacon for the men at the front. Issued from the Office of the Food Controller for Canada.

MENU FOR SUNDAY

Breakfast
Fried Ciscos Brown Bread and Butter
Tea or Coffee

The recipe for Chicken Stew with dumplings mentioned above, is as follows:—

Chicken Stew with Dumplings:—
Take a chicken, not necessarily a young chicken, cut up, and cover with boiling water. Bring to a boil, put on back of stove, cover closely, and simmer several hours. If the gravy is not sufficiently thick, add a little flour to thicken, and season with pepper and salt. In serving, place on the platter freshly-cooked tea biscuits split in two, and pour the stew over them.

The recipe for Corn Bread, mentioned above, is as follows:—

Corn Bread:—
1 cake compressed yeast
2 cups sweet milk, scalded and cooled
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons lard
2½ cups white cornmeal
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs well beaten

Dissolve yeast and sugar in lukewarm milk and add melted fat. Stir in the cornmeal, flour, salt and add well beaten eggs. Beat thoroughly. Fill greased bowl two-thirds full. Set to rise in a warm place for about an hour. Be careful that it does not over rise. It should be baked as soon as light. The baking will require from twenty to thirty minutes, according to thickness of pone. Wheat and meat saving recipes by Domestic Science experts of the Food Controller's Office.

NEW RULES FOR ECONOMY IN FOOD AT HOME URGED

London, Oct. 12.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—England must husband her food supply if her people expect America to economize in food for their sales, it is the plea of a League of National Safety which soon will be launched from the headquarters of the director-general of national economy. Members of the league will be in earnest in adhering to a food ration. "Visitors returning to America from here should have no reason to regret anything approaching scenes of luxury or extravagance," is the warning issued to members of the league.

The members are urged to observe the following rules:
Fresh meat to be served only once a day. No second helpings. Roast meat to be avoided as much as possible; it is wasteful.
Bread with the midday meal only if specially asked for. One slice only a day to be eaten.
One "potato day" a week, to be as nearly as possible a breadless day.
No butter with bread and jam.
Never more than one egg per head at any meal.
The open sugar bowl at table to be abolished.
The league will make a special appeal to those whose wages or incomes have been increased by the war.

Statute To Glorify Stand-On The Marne

Frederick MacMonnies, a sculptor, has been commissioned by a large committee of representative Americans to execute a statue and design a monument, of which this statue will be the crowning figure, to commemorate the victory of the Marne. It is the intention of the committee to present the statue to France in the name of the American people, soon as peace returns to Europe. The idea of making this gift was conceived and a committee formed nearly a year ago, but plans were thrown temporarily into abeyance by the entrance of the United States into the conflict.

Members of this committee include Thomas W. Lamont, chairman; former Ambassadors Robert Bacon and Myron T. Herrick; James Stillman, George F. Baker, W. K. Vanderbilt, Nicholas Murray Butler, Henry W. Cannon, Paul D. Cavath, John Ridgely Carter, W. H. Crocker, John H. Finley, Charles L. Freer, Frederic R. Coudert, A. Lawrence Lowell, E. T. Stotesbury, James Brown, H. H. Harjes, Willard Straight, Clarence H. Mackay, Henry Walters, Ogden Armour, Thomas Hastings, John S. Sargent, John Grier Hibbon, W. F. Bonbright, Harry Payne Whitney, Charles H. Sabin, Walter Gay, Edward Tuck, Walter Barry, Jas. H. Hyde, Mrs. Philip M. Lydig, Gertrude Atherton, Mrs. William Astor Chatter, Mrs. William Adams DeLane, Mrs. John L. Gardiner, Mrs. Edith Wharton. Other names will be added from time to time.

In making the announcement in behalf of the committee, Mr. Lamont said that in order to avoid any possibility of encroaching upon relief work, no contributions for the gift to France would be solicited until the war is over. "But," he explained, "to many friends of France it has seemed altogether appropriate that the admiration of the American people for the French nation should be expressed in beautiful and enduring form. The battle of the Marne may prove to have been the greatest event in the world's history, many think the saving of civilization. It is inconceivable that it should not have a monument; and what could be more fitting than that America should in this manner, show her admiration for this signal record of the valor and heroism of the French people? There is certainly ample precedent in the Borghese statue, given to us by France, and now permanently aglow with the light of liberty which France helped win for us."

Wide support for the gift is already assured. In fact, for months past there has come from all sides a spontaneous expression that some plan of this kind should be undertaken and carried through when the war is over. Already admirers of France from every part of the country have plainly shown their desire to send something, no matter how small, for the gift, and it is manifest that upon conclusion of the war, the idea will have widespread support from all classes of the community.

Nine deaths are reported at the board of health office for the week, one each caused by each of the following: Scald, burns, apoplexy, tetanus, convulsions, premature birth, tubercular meningitis, oedema of larynx and epiglottitis of face.

THE REGISTRATION FIGURES

The total registration in New Brunswick, according to the figures given out late yesterday, was 10,634, with perhaps 5,000 to be registered in the city at the last day for registration. Throughout Canada, including last Thursday, 272,911 had registered and of these all but 18,708 claimed exemption.

LITTLE ONES DEAD

Mr. and Mrs. John C. Gallagher, of 713 Main street, have the sympathy of friends in the death of their infant son, J. Michael, who was born on Oct. 15.

CAPTAIN BLANCHARD HERE

Captain A. B. Blanchard of the Canadian Engineers arrived in the city at noon today to take over the duties of C. R. C. E. for this district. Major Van Tuyl, who has been acting C.R.C.E. for the last few days, will return this evening to Halifax. Captain Blanchard was for the last two years camp engineer at Valcartier. He has much military experience and will undoubtedly make a very competent engineer for this district.

ALBERT McRAE DEAD

The death of Albert McRae occurred this morning, after an illness of a year and a half, at his home, 44 Rodney street, West St. John. Mr. McRae, who formerly was a well-known carpenter, was twenty-four years of age. He is survived by one sister, Miss Cynthia, at home, and one brother, Charles, who recently returned after being a war prisoner in Germany. Another brother, Duncan, was killed this spring at Vimy Ridge. The funeral will be held at 2:30 o'clock on Monday afternoon from his late residence.

DEATH OF PHILIP M. NASE

Many friends in the city and elsewhere will learn with regret of the death of Philip M. Nase, which occurred at his home in Hebron, Virginia, on Thursday evening, Nov. 1. Mr. Nase had undergone a serious operation in the Peterborough Hospital, early in September, but had made a wonderful recovery, and was able to return to his home. He was stricken with an attack of acute indigestion, from which he was not able to rally. Mr. Nase was born at Nerepis, N. B., in 1841. When a young man he removed to Pennsylvania, and later to Virginia, where he was engaged in the lumber business with his brother, the late Thomas P. Nase. He is survived by one son, Frederick T. and two daughters, Miss Ellen and Alice at home, also one sister, Mrs. Amy Lingley, of Cambridge, Mass., and one brother, P. W. C. Nase of Nerepis.

GOOD WORK DONE ON THE PROVINCIAL ROADS

Much Damage by Tide and Storm; Permanent Work Done; Getting Ready For Next Year

Hon. Mr. Venoit's department has begun a survey of the highway between St. John and St. Stephen with a view to laying out next year's work, in widening the road, draining it, improving the grades and eliminating as far as possible the short curves. The work is in charge of District Engineer A. F. Beidling, who has four men at work. They have reached Lepreau, working from St. John. Two of the men are returned soldiers. Others were offered the job, but declined. It is proposed to make extensive improvements on this highway, in line with a permanent policy under which the work will all be planned ready for work in the spring.

Westmorland county, where the recent high tide and wind are said to have done more damage than the Sackby gale. The worst damage was done between Sackville and Aulac and on the Dorchester Cape road. A span of the Upper Dorchester bridge was carried away. The September tide carried out a large portion of the dykes on the Sackby Island marshes, and repairs cost over \$600. The later tide destroyed all this work and more of the old dyke. This is now being repaired.

The road was flooded between Sackville and Aulac, being at times under four feet of water. It is now passable again, but only because it had previously been put in good shape. A crew is still at work ditching and graveling. The permanent road between Aulac and the Nova Scotia boundary was flooded three times, but was not injured at all. The same great storm did much damage to the road at Anthony's Cove, East St. John, washing off the entire surface of the road and in some places carrying bench sand over the road to the depth of over a foot. Logs over eighteen inches in diameter were swept from the beach to the highway and left there. Mr. Beidling was sent for and the road has been cleared and partly re-surfaced, the logs being used to build up the shore.

On the Memramook marsh, where there was one of the worst pieces of road in the province, over 1,500 feet has been completely finished as a permanent road, and the whole marsh ditched for over a mile. From Memramook west the crew is still at work. They have ditched for five miles toward Moncton and gravelled and skidged over half a mile.

A crew are also putting on gravel between Moncton and Fox Creek. The season's work, which is now drawing to a close, was short and interfered with by bad weather, but a great deal of permanent work has been done on the roads of the province, and the drainage which has been established on other stretches will lessen next year's work while it will also lengthen the season for work.

Between five and six miles of permanent road between St. Andrew and St. Stephen has been completed and is one of the finest stretches of highway in the province.

Hon. Mr. Venoit is to be congratulated on the valuable work done this year.

BUILDING AND STOCK BURNED

Two-Alarm Call to Premises of Consumers Sack Supply Co.

Considerable excitement was caused when box No. 48 rang in two alarms about 1:30 this morning. The fire was located at the Consumers' Sack Supply Company warehouse in Sydney street and the roof with bags, straw, and stock were totally destroyed. A fierce blaze was fanned into fury by a strong wind and all efforts to save the building was unavailing. Teams from several fire stations were brought to the scene and fire streams were played on the building.

This is the third time that the bag factory has been burned down. It is said that there was no insurance on this time. The machinery is valued at from \$5,000 to \$6,000 and the stock of bags was valuable. The fire is thought to have started from a bag on the dryer catching fire. At the time of writing the fire was still smouldering.

STREET RAILWAY WORK

With the completion of the work at the corner of Paradise Row and Mill streets today the New Brunswick Power Company has replaced another portion of its system where the heavy traffic has caused considerable wear, with new work, frogs, switches, etc., of special design so that the wearable parts, when they have done their duty, may be removed without digging up the street, as has been the practice.

As anticipated it would take but a day; instead of that operations were considerably delayed on account of the weather, so much so that during the storm they had to be temporarily abandoned. Cars were running over the section, as usual, last night, and today everything was normal again.

Alberta By-Election. Camrose, Alta., Nov. 10.—Hon. G. E. Smith, the new provincial secretary, was elected yesterday by a majority of 981 over James Munn.

WHEN PEACE COMES**

President Tory Tells of Plan To Use in Demobilization Period

Do Teaching in England — Agricultural College for 40,000 Canadian Farmer Soldiers—Business and Other Educational Training Proposed

How the demobilization period may be used for giving to Canadian soldiers an intensive education which will make them an asset of inestimable value to Canada after the war, was outlined to the Montreal Canadian Club at a luncheon in the Windsor Hotel by President H. M. Tory, of Alberta University, who has lately returned after visiting the Canadian camps in England and France. President Tory related stories which showed the almost pathetic desire of many of the soldiers to remedy defects of early education or to prevent themselves losing the value of the education they had already had, and he told as well of the large and valuable mine of teaching ability already in the army and which could be utilized for agricultural colleges, business colleges and every other kind of college which would help the men to prepare themselves again for civil life along lines which would suit their natural aptitudes and ambitions. Presidents and principals, as well as the governing bodies, of Canadian universities have assured President Tory of their hearty co-operation in the idea, and Sir Robert Borden told a deputation that every effort would be made to help them, subject always to the proviso that military necessity must be considered first.

Finest Body of Men
Incidentally, President Tory paid a high tribute to the Canadians in France, saying they were the finest body of men he had ever seen. The bad men in the army were very bad, but the good men were the finest ever. It was impossible for men to gather together under the conditions obtaining in the army with-

a square deal. If we give it to them they will give it to us. There is not much malice in the hearts of the Canadian boys. They don't swear at the Germans much. They kill them as fast as they know how, but they don't hate them.

Dr. Tory then related how one Canadian soldier took a German prisoner in with him to one of the Y. M. C. A. huts for a drink of coffee. There was only one left, and that was handed to the Canadian soldier, who asked: "Is this all you have got? Give me another cup." Then he poured half his coffee into the other cup, and gave it to the German, saying: "Here, Hun, drink that."

Day's Cost of War Enough

Dr. Tory told also of the way in which the Y. M. C. A., aided by the chaplains and many officers, kept a great library circulating for the benefit of the soldiers. Any man asking for any book could get it if it was to be had or purchasable in England. He had of tremendous benefit to the men and to Canada. Intensive instruction just as in the case of the army would teach all of them a great deal in five years in Canada. There were men who had been heads of commercial colleges in the army, and they were willing to help, and every university principal and member of a board of governors had expressed the utmost enthusiasm.

Sir William Peterson told him that every McGill man across seas could be utilized, and any professor at home could be taken if he was needed. Most of the men needed as teachers would be found in the army, and if any man wanted laboratory work the results would be of tremendous benefit to the men to be transferred to them from the army. Dr. Tory said he had not met a single rebuff at McGill, Toronto, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Dalhousie and Alberta universities. The idea was to have a board of governors for this great military university representing the universities of Canada and the Y. M. C. A., from which had come the original suggestion, and an educational committee composed of the principals and presidents of the colleges, all of whom were ready to go across when needed. All the old military camps could be used as instruction grounds, and the entire cost to Canada would not exceed what Canada now pays to run the war for a day. He was sure that that amount would be quickly subscribed for such a purpose.

enormous progress during the last year. Cloths and fabrics made entirely of paper yarn are now widely used. The base of these is a simple one-colored paper yarn used in exactly the same way as lute. Prisoners' camps are now supplied with mattresses and even pillows in which the covering is made of this fabric. In fact, paper weaving has made such strides that twills are now produced, and the time is not far dis-

tant when it will be possible to obtain excellent grades of worsted made of paper, and already the first patterns of such fabrics are being exhibited. Ready-made clothing in paper is at present confined for the most part to special workmen's clothing. Entire suits of this are exhibited, as well as aprons, overalls and office coats. The price of made such fabrics varies between 25 cents and \$1 a yard. Ready-made workmen's

aprons and overalls are sold at \$6 a dozen. For entire suits the price is entirely confined to workmen's clothing. A beginning has been made in supplying garments for women and children. For children there is a wide variety of paper garments available. For women the offerings are thus far confined to underclothing.

He saluted every man as they went by, and he kept saying loud enough for every man on his staff to hear: "Every man is a hero." He said it over and over again.

The speaker said that the men were keen to detect a sham in anyone talking to them. A man had to talk straight to them. One man had risen in one of the meetings to say: "I say, Doctor, we need have been over the top, and we have faced the bombs and Hell. We won't be afraid to face a certain sort of man at home." (Applause.)

QUEBEC CITY ENTHUSIASTIC OVER SIR WILFRID LAURIER

Large Gathering Warmly Applauds Protest Against Conscription; Criticism of Government War Policy

Quebec, Nov. 9.—Acclaimed by a great gathering of men, women and children outside and inside the Martineau rink, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, opposition leader, tonight opened his election campaign with a speech that carefully analyzed the policy of the government on conscription food control and manufacture of war munitions.

Sir Wilfrid received such a welcome in Quebec east as could probably not be duplicated in any other city of the dominion. Forty years ago tomorrow, Sir Wilfrid received his first nomination in the division and a petition to run in Quebec North presented to him tonight bears one signature that appeared on his nomination papers nearly half a century ago—the name of J. Gauthier.

"Laurier is with us; the people are with Laurier," ran a device in huge letters over the platform. The crowd began to gather outside the hall a couple of hours before the meeting. An hour later traffic was stopped. The hall was jammed from wall to wall with a mass that alternately shouted "down with conscription" and demanded that the correspondent of a government paper in Quebec should be thrown into the street.

An appeal not to smoke "for Laurier's sake," met with an instant response. A blind man, still bearing his plea for charity, was allowed to work his way to the front of the crowd. With the rest, he shouted his assent to every word.

As Sir Wilfrid appeared on the platform the crowd broke into O! Canada, and roars of cheering.

CONSCRIPTION "BRUTALLY FORCED." In the main the opposition leader followed the lines of the manifesto he issued in Ottawa on Nov. 5. He reiterated that it was the first duty of Canada to give assistance to the man at the front. He added that it was "our duty to continue as we had begun—with the voluntary system."

War One Great Problem. Sir Wilfrid, in opening his speech, referred to the changes which had taken place in Quebec East since he first accepted nomination there forty years ago tomorrow.

In regard to public affairs he said all questions turned on the one great problem of the war which had devastated Europe for the last three years. The cost of living, scandals, all questions were minor as compared with that of the war.

Sir Wilfrid then sketched the stand that he had taken at the outbreak of war and declared that he held the same views still. Canada could not remain aloof at such a time.

"I took that stand," Sir Wilfrid went on, "not because I feared invasion of Canada as some people seemed to fear it, but what I feared was hegemony, domination by a people who violated every human and divine law."

"It is our duty," Sir Wilfrid proceeded, "to continue as we began. It is our duty to give assistance to our armies with food, supplies and men and I say it is our duty to continue as we began—with the voluntary system. We began in 1914 by sending troops on the voluntary system. Everybody said there would be no conscription. (Cheers.) The prime minister declared on many occasions that there would be no conscription. Then suddenly at the end of June he introduced the conscription bill."

"Shame, shame," shouted members of the crowd and the hall was in an uproar for a time.

What Ministers Said. "Why," continued Sir Wilfrid, "did the prime minister take this step. Up to the present the only authority we have for his inspiration is that of two of his colleagues, Mr. Crofters, the minister of labor, and Dr. Reid, the minister of railways. These two ministers declared the reason for the introduction of conscription was that the province of Quebec had not furnished volunteers in proportion to its population."

"He demanded Sir Wilfrid, as the crowd again broke into an uproar, 'if this province has not furnished as many volunteers as the other provinces in proportion to the population whose fault is it?'"

"Blondin's, Blondin's" roared the crowd. "The responsibility" went on Sir Wilfrid, "must fall on the heads of those members of the Borden administration who in 1911 just to flutter a popular cause declared that under no circumstances should Canada take part in the wars of Great Britain."

The speaker was interrupted by cries of "shame."

"The leader of the opposition referred to the conscription bill as having been brutally forced on the people. The province of Quebec could be won over on appeal to its sympathy but it could not be won over by compulsion. Again the crowd broke into a roar of applause."

MAURICE SAYS THE ITALIAN DISASTER IS EXAGGERATED

Enemy Probably Counted all Civilians in Their Prisoner Claims—Mackensen Not in Charge of the Campaign

London, Nov. 10.—General Maurice, director-general of the British military operations, speaking of the Italian military situation, said: It is most serious, but some reports are much exaggerated. There is no truth whatever in the statement that von Mackensen brought off a tremendous surprise with the assistance of 300,000 German troops. Von Mackensen has been made a sort of a bogey man. He is not present at the particular drive. Von Below is the commander-in-chief on the Italian front and he has nothing approaching 300,000 Germans. General Cadorna knew of the approaching attack, its place, and approximate date.

It is clear that a great part of the disaster, for it can be called nothing else, was due to the insidious propaganda which had gone further than General Cadorna suspected. Both the British and the French are doing everything they possibly can. There is no need for alarm concerning the withdrawal behind the Tagliamento. This part of General Cadorna's plan was communicated to us before his troops reached Tagliamento. The line of the final stand depends a great deal on and where help reaches the Italians.

Referring to the German claims of an enormous bag of prisoners, General Maurice expressed the opinion that these were largely overdrawn, saying: "The Germans naturally make the best possible story, and it is likely that they have counted all the civilians in the total of prisoners they announced."

Since the Italian debacle various criticisms have been made along the line that had Great Britain and France con-

tributed the assistance which the Italians were said to have asked for, an advance into Austria, the present difficulty could not have arisen. Your correspondent is informed on high military authority that these criticisms are unfounded. There was a certain military school in Italy which held that the best route to Vienna, and even Berlin, was via Laibach, and there were also in London certain strategists who are described as of the amateur class, who uphold that view.

General discussion among the Allies of the strategy of the war showed an immensely preponderant, if not absolutely unanimous, opinion that a drive into Austria, however successful, could not bring about the decision of the war. Objection to such a project need only be suggested. For a concentration on the Isonzo front the Allies would have had the use of only two railways, while the Central Powers would have had the use of four. The distance from the French front to the Isonzo front is less for the enemy than for the Allies. A glance at the map of the Italian front will show that the fastnesses of the Trentino would have to be cleared out before a great army could be pushed far into Austria, otherwise flank attacks on the line of communication might have cut the advancing force from its base.

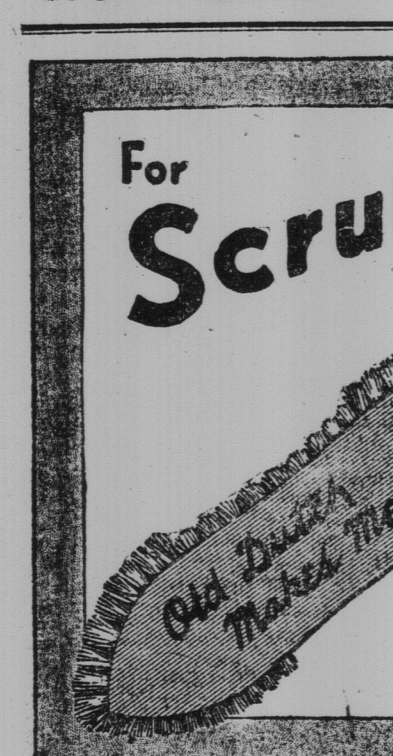
Assuming that the Trentino operations had been undertaken, and successfully carried out, the next step to ensure against flank attacks would be to clear the whole of the Terneva plateau, which is higher, more rugged, and more difficult than the Bainsizza plateau, which General Cadorna took many months of summer campaigning to seize.

BACON PRICES CUT.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Prices of ham and bacon to the consumer were cut five to ten cents by the Illinois food administration today. The government's complete control of the packing industry lends importance to the announcement. While for the moment the cut applies only to Chicago and suburbs, prices set here eventually will serve as the standard for the whole country.



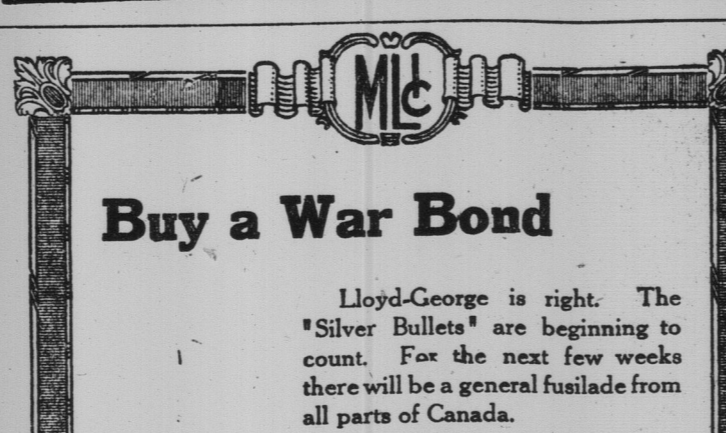

'Within a good book are the best thoughts of the best men and women who have ever lived, the greatest inventions man's brain has ever conceived; between the covers we may follow the explorer to the ends of the earth, learn the secrets of nature, science and art, study economics of other times and countries; and all this wonderful information we may gather, into a very small space—a library shelf. By the books we love we build our ideals, set our standards, and attain our lives. No good book ever eulogized an unworthy man, or the unworthy mores and actions of a good man. 'A bad book has neither an intrinsic nor a tangible value, and to this class belong the yellow journal of cheap, sensational scandal; the novel of weak, vicious wickedness; the boy's 'Dick, the Robber,' type; the girl's 'Lord Algeron' style, and all the rank and file of unhealthy, unwholesome, vitriolic stories where the emotions are made to justify the breaking of the moral law. 'To feed one's mind on such rotten stuff is to invite all the diseases of the mind which are largely responsible for our asylums, our reformatories, our jails, our orphan homes, our divorce courts; and the sadness of it is that we cannot bear the consequences of it ourselves, but must pass it on even unto the third and fourth generation. In this country books are not censored. They are in England and the United States, and therefore the worst class of book never reaches Canada. Books should be censored here—we are too big a nation to depend on others for this very important guard against moral degeneracy. Many books are sold, and sold openly, which are harmful, hurtful, vulgar, vicious, and low; and it is the duty of every parent and guardian to see that such books are not supplying their children with their heroes and ideals. This duty is not negative only—to keep away that which is bad; but positive, to supply that which is good. REPORT ON WORK OF CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY

(Continued from page 9.)

Turning now to some of the problems which have come up in the course of my work, I would place first as perhaps the most insistent, non-support of families. This may arise from a variety of real or imaginary causes, but the result is always the same, suffering more or less acute. Mixed marriages are a fruitful cause of non-support. Again experience seems to prove that a large percentage of marriages contracted too early in life are unhappy. An extreme case, perhaps, was investigated by me a couple of weeks ago, where the wife was twenty-four years old and had a daughter eleven years old. I have been consulted in six non-support cases this summer. One of these reached the police court, where the husband promised to do better for his wife and children. Another was somewhat complicated by the misbehavior of the wife and mother, and the adjustment appears impossible. In a third the husband left the city to avoid court proceedings and was followed in the forestry battalion. In the fourth a mixed marriage, the problem was solved for the time by the husband enlisting in the police force. In the fifth the wife went home to her mother, taking her baby with her after an appearance in the police court. The sixth was also a mixed marriage. There were two children and matters do not seem very much improved in the family, although the husband is providing a little better for them. In three of these marriages, the girl was under sixteen while the man was only a year or two older. In one case she was nineteen and in the remaining two the brides were twenty or over. It would seem to me that something ought to be done to impress such people with the idea that the marriage tie cannot be set aside lightly and that it carries with it responsibilities which must be discharged. A reformatory institution of some kind where these careless parents might be compelled to work for the support of their children and thus relieve the community of the burden they should never be called upon to bear would seem to be called for.

The care of the feeble-minded is another problem loudly calling for solution. During the past five months I have been called on to investigate the cases of three manifestly feeble-minded women. The first of these was a married woman with two children, who had been deserted by her husband. She gave birth to a third child about a month ago under the most distressing circumstances. The baby is now dying with an abscess of the brain. The second was a girl just turned her sixteenth year. She lives with her mother, a notorious woman with a long police record, and two so-called men boarders in the house. In spite of her apparent imbecility the girl of fifteen was nursing an illegitimate baby three months old. The third is a girl of fourteen years old. She lives with her father and stepmother, who, I think, do all they can with her. Notwithstanding their watchfulness, however, she has on two occasions stayed out all night. These are only isolated cases which I am sure can be multiplied many times over. What is imperatively required for the adequate care of this unfortunate part of the community is a home where they can be committed. In this way only can we get rid of an element of danger and demoralization from our midst. I should like to have said something of the prevalence of truancy in the city. I will content myself, however, by observing that in many and perhaps an increasing number of these cases the difficulty is, largely, at present, an economic one. The extravagant prices of all the necessities of life making it imperative to economize, the much needed boots and warm clothing for the little ones are dispensed with. The whole question of dealing with the class known as confirmed truant, it seems to me, is one that ought to be gone into very carefully with a view of improving our methods if possible. The establishment of a parental school or a training ship where the boys could be under discipline the whole time may be desirable.

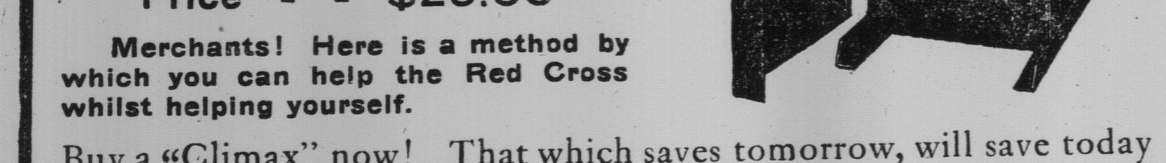

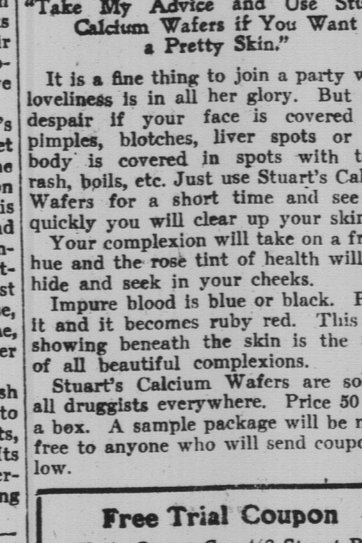

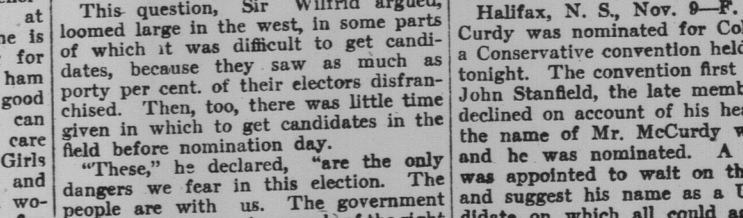

Sport Letter From New York

New York, Nov. 7.—(Correspondence) Baseball magnates, players and followers of the game in general, are almost unanimous in expression of the opinion that the coming winter months will witness important changes in the methods and arrangements governing the professional end of the national sport. It appears certain that out of the mass of suggested and proposed changes, radical developments will occur relative to the conduct of the business end of the game during the duration of the war at least.

Both major and minor league magnates will discuss and consider numerous suggestions looking toward improvement of conditions existing at the present time during the coming annual meetings. While no hasty action will be taken it is considered likely that several innovations both in combination and conduct of the sport will be adopted before the season of 1918 is reached. Owing to the difference of opinion on these points among the various club owners, it is difficult to name the proposals which may eventually be enacted in baseball law, but there has been no dearth of these both from official and unofficial sources.

Among the plans advanced are the following: Shorter season and schedule in the major leagues, coupled with a suggestion to start the World Series several weeks earlier than has been the case in recent years; curtailing the number of players now permitted to each club and a reduction of the present salaries; the shifting of one or more club franchises to new and more profitable fields of patronage; the elimination of long and expensive southern training trips; rearrangement of the large annual transportation bills; readjustment or combination of minor league circuits in order to provide more attractive and lucrative play. It is exceedingly doubtful if all these

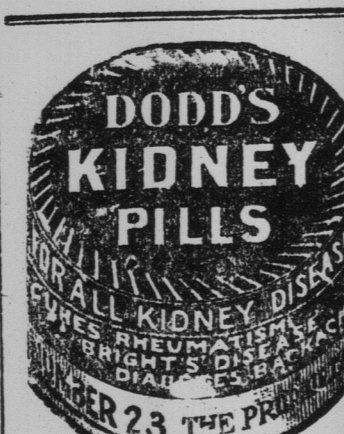

We wish, however, that he should surround himself, as well as his party, with barriers solid and high enough to prevent brigands of the Northcote and Sifton brand from creating alarm in the sheepfold by corrupting the shepherds and in muzzling the watch dogs."

Mr. Bourassa claims that Le Devoir is the interpreter and directing spirit of the Nationalists. Then he says: "The unionist programme is the antipodes of all we admire, of all we believe and all we desire; while it is the essence of all we detest, of all we despise, both in men, ideas and tendencies of both parties. We are, in fact, at our case in combatting this detestable coalition. We are at one with Laurier in contesting the right of the Tories to seek pardon for their crimes and acts of the past six years."

Mr. Bourassa takes a whack at the Liberal members of the government. He says: "We in no way share the opinion of the opposition leader as to the respectability of the renegade Liberals who have rallied to the Borden ministry. We see nothing of respectability in the monstrous cupidity of a Sifton, in the hypocrisy of a Fielding or a Rowell, or in the cynicism of a Ballantyne, a Guthrie or a Pugsley. We see in this ministry but the coalition of the most sordid appetites and the most contemptible tendencies."

JAPAN'S RESOURCES LOW

Japan's resources have been depleted by the war and they must be augmented to enable her to continue her full participation in the world strife, Baron Megata, head of the special financial commission from Japan, said on Wednesday night in a speech at St. Louis.

"Japan's desire not only to do her part in the war but to render the fullest possible aid to her allies has forced her to greatly diminish her stocks of supplies," declared the baron.

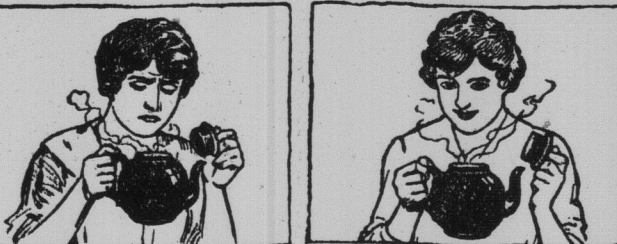

**WITH THE BRITISH
IN MESOPOTAMIA**

London, Oct. 12.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The occupation of Ramadiah has carried the British Mesopotamian army some thirty miles upstream from its previous outpost at Seluja. This is the distance measured as the crow flies, but it is nearly double that distance by the winding Euphrates. The British convoys, though moving by day, pass each other in the darkness

of a London fog, and the white dust which covers the faces of the Arabian porters gives them the ashen complexion of circus clowns.

On the right bank of the Euphrates the flat alluvial soil of the delta is left behind and one comes to the first low dunes and pebbly ridges, while the roads are better and easier. It was on ground of this nature that the battle of Ramadiah was fought.

The British troops showed themselves in excellent condition, after their

TO HONAN, CHINA**

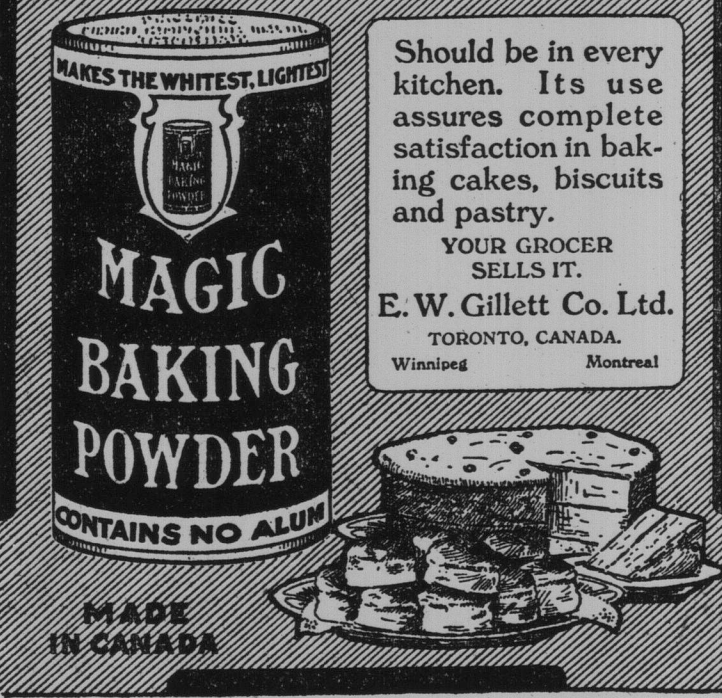

It will be remembered that Dr. Travis spent the year of 1916-17 in Serbia doing medical work under the auspices of the American Red Cross, leaving only when the inhabitants were driven out by the enemy. After many hardships Dr. Travis was allowed a passport through Russia arriving home June 8, 1916. Since that time Dr. Travis has been enjoying a much needed rest. She will be followed to her new work by the best wishes of hosts of friends not only in New Brunswick but in the eastern States.

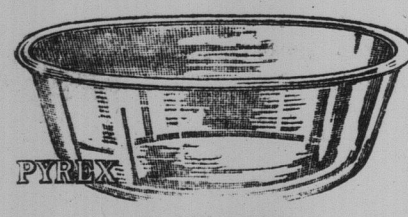

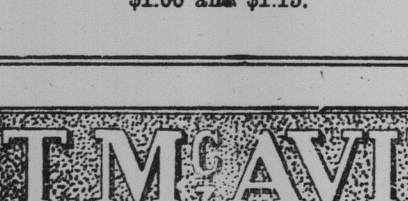

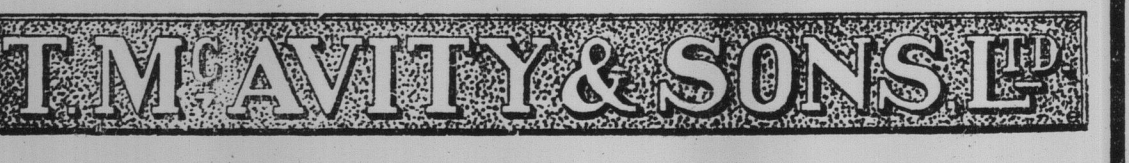
