# Germans Open Fresh Offensive On West

Heavy Attacks Against Allied Line To-SPURRED ON BY day; Early Reports Are That All The **Efforts of Enemy Are Repulsed** 

The drive on Amiens, for which the Germans plunged desperately but failed to reach in their great offensive last There Are Reports of Intense Acmonth, was resumed today.

In the effort to push toward this important junction point and allied base, renewed after a two weeks' interval in which the main German effort was transferred to Flanders, the enemy this morning launched a heavy attack on a front of Daily approximately twenty miles.

The line at which the German infantry is again being thrown extends from the district north of Albert, northeast of Amiens, to the Avre river, southeast of the city. Nearly all this front is held by the British, whose line links up with the French at the river Luce, about three miles north of the Avre.

It has been regarded as almost inevitable that the Germans would again strike here, as the advance of their right flank in the Amiens region was stopped short by the strong British resistance at Albert, lagging far behind their left, which was pushed at Castel to within a short distance of the Paris-Amiens railway. A further driving in of the we dge south of Amiens was thus virtually impossible unless the line to the north could also be advanced.

tations of profit to himself has thus given the Allies warning, largely the element of surprise, which was so strong a factor in the earlier German success, and doubtless has led to the massing of strong Anglo-French forces at the point where the Germans are now striking.

The Germans have been working up a strong artillery fire along virtually the whole British southern front for several days, following the easing of their pressure on the Flanders front, but the preliminary intensive bombardment was of comparatively short duration. The drum fire began early this morning, followed shortly by the advance of the infantry.

What was apparently intended as a surprise blow, without notable artillery preparation, was launched by the Germ ans at dusk last evening northwest of Albert. The British were on the alert, however, and met the advance with a hair of rifle and machine gun fire, driving back the enemy.

Meanwhile the enemy has maintained sufficient pressure in the Flanders area to keep the Anglo-French forces well occupied there. Not only has the artillery bombardment been heavy in many sectors, but last night there was a strong severely nuclshing the enemy.

## Opposition Attack On The Public Health Bill

Fredericton, N. B., April 23—With the exception of a few clauses which have been held over for reconsideration, the Workmen's Compensation act today passed the committee stage in the Legislature, with the approval of both sides of

The bill was considered carefully and it took up almost the entire afternoon and half of the evening session.

On the completion of this bill the Public Health bill was taken up by the nittee of the whole and its presentation was the signal for a concerted attack by opposition members, jealousy lest the administration should place on the statute books so progressive a piece of legislation evidently having led to the decision on the part of the opposition that the bill should be contested.

In recognition of the fact that charges had been laid affecting him, Hon. William Currie did not occupy the Speaker's chair today. He was absent when the officials paraded into the house for the opening this afternoon. After prayers the clerk announced that the Speaker was absent and, on this signal, the deputy speaker, C. M. Leger, of Westmorkand, took the chair.

The following bills were read a third time and passed: An act to vest the title of certain wharves in the government of Canada; an act to authorize the Andover water commissioners to issue debentures; an act to enable the town of Dalhousie to issue debentures; an act respecting the St. John & Quebec Railway Company; an act relating to the protection of children; an act relating to the Tobique Valley Railway Extension Company; an act to vest an area of land in the parish of Bathurst in the crown; and an act relating to migratory birds.

Mr. Burchill presented reports of the committee on corporations and standing rules.

Questions of Privilege.

Mr. Leblanc, in rising to a question of privilege, said that he did so with some embarrassment, as the matter of which he intended to complain did not refer to himself but to his honorable colleague for the county of Restigouche, who, by virtue of his position, was not able to speak for himself. Under the circumstances he considered it only right that he should say a word on his behalf. In picking upsome—of the daily newspapers he had been struck by large headlines which stated that serious charges had been made against his honorable colleague. He wished to say that so far as the laying of the charges was concerned, he had no complaint, as the honorable member who had acted in the matter had performed what he believed to be his duty.
