A QUEBEC MINISTER ARRESTED

Arson Charged Against Rev. J. H. Bell of Sutton

HOUSE WAS FIRED

Rector Said to Have Been Seen Wearing Green Goggles—Coal Oil the Cause, and Match Box With His Name on It Found.

(Canadian Press) Ottawa, April 28.—Rev. James Bell, an Anglican rector of Sutton, Que., was arrested before Recorder Desjardins there on a charge of incendiarism. The charge against the preacher is the result of allegations by residents of Kazabazua, where Mr. Bell owns property.

On Thursday passes-by in the road near the house noticed smoke issuing from the windows, and breaking in the doors managed to extinguish the fire. Inside were found a number of coal oil cans and a metal match case marked "Sutton," near where the fire had apparently started. Some of the villagers also alleged that they had seen the minister, dressed in ordinary clothes and wearing green goggles, boarding a train on the night of the fire. Investigation by Sheriff Wright after the allegations showed that Rev. Mr. Bell had left his home at Sutton on Wednesday last and had not returned until the following Saturday. Sheriff Wright went to Sutton armed with a warrant for his arrest but on arriving there found that he was not at his home. Returning to Hull the sheriff found his man just preparing to board the train.

BOY IN INDIAN PLAY DIES FROM BURNS

Mimic Torture at the Stake Becomes Grim Reality for Lad's Clothing Catches Fire and Playmates Flee.

Boston, April 28.—Bound and tied to a stake while his little playmates executed a mimic Indian war dance about him and "tortured" him with a lighted candle, Max Tuttlebaum, aged five years, of Roxbury, turned play into reality when he was "burned" at the stake, when his clothing caught fire from the candle, causing injuries which resulted in the boy's death in a hospital last night.

REVOLUTION BREAKS OUT IN THE CITY OF CANTON

Situation Serious is Report of British Consul; Fighting in The Streets



Detective Burns

(Canadian Press) Hong Kong, April 28.—Messages received today from Canton, where a revolutionary outbreak occurred last night, are of a disquieting character. The revolutionists have obtained a quantity of rifles, shotguns and the government has asked the steamship companies plying to that city to suspend their service, lest arms be smuggled to the disturbers, who are still at large. Many of the leaders have been arrested. Fighting between the troops and the revolutionists broke out in the streets of Canton last night. The revolutionists were armed with rifles and bombs and fought desperately. Several were killed and many arrested.

THE DYNAMITE CASE

(Canadian Press) New York, April 28.—The local papers this morning have special dispatches from San Francisco saying that Orrie McManis made a detailed statement yesterday to District-Attorney Fredericks in the presence of four witnesses. He is quoted as saying that John J. McNamara conceived the plan for blowing up the Los Angeles Times that James B. McNamara placed the dynamite and time clock and got away by train five hours before the explosion.

McManis is quoted in detail on several other explosions, with which he is connected. McNamara have been stated by the detective as being the author of the explosion. San Francisco, April 28.—The San Francisco building trades council last night pledged itself to pay \$100,000 for the defence of John B. McNamara.

MAYOR STOPS FERRY WORK

Doubtful of His Power but Takes the Step to Stop Waste of People's Money on the Western Extension

The finances of the city are being wasted and thrown into the tide, and I will now order that the work on the Western Extension be stopped. If the city council on Monday decides to go on with the work in the face of these reports from the inspectors and the superintendent, they will have to take the responsibility. At a meeting of the ferry committee this morning Mayor Brink decided after hearing reports from Inspector Oliver and Dalton and Superintendent Waring, as to the feasibility of continuing the work on the Western Extension, that he would assume the responsibility of ordering the work stopped, though he was doubtful whether he had authority to do so. It was then that he spoke as quoted.

Cape of Birds' Feathers to be Worn by Hawaiian Princess at Coronation

(Canadian Press) New York, April 28.—Princess Kawānanakoa of Hawaii, who was Miss Abigail Campbell, formerly a wealthy sugar trader, is in New York on her way to attend the coronation in London. She will wear a cape of birds' feathers, one of the most costly garments in the world. It is made of the feathers of a species of island bird now extinct. Each bird had only one of the variety of feathers used in making the cape.

POLICE SAY MOTHER WAS TEACHING LITTLE ONE TO BE THIEF

Toronto Woman is Sent to Reformatory for Six Months for Shoplifting

(Toronto, April 28.—(Canadian Press)—Julia Kennedy, alias Connors, was sent to the Mercer Reformatory for six months yesterday for shoplifting. The police reported the woman last Saturday and she had a quantity of goods in her possession. The value of the stolen goods was \$100. According to the police, the Kennedy woman was teaching her 11-year-old daughter to steal goods, and had her carry away the stolen goods.

TORONTO'S LIQUOR LICENSES RENEWED

(Toronto, Ont., April 28.—(Canadian Press)—Toronto's 110 hotels and 50 liquor stores were yesterday granted unconditional renewals of their licenses. The license of the Printers' Club was cancelled owing to a recent conviction for selling to non-members. The applications of the Irish Club and the Dominion Club were refused, these leaving twenty club licenses in Toronto.

LANGLOTT CLEARED BY HOUSE VOTE

House of Commons in Session Until 5 O'Clock This Morning When Division Resulted in Majority of 42

(Special to Times) Ottawa, April 27.—The longest sitting of the session was finished just before 5 o'clock this morning with a division which cleared Langlot, M. P., of Richelieu, of the charge laid against him by Blondin, by a majority of 42, the division following party lines.

Before the division was taken Mr. Blondin declared that he had not been moved by personal spite in making his motion but wanted to uphold principle. He did not think that a member of parliament should have his house painted by government forces even if he paid for it. The division was not marked with the acuity which frequently characterizes such affairs. The members were sleepy and exhausted by the length of the sitting. The minister in charge of the motion was reported to have been asleep for some time. The motion to adopt the majority report which cleared Mr. Langlot was decided carried by the same division reversed.

LIQUOR DRINKING AGAIN CALLS FORTH REMARKS FROM BENCH

Judge Ritchie Makes Stirring Comment—Two Brothers in Court in Two Days

A long row of prisoners, each charged with drunkenness, and several of them young men, formed the subject of some strong remarks this morning in the police court by Judge Ritchie. "Some of you," he said, "might be filling responsible positions today if it were not for your thirst for rum. And yet, after being driven against the people who deal in this traffic, in spite of the fact that they know young men are going straight to hell because of drinking rum—they're afraid to hunt the feelings of the liquor dealer."

"The police should look after some of these men who continually hang around shady sections of the city such as Sheffield street, or we shall hear of young mothers, not twenty years old, who are older than themselves, or perhaps even to colored women."

Donald Hall, aged 22, who was yesterday fined \$8 or two months for drunkenness, was this morning fined \$32 or four months for the same offence. Thomas Pierson and Wesley Ward were fined \$4 each for drunkenness. Bernard Hall, aged 18, was fined \$20 or two months for drunkenness. James Adams, Arthur Howe and Wm. Hanley remained, and Thomas Anderson allowed to go on file charges.

Walter Hoild, aged 25, was remanded on a charge of drunkenness, using obscene language, and resisting the police. He was told he was liable to a fine of \$96 or fourteen months in jail. Hoild was yesterday fined for being drunk, and it was pathetic this morning to see the two young men, one being allowed out after his fine was paid, while the other went into jail, the tears of his mother and sister flowing freely as he left them.

FORMER MONTGTON MAN IN A HOTEL FIRE

Luther Gaddis Had Narrow Escape in Kelso, Ont.—I. C. R. News of Railway Town

(Special to Times) Monton, N. B., April 28.—Luther Gaddis, former operator in the Monton Western Union telegraph office, but who is now employed with E. A. Walberg in Ontario recently had a narrow escape as the result of a fire in a hotel in Kelso, Ont. He lost his clothing and some cash.

SPEAKS FOR TREATY OF ALLIANCE

Daily Graphic Says Arbitration Pact is Really Superfluous

HIGH POST FOR JEW

Rumor That Sir Mathew Nathan Will be Appointed British Resident in Egypt—Million and a Quarter for Collection of Chinese Porcelain

(Canadian Press) London, April 28.—The Daily Graphic contends that war between the two great branches of the Anglo-Saxon race is not only impossible but inconceivable and a formal treaty or arbitration is superfluous. The Graphic adds: "The treaty which is required to give effect to the feeling which is uppermost in all British and American hearts is a treaty of alliance."

The Jewish Chronicle states that it is rumored that Sir Mathew Nathan will succeed Sir Eldon Gorst as British resident in Egypt. "Should this report prove correct," says the journal, it will be second time in history, after a lapse of some 4,000 years, that a Jew will have taken the most prominent place in the government of Egypt."

Sir Mathew Nathan, was formerly Mayor of Natal. A collection of rare old Chinese Porcelain is reported to equal the Salting collection, has been acquired by Edgar Gorroo, a London porcelain expert, for \$1,250,000. The collection was made by Richard Bennett of Derby Hall, Northampton.

Among the notable pieces is a unique pair of yellow hawthorne vases, said to be the finest of their kind in the world, having a market value of about \$30,000; two dozen black hawthorne vases, average in value about \$20,000 each; six examples of green hawthorne and a group of pearl grays, are said to be the finest in existence.

ARTILLERY HERE WILL NOT DRILL

According to militia orders just issued, the 3rd Regiment (Canadian Artillery) of this city, will not go into training this year, nor will they go to Camp Petawawa. This is the first time, it is stated, since the organization of the regiment that local training has been abandoned, and there has been much speculation. Rumors have been circulated that there is trouble in the regiment, and that matters are not at all harmonious.

At the office of the D. O. C., it was stated that they had no information other than that contained in the order, which states that the regiment is relieved from training. Another general section states that regiments which have not been in training will not go into camp.

Colonel Baxter, commander of the regiment, said he had not yet received a copy of the orders, but the only reason for such an order was that the regiments were in an unsettled state with regard to the local training. It had been impossible to get horses for the regiment, and the new regulations require that there shall be a certain proportion of horses for heavy artillery. It was probable that there would be some kind of a reorganization which would put the regiments on a working basis. As to rumors of any trouble in the regiment, he said he had heard nothing, and their affairs had never been more harmonious than at the present time.

THREE BUILDINGS ON LOCH LOMOND ROAD DESTROYED

Five early this morning destroyed an unoccupied house, barn and factory on the Loch Lomond road, owned by Thomas Red, of Thorne avenue. The buildings had been intended for some time. The factory was formerly used for manufacturing fertilizer. The blaze started soon after midnight, and as there was nothing to stay its progress it quickly consumed the three buildings. It is not known how the fire started, but it is presumed that tramp were probably responsible.

**ARMCHAIR REFLECTIONS**  
By H. L. Spencer

A good many years ago, a young lady, a native of this province, visited me at a newspaper office in this city, seeking my advice as to the occupation in life in which she might make her most judicious investment to herself and others. We debated the subject on several occasions, and at last she went away with the determination that in educational work and in authorship she would employ her life. Years passed by before I had intelligence of her again, and then she wrote that two or three books from her pen had been published and that she was receiving considerable income from their sale. I received a letter from her a few days ago, extracts from which are appended. I refrain from publishing my reflections but am rejoiced that my friend of so long ago is living so full and earnest a life—pleasing to herself and useful to others. She writes:

Chicago, April 23.

My Dear Friend:  
Your letter came to me this morning just as I was leaving for my daily duties. I read it in the car and it revived in my heart. I cannot bear to think of a friend "growing weaker every day." Let me be a robin and sing "Cheer up! Cheer up! Cheer up—cheer up! Cheer up!" You will feel better when there is real sunshine to get into. It is cold, so cold here—April—I have known it to be warmer in March. I want you to keep well and be able to talk to me next summer when I expect to pass through St. John and visit relatives there for a few days. I am going to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia for the summer. My mother was over eighty when she "went out" but she never seemed old because her mind was so clear and active. My mother was a Peters, descended from the old Loyalists. Peterses, Coppetites, Yeomans and I know not how many other old Loyalist families contributed to her wisdom and vigor which the descendants of the United Empire Loyalists have always been so proud of.

You speak of King Square. Is it at the head of King Street, where Coburg street? I find that I do not remember St. John very well. I used to visit my relatives the Latheways who lived on Coburg street, and think that that street ran into a little park at the head or top of King street. I was in St. John for a day and night four years ago this coming summer—and I remember how very beautiful the view of the bay was as seen between the houses as one looked down entire streets. It was at sunset and the coloring was exquisite. I shall never forget that wonderful marine framed by street walls.

I include one of the children in one of the schools I visit and send me with their Easter wishes. The children in our public schools now receive free of charge instruction superior to what I used to pay dearly for as a special instruction received in private classes. It is remarkable what artistic work we can get from them.

In English the children are also taught the principles of classification and they compose verses descriptive of nature subjects and other things. Some of the children I will send you some examples of their little paper boats. Some time I will send you some examples of their hand work. There are some in my office. I think perhaps they will interest you. Next year we are to have a Child Welfare Exhibit here. Every school in the city is to be represented by groups of children. There will be 600 children of from eight hundred to 1500 in all. This exhibit will be open from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Sundays only excepted. I shall have groups of children with their teachers at work in drawing with water colors, ink and water color. Other groups working in clay and in leather and other kinds of appropriate designs. They will also be dressed in woodwork, sewing, cookery, etc., and I must not forget the printing, which I am to visit tomorrow is to take a whole printing outfit to the place of exhibition and be at work on the afternoon and evening during the thirteen days. I will send you further accounts of the exhibit if it will interest you.

THE PRIMITIVE WEAPON OF THE PATAGONIANS.  
In pre-que days, terminating with the Spanish invasion, those some of the pampas lived a much more athletic existence; for today the Tehuiche, like the gaucho, will not walk a hundred yards if his horse is close at hand, and it usually is. To the horse is probably due the disappearance of the sling and the bow and arrow, as well as the more prevalent use of that unique and characteristic weapon of the pampas, the bolas, or bolas.

This consists of two or three rawhide-covered balls, connected by rawhide, to be swung around the head, and hurled from the saddle by one of the balls, slightly egg-shaped, called the molito, or hand-ball, with the result that the quarry is entangled around the legs, and incidentally struck and pounded by the balls themselves. The more primitive bolas were round stones, to which rawhide guanocho thongs were attached in a groove. Later these were covered with rawhide for horses, and the lines doubled, and now many bolas leathers are filled with shot or iron. Three-balled bolas are used for horses, while two balls serve for catch and sometimes guanocho, which are lobbed about the neck. A single ball, called the bola perilla (lost ball), was an attached string, used as a hurlingstone, was undoubtedly the most primitive form of this formidable weapon. Horses are never lashed by a man on foot, for the obvious reason that they must be taught not to fear a man coming thus, this precaution enabling a lone dismounted man to approach his horse.—Charles W. Furlong, F. R. G. S., in Harper's Magazine for May.

Dr. Christie Gives Striking Evidence in McArthur Inquest

TWO WITNESSES

Jail Physician and Turnkey Examined By Coroner Berryman and Adjournment Until Monday Evening is Made

That four months of the diet provided in the county jail for hard labor prisoners is enough to make any man anemic was the starting statement made last night by Dr. James Christie at the inquest before Coroner Berryman into the death of William McArthur, who died in the General Hospital a few hours after having been taken there from the jail.

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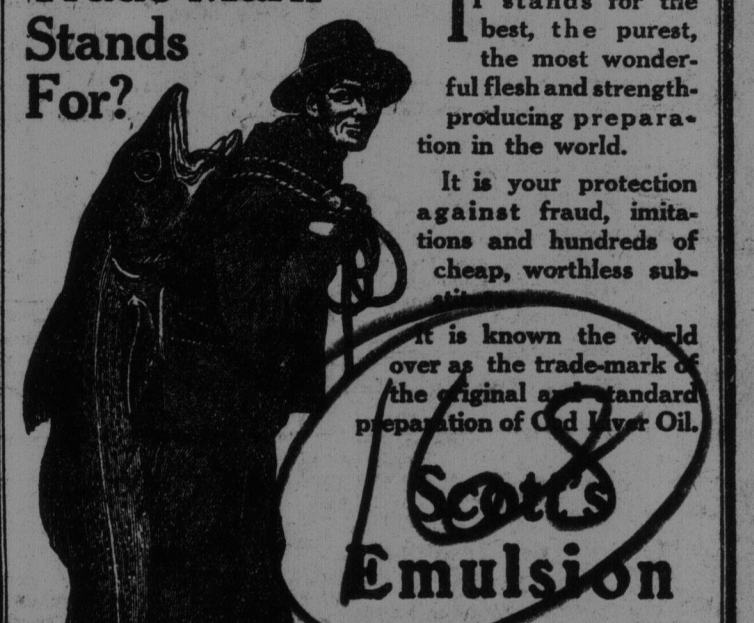

HAZEN TO BREAK FROM VALLEY RAILWAY PLAN

Rejection of Operation by L. C. R. Local Government Men in Ottawa About Subsidy. Ottawa, April 27.—Hon. Messrs. Fleming, McLeod, Maxwell and Morrissey, of the New Brunswick government, had an interview with Hon. William Eggleston, minister of public works, this evening in regard to a dominion subsidy for the Valley railway, and so far as is known, the result of the talk was a request by the minister for them to put their request in writing.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND FAILURE TO SUPPORT FOREIGN MISSIONS

Strong Indictment by Bishop Richardson in Montreal and Editorial Comment on His Remarks. (Montreal Herald). A strong indictment against the Church of England in Canada, for its failure to properly support foreign missions with money, men and prayer, was delivered by the Lord Bishop of Fredericton, preaching on the curse of Meres last night at the dedication of the chancel and transepts of the Church of the Ascension in St. Louis Annex.

In the light of good government and for moral and social reform, said the Bishop, there was always a small band doing the work, while the great mass of the people stood aside and enjoyed the fruits of other men's work; accepting privileges but refusing responsibilities.

There is food for thought in the utterances of Bishop Richardson at the Church of the Ascension last night and particularly in his citation of the western diocese where there were but four Canadian clergy men in a western diocese who were: "I am beginning to believe that you Canadians are fools. Where are your men for the ministry? Of eighty-one clergymen in this diocese only four are Canadians and one is leaving to go farther west."

To whom, asked the distinguished preacher, could the curse of Meres more appropriately come than to the Church of England, if it disobeyed the positive commandments of Christ in regard to missions?

This is a hard word but we venture to state that it will be endorsed upon consideration by the great majority of Canadian Protestants with the exception of that recalcitrant element which still goes to the Wednesday evening prayer-meeting and makes religion one of the chief activities of its week-day life. We have already pointed, in recent articles, to the immense national value of the fact that all the other professions, even in the present Canada of the west, are in the hands of Canadians and that a strong guiding force of Canadians is thereby provided for the assimilation of the alien settler. Now we refuse absolutely to believe that it is solely because of superior earning capacity that Canadians select these professions, and leave the ministry severely alone.

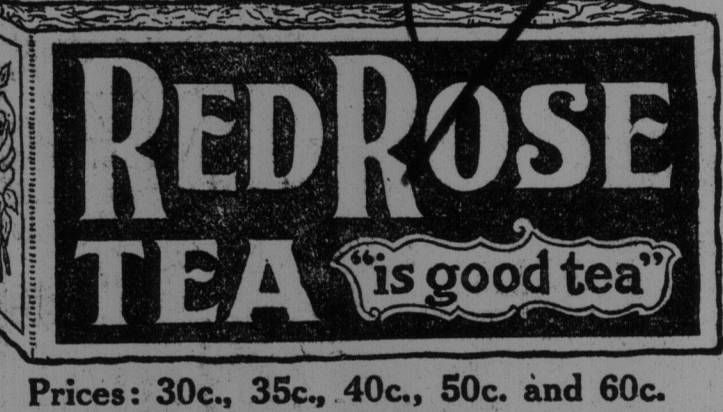

The child's body was scorched painfully, part of her hair burnt off, her clothing almost stripped from her body, and had it not been for the timely arrival of Mrs. James Hughton it is doubtful if the child would have escaped fatal injuries.

Mrs. Hughton, with much presence of mind, caught up the child and smothered the flames which were devouring her clothes and scorching her body, but not until after the little one had been severely burned about the stomach and lower limbs. Her face escaped injury. Dr. McAlpine attended the child.

With another little playmate the child was scampering about the yard enjoying her innocent pleasures, but it is believed, when no older people were near she approached the fire and began to probe into it, with the result that her clothing soon caught.

### AUCTION OF MARKET STANDS AND THE PUBLIC SCALES TODAY

The annual sale of the commission stands in the country market and public scales was held this morning at 11 o'clock in the market building and was attended by many though there was little or no interest so far as bidding was concerned.

Only one stand was sold by the auctioneer T. J. Lantana. Two purchasers were Polking & Macdonald and the price paid was the upset figure—\$72.

The scales at North Slip and Adelaide street were sold to Gilbert Robertson, the former at \$25, and the latter, \$12. There were no other bidders.

In accordance with a resolution of the market committee, all holders of stands last year were allowed to secure the stands they have been using, at an advance of 20 per cent over the former figures, or \$72 each.

It is also worthy of note that last year only about a half dozen stands were sold, whereas this year seventeen have been disposed of. It is thought that others will be secured later at the upset prices agreed upon.

The privilege of collecting the tolls was not sold this year, as it has been decided that the city will do its own collecting. Last year Roy Potts paid \$3,800 for the privilege.

## HEAR CASE AGAINST CONSTABLE

### The Blair Case in Fairville Today Develops Much of Interest—Justice Allingham and Mr. Baxter

An assault case, in which George Blair, a local constable, is the defendant, and Henry McBarnie the plaintiff was commenced in the Fairville court this morning, with Justice Allingham presiding. The plaintiff contends that Blair entered his house on Wednesday last and landed his wife roughly. This charge is denied by Blair. The case arises over the payment of water taxes by Justice Allingham, in whose house the plaintiff lives. Blair, it is said, went to the house on Wednesday to collect the taxes and Mr. Allingham refused to pay. He then went down stairs in reference to seizing goods for the taxes and it is said showed Mrs. McBarnie aside.

The court opened this morning at 10 o'clock. B. M. Baxter was present in behalf of the defendant and H. J. Smith for the plaintiff.

Justice Allingham said he wished to know whom the lawyers present were representing. Mr. Smith said he was for Mr. Baxter and Mr. Baxter said he was for the plaintiff. A lively tilt ensued in which the justice ordered Mr. Baxter to take his seat. The case was then proceeded with.

Henry McBarnie, the plaintiff, said that while he was on Wednesday he received a telephone message in consequence of which he went to his home and there found his wife quite ill. She has been in good health that morning. He asked what was the matter and was told that a constable had come to the house and assaulted his wife. He went to Justice Allingham and laid a complaint against Blair. Nobody asked him to the information. He testified that his wife was at present confined to the house and was under the doctor's care.

When the witness was finished with his testimony Justice Allingham asked if the counsel wished to question the witness. Mr. Baxter replied that at present he thought it would be useless for him to proceed with his case. He further said that, until the case was tried before an impartial tribunal, he would not interest himself, but if his client was found guilty before this court, the sentence would be put aside on some technicality, so it would be useless to proceed.

This brought forth some remarks from the justice who stated that Mr. Baxter should not make remarks like that in court. "This is not a court, replied the recorder. "Well," said the Justice, "we will see about that."

Mr. Smith asked that the case be adjourned until Mrs. McBarnie would be able to come to court. Mr. Allingham decided to adjourn until 2 o'clock this afternoon, when they would go to the plaintiff's home and take the evidence of his wife.

Mr. Baxter said that if there would be another justice at the house to take the evidence he would be present.

Just before the court adjourned Mr. Allingham said that Mr. Blair should be kept in custody. Mr. Baxter argued that his client was not a prisoner, as according to law a magistrate would have to take down the evidence of the plaintiff before a warrant was issued. As this was not done, he contended that Mr. Blair was not a prisoner.

"That may be so," said the Justice, "but I am running this court, and I order the constable to take charge of that man."

"Well," said Mr. Baxter, "if he tries to now he is going to get hurt. He has no right whatever to lay his hands on my client, and if he does he will have to take the consequences. If he arrests him, I, as a justice of the peace, will commit him to jail."

Then an argument ensued as to whether Mr. Allingham should proceed with the case or not. He finally agreed to allow another justice to preside.

Mr. Baxter said that he would have his client at the house this afternoon, and as this was agreeable to all, the constable was allowed to go home.
