RECORD OF PAST YEAR.

ATTENDANCE.

During the winter term there were in attendance at the Institute 216 pupils;—108 girls and 108 boys;—101 from the town and 115 from the country. Of the country pupils 68 were from the county of Perth, 20 from Middlesex, 14 from Huron, 5 from Oxford, 4 from Lambton, 1 from Kent, 1 from York, 1 from Victoria, and 1 from Hastings.

SENIOR MATRICULATION.

Three of the Institute students passed the First Year's Examination of the University of Toronto, taking the following honors:

COURSES OF STUDY.

The programme of studies is arranged with the following objects in view:

1. To give a good English Education.
2. To give a good Classical Education.
3. To prepare for Matriculation at the different Universities of Ontario.
4. To prepare for Teachers' Certificates of all grades.
5. To prepare for the preliminary Law and Medical Examinations.
6. To prepare for the Local Examinations for Women.

LOWER SCHOOL.

I.—The subjects of study which are obligatory upon all High School pupils in the Lower School are:

1. English Grammar.
2. English Literature.
3. Composition.
4. Dictation.
5. History and Geography.
6. Arithmetic and Book-Keeping.
7. Drawing.
8. Drill (for boys) and Calisthenics (for girls).

II.—The subjects of study which are optional, but which all pupils are recommended to take up are:

1. Algebra.
2. Euclid.
3. Botany.

III.—The optional subjects, of which a pupil may select one or more, are:

1. Natural Philosophy.
2. Chemistry.
3. Latin.
4. Greek.
5. French.
6. German.
7. Physiology and Hygiene.
8. Music.

UPPER SCHOOL.

In the case of the pupils in the Upper School who are not preparing for the University or other examinations, any parent or guardian, after consultation with the Principal, and with his approval, is at liberty to select for his child or ward one or more of the following subjects, as may best suit the purpose of such pupil, viz.:

1. English Language and Literature.
2. History.
3. Arithmetic and Algebra.
4. Any of the following:

LOCAL EXAMINATIONS FOR WOMEN.

Examinations for women will be held at St. Marys Collegiate Institute in June, 1883.

No candidate will be admitted to these examinations unless she has completed the fifteenth year of her age.

The examinations will be upon the subjects specified for Junior Matriculation, and will be held simultaneously with the ordinary June examinations.

The papers will be distributed by a person to be named by the Senate, who will also collect the answers, and transmit them under seal to the Registrar for delivery to the Examiners.

The questions will be precisely the same as those proposed to the candidates for full matriculation in Toronto.

The subjects of examination are subdivided into groups, for any one or more of which a candidate may enter ; and a candidate may take either the Pass Examination, or both the Pass and Honor Examination, in any such group or groups.

Every successful candidate for Honors will be entitled to a certificate of her exact standing among all the candidates at the Examination for Women.

The subjects of Examination are divided into the following groups :

Group I.—Classics for Junior Matriculation.

Group II.—Mathematics of J. M.

Group III.—English, History and Geography, and French or German of J. M.

Group IV.—Latin, English, History and Geography of J. M.

Group V.—Latin, French and German of J. M.

NOTE—Minimum for passing, 25 per cent.

INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION.

The true object of this examination being to test the fitness of each pupil to proceed from the Lower to the Upper School, it will be regulated so that any pupil of moderate capacity may, after the requisite period of study, pass in the most essential of secondary branches in the Lower School. The obligatory subjects of such examination are therefore limited to the following :—

1. English Grammar.
2. English Literature.
3. Composition.
4. Dictation.
5. Arithmetic.
6. Drawing, and
7. One of the following subjects or groups of subjects at the option of each pupil, viz. :—

- (a) Algebra and Euclid.
- (b) History and Geography.
- (c) Any two of the following three:—Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany.
- (d) Latin.
- (e) French, German, Music.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.

I.—FOR THIRD CLASS CERTIFICATES.

Every candidate for a Non-Professional Third Class Teacher's Certificate must pass the Intermediate Examination, and an additional examination in the following subjects:—

- 1. Mental Arithmetic.
- 2. Two of the optional subjects or groups of subjects prescribed for the Intermediate Examination, in addition to the one taken by such candidate at his Intermediate Examination, provided that the groups of Algebra and Euclid, and of History and Geography, and of Physiology and Hygiene must be taken, either at the Intermediate or additional examination.

II.—FOR SECOND CLASS CERTIFICATES.

(a) Every candidate for a Non-Professional Second Class Teacher's Certificate, who has passed the examination for the Non-Professional Third Class Teacher's Certificate, may present himself at the next or any other subsequent yearly examination for Non-Professional Second Class Teachers' Certificates.

(b) The subjects for the Non-Professional Examination of Second Class Candidates will be the same as those required to be taken by candidates for Non Professional Third Class

Certificates, but the questions will be separate and distinct and of a higher standard.

The times of these Non-Professional Examinations will be in the same week and, as far as may be, concurrent with the Intermediate.

A female candidate may, at either of the above-mentioned examinations, substitute for Algebra one of the subjects of French, German, Music or Botany, in which she has not been examined for the Intermediate.

EXAMINATIONS AND REPORTS.

Weekly written examinations will be held throughout the year in all the Forms, and the results will be published from time to time in the town papers.

Monthly reports of conduct, progress, and attendance, will be sent to the parents or guardians of all the students in the First and Second Forms, and of the junior pupils in the higher Forms.

EXPENSES.

FEES.—All pupils from the town have free tuition. All pupils whose parents or guardians do not pay rates for the support of the Collegiate Institute will pay fees. The fees for the autumn term will be \$4.00; for the winter and spring terms, \$6. These fees are payable in advance.

NOTE. All Upper School pupils have free tuition.

BOARD.—Good board may be obtained in the town in respectable families for \$2.50 per week, or for \$1.75 from Monday till Friday.
