

## War News

### British Official

The Governor, St. John's: London, Oct. 2.—Successes of very considerable importance have been obtained on the Somme. We captured Morval, Les Boeufs, Thiepval and Combles; then captured several entrenched positions north of Thiepval, and yesterday took Baucourt Labyrinth. Some five thousand prisoners were taken during the week.

The French have captured Ran court and Fregicourt.

Since eighteenth September twenty-four field guns and six howitzers have been captured by us.

The Russian report states that near Brody and Brzezny, and over four thousand prisoners.

We have captured a position on the Bulgarian line in the Struma front, defeating counter attacks and capturing two hundred and fifty prisoners.

Boumanian troops, attacked by superior forces at Hermonstadt, retired southwards.

A further raid by ten zeppelins occurred last night. One man was killed, one woman injured, and one zeppelin of the latest type brought down in flames.

## Take the Offensive

Petrograd, Oct. 3. German forces have taken the offensive south of Iwinsky, attacking the Russian lines in force near Leva Alexandrovsk, the war office announced to-day. They were met by an intense defensive fire from Russian guns, however, and forced back to their positions.

## Bridges Destroyed

Berlin Oct. 3.—The war office announced to-day that Austrian-German monitors had destroyed the pontoon bridges across the Danube in the rear of the Roumanian forces which had crossed the river and invaded Bulgaria.

## Violent Fighting

Bucharest, Oct. 3. Violent fighting continues in Transylvania and Dobruja, generally with success for the Roumanians, says to-day's official. The Roumanians have captured more than 500 prisoners in Transylvania.

## Bulgars Abandon Positions

Paris, Oct. 3.—The Bulgars have abandoned several positions in the Stankov, Grobs and Prod River regions. The Entente Allies have occupied Svich, Petorak, Verbeni and Jenikoi, northeast of Florina.

## in the Struma

Berlin, Oct. 3.—A portion of an official issued by the war office to-day concerning fighting in Macedonia, reads: An attack against the British who crossed the Struma north and west of Lake Tasinos has been made and is in progress.

## Provisional Government

Canea, Greece, Oct. 3.—Former Premier Venizelos is expected to leave here shortly for Mytilene, where he will establish the seat of the Provisional Government. Vice-Admiral Coundouritis will go to Salonika to represent the Provisional Government there.

## The Price of Fish

Soft Labrador fish is selling at the highest figure ever paid for it—\$6.50 per qt. The most of the soft Labrador sold here has been purchased at this figure. Soft Labrador is selling to-day at some outports at \$6.50; \$6.20 is paid at a few places. There should be no hesitation at selling at those figures for there is not much hope of higher prices. Dry shore fish is selling here at \$7.50 per qt. Damp and West India cul ed out. The fisher men have secured large prices for fishery produce this year, as the high price was paid before much fish had changed hands. The merchants have very little cheap fish this season, hence all are opposing any higher advances. Stocks here are very small, probably less than 20,000 qts.—Mail and Advocate.



A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.  
To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Nfld. Seaman Killed At North Sydney

North Sydney, Sept. 29.—A distressing accident occurred on Commercial Street last night about midnight, whereby a seaman named Charles Stroud, mate of the schooner Bessie C. Lake, of Rose Blanche, lost his life by being struck by an automobile. It appears that the unfortunate man Stroud, in company with a Captain Street, had been set upon by a gang of toughs and chased down King Street. They beat Captain Street pretty badly and, it is reported, took fifteen dollars off him before he made his escape. Stroud, who got away from them, ran down King Street. In his hurry and fright he ran right into an automobile, owned and driven by Mr. Colin McKenzie, of Sydney, who was proceeding homewards with a party of friends and driving along very slowly when the accident occurred.

Stopped His Car Mr. McKenzie at once stopped his car and saw that the man was quite badly injured. Police Officer Gilbert happened along just at this time and summoned Dr. M. T. McLean, who had Stroud removed to the hospital in Mr. McKenzie's car. Everything possible was done for the poor fellow, but he never regained consciousness and passed away at three o'clock. It is said that the only mark to be seen is a bruise on the forehead. The body is now at Dooley's undertaking parlors, and an inquest will be held in the court house this morning at 10 o'clock, before Coroner A. R. Potts.

Suspect Arrested This morning a fellow named D. Burke, who is supposed to be one of the gang who chased the victim and his companion, was arrested and placed in jail. Three other supposed members of the gang and their arrest will likely follow through the day.

Car Owner Not Blamed No blame whatever is attached to Colin McKenzie for this unfortunate accident, who did not know the poor seaman after the sad occurrence. Stroud was about 25 years of age, unmarried, and a native of Rose Blanche, Newfoundland. Mr. McKenzie, when seen by the Record this morning, said that he regretted the accident very deeply, and that his regret was shared by his friends in the car.

We do, therefore, declare to all our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden— At Brigus, on Friday, the Eighteenth day of November next;

At Harbor Grace, on Monday, the Twentieth, Tuesday, the Twenty-first, Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-fourth, and Saturday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these presents, further order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Northern District of Our said Island being prevented by a prior, seen circumstances from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinafter appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as at aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaol, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.



Hospital Matters

The question of better hospital facilities for the sick and afflicted among our outport population is daily being brought more vividly before the public eye.

We have, on various occasions, spoken rather plainly on the great need that exists for outport hospitals. We again make the plea for at least one such institution north and south of St. John's.

In many of our sparsely settled outports medical attendance is not easily obtainable, and travelling facilities are not always the best.

Then, again, there is the independent class, who take advantage of the hospital. Fortune has favored them with the good things of life.

This matter of hospitals and the proper means of transportation and care for those who have to visit St. John's for treatment (which should be free to the needy) is a burning question.

Our columns are open to the public. We desire that this matter should be thoroughly discussed and agitated. Let clergymen, doctors and others, who know conditions as they exist, give their views in the press, and help better present conditions.

Lost and Found

On Monday last while Mrs. John Mercer, of Moses, Mercer's Cove, was on her way to the Post Office, accompanied by her 10 year old daughter, Minnie B., the latter picked up a purse containing a sum of money.

The S. S. Diana, bringing Job. Bros. crews from the Straits of Belle Isle, arrived in port at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening. After landing the crews, with their gear, etc., at this port, she resumed her voyage to St. John's early Wednesday morning.

Delays In Coal Ports

Now that a revival of ship building on a large scale is soon to take place in this country, it is interesting to note the question of equal rights to Canadian schooner owners and captains in their own home ports receiving considerable attention, especially by the news papers of the Province of Prince Edward Island.

The allegation is that coastwise shipowners and captains of the east and west coast alike are the victims of discrimination in coal ports and have been actually discouraged in their endeavors to make coastwise shipping pay.

The complaint is that there is discriminatory delays of Canadian boats in coal ports as against dispatch and facility for foreign traders, such as Norwegian steamers, etc. An unpatriotic and high handed control by the steel and coal combinations classed as Norwegian, is blamed by Mr. A. G. Baillie, of P. E. I., and the news paper articles for the condition.

It is said that it is a very common occurrence for the skippers of coastwise schooners to be kept waiting many weeks for their coal cargoes, and some return empty handed.

Is this one of the causes why schooner owners in the coal trade charge \$4.50 a ton freight for coal instead of \$2.50 a ton, as heretofore, and consequently the consumer has to pay from \$9.00 to \$10.00 a ton for coal compared with \$6.50 in 1915. If these conditions exist they should be enquired into by the authorities.

Back From North

After an absence of nearly three months, the S.S. Kite, Capt. Parsons, returned to St. John's yesterday morning. The ship left here in July last with a load of supplies for an expedition party at Baffin's Land, but was unsuccessful in reaching that place, owing to heavy ice, though she got to within seven miles of it.

No Clue

No clue to the whereabouts of Mr. Perrine, who so mysteriously disappeared a week ago Monday last, had been found up to the time of going to press today. Some parties, in motor boats, searched along the shore a little this week but found no trace of him. It appears to us that the authorities are not very painstaking in their efforts to clear the matter up. Who is to blame for the indifference shown?

NEWS IN A LIE

The schr. Glaiys S. arrived in port last night with a cargo of coal to Messrs. C. & A. Dawe.

The recruiting headquarters at St. John's are being dismantled and the volunteers moved into billets. They will drill in the C. L. B. armory in future.

Mr. Francis French, one of the oldest residents of French's Cove, passed away on Friday, Sept. 29th, after a week's illness. His funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at the Meth. Cemetery, Rev. S. Bennett officiating.

Less than one hundred pairs of rabbits offered for sale in the city market since the opening of the shooting season. Not in many years have they been so scarce, and the sportsmen and trappers are unable to explain the cause.

Master Bert Sterling, son of Rev. A. B. S. Sterling, met with a painful accident on Water Street yesterday afternoon. It appears that he was following some parties riding motorcycles, and, unknown to one of them, climbed up on the machine, and tumbling off broke his collar bone.

The schooner Betty, Nathaniel Parsons, master, arrived from Labrador on Saturday morning last, after a tedious passage.

Rev. C. A. and Mrs. Whitmarsh, of Brigus, drove to Bay Roberts Thursday afternoon. They returned the same evening.

Messrs. Baine, Johnston & Co., of St. John's, have added a new vessel to their foreign going fleet. The new purchase is a barquentine named John, of over 300 tons.

The little schr. Hope, C. Cave master, arrived in port last Saturday evening from a fishing cruise in the vicinity of Petty Harbor the past summer.

Mr. Ralph Parsons, son of Mr. Wm. Parsons, and brother of Private Wilfred Parsons, has joined the colors. He enlisted in the First Newfoundland Regiment at St. John's on Wednesday last.

The schr. Kitchener filled with water and sank at her moorings in the harbor during Tuesday night. The hull lies in the way of shipping in the upper harbor, and should be removed.

Miss Bebie Fleming, daughter of Thomas and Mrs. Fleming, arrived here from Boston, Mass., recently, on a visit to her parents and friends. Miss Fleming and Miss Cullerton, who accompanied her, are both in the nursing profession.

According to reports received from the northward by the S. S. Prospero, the fishery in that direction has been almost a blank for the past month. A little fish was being taken at Coachman's Cove when the ship was there, and at Catalna on Monday last some of the boats took 7 to 8 qtls.

Chicago has a syndicate of black mailers numbering about sixty, a third of whom are women, according to the confession of some of the gang who have been arrested. Blackmailers endeavor to force money (hush money) out of people by threatening exposure unless it is paid.

The construction of the dams, flumes, etc., for the Union Electric Light and Power Co., at Catalna, are well under way. Engineer Powell, of the Reid Nfld. Co., is superintending the work. A Union Shipbuilding Co. is also being organized, as is also a Marine Dock Co. All these enterprises and more will be located at Catalna. The Guardian is very pleased to see such things taking place in an outport town.

Latest War News

Still More Men

London, Oct. 4.—General Sir William Robertson, Chief of the Imperial Staff at Army Headquarters, said in a speech to day at Dal Jerby, Lincolnshire.—While the Allies are winning slowly, but surely, he wished to impress on his hearers the necessity of procuring more men for the Army and munition factories. In this connection, he said, he had a serious word of warning to give. We are not justified in expecting to win the war, he said, unless the service of every man and woman in the country be utilized to the fullest extent. We must be under no delusion, he continued, as to the end or probable duration of the great struggle. We must be prepared to continue it for a time which cannot at present be estimated. In fact we must prepare for the worst, while we hope for the best. We have adopted in theory the principle of national service. We must see that we put it into practice, because we want more men and we want them now, and eventually we want all who can be spared.

Red Cross Steamer Blown Up

Paris, Oct. 4.—A British Red Cross steamer blew up on Sunday morning in the Straits of Dover, says a Boulogne despatch to the Figaro. The despatch says news of the disaster was received by wireless, but details are lacking.

French Gains

Paris, Oct. 4.—A strongly fortified line of German defenses between Morval and St. Pierre Vaux Wood on the Somme front, has been captured by the French, the War Office announced to day. Two hundred prisoners were taken.

Advance on Lemberg

London, Oct. 4.—After three days of incessant and furious fighting the Russians are reported to have won a considerable advantage in their new drive on Lemberg from the south, and to be threatening the important railroad town of Brzezany, 50 miles S. E. of Lemberg.

The Lorina Enquiry

The enquiry into the why and wherefore of paying a bounty on the schr. Lorina, about which so much has been written, pro and con in the press last winter, is now, we learn, in progress before Auditor General Berteau and Messrs McGrath and Whiteway.

First Newfoundland Regiment

Badges for rejected Volunteers will be issued on application to the Officer Commanding Depot at Headquarters, St. John's, subject to the undernoted conditions as approved by the Governor in Council and published in the Royal Gazette of September 26th, 1916. In the case of Volunteers living outside of St. John's, who have been examined and rejected by the Medical Examiner in their district, a certificate from the Medical Examiner showing cause of rejection should accompany applications.

Rules and Regulations.

- 1. The Badge to be of bronze with Crown, suitable inscription and a number (consecutive.)
2. A register to be kept giving the number of badge, to whom issued, and date.
3. Badges to be issued at Headquarters by the Regimental Authorities, only to men of military age, and not to any man obviously unfit.
4. Badges to be issued only to men who have enlisted and have undergone the regular medical examination.
5. Men rejected prior to the publication of the regulations who apply for badges to submit to new medical examination if required, and not to receive a badge unless still unfit.
6. Penalty on any person other than the man of whom badge is issued wearing same, or having it in his possession (except for repairs), \$50.00.
7. Penalty on owner of badge selling it or giving it away or permitting it to be worn by any other person, \$25.00.
8. Badge-holder required to produce badge for inspection to Regimental Authorities or their appointee whenever called upon to do so. Penalty, \$10.00.
9. Badge holder losing badge to report loss forthwith to Regimental Authorities, and if required, furnish affidavit of loss. Penalty, \$10.00. A new badge may be issued on satisfactory proof of the loss.
10.—Badge holder leaving the country to return badge to headquarters and receive a certificate in exchange.
