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WOMEN DOCTORS.

Why They Succeed.

There are nine medical freshettes this autumn, and this is the largest "mind-the-paint" class since the women began to migrate from their own "Medical Building," some ten years ago, to see if the men were getting anything better than they in the way of training.

There are at present over twenty-five women practicing medicine in Toronto, and after interviewing them thoughtfully and pondering much, an impression is gained, which appears not unreasonable, that in entering medicine, women are not usurpling the natural field of men, but regaining possession of a field for which they have been endowed by nature and which has been wrested from them by strange processes of civilization.

Almost everyone knows that the first woman in Canada to brave Mother Grundy who is always more or less paralyzed when a woman does something she has never done before, was Dr. Emily Howard Stowe, who graduated in New York in 1867 and came to Toronto to practice. The mental attitude at that time is represented by the story of Mary Ann at the dispensary when the doctoress informed her that her illness was serious and she had better go home to bed. Mary Ann trembled and asked breathlessly, "Well then hadn't I better get a real doctor."

Most men won't call in a doctor until they are delirious and their wives do it for them. But there are a number of women who, when other dissipations pall, find it soothing and interesting to have a long, confidential chat with a doctor who will be much exercised over their truly exceptional cases. Only a doctor can realize how finely and nervously wrought is one's high-strung mentality. The family may be sarcastic, but the doctor isn't paid for that. are those who raise their hands in ab horrence at the idea. But, if the woman

17 vessels overdue at head Great Lakes. Tug founders and crew lost-Othe wrecks reported.

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Nov. 12.—Wreeks all over the Lakes mark the path of the most severe storm in the history of fresh water navigation. There are 17 vessels overdue at the head of the Lakes, none of water havigation. Inter any where overdue at the head of the Lakes, none of which have been reported any where.

The Canadian Tow and Wrecking Oo's tug J. R. Horne, which went in search of the steel freighter Leafield, of the Algoma Central Steamship Co.'s line, returned late last night with no word of the missing ship. The Leafield was sighted aground on Angus Island Saturday morning but no sign of her has since been seen. It is thought to be almost a certainty that she slid from the rocks and sank. She was loaded with street rails for this port.

At Parisan Island the steamer Nottingham is said to be hard on the rocks with a great portion of her bottom ripped out. The wrecking tug Sarnia City steamed, up the lake to the overturned freighter yesterday afternoon to endeayor to identify the boat. This is as much as could be accertained as the Lake is still so rough as to make it impossible for divers to go down.

DEATH OF WILLIAM PARKER A highly esteemed P. O. official passes away at Bedford.

The death of William Parker occurred at Bedford this morning. Some years ago when the work in the Halifax post office when the work in the Halifax post office was performed under many disadvantages—as compared with the condition of things as they exist to-day—when a more than ordinary amount of, zeal was called for and considerable physical endurance had to be undergone, one of the most active in the somewhat lighted staff of employees was William Parker. 

The old, old race feeling possesses them—they are back on the old, old paths—they are once more beneath their ancestral palm groves on some Polynesign atoll "at the gateways of the day," where their Eve-like girls and women dance the Yenus dance by the light of the round tropic moon. No pale-face mummers, no pakeha corps de ballet hold one in such thrall as does this poi of the brown villagers of Whakaewarewa or Ohinemutu.

Their faces are daubed with blue and black warpaint, their heads circled with hand-kerchiefs for the purpose of keeping in position the invariable feathered head decorations—for without a prodigal display of feathers, much of the martial spirit of the proceedings would be lost. At a signal from the young hereditary chief, the fiery-eyed descendant of a long line of tribal harses, the Tuwharstoa, who have been crouching in a listening attitude, silent as statues, spring into astonishingly savage life. With another leap, like so many deer, the léader shouts the opening line of the song, "Ui-u-spli-mal-te-waere," an ancient chant, which makes a splendid accompaniment to these dances.
