NEW HARDIE AIR MOTORS.

Successfully Stand Severe Test on Rome, N. Y., Street Railway—Run at Low Maximum Cost.

At the shops of the Compressed Air Company, in Rome, N. Y., six new Hardie air motors, part of an order of twenty-five, have just been completed, and are now in operation on the Rome street railway. One of the new motods had a severe test, travelling from the ball grounds with three loaded trailers, carrying 260 persons, and the chire train-took the heavy grade at the West Thomas branch, making the rin of nearly two miles, including stops, in less than ten minutes.
