

THE HUDSON BAY FLEET STARTS ON ITS LONG TRIP

Little Schooners Engaged in the Fur Carrying Trade, Having Spent the Winter in Britain, Are Now on the Voyage to Canada's Inland Sea.

LONDON, June 18—Leaving the British coast this week is a little fleet of which the like is to be found in no other part of the world. SCOTLAND'S OLDEST CITIZEN IS A DEVOUT CHRISTIAN.

Archibald MacCrimmon, Aged 108, Has His Record Read in Kirk—Steel Combine Has Advanced Prices Five Shillings per Ton.

GLASGOW, June 15.—When the other evening the Free Church of Scotland, otherwise the "Wee Free," resumed their general assembly in Edinburgh, members were cheered by an announcement that a west of Scotland minister was able to make. This was nothing less than that one of the members of the Church was a centenarian, and had communicated for the first time when he was 107 years of age The veteran who is believed to be the oldest Scotchman alive, is named Archibald MacCrimmon, of Snizort, in the Island of Syke.



Will Return to Canada After Second Reading of Bill, Which Was Read First Time Yesterday.

LONDON, June 14.—Winston Church ill, in introducing in the Commons the bill amending the British North America act regarding federal subsidies the provinces, made a somewhat exceptional detailed statement as headers are the large Call ceptional detailed statement as h said, out of respect for the large Can adian interests concerned. He said the other provinces at the Ottawa conference in 1906 admitted that British Columbia had an exceptional claim upon the federal treasury. The British par liament did not know of the relative interests of the various provinces, to judge on which side the merits of the claim lie, but he would be very sorry if it were thought that merits of the claim lie, but he would be very sorry if it were thought that the action of His Majesty's government meant that they had decided to establish as a precedent that whenever there is difference upon the constitutional amendment between the federal government and the provinces, His Majesty's government would always be prepared, if necessarily to accept the federal as against the provincial point view. Such a deduction would be of too sweeping a character. The question the British parliament had to ask itself was, did the constitutional amendments now demand and command the support of a great majority of the people of Canada? About that there could be no doubt. Five millions of the people of Canada were represented in the support of the measure as against 176,000 population of British Columbia. The imperial govern-

sented in the support of the measure as against 176,000 population of British Columbia. The imperial government therefore decided to introduce the bill. The prime minister of Quebec, also Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Fielding, had all made a personal application to the colonial secretary. On the other hand, Hon. R, McBride, prime minister of British Columbia had with great frankness and much force, urged the views and grievances of his province. The imperial government were unable to adopt his arguments entirely, but favored to make legislation agreeable to him by not introducing into it the words, "final and unalterable," which it had been proposed to introduce and which would have prejudiced British Columbia's chance of making some other friendly arrangement in the future with the Dominion and the other provinces. He concluded by reading a letter from Fielding, explaining the desirability of the passage of the bill at the earliest possible moment. Churchill then went to the bar of the house and brought in the bill, which was formally read the first time. The second reading is expected next week, after which McBride will return to British Columbia. He expresses himself well pleased.
