Constitution and Rules of Order

OF THE

EASTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 1.—This association composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they represent; shall be styled "The Eastern N. B. Baptist Association."

Article 2.—The Association shall meet Annually, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on the second Thursday of July, at such places as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference, after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by Prayer.

Article 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

Article 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year immediately on their arrival, the letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preceding year shall call the vote for a Moderator, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the Press.

Article 5.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution within the last year; and generally of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

Article 6.—When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by Letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order; this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, in behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers, if any be present, the right hand of fellowship.

Article 7.—When a Church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successfully, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

Article 8.—Although as an Association, we disclaim all power over the Churches so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any Church or Minister in our connexion, which to us shall appear to be unscriptural in principle or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their inquiries to the Association, that they may decide as duty shall appear.

Article 9.—Alterations and amendments may be made in this Constitution from time to time, such as experience may dictate.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. That each meeting be opened by prayer.
2. That motions be made and seconded according to parliamentary usage.
3. That no delegate speak more than twice to the same motion.
4. That every resolution be written out and handed to the clerk.
5. That motions which are lost be not recorded.
6. That these regulations be read at each session.

The Association resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole on Special Business. Elder Todd in the Chair.

RESOLVED.—That the subject of the Point de Bute Church be taken up.

In connection therewith the Committee appointed last Association to visit said Church made a verbal report, and after mature deliberation it was unanimously

RESOLVED.—That in the opinion of this Body the conduct of Elder David Lawson, as Pastor of Point de Bute Church, is arbitrary and unscriptural, inasmuch as he has caused division in said Church, and is irregular in practice, and although we as an Association disclaim all power over the action of the Church, yet as Mr. Lawson was accepted as a Delegate to this Association from Point de Bute, of which Church he was not a member; therefore

RESOLVED.—That the name of David Lawson be erased from the Minutes of the Association, and further recommend that the Committee appointed last year to visit said Church be requested to discharge their duty, and report next year.

Letter from Point de Bute Church was then read, and it was further

RESOLVED,—That the Minutes of this Association be sent to said Church. Adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock this A. M. Prayer by Rev. Mr. McDonald.

PUBLIC SERVICE, 10 o'clock, A. M., July 12.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by alternate Rev. W. A. Coleman, from Malachi 1st Chapter, 14th verse.

Letters were then read by Clerk from the following Churches:—3d Springfield; Delegates—Rev. G. Springer, and Brother J. Kiersted. 2d Cambridge; Delegates—Brothers W. Corey, and Thomas Mason.

Brothers N. S. DeMill and W. A. Masters invited to take seats in this Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION, 2 o'clock, July 12.

The Association then resolved itself into a Committee of the whole, and took up the subject of Periodicals.

RESOLVED,—That in the opinion of this Committee, we do well to dismiss this subject for the present, and recommend the Association to transact such business as shall tend to advance the interests of the denomination.

The Association then gave place for the Annual Meeting of the N. B. Home Missionary Society.

The President, Rev. S. Robinson, took the Chair, and Rev. I. E. Bill, Secretary of said Society, submitted Report, (see Appendix.) which was Resolved to be adopted and printed in the Minutes. Speeches were made by Rev. Messrs. Spurden, Cady, Hickson, Edwards, Herritt, M'Ginnis, Frances, Sprague, Blackney, and Coleman.

RESOLVED.—That a Committee be appointed to nominate officers for the Home Missionary Society for the ensuing year.

RESOLVED.—That the Association be held at Jemseg, on second Thursday in July next.

Committee to examine and read Circular Letter, report that Rev. S. Bancroft, who was appointed last Association to write Circular Letter, is not present, and there is therefore no Circular Letter to present to this Association.

Letters received and read from the Church at Flatlands, Restigouche.

Letter from Turtle Creek Church was then read, asking this Association to give an expression of opinion upon the ordination of Brother John Fillamore, and after some discussion the following Resolution passed,—

WHEREAS, Hillsboro Church has recognised the ordination of Brother J. Fillamore,

RESOLVED.—That this Association concur in that opinion.

Committee on departed Brethern then presented the following Report, which was adopted.

The Committee on departed Brethern, beg leave to Report:—

That Elder John Marsters has departed this life since the last Association met. He was ordained to the Ministry in November 1834, so that for thirty six years he has

been more or less regularly engaged in the work of preaching the Gospel. Your Committee are not acquainted with the particulars of his movements during such a lengthened period, but among the places where he has ministered are St. Martins, Canning, Grand Lake, Springfield, and Norton, and at Baltimore in the United States. The first person baptized in St. Andrews was baptized by Elder Marsters. By his death another of the older Ministers has been removed from our midst, reminding us that we are all rapidly hastening to the final account of our stewardship. May we be found faithful as Ministers of Christ.

They have also to record with sincere regret the early departure of their beloved Brother Elder W. D. Fitch, who under the influence of insidious disease, departed this life during the past year. He was ordained to the Ministry of the Word in the year 1844, and continued to preach until laid aside by sickness, and as his end drew nearer and nearer, and he became more and more enfeebled by disease, his desire to be engaged in preaching appeared to increase, but the will of the Lord determined otherwise, and he was summoned to his rest. He exercised his ministry, among other places, in Woodstock, Jacksontown, Canning, Upper Gagetown, and occasionally at Hopewell, in which latter place he died. His memory is held in grateful remembrance by the Churches in those places; he was universally beloved for his amiable disposition, his piety and intelligence, and his loss is deplored not only by a large circle of relations and friends, but by all his brethren in the Ministry.

A. D. THOMPSON, CHAIRMAN.

Committee on Education then presented the following Report, which was adopted.

In reporting upon the subject of Education, your Committee are happy to express the belief, that there exists in the Denomination an appreciation of its claims which is truer than ever before; and a solicitude in its behalf which argues well for the future. Our Fredericton Seminary is in a most encouraging condition, and the sound instruction which is imparted there to youths of both sexes, has given it a high rank among similar Academic Institutions in the Province. In Acadia College the efforts of Baptists have met with abundant success. In the higher forms of Education which it imparts, the young men of our denomination will find the means of true advancement; while the Religious influence which it exerts will impart that heavenly knowledge which is life eternal. In this union of religious influence with secular Education, your Committee see what is the true idea of a Denominational College; and believe, that the Institution which Heaven has so highly blessed, will be cherished and cordially sustained by every Baptist in preference to others which are devoid of these influences.

The Moderator then resumed the Chair, and the Report being presented to the Association, was adopted and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

Public service by Rev. E. Cady, after which were delivered a number of warm and deeply interesting speeches, when the meeting adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock, P. M.

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wick Baptist Home Missionary Society. The President—Rev. Sam. Robinson—in the Chair. The Committee appointed to nominate the officers for the ensuing year submitted their Report.

Moderator resumed the Chair. The following Preamble and Resolution was then offered :—

Whereas Brother Hall has become the Proprietor of the Colonial Book Store, and keeps constantly a good supply of Books sustaining Baptist principles ; therefore

RESOLVED,—That this Association recommend Brother Hall, and his establishment, to the favorable consideration of the individual members, Churches, and Sabbath Schools, connected with our Denomination.

RESOLVED,—That all correspondence, both local and foreign, in connection with this Association, be addressed to the Rev. I. E. Bill, of St. John.

RESOLVED,—That Article II. of our Constitution be amended by erasing the word "Saturday," and inserting the word "Thursday," making it read "the second Thursday in July," at such place.

RESOLVED,—That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration the advisableness of removing the Baptist Seminary from Fredericton, and report at the next Association.

Committee to investigate statements made in 5th No. of the *Christian Watchman* submitted their Report, which was unanimously adopted :—

Your Committee report that they invited Brethren Bill, McHenry, Robinson, E. B. DeMill, N. S. DeMill, and others, to give testimony before them in reference to remarks made in the fifth number of the *Christian Watchman*, and from said testimony have come to the following conclusions :—

1st. Rev. E. B. Demill had reason to believe from statements made to him by brethren in whom the Denomination has confidence, that there was nearly £500 due the *Christian Visitor* at the time it was transferred into the hands of Rev. I. E. Bill and R. Thompson; but from testimony given before your Committee, it could not be proved that the amount was more than £300.

He also had reason to believe that Brother Loekey collected £90, £70 of which was *Visitor* money. But from testimony brought before your Committee, it would seem that he collected only £67, what proportion of which was "*Visitor* money" cannot now be ascertained.

2d. Rev. I. E. Bill and R. Thompson were to pay into the hands of Hon. A. McL. Seely, Treasurer of "*Visitor* Committee," all moneys due the *Visitor* after deducting such amount as was due to subscribers who had paid in advance of 17th January, 1852.

It appears from some testimony that none was paid over according to said agreement; from others, that about £40 was paid. Still it appears that whatever moneys were thus collected were used for paying the debts of the *Visitor* to the amount of about £146, and so far as Brother Bill is concerned, we believe that the spirit of his engagement was complied with.

3d. It further appears that Brother E. B. DeMill sincerely regrets the publication of the whole controversy which called forth the said article, still he feels that remarks made in the *Visitor* may strongly be urged in justification of the publication of said article.

Your Committee feel that they have done their duty impartially, and that they do not feel themselves called upon to express any further opinion in the matter, and respectfully beg to be discharged.

The Committee on Temperance submitted the following Report, which was adopted and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following :—

They report the subject of Temperance as one of vital importance, demanding the hearty support of the Baptists of this Province; and would earnestly recommend a continuance of every proper exertion to advance its principles through the pulpit, the platform, and the press.

Your Committee would further recommend to all the Churches of this Association, the propriety of enjoining upon all their members the principles of strict total abstinence, and thus endeavor by precept and example to persuade others to do the same.

J. C. HURD, CHAIRMAN.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools Report with pleasure :—

That according to the statistics furnished by the letters, our Sabbath Schools are in a more flourishing condition than at any other period. They trust that the self-denying efforts of our Ministers, Superintendents, Teachers, and others engaged in this work, will still be successful through the blessing of God. They recommend that the books and periodicals of the Baptist Publication Society be introduced into our Schools wherever practicable.

Thirty-six Churches have reported Sabbath Schools; we regret, however, that in some cases the returns are very imperfect. Fifteen Churches have returned as follows, No. of Schools, 21; Teachers, 94; Scholars, 800; Libraries, 18. Five Churches have returned 6 Schools with 300 Scholars; and 16 Churches have returned 17 Schools, making a total of 44. Seventeen Churches have returned no Sabbath Schools.

In conclusion your Committee recommend that the statistics of the Sabbath Schools be more carefully prepared in future.

REPORT.

Your Managing Committee once more appear before you, for the purpose of giving a bird's eye view of their labours the past year in the Home-Mission field. One of the first Missions established by your Board is at

NEWCASTLE, MIRAMICHI.

On the retirement of Rev. I. Wallace from this field, Brother Edward Hickey, a graduate of Acadia College, was chosen in accordance with the expressed wishes of the people, to take his place. The following condensed report of his labors by his own pen is encouraging:—

"Your missionary has been in this field nearly ten months, during which

time he has confined his labours chiefly to a circuit of forty miles, embracing four small churches. The regular preaching stations were Newcastle, McKay's Settlement, Whitney's Settlement, Little Southwest, North Esk, and Black River. There has been preaching regularly every Friday evening in the Town of Newcastle. A visit was made to Doak Town in January, and in May one was made to Bathurst, notices of which have already appeared. Your missionary during these ten months has travelled 1857 miles, visited 144 families, attended 30 Prayer and Conference Meetings, preached 112 sermons, organized one Sabbath School, and received some \$120, in addition to the amount received from the Board. There is a Mission House now in course of erection in Newcastle; and an effort will be made to finish the Meeting House in Black River this season. The finishing of the North Esk Meeting House is also contemplated. The cause of Christ has not made that advancement that could have been desired, yet there is cause for thankfulness and hope.

This valued brother is highly appreciated by the people of his charge; but he feels it to be his duty to devote himself to a field less extensive, so as to be able to give more time to study, consequently the Board is under the necessity of securing the services of another minister to take his place. This section of the Missionary field is assuming very great importance. Newcastle is a growing town, and its commercial relationships are being rapidly extended. The money and labour expended there, have produced highly encouraging results. At the several stations the cause has been much revived and strengthened. Many have put on Christ; and four Baptist Chapels have been erected: and now, as stated by Brother Hickson, a Parsonage is in course of erection at Newcastle. Our esteemed Brother, John Harding, takes a lively interest in this Mission, and has contributed largely to its support. He says it is the key to that vast northern country, extending on to the Canadian boundaries.

RESTIGOUCHE.

Your Board have done what they could to strengthen the infant cause in this northern county. Rev. W. A. Crandall removed to that region some two years ago, and laboured indefatigably and successfully the first year without any support except what he received from the people. For the last year the Board has contributed a small amount to aid him in his self-denying work. His last report to the Board was dated April 29. In this he says: “For a few weeks past there appears to be a deep solemnity pervading the minds of the congregation, and several are inquiring the way to God. About 50 scholars are in regular attendance at the Sabbath School. Since I last met with the Board, I have been engaged preaching twice and three times on the Sabbath, attending our Sabbath School, Conferences, and visiting and preaching through the week.”

Rev. D. Blakeney has also been labouring in Restigouche since September last. He was invited there by the people, and applied for some assistance to your Board, and obtained a grant of \$40. He has laboured principally at New Bandon and Armstrong's Brook. Up to April 13, he reports having travelled 2600 miles, preaching 84 sermons, attended and addressed four Conference Meetings, and delivered four Temperance addresses.—Received from the people \$56.40. He says “That Restigouche field presents at present a most inviting and encouraging prospect for missionary operations, and the call is loud and earnest for the united prayers and liberality of our churches.”

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DOAKTOWN AND BLISSFIELD.

Rev. H. M. Edwards has this field in charge. His last report is dated July 1st. The storms and drifts of winter interfered somewhat with the progress of his work; but he speaks of the people as being united in the faith, and being interested in his ministry. He says:

"During my eleven months' missionary labour in the North, I have travelled 1658 miles, made 353 pastoral visits, attended 181 meetings for preaching, held 20 Conference Meetings, baptized 10, Communion monthly. We have three Sabbath Schools in good working order, well supplied with books, &c. The Lord has blessed our labours. The Church has been revived, sinners have been converted, and peace and harmony reigns in all our borders. The Lord has done great things for us, whereof we are glad.

They have given him a unanimous call to preside permanently with them as their pastor. This accords with the wishes of your Board. They are desirous to aid the Churches as far as possible in order to establish a permanent pastorate. But the main reliance for financial support in most cases is upon the people for whose welfare the pastor labours. If he minister to them in spiritual things, they should in return bestow on him as God prospers them, in temporal things. Your Board are of opinion that this field should be nearly, if not quite, self-sustaining, and cannot but hope that increased liberality on the part of the people will soon make it so. The success which has attended the exertions of your Board in the Northern Counties is fraught with encouragement in relation to the future. In 1853, Rev. B. Scott was our first missionary to the North. His appointment took place at that period. Then the only Baptist Minister in that northern district was Elder Tozer. Three or four small churches had been established; but, with the exception of the Church at Blissfield, they were without pastoral labour, and were in a scattered, disorganised condition. Now we have seven churches, the most of which are in a healthy condition, and with brother Tozer, five ministers. The field is daily whitening to the harvest. There is plenty of work now for two additional ministers. What is wanted is the fund to sustain them.

SHEDIAC.

This is a mission of growing importance. Your Board has from the beginning felt a deep interest in its support, but owing to the deficiency in funds there have been frequent interruptions in the work.

Numerous applications were made by the friends of the cause at Shediac to the Board for help, and they were finally enabled to give encouragement to the amount of \$100 per annum toward the support of an efficient missionary. Stimulated by this promise, and by a consciousness of the necessities of the case, the brethren were induced to extend an urgent call to Rev. William Coleman in the month of January last, and to make most praiseworthy exertions to make up the needful salary. He accepted the invitation, and has been prosecuting his work with vigor and success. His last report was dated May 13th, in which he says:—"We have still encouragement to labor in this place. We have had the privilege of administering the ordinance of baptism to believers for six Sabbaths. Twelve have been baptized. During my three months' ministry here seventeen in all have been added to the Church; five of them by letter." He reports also a Sunday School in faithful operation, with 75 scholars and 12 teachers; but requiring very much an increase of books. Our brother Coleman is doing a most efficient work in Shediac, and God's blessing is resting upon his ministry. Your Board hopes that their efforts to sustain

a stated ministry at Shediac will receive the whole-hearted co-operation of all the Churches.

DUNDAS AND BIG BUCTOUCHE.

This extensive field has been occupied for the last year by Rev. C. Spragg, who has devoted himself with untiring zeal and energy to the important trust committed to his care. His report is full of encouragement. He says:—"The field that I occupied is as follows, namely, Dundas and Big Buctouche, Buctouche Church, Mill Creek Settlement, and McLain Settlement. At Dundas and the head of Buctouche I have held ninety-nine religious meetings, baptized five, and regularly every four weeks, administered the Lord's Supper twice. Buctouche Church held forty meetings, baptized one, and administered the Lord's Supper occasionally. Mill Creek held six meetings. McLain Settlement held two meetings, and in addition to religious services we have established three Sabbath Schools. At the different stations where I have laboured, and throughout the field generally, a deep interest seems to be manifested, and many I trust are seriously inclined. There are several inquiring souls whom I trust will soon see it to be their duty to unite with the Church. In making my various appointments I have to experience much labor and fatigue of body, yet I am encouraged to hope that my labors are not in vain, but are being blessed, and I pray they may be a blessing to many. The above statements have reference to that portion of my time as directed by the Board. In addition to the above I am labouring with the second Moncton Church and the second Coverdale Church.

In the second Moncton Church we enjoyed a refreshing season last winter. In unison with my brother Goldrup, we had a series of meetings, and the Lord blessed our labors. Sixteen were added to the Church by baptism, and I hope a good impression made upon the minds of several others. In presenting this my report, I have aimed at presenting the plain and simple facts in connexion with my mission, without any intention to deceive or mislead. And now in conclusion, I humbly ask your prayers and the prayers of my Brethren, that God's cause may be promoted, and that sinners may be converted."

LITTLE RIVER AND POLLET RIVER.

Rev. J. F. Goldrup is partially sustained by funds of our Society, and appears to be doing a good work. He reports as follows, viz:—"I entered into the field of my present labor on the 25th of last July, and although I have had strong opposition to contend with, yet I trust that good has been done. The attention of the youthful part of the community seems to be called up. Deep solemnity rests upon them, and they appeared to be deeply interested in the word preached. I am greatly encouraged in my work, believing that God is blessing the same. We have a good Sabbath School in one part of the field, and I trust that God will bless it. While labouring under the direction of the Board in the field assigned me, I have held one hundred and forty meetings; and since my ordination, regularly administered the Lord's Supper to the Churches of which I am pastor. During the last winter I visited the Bend Mountain Church of which Brother Spragg is pastor. On the day after my arrival, a special revival commenced, and I felt it my duty to remain and labour with Brother Spragg. We laboured together for three weeks, and the Lord blessed our labors, and sixteen, as you have been already informed were baptized, and added to the Church. I beg the Little River and

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Pollitt River will not be overlooked by the Board as a field for Missionary labor. There are a great number of poor people, who are in trying circumstances, and entirely unable to pay anything towards my support, yet they are very anxious that the Gospel should be preached amongst them, and they manifest the same by a regular attendance to all the meetings. In conclusion I would say that the field appears white for the harvest, and I am much encouraged in laboring with and for the people. Brethren, pray for us, that the word may have effect, and that many precious souls may be converted to God."

NEW IRELAND AND MECHANICS' SETTLEMENT AND PROSPER BROOK.

By the recommendation of the Albert County Quarterly Meeting, Rev. W. Pulsifer was appointed to labor three months in this field, and to receive from the Missionary Treasury ten pounds towards his support while performing this service. His mission was faithfully performed, and there is reason to hope that good was done in the Master's name.

NORTH RIVER, SALISBURY.

Rev. James Herrett, by the request of the people, was placed in charge of this field. Prior to Brother Herrett's mission, the people in that section had not much Baptist preaching. But he has gone heartily into the work, and reports as follows:—

"NORTH RIVER, June 10, 1861.

"My missionary labors commenced Dec. 11th, 1860. I labored some 22 days; during that time I organized a Church, and baptized two. Our meetings were generally well attended, and the presence of the Lord seemed to be manifest in every heart. Up to June 10th, I have been with them 14 Sabbaths, and preached twice each Sabbath. Week days I visited from house to house, prayed with the people, and conversed about the salvation of the soul. Also preached on week days as often as convenient. The Church unites in asking the prayers of all that love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity."

LOCH LOMOND MISSION.

Our valued Brother A. Washburn was appointed to this field when a licentiate from St. Martin's Church. The cause at that time in that whole region of country was in an exceedingly low state, and the Church at Loch Lomond, through mismanagement and neglect of pastoral oversight, thoroughly disorganized. The missionary engaged in his work with commendable zeal, and in a short time the aspect was more favorable. Brethren Robinson and Bill were invited to Loch Lomond to consult in reference to the re-organization of the Church. By their advice and assistance this was effected. The result was favourable, and the cause so revived that a council was called from the city to consult in relation to the propriety of ordaining the missionary. The ministers and brethren in attendance recommended that he should be ordained, and he was accordingly set apart by the imposition of hands. Since then he has been much encouraged, and is extending his field of labor. In a recent report our missionary says: "I have spent three-fourths of my time in the mission field. I trust my labor has not been in vain. The places in which I labor, under the auspices of your Board, are the following:—Patterson Settlement, Wade and Stackhouse Settlements, and Loch Lomond. In the latter place we have been

much blessed. In my former report I named the organization of 19 Church members at Looh Lomond, October 15th, 1860. Since that time those restored, added by letters, and by Baptism, have more than doubled the membership. The Church now numbers forty, and they have doubled their subscriptions as well as their membership. I might observe that I have added Harding Settlement to the number of my preaching stations for the ensuing year. This is a most interesting field. A large attendance is given to the means of grace. The Baptist interest in this place has been sadly neglected. But now, through the zeal of sister Harding and others, we have a neat Baptist Chapel finished outside, and the inside nearly ready for plastering. I have in contemplation visiting this place semi-monthly. I feel thankful to the Board for the sympathy that they have shown me as their Missionary, and the uniform kindness I have received from its members at all times."

DIPPER HARBOR AND GONDOLO POINT.

Rev. E. M'Innis is our Missionary in these two places, and he has attended to his duties with earnestness and prayer. We are happy to add that his labors have not been in vain in the Lord. In his report, he says: "Since I commenced my mission, I have preached 78 sermons, attended five prayer and three conference meetings, and have travelled 444 miles. I have made 129 visits, baptized 5, added 4 by letter, and collected £12 2s. 6d." It is of immense importance that these outposts should be fully occupied. Some of the brightest jewels in our Churches are gathered in from these places. If the Churches will furnish the means, your Board will see that none of these posts will be neglected.

ST. ANDREWS.

Your Board have long felt desirous to aid the cause in this ancient town, but they felt in order to do an effective work there, it would be necessary to have continuous labor in the field. Some time ago the Rev. Stephen March visited St. Andrews; the people became interested in his ministry, and made arrangements to secure his services a portion of the time, in the expectation that your Board would render what assistance they could. The case was submitted to the Board, and they most cheerfully pledged ten pounds per annum towards the support of Brother March in St. Andrews, for one-half of his time. His report speaks hopefully in relation to the future. He is engaged in a most important enterprise, and your Board will not fail to render all the assistance they can consistently with other claims. He says: "I have laboured six months under the direction of the Board in the town of St. Andrews, preaching twice a day, and attending a prayer meeting every alternate Sabbath; paid quite a number of visits, travelled above 520 miles, and received for the Board the sum of ten dollars. The congregations have been good, and when there has been no service in neighboring places of worship, large efforts have been made to support the Gospel by the few Baptists who reside there, and strenuous exertions put forth to raise an edifice in which the Gospel may be constantly preached, that shall prove to be a home to the followers of Christ who may hereafter be united with them. A Bazaar has just been held, and some \$235 raised, to be applied towards the accomplishment of so desirable an object. There has been no special manifestation of Divine power, but a deep solemnity has characterized all the meetings, and your Missionary trusts that the seed of the Gospel which has been sown by him in weakness

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will be raised in power, and an abundant harvest of souls be gathered in to the glory of redeeming grace."

MASCAREEN.

A mission of a few weeks was performed last Summer by Rev. John Magee in this place. He reports that the seeds of error had been sown among the people, and had produced division of sentiment and feeling. His meetings, however, were well attended, and his instructions well received. One aged person was baptized, and the occasion was one of much interest.

SCOTCH TOWN, LITTLE RIVER.

Rev. David Crandal is stationed, by the request of the people, in this district. He labors indefatigably to win souls to Christ. He reports having preached during the quarter 30 sermons, attended eight Prayer and Conference meetings, and made 113 ministerial visits. His labours have extended over Scotch Town, Maquappet Lakes, Little River and some other places. He is encouraged to hope that some persons have experienced the power of truth, and that they will soon make it manifest by publicly professing their faith, and by yielding a cordial obedience to the laws of Christ. He reports two Sabbath Schools, one at Scotch Town, and the other at Maquappet Lake.

SALMON RIVER.

Brother John Curry, Licentiate of Gageton Church, devoted three months last autumn and winter in the Salmon River district, under the direction of your Board. His visit, as we are informed, has resulted in his settlement in that place.

OROMOCTO AND RUSHAGONISH.

These stations have been occupied by Rev. John Williams for the last year. He reports having preaching stations at the Oromocto, and three or four at Rushagonish. He has met with a good deal of opposition from the enemies of the Baptist cause, but he is sustained by the promises and presence of the Master. He reports a Sabbath School in his district, and says the churches are doing the best they can for his support. At the Rushagonish a worthy Christian Sister, by the name of Smith, who departed this life on 22d of last month, bequeathed to the Baptist Church 40 acres of land, a portion of which is under good cultivation, and having upon it a nice house. This was a Christian act, and will greatly aid the little Church in their effort to sustain the ministry among them.

WOODSTOCK AND NORTHAMPTON.

By the advice of the Rev. David Nutter, Rev. Allen Barrows, of the State of Maine, was invited by your Board to devote some time as their Missionary in this section. He accepted the invitation and entered upon the work the 1st of September last. He laboured indefatigably for six months, but not having his expectations realized after six months' trial, he resigned the mission. His reports exhibit a persevering application of all the means in his power to build up the cause, and an earnest desire for the salvation of souls. The people esteemed him as an able expounder of the Word of God, and a faithful Minister of the Lord Jesus. Though no special blessing upon his labours was apparent, yet there can be no doubt that the truth so faithfully proclaimed by him will be productive of lasting benefit.

RICHMOND.

Your Board grants a small sum to aid in the support of Rev. J. C. Blakney in this Parish. There are two small Churches in Richmond, one of which was organized since he went there. He was ordained Pastor over the new Church and has the Pastoral charge of both. In a recent report, he says, "Preaching Stations, 7. Sabbath Schools, 3. and large congregations." He has baptized one this summer, and is praying and laboring earnestly for a renewal of God's work.

REV. T. TODD'S MISSION.

This is a general missionary agency under the direction of your Board for the benefit of the whole. Our Brother's field is the Province of New Brunswick; the special design of which is to explore the necessities of the country; give assistance to feeble churches; awaken a more earnest missionary spirit; preach the gospel publicly and from house to house, and to collect funds for the Missionary Treasury. Your Board considers this mission in its connection with the Union movement as indispensable to the success of the Home Mission Work. He is invariably well received by the Churches, and is laying a broad foundation for future success. The scarcity of money in the country has proved a very serious drawback to his financial success, but though his collections have not been equal to what they would have been, had the finances of the Province been in a more healthy condition, still through his labours your Board has been enabled greatly to extend the sphere of its operations. His last report is as follows:

To the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society.

DEAR BRETHREN,—Since your last annual meeting, I have travelled extensively through the Province, chiefly, it is true, for the Union Board. On an average I have preached five times a week, besides attending other meetings. I have spent three months of the year in direct Missionary Work, where I felt that God in his providence required my service. During which time I assisted in the organization of four new Churches, two ordinations, and preached the dedication sermons of two new Meeting Houses, and baptized seven persons. Three of these new Churches adopted the Union and subscribed at once about eighteen pounds; the addition of such Churches is quite an object. As a denomination we should look more closely after the new settlements of our Province. There is great progress in the agricultural department. New settlements are springing up all around, and these should be new fields of Missionary enterprise. And if our young brethren who feel the 'and of God upon them, were to go into those localities and preach Christ to the people, in a log house or in a barn, they would be well received, and I believe it would be productive of very great good. Our Fathers in the Gospel did so, and God crowned their labours with marvelous success. Other denominations are (to their praise be it spoken) pursuing this very course. The ground by them is being taken up and they have the first claim. As a people we require more missionary souls, and more missionary money. God has blessed our missionaries during the past year. Some small Churches have been quite reasuscitated, and souls have been converted to God. And yet the Macedonian cry is heard on all sides. As Baptists, we ought still to bestir ourselves. Our Churches have been doing more this past year than in former years, but I do believe they have not come up quite to the point yet. I am not prepared to give you the amount of money raised, as I cannot make out my financial report until the Association.

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This is but mere apology for a report. I will prepare a proper one for insertion in the Minutes.

It will be seen by the above statements that the labors of your Board during the past year, are far in advance of any preceding year. Nineteen Missionaries altogether have been in the field, and all of these engaged all the time, with the exception of three or four whose term of service has varied from six weeks to six months. The remuneration from the Board has been in many cases small when compared with the labor performed. But the great objects of the Board is to encourage a permanent ministry, and to stimulate the weaker Churches to help themselves in relation to this matter. A great work remains to be done. Churches are dying out for the want of the ministry of the Word. Vast tracts of country are a moral waste. On all hands, doors are open for the preaching of the Word by our Missionaries, and the promise holds good :—"Lo, I am with you alway." Let us faithfully discharge our duty and we shall not fail in the reward.

REPORT.

In presenting their twenty-fifth annual report of the proceedings of the Society, the Committee appointed to conduct its affairs are happy to say that the Seminary still continues to deserve the confidence and encouragement of the Denomination: The number of pupils, who have entered during the year, has been eighty, and the average attendance has been forty-four each week, throughout the year. The diligence and progress of the Students have been very commendable, and their general behaviour such as to give much satisfaction to the Teachers. In the winter the usual exercises of recitations and original essays were held in the presence of a large audience, who appeared to be highly gratified with what they heard. In the summer the classes were examined in the various branches of English, Classical, and Mathematical studies, and the Examiners expressed themselves much pleased with the readiness and correctness of the answers given, as well as with the general intelligence of the youths.

During the past year the outside of the building has been thoroughly painted, and also the floors inside; the expense thus incurred amounted to nearly fifty pounds, which has been met by Donations obtained in St. John and Fredericton, and by the amount received from the Union Society.

A few weeks before the close of the term Brother McLeod, a Licentiate of the Woodstock Church, commenced his studies under the encouragement of the Union Board with good promise of future benefit.

The prosperity of the Society must in a great measure depend upon the

efforts of its friends in its favour, and the sympathy and co-operation of the Ministers and Members of our Churches throughout the country. The success of kindred Institutions, while it is a source of joy to the friends of education connected with our body, ought also to stimulate them to further exertion on behalf of our own Seminary, that our youth may derive the utmost benefit from the advantages which are placed within their reach.

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REPORT

OF THE

Union Society of the Eastern N. B. Baptist Association.

It will be observed that I was requested by the above body, at its late session, to prepare a report on said Society. It will not be expected that I shall say much about the Agency, or the work done by the Agent, during his past service in this department, suffice to say, that one year and five months have been devoted exclusively to the financial work in both Associations. About eighty Union Societies have been formed, with eighty Secretary-Treasurers and two hundred and fifty Collectors appointed. The cash receipts during those months have been (\$3,016) three thousand and sixteen dollars, and, including the arrangements made by the Agent for the Grand Falls and Tobique, there is in subscription on the Ledger about (\$1600) sixteen hundred dollars. We expect quite an amount of this to be paid at the Western Association in September. Had not the times been peculiarly embarrassing the greater part of the above sum could have been collected without delay. It will be remembered that the Eastern Churches last year paid for Home Missions £16 3s. 4d., as reported in the Minutes of that year. Compare the conjoined report with *that*, and the utility of system will at once appear, even to the sceptic. Now that we have a uniform financial organization in our Churches, let our Ministers, Deacons, and Members take hold and work it, without a General Agent; thus they will save time and expense. The Agent will not allude to toil connected with this work, but refer to kindness received on all hands from the Ministers and Churches, and deeply regret that he was not more qualified for the work to which he was appointed. I am confident that we have arrived at the right plan. Let us therefore not abandon it. There may be some little discrepancy in publishing the names of subscribers in our report. To be perfectly accurate in this requires more attention than the superficial man is prepared at once to recognize. Any mistake that may occur is not intentional, and therefore we hope will be overlooked.
