The total catch in Fundy's waters in that section of the bay from Lorneville to Dipper Harbow was, according to a local merchant who handles the largest portion of the season's catch, lower than for the corresponding period in 1912; the increase he estimated at about thirty per cent. over last year.

Employed in the business were somewhere around seventy-five or eighty boats.
