





Paris, Nov. 11, 10.40 p. m.—The following French official statement was issued tonight: "The enemy has continued all day his effort of yesterday without accomplishing any new result. He has directed against Lombartzyde a counterattack which has been "opulsed, and has made vain attempts to debouch from Dixmude on the left bank of the Yser. "There is nothing new to report from the rest of the front."

GERMANY

London, Nov. 11, 6.20 p. m.--The following German official state-ment, issued this afternoon, is contained in a despatch from Berlin transmitted by the Marconi Wireless Company: "We made good progress yesterday on the Yser branch of the Ypres, and took Dismude by storm, capturing more than 500 prisoners and nine machine guns. "Further south our troops crossed the canal, and west of Lang-march captured the first line of the enemy's position, ... About two thou-sand infartry were taken prisoners, and six machine guns were cap-tured.

tured. "South of Ypres, we have driven the enemy out of St. Elol. "Despite of fierép counter attroks by the British, the dominating heights to the north of Armentieres remain in our hands. "Our attack has made progress to the southwest of Lills. The French suffered heavy losses while attempting to recapture command-ing heights to the north of Vienne-Le-Chateau, in the forest of Argonne, and to the northeast and south of Verdun French attacks were every-where repuised. "No important information is at hand from the eastern theatre of the war.
