# LLARTON DEAD ABOUT 100

# ACADIA COLLIERY DISASTER NEAR STELLARTON, N. S.,

Estimated that Nearly One Hundred Miners Lost Food Controller W. Their Lives in Allan Shaft — About One-Fifth of Bodies Have Been Recovered - Little or No Hope That Anyone in the Mine Will Be Found

Gas All Out of Mine and Work of Bringing Out Bodies Proceeding Night and Day — Fire Breaks Out in Shaft—Families of Dead Miners in Need of Assistance—Disaster Will Seriously Aggravate Coal Shortage.

New Glasgow, N. S., Jan. 24-That nearly one hundred per ons perished in the disastrous explosion at the Allan shaft of the Acadia Coal Co's collieries between here and Stellarton late ye terday was the opinion of practically every person on the scene to night. It is known that 105 men were in the mine at the time of disaster and that seven miners on an upper level escaped injury venteen bodies have been recovered, a dozen being those of Stellarton and Westville men. The bodies are badly disfigured.

There is now no gas in the mine and the work of clearing away the debris is proceeding. A few small falls at the bottom of the shaft have been cut through but there appear to be heavy falls ahead and officials are unable to say when they will be able to reach bodies still in the mine. They have given up all hope of any of the men being alive, maintaining that all who were not crushed to

death by the debris must have died of suffocation many hours ago.

**Charges Prime Minister** Cabinet with Failing British Armies in the Present Conditionssions on Western From

London, Jan. 24—The situation on the western front is now critical, in the opinion of Colonel C. A. Repington, one of the foremost English military critics, who recently resigned from the Times and became military correspondent of the Morning Post. In his first contribution to the Post, which appears in today's issue, he criticizes Premier Lloyd George and the war cabinet severely because, he asserts, they have failed to maintain the strength of the British armies in the west, thereby creating the present conditions.

west, thereby creating the present conditions.

Colonel Repington begins his article by saying that he intends not to mince matters. The Germans, he says, now have 185 divisions on the western front, or more than all the Allies combined, excluding the Italian theatre. The number of German troops is being increased, he adds, at the rate of soven to fifteen divisions monthly, and may be expected to reach more than 200 divisions as soon as it is possible to concentrate them. The arrival of some Austrian forces is also to be expected and news already has come of the appearance of some Austrian troops in this region. Remarking that the accumulation of this immense force may be either to push negotiations or a grand attack, the writer says all points to the impending delivery of a series of great attacks.

"This is the same Senator Stone," he cried, "who voted against the declaration of war last year, who engaged in fillbustering operations against our taking action to defend ourselves, operations of a kind which drew public rebuke, to those engaged in them from the president of the United States."

Washington, Jan. 24—Standing firm-ly by his charge that the United States ily by his charge that the United States military establishment is enmeshed in inefficiency, Senator Chamberlain, of Oregon, chairman of the military committee, replied in the Senate today to President Wilson's denunciation of his New York speech, by repealing the statement which drew the president's fire, and declaring' that the president himself does not know the truth.

Senator Chamberlain declared he would show that hundreds and thousands of illness at cantonments and camps were due to the war department and that all epidemics could have been prevented if the war department had been effective.

Senator Chamberlain read to the Senate a letter received from President's charge that he had not been consulted regarding proposed legislation to be offered in Congress.

After speaking nearly three hours Senator Chamberlain concluded with a plea that he was only doing his duty in arousing the country to its danger and that he would support the president although grossly maligned.

Senator Kirby, of Kansas, a Democrat, replied. The Chamberlain re-organization bill, on motion of Senator Hitchcock, was referred to the military committee without objection when Senator Kirby had concluded.

Because leaders desired to prevent further debate the Senate adjourned until Monday.






