Additional Particulars of the Disaster in Long Island Sound.
A GRAPHIC NARRATIVE.
WHAT WAS SEEN AND WHAT WAS DONE AFTER THE COLLISION.
New York, June 12, 1880.—Mr. C. C. Coffin, New York, writes to the *Stonington* left her dock at Stonington at 9:45 p. m. Friday. There was the usual number of passengers. The Steerage and Berths were all occupied, and there were also a few cots. There was a fog, not very dense, but the fog whistle was sounded from the start. I went to bed at 10:30, fell asleep, and awoke hearing the whistle all the while. I heard a signal, two or more short whistles in succession, and then the engine stopped. My stateroom was amidships. It might have been either before or after the stopping of the wheels before I felt a shock and heard a crack. It was the work of perhaps a minute to put me out of my stateroom and erect a short while doing it I heard screams and several voices say, "Keep quiet." Going into the saloon, I saw two young ladies and four or five men; a minute or two later and the passengers were out, a few with life preservers on. I looked at my watch, and saw that it was 11:45. Running to the stern, I saw a steamer about 100 feet away, her lights nearly all out. "The steamer is all smashed in," said one. "A man was knocked overboard," said another. The lights were pretty much out. Both steamers were blowing their whistles, both letting off steam, and it was difficult to hear anything amid the babble of voices. I went down to the middle passage; I saw two or three deck hands were there. A negro came and said, "You are wanted for the boat." They went up on the run. Most of the passengers by this time had left the steamer, but did not cover a listing of our steamer, I did not put one on. I saw a glimmering light on the other steamer, which, by this time, was a quarter of a mile away. "They are not fired," was the shout from a dozen voices, followed by screeching on our own boat, but in a few moments, the noise quieted down. I looked at my watch, and saw that it was 12:05.

THE MEN WERE AT THE BOATS.
I stood on the guard and helped steady the aft starboard boat, which was quickly in the water. An officer and four men sprang in one of them and a passenger. I afterwards learned that it was James Tripp of Arlington, Mass., who did noble service, making four trips, and aiding in the saving of about 60. It was 12:13 a. m., when the first boat put off, and the other four followed in quick succession. At 12:20 the sky was bright with the light of the burning steamer, all on fire amidships and spreading aft. The fog was very dense; we could not see the smoke stack, flag staff, beams, windows, and in the line of light, two boats with persons around them struggling.
Never again will I hear such a wall of noise as came to us over the water. There was a glimmer through the fog. Our own boat was sounding its whistle and sending up rockets to guide the boats. I saw the two boats, one of them was in the water, and the other was on the water. The captain of the *Stonington* had wisely stationed a guard at the stairway to prevent the passengers from rushing to the lower deck to impede the taking in of the rescued; but a man came up, calling for a physician. No physician was found. Having seen not a little of the first boat work, I saw the steamer services were tendered, and the men asked to go down to the lower saloon, where I found seven or eight living senseless upon the dining tables, three or four were insensible, but vigorous round, trying to lie in a liberal way. It was but the work of a moment to run a knife through their clothes, and to have the savant's work with blankets snatched from the berths. The cook had thoughtfully made some coffee and one or two gentlemen had brandy flasks. Some three or four were insensible, but vigorous friction of the limbs revived them. Help was wanted in the ladies' saloon, and I went up and found the floor covered with masses of dead women upon the seats. Some had been rescued, and some were insensible, with their damp clothing hanging limp around them. A large number of women were at work, and one or two men, some blind, others intelligently, and others standing dazed, not knowing what to do. One of the last women to be rescued was thin, spare and of middle age. I was at work upon a woman when a man came and said, "Here, sir, I think this case needs your attention." The eyes were fixed, but I could detect a fluttering of the heart, and a dozen women in an instant were at work upon her. There were two Sisters of Mercy on board. They had been unfeeling from the first.

BREATHED IN HER LUNGS.
and for 15 minutes everything was done that could be done to resuscitate her, but in vain. The heart ceased to beat, and there was no response of vitality to all our efforts. A Sister of Mercy closed her eyes, and I arranged her dark hair and I crossed her hands upon her heart and smoothed her limbs. No one knew her. We gave our attention to the others. I have since learned that a child of the steamer was saved. Before leaving the guards to take part in the work in the saloon, I heard a whistle and saw the *City of New York* come into view.
