The co-operation was secured of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, of the McDonald College and of the Intercolonial railway. A train of seven cars was specially fitted up, with exhibits illustrating dairy and beef cattle, poultry and poultry appliances, soils and drainage, weeds and seeds, dairy appliances, sinsects and insectides, fruit growing and hotticultural work, including practical demonstrations of spraying. Living accommodations were furnished aboard the train for the corps of instructors and train crews. Expert instructors from McDonald Colledge and the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture were in charge of the partment of Agriculture were in charge of the various exhibits and gave lectures at each stopping point. 


